Greg Carpenter Reflects on His Career as the City Manager

Put a wrap on it. After a 31-year career in the public sector working for municipal governments including 11 years here, El Segundo City Manager Greg Carpenter has officially retired. His last day was June 28 and his successor, Scott Mitnick, took over the position on July 1. Ready to enjoy his next chapter with his wife Julie by spending more time at their second home in Lake Nascimento near Paso Robles (where he will be tasked with enough home improvement projects to almost rival his workload at City Hall), Carpenter looked back at his career and confirmed that it went by in a flash.

It all began with a job in the City of Long Beach's planning department back in 1988 and over a decade of rising up the ranks, followed by a brief stint at the City of Lawndale from 2001 to 2002. Carpenter returned to Long Beach to run the planning department there and figured he would stay put "forever." That is until he received an unexpected call from his home town. It seemed that the City of El Segundo needed someone to lead the Planning and Building Safety Department after the retirement of Gary Chicots. Though not unhappy where he was, Carpenter couldn't help but be intrigued. Not only were the salary and benefits better, but the challenges of the job appealed. And then there was the commute: A three-minute walk from his house on Standard Street versus a 45-minute snail-paced drive on the 405. That made the decision a no-brainer.

Carpenter ran Planning and Building Safety for three-and-a-half years until another unanticipated event -- the sudden dismissal of then-City Manager Doug Willmore in February 2012 -- created an opening that the El Segundo City Council decided to fill

internally. Carpenter first stepped in on an interim basis and then signed an initial three-year contract to become the city manager in March 2012. Humbled by the offer, he wondered if he was up to the task and later said, "The Council had more faith in me than I did in myself."

Indeed, Carpenter's new leadership position was something he never previously imagined. "I had spent my entire career as a city planning and planning and building director – both of which I thought were my dream jobs," he said. "I was much more comfortable dealing with codes, customers and construction than I was dealing with meaty financial, labor and legal issues. Despite these concerns, the city is my home and somebody needed to step forward. It was an honor to be asked to take the position and I was just going to need to step way out of my comfort zone and figure it out."

As it turned out, the move paid dividends as Carpenter earned a contract renewal. His eventual tenure of seven-and-a-half years at the helm is one of the longer ones in the town's history. It may not seem so lengthy at first glance, but it's an eternity in the world of city government. It was long enough that over the course of that period, Carpenter had to find a replacement for every single department head at City Hall. Only one current Council member (Don Brann, who then chose not to run in 2012 and completed his first term the following month) was on the dais when Carpenter assumed the job. But besides witnessing the comings and goings of elected officials and City leaders, he also oversaw one of the most significant eras of change in El Segundo. But it wasn't an easy start by any stretch. "At the point when I was hired, the City had not recovered from the recession," Carpenter recalled. "Revenues had cratered and were down 20 percent from where they had been. Our workforce had been reduced from 320 to 240 employees and we had stopped investing in ourselves in just about every way in order to balance the annual budget."

While Carpenter noted that the City did its best as an organization to prevent the public from feeling any service reductions, the impacts inevitably became evident in the form of equipment breakdowns, leaky roofs on City buildings, dated technology, and too few people to handle too many responsibilities. "Adding to these difficulties, we were involved in personnel lawsuits, CalPers struggles, negotiations with Chevron over a financial agreement, negotiations with TopGolf over The Lakes, negotiations with LAX over expansion plans and residential sound insulation...and with the Wiseburn Unified School District over the high school and aquatics center," Carpenter explained. "Throughout this time, we had also asked our now smaller workforce to deal with reductions in pay and benefits. To their credit, they continued to be dedicated and professional. I'm personally very proud of them for this commitment to service on their part."

Eventually, the City came out of the recession and focused a great deal on shoring up basic needs such as new roofs on all the City buildings, broken sidewalk repair that included the complete reconstruction of Richmond Street, replacement of the Campus El Segundo turf, replacement of the entire public safety vehicle fleet, and the remodel and retrofit of Fire Station 1. "We also rebuilt our reserves and right-sized and shaped our workforce to deal with our needs,"

Precautions to Prevent Vehicle Theft

July is National Vehicle Theft Prevention Month. There has been an increase in auto thefts within El Segundo. Summers prove to be the worst season for vehicle thefts. So, to help keep vehicles safe, El Segundo Police Department's goal is to educate the public and put out as much information regarding auto theft and ways to prevent it.

