Council Debates Richmond Lot Funding, Okays Media Campus

Tuesday night's El Segundo City Council meeting featured an update from Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit on the Richmond Street Field Improvement Project that resulted in some philosophical differences on the dais. For the 2018/19 budget, the Council initially allocated \$350,000 for this project and then added another \$120,000 to expand the scope of work to include a shared parking lot expense with landowner El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD). The lot provides about 30 new spaces as part of a separate District project to demolish and reconstruct a portion of the adjacent Richmond Street Elementary School campus that encompasses The Learning Connection (TLC) before- and after-school program.

The original project included accessible pathways to and around the field, new dugout fencing, a new backstop, new spectator bleachers and public restroom facilities. City and District staff agreed the latter would manage the project. But with the parking lot component now in the mix and after further discussing long-term needs/priorities, the City/Schools Affairs Committee felt the condition of the turf is the top priority rather than the infield, fencing, pathways, bleachers or restrooms. The committee (which includes Mayor Drew Boyles and Councilmember Scot Nicol) recommended holding off on the field improvements and eliminating the

restroom facilities. Said restrooms will be reevaluated during The Plunge renovation to consider both external and internal access.

The committee also agreed on a costsharing methodology, with the City pegged to pay 70 percent and ESUSD 30 percent. The proposed breakdown came after a review determined that City-related activities make up 70 percent of the site use. The City's adjusted project cost revised to \$310,000, leaving \$160,000 in remaining funds to use for future turf-related renovations or be directed to another project.


While acknowledging that he "has no issue with" the project itself, Councilmember Don Brann did not agree that the City should pay for any of it since ESUSD owns the property and is flush with cash from a recently passed school bond that calls for monies to go towards facility and site improvements. "They're [ESUSD] sitting on \$100 million," he said. "We don't have that kind of money here."

In response, Boyles noted that the City utilizes the fields and public lot the most. "Regardless of who has money, it's who's using the resource," he said. Nicol pointed to the impacts on residential quality of life and that it made logical sense to look at usage time in establishing the cost parameters. He added that the District could theoretically "build the parking lot without our help" and then choose to close it up so that the rest of the community would have no access.

The Council did not conduct a vote on the item on Tuesday, but will revisit the matter in two weeks after City Attorney Mark Hensley confers on additional points with the District and staff returns with some final details. Later during public communications, School Board member Emilee Layne expressed her disappointment with some of the comments from the dais though did not mention Brann by name. She explained that the District made an earlier decision to fund the Richmond project "in a different manner before the bond was passed." She likened the City's cost contribution to ESUSD's financial commitment towards the new aquatics facility, which the District does not own or manage but nonetheless uses. "I really think this is a win for the public," Layne said of the project intended to provide much-needed parking opportunities to local field users.

In a continued public hearing from July 16, the Council approved general plan and zoning changes, a 10-year development agreement and environmental impact report (EIR) certification with a statement of overriding considerations for the Beach Cities Media Campus project at 2021 Rosecrans Ave. The project, a partnership between Continental Development Corporation (CDC) and Mar Ventures (Rosecrans-Sepulveda Partners 4, LLC), entails a 313,000-foot maximum development with a floor area ratio (FAR)



El Segundo Firm Wins U.S. Air Force Innovation Research Contract

Epirus, the only U.S. company developing software-defined electromagnetic pulse (EMP) technology designed to take down dangerous drones, was awarded a Small Business Innovative Research (SBIR) Phase I contract by the U.S. Air Force at its Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Pitch Day on July 24. Epirus CEO Nathan Mintz and CTO Bo Marr led the company's presentation, held at the Kostas Research Institute for Homeland Security in Burlington, Mass.

Epirus, which is based near the U.S. Air Force Space and Missile Systems Center in El Segundo, was one of just 13 firms out of 108 selected to present at UAS Pitch Day. Epirus presented the world's first ever megawatt-class drone-mounted, directed energy capability system and was the only company with this

capability that was selected for a contract award. Epirus presented video demonstrations of the megawatt class system at work in the field.

