Weaver Embraces City Clerk Role as Ideal Fit

Undoubtedly 2012 has been a year of significant change at City Hall, with the retirements of several longtime elected officials and the arrival of newcomers to fill the vacancies. The longest-standing of them all, Cindy Mortesen, recently said goodbye to the City Clerk's office after 20 years at the helm. In a tight three-person race in April to choose a successor, El Segundo voters elected lifetime local resident Tracy Sherrill Weaver as the new City Clerk. As it happened, Weaver received encouragement from her predecessor that was pivotal in the decision to run for office.

"Our families have been friends since my parents [Lee and Christine Sherrill] were in high school," said Weaver. "Cindy loved the City Clerk position and has been telling me for years that because of my history with El Segundo and my professional background, that this job would be a great fit for me. Therefore when she decided to retire, I pulled my papers to run. Cindy was right. I do love the job and think it is a good fit for me. Since my kids are older, this was the time for a new challenge in my life and I am enjoying every minute of it." A 1981 El Segundo High graduate who later went on to earn a degree at Cal State Long Beach, Weaver worked at various restaurants earlier in her career before moving into banking as a branch manager for six years at World Savings and Loan. Married for 21 years to Kirby Weaver, she left the professional world behind in 1998 to stay at home with her three kids. The oldest, Meghan, recently graduated from El Segundo High and will attend the University of Oregon in the fall. Mady will be a sophomore at the High School, while Jackson will enter the sixth grade at El Segundo Middle School. While a learning curve was to be expected in making the transition into the new role, Weaver reported that her staff, Cathy Domann and Mona Shilling, have been "patient and kind" in teaching her the ins and outs of the City Clerk's office. "Actually everyone at City Hall has been very receptive since I came into office," said Weaver. "There is truly quite a bit the Clerk's office does for not only the citizens of El Segundo, but we support other departments in the City as well. It will take me a while to learn all there is to know...but I have time and am embracing all that I have learned so far."

For the immediate future, Weaver continues to acclimate herself with the daily routine of the Clerk's office, which includes putting together City Council agendas that are much more complicated than most people realize. "The agenda can take up to two weeks to complete from start to finish and that was an eye-opener for me," she said.

Starting next month, Weaver will attend seminars through November that will count toward her Certified Municipal Clerk certification. Normally a two-year process, she hopes to earn her certification in 18 months. Also in the coming months, Weaver plans to look over the Clerk's portion of the City's website to improve content and bring it up to date. *See Weaver, page 13*

6th Annual El Segundo Relay for Life Raises \$50K to Help Beat Cancer

Nearly everyone you know has been touched in some manner or fashion by cancer. Last weekend, many El Segundo residents came out to support the 6th Annual Relay for Life, which raises money for cancer research and awareness. The Relay for Life is an overnight event where teams of people take turns walking/running around a track for 24 hours. This year, more than 200 participants on 16 teams walked for 24 hours at the Campus El Segundo. The event started in the morning with a Survivors Lap – an inspirational time where survivors circle the track together to help everyone celebrate the victories they have achieved over cancer. Caregivers also walked a lap afterwards and then the event officially started. Food, games, and music during the event provided entertainment and fundraising opportunities.

In the evening, a heartfelt luminary ceremony honored those whose lives have been touched by cancer and remembers loved ones lost to the disease. Candles This year the Relay for Life for El Segundo will raise nearly \$50,000 for cancer treatment and research, according to event chair Derek Lovett.

"Since starting this event in El Segundo six years ago, we have brought in about \$500,000 in donations to help with cancer research. We walk for 24 hours because cancer never sleeps," stated Lovett. Lovett is passionate about this event, as is his wife who has survived not one but two breast cancers. They were originally active in Relay for Life Groups in Santa Monica and then expanded into El Segundo.

Mark Antonio Grant, Hero of Hope speaker emphatically shared with the crowd, " I am today three years cancer free. I encourage everyone to go for your screenings. Early detection is key."