Here is how you can keep thieves from driving away with your ride:

- Stow your valuables in the trunk. Exposed items will often encourage thievery.
- Don't leave your key fob in the car. Always lock your vehicle and never leave it running or unattended.
- Park in well-lit/ well-traveled areas. Criminals hate light.
- If you see something, say something (contact the ESPD dispatch center by dialing 911 or our non-emergency number 310-524-2760).

Prevention Devices:

An anti-theft device is a device that helps prevent vandalism to or theft of a motor vehicle and its contents. These can be a locking device, alarms, sensors, or tracking devices. Other methods include etching the vehicles VIN number.

Types of locking devices:

- Steering wheel bar lock: The most popular is the "CLUB."
- Steering column collar: This protects entry to the ignition through the column.
- Tire/wheel locks: Tool wraps around the tire or wheel to immobilize the vehicle.
- · Gearshift lock: Locks gearshifts in place to make it impossible to shift the transmission into gear.
- Ignition kill switch: Toggle switch is spliced into the ignition and disables the vehicle when the switch is off.
- Alarm: Horn, bell, siren or other sounding device that is audible from a distance.

New Grant Funding for Water Bottle Filling

The West Basin Municipal Water District (West Basin) announced its Water Bottle Filling Station Grant Program will return for another year with increased funding opportunities. Eligible public facilities can apply for a \$1,000 grant to install indoor water bottle filling stations. New funding includes a larger, \$2,000 grant for outdoor filling stations, which can cost more than indoor units. The popular program provides community members with access to safe, reliable drinking water and encourages users to refill personal, eco-friendly water bottles to reduce plastic waste.

Eligible grant applicants must be public facilities located in the District service area that meet all criteria specified in the application guidelines. Grant details and application forms are available at www.westbasin.org/fillingstations. Applications will be received and reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis until funds are exhausted. A total of \$35,000 in program funding is available for the fiscal year running July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020.

Since launching the program in 2017, West Basin has installed 21 water bottle filling stations throughout its service area. These 21 stations have prevented the use of approximately 110,000 plastic water bottles annually, potentially decreasing the harmful environmental impacts of single-use plastics while also providing access to free, high-quality water at local schools, community centers and parks.

The City of Segundo and El Segundo Unified School District were among the local agencies awarded grant funding in 2018/19 to install filling stations.

West Basin Seed \$\$ Makes Yard Conversions More Affordable

The West Basin Municipal Water District made some noise last week with an announcement about its turf removal program. It raised the incentive by \$1 for customers to plant yard-sized gardens that can thrive using less irrigation. Outdoor irrigation of lawns and flower beds account for half of the water used in the South Bay.

The average check from West Basin to owners who replace grass with drought-tolerant landscaping around their properties is \$3,900, according to district spokeswoman DeAnne Blackmon. That's based on an average lot size of 1,300 square feet. The turf removal incentives are flexible and can include residential properties up to 5,000 square feet, she said. A property that size could be in line for a \$15,000 check for outdoor improvements.

John Arney runs a landscape construction company in the South Bay and says any size check from West Basin will "get the ball rolling" on an outdoor renovation of the grounds. Expect to pay anywhere from \$7,500 to \$15,000 for a professionally designed and installed landscape, said the owner of Helix Landscape Construction. "If you're dissatisfied with your landscape as it is and someone is giving you four grand, those are two very good incentives," he said. Grass lawns are fine "for any other area other than the dry Southwest where we're in a desperate situation with water shortages."

West Basin is hosting classes for residents to learn how to remove turf and choose landscaping. The Metropolitan Water District is paying \$2

of the incentive, and the local water supplier sweetened the offer by adding another dollar starting in July. The next landscape conversion class is at 5:30 p.m. on July 16 at Inglewood City Hall. Residential and commercial property owners are invited to enroll by calling (310) 371-7222.

Adding California-friendly, drought-tolerant plant varieties around a property can save 1,800 gallons of drinking water each month, according to West Basin. The water supplier is committed to securing a safe and reliable source of drinking water for its South Bay customers. It also hopes to increase the participation in the turf removal program, which is funded by the Metropolitan Water District and the local West Basin district.

The do-it-yourself approach won't work for everyone. There's the turf removal, which is physically demanding. The sod is heavy, Arney said, and it needs to be hauled away and disposed of properly. A property owner can expect to need to hire laborers and a dumpster for the demolition stage of the landscape remodel.