Epirus's technology uses a short burst of directed energy to neutralize UAS such as drones, which present a new, unique threat to national security. In fact, recreational drones have caused shutdowns at busy airports like London's Gatwick, affecting thousands of travelers. And as drone technology becomes cheaper and more easily accessible, the possibility of them being used by enemy combatants of all types continues to increase. The company has expertise in understanding how drones respond to EMP, which helps inform its work in developing technological innovations for how America will defeat drone swarms.

Real Changes Could Reduce the Wait Times at DMV Locations

The public can expect better customer service and a fresh can-do attitude from the Department of Motor Vehicles, says its new leader who closed down the motor vehicle licensing offices temporarily last month to re-train and recharge the beleaguered agency. "Real, tangible change is coming to the DMV," newly appointed Chief Deputy Director Kathleen Webb promised on July 24, the same day that DMV offices statewide closed their doors for a half-day of staff training. New procedures were demonstrated for processing driver's licenses and identification cards, primarily the REAL IDs that airports and federal buildings -- including military bases -- will accept as proper identification as of October 2020.

The half-day, closed-door session follows a series of mishaps at the department that cost the former director her job last December. And the department responsible for driver's licenses and motor vehicle licensing has been dealing with an unprecedented demand for the new federal REAL IDs, causing hour-long waits for the licenses at local DMV offices.

Gov. Gavin Newsom last December replaced DMV Director Jean Shimoto after embarrassing problems with the Motor Voter registration program. Webb took over permanently for Shimoto earlier this year, even though the former director's management team had reduced wait times for driver's licenses at DMV offices statewide. However, it was discovered that 150,000 driver licenses were delayed and Gavin replaced Shimoto, making good on his promise to make it his priority to fix the problems at the DMV.

Lawmakers gave the motor vehicle licensing department a one-time \$226 million increase to hire 2,000 more employees and to extend hours at some local DMV offices. To cope with the high demand for REAL IDs, the Hawthorne DMV office is now open on Saturdays for licensing and vehicle registration.

"We know that our customers deserve consistent, quality service on every visit at every office," Webb said last month. "That is why we took the extraordinary step to stop business for half a day and give our employees the support and information to provide that service."

The half-day training on July 24 included the Hawthorne, Inglewood, Culver City and Torrance offices. The rare closed-door session followed the release of a report by a strike team that studied the department's operations and made recommendations to the governor about how to clear the bottleneck at DMV counters. The front-line employees learned about new procedures and computer-assisted resources now available to them.

Employees were told to be ready for customer volume to double between now and fall of 2020, when the REAL ID enforcement date starts. The closed-door training introduced steps taken to streamline REAL ID processing, including developing a digital REAL ID Field Guide that employees can now access at their workstations.

Another change implemented this summer was to open DMV offices earlier, including Inglewood and Torrance, at 7 a.m. four days a week. The exception is Wednesday when the offices open at 9 a.m. and close at 5 p.m.

The motor vehicle and licensing agency for California is, in one state official's words,







<u>Film Review</u>

Anton Yelchin, Remembered, in Love, Antosha

The new documentary *Love*, *Antosha* captures the life of the intellectual, spirited and beloved artist Anton Yelchin. Directed by Garett Price and produced by Drake Doremus, the film

captures Yelchin's life story and acclaimed film career that ended at the age of 27 after a freak auto accident in 2016. Using home video footage, self-shot videos, interviews with friends and Hollywood talent alike – as well as his personal diaries - we are given a comprehensive look inside the mind of an artist who was creatively unbound and yet still internally conflicted.

Antony Yelchin appeared onscreen for most of his life, in a total of 69 film and television projects (most widely known as Chekov in J.J. Abrams' Star Trek reboot). The film celebrates the creativity that Yelchin permeated throughout his life, where stars like Kristen Stewart, Chris Pine, John Cho and Jennifer Lawrence offer remembrances through on-camera inter-

views. Whether it was devouring classic films, playing music in his band (The Hammerheads) or furthering his passion for photography, Yelchin was always learning, growing and searching. But it's this same anxious artistic drive to pursue his passions that also reveals his restlessness in other areas of his life. The film does not shy away from showing an artist conflicted and often occupied with complexities.