A casual open house memorial will be held at Douglass Mortuary in El Segundo on Friday, August 3 from 4pm to 8pm. •



Lifetime of Service to Community Leads to Lifelong Friendships

It has been 25 years since Doctor Eileen Bell decided to open her optometrist office in El Segundo. An unknown city to her at the time, El Segundo would not only become her place of business but it became home and a source of enduring friendships.

"I have to say that I was not really aware that there was a residential need in El Segundo. I was new to California when I graduated with my doctorate degree and had lived in Orange County, but then I moved out to Manhattan Beach for a year or two," Dr. Bell said. "One day playing racquetball with a dear old friend, Jim Morgan, he told me to check out El Segundo. Since I didn't know what he was talking about, he brought me over here. He showed me the residential area and this building was being constructed, so I thought, 'Let's talk.""

After speaking with Ken Schofield, who was responsible for constructing the building where Dr. Bell practices, she decided that she loved the place and wanted to practice there. "She was my first tenant, so I was her first patient--it all happened 25 years ago," Schofield said. "I have kept coming back to Eileen this whole time. I have been a patient of hers and we have a great relationship. She is certainly one of the best professionals we have had. She moved into El Segundo during the primetime in which Dr. Elms retired and closed his optometry shop. She came in right out of optometry school, took the bottom space and has been there ever since. She's done a great job."

These long-lasting relationships have earned Dr. Bell the love and respect of her colleagues, patients and neighbors. "It was really important for us to show her our appreciation of the quality of doctor and person that she really is," friend and colleague Dr. Michele A. Rogers said. "She cares about her patients and patients care about her, as is evident by the turnout of people here to celebrate her. She does not get a lot of recognition in the community for what she does. She has been behind the scenes for such a long time. I wanted to celebrate her and her contributions to the eye care needs of this community."

Gathered at her celebration was a multigenerational group, which included teens and retired individuals who came from as far as Whittier to celebrate Dr. Bell's presence in the community. "She is just such a great individual and such a great doctor," Father Taylor, who used to be at St. Michael's Episcopal Church, said. "A lot of people have come to honor Dr. Bell today because when you go to see her as one of her patients, she is so pleased to have you there. She makes you feel that you are very special and whatever needs to be done for you she makes you feel like it will get done and it does get done. It's a nice feeling when you come away knowing that the doctor has done her best for you."

In the 25 years that Dr. Bell has been serving the community, her staff has changed very little. She believes that the presence of Dr. Rogers, Luda, Patsy and her long-time friend Betty Bosela, who worked as the front office person for 23 years, has been the key element to her success. "I feel that my success is really just the success of my staff and the relationship that we have with our patients. I don't think we would have been the same practice if we had large staff turnover and sort of an anonymous group of people working from year to year," Dr. Bell said. "It has been the same group and we have been together the whole time and everyone knows everyone. Everybody knew See Lifetime, page 9

El Segundo Baseball Going Into August

The long baseball season for El Segundo is extending into August. It means one or more teams have advanced in all-star play and are playing for state or regional titles and the opportunity to play for a national title. The El Segundo Babe Ruth 13-year-old All-Star team won the Southern California title and advances to the Pacific Southwest Regional this week in Surprise, Arizona. The 13-15-year-old All-Star team has advanced to the winner's bracket of the Pacific Southwest Tournament it has been hosting this past week. The El Segundo Little League team lost its bid to continue play into August with a pair of losses.

The El Segundo Little League's remarkable run ran its course when they fell to Orange and Upland in the North Sub-Division playoffs. The team, which had won nine consecutive all-star games to win the district and sectionals and their first Sub-Division game, fell to Orange 2-0.

Facing elimination, El Segundo's season came to an end with a 6-2 loss to Upland. Spencer Long provided El Segundo with its only offense with a pair of home runs. It marked the third straight year El Segundo had advanced to the Sub-Division, which is thought to be a record run by a single league in the area.