Arney recommends choosing plants in onegallon buckets because they cost less and will fill in eventually. Going from a green carpet of grass in front and back to a new garden takes patience, but Arney said the right selection of California-friendly plants will fill in over time. "Plants need some room to grow into one another," he explained. And landscapes deserve trees, which have a cooling effect on the garden and the ground loses less water to





ES School Board Holds Last Meeting Until End of August

The El Segundo School Board, meeting for the final time in open session until August 27, witnessed three special presentations Tuesday evening during the 100-minute session.

Tim Carty, who is Managing Director of Public Finance, Investment Banking for El Segundo Unified School District's (ESUSD) financial advisor PiperJaffray, presented facts and figures relating to the June 5 issuance of \$27 million in Measure ES series A bonds. The District looks to fund multiple projects in accordance with its Long-Range Facilities Master Plan.

Carty said that June 5 was a day of "a quite

a bit of excitement," terming the bond issuance and the rates locked-in "a grand slam home run for the District" that will benefit local taxpayers. He credited good market timing and top-notch credit ratings for the favorable bond rate the District received. Local taxpayers should see their first increase for Measure ES funding in October.

Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore said the District received "an amazing bond rate (3.15) percent), which surpassed our expectations. We were really, really pleased." Fidelity Capital Markets was the winning underwriter of the bonds. Moore added that the District would

The Art of Self-Defense: This Summer's Karate Comedy Knockout

In 2014, writer/director Riley Stearns' feature film debut, Faults, premiered at the SXSW film festival. probably issue a second round of bonds "in a couple of years."

Next to the presentation podium was Southern California Regional Occupation Center (SoCal ROC) Superintendent Dr. Atlas Helaire, who briefed the members on the current status of his organization. SoCal ROC is based in Torrance, serves six school districts and began providing students with the career technical education programs in 1967.

Helaire spoke about two distinct programs currently offered, including regional occupational centers designed for multiple school districts to pool their resources to serve more students; and regional occupational programs that are only offered at specific schools. He informed the Board of multiple courses available and Career Pathway options offered by SoCal ROC.

Helaire then presented information showing a decline in program participation. He cited a total enrollment (including adults and students) during the 2013/14 school year of 3,393. In comparison, the enrollment for the 2018/19 school year was 2,087. El Segundo increased enrollment this past year to 75 students, up from 45 participants the prior school year. Helaire noted that most of the El Segundo students take Health Service courses.

"Our enrollment trend has been steady," Moore said. "Some Districts have really taken a decline." The Inglewood Unified School District, which had 377 participants in the 2017/18 school year, dropped out of the program in 2018/19, not sending any students.

Helaire also cited statistics noting a scramble for funding. The 2007/08 budget was \$12 million. The 2017/18 budget dropped to \$5 million. Much of the decline occurred when the State of California eliminated SoCal ROC funding after the 2014/15 fiscal year. Currently, each school district pays \$1,234 per enrollee.

Prior to the meeting School Board President Nancy Cobb, a staunch supporter of SoCal ROC and also a member of that organization's board, said that she receives complaints that the high schools "no longer train for essential jobs in society, such as auto mechanics, construction and healthcare." She noted that the programs offered are free to the students and can prepare them for a lifetime career. Cobb also implored businesses who complain that they can't find trained workers fund a SoCal ROC program that would address their

specific workforce needs.

Helaire said that while SoCal ROC faces a challenging time, the key is for all involved to "keep it positive" as they seek financial support to build the enrollment base. Cobb spoke Tuesday evening of the SoCal ROC option as valuable and inspirational. "Truly important to our students, and our community," she said.

Moore made the evening's final presentation, focusing on the District's "Goals for the Future." The plan is for the superintendent and staff to reach out to stakeholders, including "faculty, staff, association leaders, parents and students" to garner feedback on the efficacy of the proposed goals. Moore plans to gather information during the months of August through October and then bring the final recommendation to the Board as an action item at the Nov. 12 meeting.