Love, Antosha reveals that Anton secretly battled the auto-immune disease cystic fibrosis (which was never publicly acknowledged) and bouts of breathing and coughing issues. A curious and self-aware person, the documentary portrays one heartbreaking moment when Yelchin researches the average age of life expectancy for people with his disease. The results show less than 40 years old. The question may arise as to whether or not, on some intuitive level, the self-aware Anton knew that his life would be short-lived? And if this drove him to subconsciously consume



widow Taya has been in the process of reclaiming her life through public speaking and in service to others, heading a foundation and inspiring other charitable groups with her words and deeds.

Taya tells the stories of more than 30 individuals who pay it forward and establish means to address those struggling with disease, homelessness, hunger and the varied ills we all face in our society. Many of these "working class heroes" saw a need and filled it, no matter the hardships they faced themselves in establishing methods of serving those who are desperate for help. She also includes a few of the rich and famous who have donated time and money to causes and people that touch their hearts.

Santa Monica-based Angel Flight West is a network of more than 1,400 volunteer pilots who transport non-emergency medical patients and their families across the country for treatment in faraway hospitals and medical centers. Even victims of domestic violence are assisted in their quest for a new life in another city. The pilots fly their own planes and pay for all costs out of their own pockets so that those

First-Year ESMS Principal Nicole Duquette Is In It for the Long Haul

When classes resume on Wednesday, Aug. 29, El Segundo Middle School (ESMS) will welcome

its fourth principal since the beginning of the 2016/17 school year. Nicole Duquette was selected in mid-May by El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) administration to replace Acting Principal Ali Rabiei, who has taken another position as Director of Operations. Rabiei became the acting principal last November when predecessor Dr. Jennifer Hawn unexpectedly left to join the Whittier City School District. Hawn's mid-school-year departure set the wheels in motion for the elevation of then-ESMS Principal Dr. Melissa Gooden to the lead post El Segundo High School, with Rabiei taking over at the middle school on an "acting" basis.

Aware of the recent quick turnover, Duquette said she hopes to stabilize the tenure of the principal position at ESMS. When asked how long she plans to stay in the ESUSD, she said she is in "for the long haul and likes the long-term growth opportunity offered here. "I would really like to make the ESUSD a long-term home, serving the families and students and the faculty for years to come," she said, adding that she also does not wish to "load another U-Haul anytime soon!"

Duquette, who has a Master's degree in Educational Leadership as well as Bachelor's degrees in Political Science and Journalism, comes to the ESUSD after a two-year stint as principal at McKinley School of the Arts in Pasadena where she focused on increasing rigor, closing the achievement gap and expanding their arts program.

A 20-year educator who is in the process of moving to Marina del Rey, Duquette served three stints as a high school assistant principal,

as well as accruing seven years teaching in the classroom and specializing in English, History Special Education and Student Government. She was selected Teacher of the Year for the Deer Valley Unified School District when she was instructing at Boulder Creek High School in Anthem, Arizona during 2009/2010.

"My love for public schools and my deeply rooted commitment to ensuring that all students are ready to thrive once they attend college drive me to lead," Duquette said. "Our school will develop students who not only feel safe and loved, but can also thrive in an innovative learning environment where they feel confident in taking on this great big world around them."

Principal Angela Baxter of Willard Elementary in Pasadena is keenly aware of Duquette's talents. "Ms. Duquette is a committed educator who enjoys celebrating students' success," Baxter emailed. "She is knowledgeable, talented and is a quick learner who is an excellent model for students."

Duquette was selected from a highly competitive pool of applicants. ESUSD Executive Director of Human Resources and Facilities Dr. Dylan Farris conducted three focus group meetings with stakeholders to finetune the list of desired qualities that the new principal should possess. The hiring process included paper screening to narrow the field of candidates, an initial screening interview, a comprehensive panel interview, a finalist interview, and a reference check.

Farris reported that the District received 26 applications for the principal position. The top three candidates were interviewed by ESUSD Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore. Farris emailed that "throughout the interview process, Ms. Duquette stood out as the most experienced, competent and knowledgeable candidate. She exemplifies the qualities deemed desirable by our teachers, parents and leadership team. She also came with strong positive references from her previous employer."