For just the second time in the El Segundo Babe Ruth League history that spans over 50 years, two teams have advanced to the Pacific Southwest Regional tournament in the same year. The 13s will travel to Surprise,

Arizona this week while the 13-15s played host this to the regional tournament this week.

The 13-year-old Babe Ruth All-Star team defeated Westchester twice to advance to the Pacific Southwest regional. The team is made up of mostly players from the Little League squad that advanced to the Little League North Sub-Division last year. The team started play in the Pacific Southwest Regional playing the host Surprise, Arizona this past Tuesday. Should it have won, it would have played Sparks, Nevada on Wednesday. The nine-team tournament winds up play on Saturday with the winner advancing to the 13-year-old World Series at Kitsap County, Washington August 15-22.

The 13-15-year-old Babe Ruth All-Star team rolled into the winner's bracket final after dominating Vernal, Utah 14-0 in the first round and taking care of Del Oro (Tucson) Arizona in the second round. In the third inning, El Segundo scored nine runs on eight hits to chase two Vernal pitchers. Connor Underwood, Dean Abramson, Nick Martinez, Noah Bergren, Tanner Stevens and Nick Karsaboom each had consecutive hits to open the inning. Underwood would get his second hit of the inning and Jackson Walz ended the scoring onslaught with a two-run single.

In the fourth inning, Chris Phelps walked and consecutive singles by Karsaboom, Lars Nootbaar, Hunter Lewis and Underwood made it 13-0. Joey Garza laced an RBI single to right field to make it 14-0 to conclude the See Sports, page 6







2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh mint, plus 4 sprigs for garnish

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

4 large lettuce leaves, such as Boston, romaine or iceberg

4 lime wedges

Steps:

1: Combine shrimp, 1 tablespoon oil, 1 teaspoon ginger and 1 teaspoon jalapeño in a medium bowl. Cover and refrigerate for 4 hours or up to 24 hours.

2: Combine melon, pineapple, red and green bell pepper, onion, vinegar, chopped mint and salt in a large bowl with the remaining 1 tablespoon oil, 1 teaspoon ginger and 1 teaspoon jalapeño. Refrigerate until cold, about 30 minutes or up to 4 hours.

4: Thread the shrimp onto skewers, piercing each twice, once through the tail end and once near the head end. Grill the shrimp until pink and just cooked through, 2 to 3 minutes per side. When cool enough to handle, slide the shrimp off the skewers.

5: To serve, arrange one large lettuce leaf on each dinner plate. Spoon salsa onto the lettuce and top with shrimp. Garnish each serving with a lime wedge and a mint sprig, if using.

Old-Fashioned Service Plus New Technology Equal a Recipe For Success for Local Jeweler

Thinking back to the time she and partner Roanne Mahony launched a wholesale beadselling operation in a tiny 84-square foot hallway on Grand Avenue 28 years ago, The Jewelry Source owner Brenda Newman could not have possibly anticipated how computers and technology would factor so prominently in her future success. The Downtown El Segundo shop soon moved around the block to its current location at 337 Main Street, became a retail jeweler and has built a loyal following over the years thanks to its combination of quality merchandise, craftsmanship and personalized customer service. While such service remains the cornerstone of the business, technology has created a wealth of new opportunities to enhance the overall customer experience.

In 2004, Newman automated the business via computer to allow her to streamline customer communication and provide new services such as wish lists, automated postcards and point of sale programs that pinpoint the source of every purchase. Two years later, she added 800 square feet to the store's footprint to build a state-of-the-art workshop and accommodate the acquisition of a laser welder that uses amplified heat instead of heat and fire. With that machine in tow, technicians can now restore and repair sensitive pieces in-house that were previously deemed off limits. Examples include watch cases or emerald cluster rings where in the past all the stones had to first be removed before using a traditional torch to re-tip a prong. Now, those stones can remain intact instead of being reset. The machine also allows technicians to fix impurities in castings.