Moore's presentation delineated the District's motto, "Transforming education for a changing world." She mentioned ESUSD's "Graduate Profile" and then highlighted the Board's guiding principles, listing five goals: (1) Ensure high-quality teaching and learning to increase student achievement and develop well-rounded students who are prepared for college and career; (2) promote a safe and respectful learning environment while maintaining high expectations and the social and emotional well-being of all students; (3) Recruit and retain high-quality employees and further build the capacity of personnel; (4) Provide parents and community active participation and engagement; and (5) Maintain fiscal health and address long-term infrastructure and facility needs.

Consent agenda items were next addressed by the Board, including multiple items dealing with District special education students, and a hazardous materials survey prior to the planned demolition of two buildings at El Segundo High School -- including the venerable Snack Shack.

Other items approved by the Board included consultancy contracts with STAR of CA to conduct "educationally related intensive counseling services and assessment" to support students with disabilities; and a somewhat similar agreement specifically geared towards the support of Arena High students.

Action items approved included consultancy agreements with Premier Health Care Services, LLC, to provide "educational-related special

school-based nursing services" for the 2018/19 school year; contracts with Discovery Ranch, a residential treatment center based in Cedar City, Utah, and Oak Grove Center, a residential treatment center located in Murrieta, CA; another contract with STAR of CA to provide "direct behavioral services, consultation services and behavioral assessments" to "identified" District students; and an agreement to participate in the Wiseburn Unified School District-operated Success Learning Center.

Additional items approved included an amendment to Moore's employment contract, which now runs until June 2022 and adds a "longevity bonus;" acceptance of completion paperwork for emergency roof repair performed at El Segundo Middle School; the award of a \$192,000 bid to Signature Painting for work on three District properties; and an agreement with Graves Construction Services Group for construction and services related to the new Learning Connection facilities to be constructed at Richmond Street Elementary School. If all goes according to plan, that project should come in under budget and

wrap up in December.

The Board additionally approved a contract with EKC Enterprises to support personalized learning at a cost not to exceed \$180,000 that will provide the District with new interactive technology, including audio/video equipment, interactive laser boards, and TVs for "screen mirroring." And finally, Board also approved El Segundo High's request to send the varsity cross country team to Portland, Oregon to allow members to compete in the NIKE Cross Country Invitational on Sept. 28.

There were no information pending items on the agenda. Moore, who is beginning her sixth year on the job, then touched on the July informational calendar, noting that the District office will be closed on Fridays. Board member reports then followed, with the comments skewing towards wishing all a happy summer hiatus and taking note of the accomplishments made during the 2018/19 school year.

The next regularly scheduled El Segundo School Board meeting is calendared for Aug. 27. Classroom instruction resumes the following day. •

fragile dachshund. Deciding to empower himself through self-protection, Casey forgoes purchasing a firearm (in a hilariously awkward scene) and instead enlists in a local karate class under the leadership of the confident (if slightly delusional) Sensei (Alessandro Nivola).

From here, the film further examines (again, in comically deadpan fashion) the concepts of masculinity: Casey learns from Sensei that to be tough – to be "a man" – one must listen to heavy metal, own large dogs and, essentially, be a jerk. Despite rising up the ranks through harsh training from both Sensei and Anna (Imogen Poots), the dojo's most qualified student, the still emotionally-sensitive Casey, questions whether he's able to transform himself in this newly adopted lifestyle.

A smaller film with modest ambitions, *The Art of Self-Defense* is one of the funniest movies I've seen this year. Eisenberg as Casey plays a version of his recognizably neurotic movie self, but adds many more intriguing layers here. As Sensei, Alessandro Nivola is unforgettable and wonderfully wacky in this supporting role.

Carpenter said. "We created a Human Resources Director position to make HR its own department and focus on process improvement and employee development. We created an Information Services Department and IS Director position to prioritize technology integration and implementation. We invested in economic development and marketing, added engineering/project managers in Public Works in order to begin moving sewer, water, street, sidewalk and facility projects forward... and we recently added the Deputy City Manager position to oversee economic development and the new centralized and soon to be enhanced communications role."

While pleased to oversee a revamped workforce, Carpenter pointed out the issues resulting from the retirement of the Baby Boomer generation - himself now included in the mix. "This has created both challenges as well as opportunities," he said. "The challenges come from the loss of experience that many long-tenured employees brought to the job, many of whom spent their entire working career with the City. The opportunities come with bringing in employees with fresh perspective and skills that more often than not have worked in both private and public sector positions or with multiple public agencies. The competition for talent is very tough right now. The organization had shrunk to 240 employees and then sized back up to 276, but we continue to operate with 240-250 employees due to retirements and a very competitive recruiting environment."