Farris added, "We are pleased and excited that Ms. Duquette has agreed to join our team and we look forward to her stewardship at ESMS in the coming year."

After the diligent interview process, Duquette earned the selection and said she was pleasantly surprised and flattered when informed that she was the unanimous first choice to become principal. "That is rare," she said, adding that she is eager to "put my money where my mouth is" in meeting stakeholder expectations.

Duquette's selection did not surprise educator Lauren Paule Sheahan, who sent a glowing See ESUSD, page 15



of 1.13. Of the total, 240,000 square feet is for creative office uses with the option to include a roof deck, 66,000 square feet of studio and production facilities, and 7,000 square feet of retail.

The Council approval allowed the land use designation for the project to change from Commercial Center (C-4) to Urban Mixed Use South (MU-S). The agreement also prohibits certain uses at the site: drivethrough restaurants, adult businesses, catering services/flight kitchens, freight forwarding, and service stations.

CDC Vice President-Development Alex Rose provided a brief history of the site area and its evolution from industrial to mixed use. He described the new project as the "final piece of Rosecrans Corridor frontage" and an extension of Continental Park" that will continue west from the latter location until it touches The Point shopping center. He noted that the applicant undertook extensive traffic studies and voluntarily downsized the project below the allowable thresholds.

During the public hearing portion of the discussion, Rebecca Davis representing Supporters Alliance for Environmental Responsibility (SAFER) urged the Council not to certify the EIR until there is a satisfactory revision and further public review. She contended that the project does not comply with California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) guidelines and poses significant unmitigated impacts from toxic soil contamination that could especially put construction workers as well as nearby residents at risk. Among other concerns, she asserted that the draft and final EIR do not contain health risk assessments (HRA) for cancer risk and that indoor air quality is not addressed.

Davis provided a series of numbers from her group's analysis of the project indicating cancer risks exceed CEQA thresholds. However, the City of El Segundo's CEQA consultant (from Eco-Tierra Consulting) maintained that Davis and company "highly overestimated" those risks with incorrect assumptions and faulty methodology - as examples: that all particles will be diesel when in fact they will be natural gas vehicles, and that the wind will only blow in one direction. The City consultant explained that the project does not actually require an HRA, but that Eco-Tierra conducted a "more detailed analysis" that found risks to be below than the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) threshold. The firm responded to each of SAFER's comments (as well as those from other entities) in detail last month in an errata to the final EIR. Prior to the Council approvals on Tuesday, the El Segundo Planning Commission in May concluded that SAFER's comment letter had no evidence requiring recirculation of the EIR nor further environmental review.

Also on Tuesday, El Segundo Police De partment Lieutenant Dan Kim presented an update on local homelessness activities. The Council approved a homelessness plan last year after the City received a \$30,000 grant from the City of Los Angeles. Kim went over the plan's primary goals and reported that the community's 2019 homeless count was 19 individuals but that his department did an independent count that showed the total of 15.

John McCullough gave the Council a quick update on the El Segundo Art Walk and said that the most recent two June and July events were "exceedingly great." He reported that last month was the "largest event ever" with 45 businesses and 55 artists participating along with an estimated attendance of 4,400 and notably increased social media activity.

During presentations, Police Chief Bill Whalen introduced two new officers, Lucas Montero and David Deady (the second lateral officer to join the department). And the Council also enjoyed a sneak peak of El Segundo Youth Drama's upcoming production of The Addams Family. •

"the face of state government" to most people who live and work in the state. Waits of two hours or more for walk-in customers to reach the counter have become commonplace since the DMV began issuing REAL IDs. The deadline for having one of the federally compliant driver's licenses and identification cards is 16 months from now in the fall of 2020.

Frequent fliers and federal contractors will want to carry the REAL ID. However, people who don't fly or do business involving federal buildings or military bases don't need one. Having a REAL ID makes it easier to board a flight, but even passengers with a standard California ID can fly as long as they show a birth certificate or U.S. visa. Beginning Oct. 1, 2020, the federal government will require passengers flying within the United States to present a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or identification card – passport, passport card, or other federally approved document - before boarding a plane or entering secure federal facilities and military bases.