Not one to rest on her laurels, Newman recently turned to technology again by adopting a customizable, interactive diamond database as well as a software program for 3D jewelry design called Counter Sketch. "The database is a giant virtual inventory of diamonds and colored gems our customers can view," explained Newman. "They can come to the store, sit down at my desk and at the click of a button, I can pull up photos and information on countless diamonds in this database that we have access to. It's a marvelous offering since we are limited in what we can carry at the store itself. Then with Counter Sketch, we can look at various design options, reset or rebuild rings. So at the same time, it allows us to better educate people about diamond buying."


Newman works primarily with a diamond dealer/cutter in Upstate New York who can then ship the loose diamonds of interest to The Jewelry Source on spec for perusal and, if it all works out, eventual purchase and instore setting. And that is where technology can only take you so far. "You should never buy a diamond online," warned Newman. "You still have to see it in person, look at it through the loupe, hold it in your hand. That part of the business will never go away."

In any case, embracing technology has helped The Jewelry Source grow and as a result there is more staff there than ever before. Newman was quick to point out that the newer employees are quite a bit younger than she is and that is not by accident. "While we still retain the same fundamental core of our business as established back in the '80s, it's really important for us to understand the new generation and what their tastes and likes are," she said. "We have a staff meeting almost every day." Part of staying current also means maintaining an updated website and Facebook page, although Newman has yet to join Twitter.

Newman has also parlayed her longtime membership in the Independent Jewelers Organization (IJO) to provide customers with merchandise and pricing options normally reserved for industry giants. She just returned from Minneapolis as part of her twice-a-year IJO excursions. "I can sit down with a diamond dealer and I'm able to buy like the big guys," she said of the cooperative arrangement.

Then in the fall, Newman will head to Antwerp, Belgium—noted as the world's diamond capital. The annual exclusive trip allows her to hand-select diamonds for her customers—but this time there is no interactive diamond database to preview the gems in question. "You can't just walk in and buy diamonds—it's all about the relationships,"

Cancer is one of the leading causes of death in the world, particularly in the USA. There are more than 100 types of cancers and any part of the body can be affected. The most common types of cancer that kill men and women are lung, stomach, liver, colorectal and breast. According to the World Health Organization 30 percent of cancers can be prevented, mainly by not using tobacco, having a healthy diet and being physically active -- food for thought. The American Cancer Society Relay For Life, began 27 years ago in Tacoma, Washington. Dr. Gordy Klatt, a local colorectal surgeon, wanted to help support his local American Cancer Society office and also show support for his many patients who had battled cancer. He decided to personally raise money for the fight by doing something he enjoyed - running marathons. In May 1985, Dr. Gordy Klatt spent 24 long hours circling the track at Baker Stadium at the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma. He ran for more than 83 miles. Nearly 300 of Dr. Klatt's friends, family, and patients

watched as he ran and walked the course. Throughout the night, friends donated \$25 to run or walk with Dr. Klatt for 30 minutes. His efforts raised \$27,000 to fight cancer. From this small beginning Relay for Life was born.

According to RelayforLife.org, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities across the United States take part in Relay for Life each year to celebrate cancer survivors, remember loved ones lost and fight back against the disease. During the event, teams of people camp out at a large community venue and take turns walking around a track or path. The good news is that Cancer Deaths have been declining according to the American Cancer Society because of early detection and better treatment methods. Separate team events continue after the Relay for Life Event to raise monies up until the deadline at the end of August. One of the 16 participating teams, The ZF Dancing Fleas, are holding a Mardi Gras Benefit Dinner and Dance on Sunday, August 19 from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the El Segundo Joslyn Center, located at 339 Sheldon Street. Tickets are \$40/\$50 at the door and 100 percent of the proceeds will benefit the El Segundo Relay for Life. 