Along with the difficulty in maintaining ample workforce numbers, Carpenter sees other challenges in the future as the City will continue to cope with rising pension costs, airport expansion, the loss of sales tax revenue as online buying continues to increase, declines in commercial utility user tax revenues due to conservation and efficient buildings, and mandates from Sacramento that hamper local control.

Despite the many challenges, Carpenter was optimistic that his successor as well as the rest of the community have much to feel good about in the future. "Revenues are 50 percent higher than where they had dropped to, reserve levels are high and we have a good understanding of our future costs," he said. "There is tremendous investment occurring the east side of town, Smoky Hollow and Downtown. The city is reinvesting in itself in visible ways like buildings, streets, sidewalks, and soon on the Plunge, Acacia Park, the new website and the entryway sign at Imperial and Main. There is also less visible, but critical investment occurring with water and sewer lines, sewer pumps, fiber optic lines and technology enhancements like the new permitting system. Even in the difficult area of police recruiting, signs are very positive that we may actually be filling all of our vacancies this year with a combination of lateral officers, internal promotions and new recruits."

Carpenter thanked the various mayors, Council members, commission/committee/ board members, department heads and staff he worked with over the years and said he will miss his City family. "I learned a great deal from them all and appreciate their support over the years," he said. "Even if we didn't agree at times, we respected each other and it has been especially rewarding to see our organization become the most tight-knit I've seen."

Looking back at the choice of public service as a career, Carpenter said he wouldn't change a thing. "You have the opportunity and the accompanying satisfaction that comes from making people's lives better in many different and important ways," he explained. "You can see the direct benefits of your work. They are all around you if you just take a minute to look for them. And best of all, you get to work with other great, dedicated people who share the common purpose of serving the community and helping each other in these efforts." •

evaporation, he added. The one-gallon buckets work best and come with advantages over the larger five-gallon sized plants that admittedly are more mature. "A one-gallon grows faster than a five-gallon," Arney said. "If you go with California natives, you save on installation costs on your planting budget."

Any qualifying project starts with a landscape plan. The design guides every step of the installation, including new irrigation, plants, trees, paved walkways and lighting, Arney noted. The site plan depends on the look of a home, whether it's a World War II-era bungalow or a modern structure. Three popular types of landscapes fit the home architecture of the South Bay, he said. A modern landscape is one of them, and involves cast concrete pavers and a narrow selection of plant varieties throughout the garden. Arney said one to two types of drought-tolerant plants complement a modern home's outdoor features.

A Mediterranean landscape is another local favorite and features plant varieties for the South Bay's coastal climate with moderate temperatures and mostly sunny days. The English cottage landscape is popular here too.

In addition to the July 16 landscape conversion class in Inglewood, other sessions are planned for August, September and October. Program details are listed at www.westbasin.org/grassreplacement as well as the dates and times of the informational sessions for West Basin customers interested in converting to a grassfree exterior.

The loamy soil found in El Segundo, Hawthorne and Inglewood is easy to work with, unlike the heavy clay soils found along the Palos Verdes Peninsula. Those residents incur higher costs and more labor to excavate grassy front and back yards because the pieces weigh more and machinery is needed rather than hand tools, according to Arney.

Customers who want more curb appeal can change the exterior look of their home with landscaping. The money from West Basin goes almost halfway toward paying a landscape contractor or making it a DIY project. The rebates are available on a first-come basis, and renters may participate with written consent of their landlords.

Frequently asked questions and the rules are listed at socalwatersmart.com under "Turf Replacement Program." Before you begin your project or remove any turf, you must apply for and receive an approval to proceed. The pre-project approval to proceed will specify the estimated rebate amount based on the measured area and information you provided. It is important that you measure your project area(s) accurately. Once your project start has been approved, your rebate amount cannot be increased from the amount approved.

Visit the SoCalWater\$mart Turf Replacement Program Application to apply online for your approval to start your project. Items to have ready before going online: At least five color photos of the areas where you plan to remove turf; a simple landscape plan that shows the area to be transformed and the type and location of your selected stormwater retention feature; and a photo or scanned copy of a recent water bill.

Arney said that the size of a landscape conversion project comes down to this: How much do you want to live out there? "The more people like to be outside, the more they spend," he explained. •