REAL ID applications are complex and must be done in person at a field office, the DMV explains. An application with an appointment can be completed in 40 minutes or less. "To many Californians, DMV is the face of state government, and we owe those who work on the frontlines the resources and support they need to do their jobs well," said Marybel Batjer, who leads the DMV Strike Team.

The average wait times for customers without appointments in May improved by 12 minutes and averaged 49 minutes, the DMV says. The department pointed to changes made for the improvement. Fourteen of its field offices are offering mobile Start Here stations, and more front-counter employees and support staff were hired with the boosted funding.

The strike team issued its recommendations to the governor on July 23. The report, along with regular updates about average wait times, can be viewed at the DMV website at www. dmv.ca.gov by clicking on the news tab at the bottom of the home page. •

whose lives are in turmoil can more easily cope. Helping veterans who have sacrificed so much for our country and its people is very close to Taya's heart. She shines a light on Operation Safe Haven, a tiny house community for homeless veterans in New Jersey. Donnie Davis served in the Air Force and as a police officer before becoming a pastor for the Amazing Grace Community Church. He led an initiative for the church to purchase an abandoned 277-acre campground with a 65acre lake. Tiny houses are built by volunteers in order to give shelter to veterans who are battling mental trauma and homelessness.

There are other feel-good stories such as the couple who started a program that helps kids who are aging out (at the age of 18) of the foster care system. When she was just four

years old, Alex Scott held her first childhood cancer fundraiser in her front yard and raised over \$2,000. By the time of her death in 2004, Alex raised \$1 million and inspired a legacy of hope and cures for childhood cancer – Alex's Lemonade Stand. And there's the blind veteran whose work with disabled bike riders inspired a volunteer organization that takes blind bikers on rides through New York City. These and other accounts will make you smile through your tears while you reach for your wallet and start to pull up your sleeves yourself. We can all make a difference in someone else's life.


Boys Volleyball Finishes Second in League

letter of recommendation to the selection committee near the end of March. Sheahan has worked with Duquette for the past decade as a supervisor, mentor and colleague. Her letter of recommendation noted how Duquette "has maintained a committed focus and advocacy for students, teachers and her school. She is able to see the big picture and apply broader concepts into practice at the campus and at the student level." Sheahan pointed out that Duquette is "always looking for a challenge," calling her an "extremely articulate communicator. Her ability to communicate a vision, manage and lead instructionally, and facilitate learning makes her a highly valued and impactful leader."

Asked why she sought the middle school job,

Duquette said that "there is something very signature... in that the schools are true partners" with the community. She mentioned her tenure in the Phoenix School District, where the locals took a great interest in school day activities and after-school events, and partnered to provide internships for students. She added that her "mini-district" cultivated a small-town vibe, hosting and anchoring parades and special events. "The school and community become one and the same," Duquette said, mentioning that she sensed a similar form of support in El Segundo.

Duquette said she "believes deeply in highly rigorous expectations for every student" and that ESMS will offer, in a positive way, the chance

"for students to feel that rigorous pressure to take advantage of the opportunities" at a school where they are "highly supported." A big proponent of tech integration, Duquette called landing her new position a "dream match for me."

Duquette also noted that she was fortunate to be a summer hire, which has allowed her to slowly immerse herself in the ESUSD culture prior to the first day of classes. She attended a staff meeting before the close of the 2018/19 school year, was a spectator at the ESMS promotion ceremony, and partook in two days of faculty professional development activities. "It's a slow start," she said, which gave her the opportunity to "do some reading and formulate some [school] plans in July."

Duquette emphasized that she firmly believes it is paramount that school officials be active in the community. "I hear only good things about the inviting and welcoming nature of El Segundians," she said. She also stressed how important the middle school years are to shape the future success of her students.

"I know we are only the middle school, but we cannot be short-sighted when [considering] what does our student have to look like when they head off to college or a career," Duquette said. "At the end of the day, it is all about cultivating positive relationships with students, ensuring that they feel safe, and feel ready to thrive and learn. That is our responsibility." •
