Financial Audit Paints A Dire Picture: Cash Funds Could Be Depleted by 2016

With financial issues plaguing the city of Hawthorne, considerable interest was paid to the results of a financial audit that were released earlier this month.

The study was conducted by the outside accounting agency, Vasquez & Company LLP in hopes of promoting "clarity and transparency regarding the City of Hawthorne's financial condition."

"The scope of our study was to investigate certain records and transactions of the City's Finance Department," the report sent to Interim City Manager Arnold Shadbehr said. "We also considered claims against the City's cash balance during the past few years."

The primary objective of the study was to provide an understanding about the cash balance of the City's General Fund as of June 30, 2015.

A multi-step process was carried out in order to execute the audit, including research and various investigatory procedures. They began by obtaining a detail of the general ledger of transactions in the city's General Fund for the fiscal year of 2014-2015.

Cash transactions were sorted through, revenue and expenditures from July and August 2015 were reviewed, and interviews were conducted with city management and staff within the Finance Department.

The study found that, "the City's financial condition has worsened subsequent to fiscal year 2013-2014," the report said, "primarily because certain anticipated funding sources did not materialize and unplanned expenditures occurred."

The report states that the city has only \$4.1 million of cash available in the General Fund and an additional \$4 million of that set aside in a "Rainy Day Fund." Vasquez and Company concludes that the amount of cash in the fund

is enough to fund only about 3 weeks of city operations.

While that might sound dire, it gets worse.

The report found that during fiscal year 2014-2015, the General Fund budget had proposed expenditures of \$62.6 million against an estimated income of \$59.4 million and reserve funds of only \$3.1 million.

When including amendments that were made in July and August in reaction to the total income and expenditures came down slightly, but the deficit remained at \$3.2 million. This deficit was funded by the General Fund cash reserves.

While much is sure to change between now and the upcoming elections, the report states that the city is expecting a 2015-2016 income of \$59 million and though the slight increase in revenue is much-needed, the city is still expected to be in a deficit.

In fact, the report finds that "assuming a business as usual scenario," city expenditures will be approximately \$65.2 million, or a 5.3% increase year-over-year.

"City management is evaluating options to reduce costs by \$6.2 million on an annual basis," the report states. "Because one-fourth of the year will likely have passed before substantial cost saving measures can be implemented, the City will only realize a portion of the annual savings potential."

The city recently balanced its budget by including General Fund Reserves as a financing source. In 2013-2014, \$1.5 million was used while in 2014-2015, \$3.2 million was spent.

"The proposed 2015-2016 budget reflects spending an additional \$6.2 million of General Fund Reserves in order to finance the deficit," the report states. "Because the city considers \$4 million of the cash to be its 'Rainy Day Fund,' and thus unavailable for appropriation

for normal operations, the draft budget would have the city spending cash reserves which it will not have on hand."

The report goes on to state that "if the city spends its cash reserves pursuant to the projections, the General Fund Cash Balance will be substantially depleted if not exhausted."

While the idea of not having any "side money" to pay for expenditures is a harrowing reality, the report adds that certain costs that were not recorded in the General Fund will need to be paid with the money in there.

Escalating retiree medical care costs of \$49.7 million, escalating pension costs of \$39.2 million, pension obligation bonds with escalating annual debt service payments and a \$6.4 million insurance fund deficit are all expenditures that will need to be paid off at some point.

"The city's General Fund Balance is not sufficient to finance these increasing costs, and any worsening of the financial condition caused by operating deficits will place the city in an even more precarious financial position," the report cautions.

The City Council re-scheduled its first meeting since the report was released for Thursday, September 10 and with several of the members on the board involved with upcoming elections, residents may want to visit City Hall to see what their representatives have to say about the report findings.

The situation has become so dire that one of the discussion items will center on voluntary participation with other city employees in on-going furloughs. City employees have been getting deferred payments to help balance spending budgets per departments, but with each month passing with no resolution in sight, yet another expenditure that continues to grow that the city will eventually have to pay out. •

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Film Review

The Second Mother is a Culturally Crowd-Pleasing Number About Family

The Second Mother is set in Sao Paulo, Brazil (a place where the Grammy-Award winning alt-rock band Arcade Fire is referred to as "The Arcade Fire"). The film (*Que horas ela volta?*) follows the eponymous character Val (Regina Casé), a housekeeper for a considerably wealthy family. It's not an understatement to say her job has become her life, evidenced when her daughter Jéssica

and even intimate in its storytelling.

It must be said, Regina Casé shines in the lead role as Val. She is a graceful presence as an immediately empathetic and cordial character. Val is visibly frustrated by her position – she overthinks how to organize a new coffee table set, is bothered by the family dog, and can't seem to stop Jessica from eating the family's chocolate ice cream. Everybody in *The Second Mother* seems perpetually frustrated and

(Camila Márdila) flies into town, and end up only staying in the house.

The main conflict here is in Val's struggle to identify with a daughter she never quite got to raise. At one point she even relies upon the opinion of the family's son to get a sense of what her own daughter is like.

The Second Mother is a mostly quiet picture. Music is scarce, and camera angles, if not static, move slowly. Scenes within the house are almost claustrophobic due to how these angles repeat themselves throughout, very astutely mirroring the routine of Val's life. Aside from one sequence, set in a high-rise, the surrounding city is never really explored (except for that it rains a lot). But these elements make the film contained, focused,

vicariously argumentative, which feeds what is most interesting and entertaining here: the dynamics and dialogues between characters.

The Second Mother is a film primarily about thickness of bonds, how we concern ourselves with the opinions and approvals of those outside our family, and how they seem to mean more when they are earned. The family's son reaches out to his "second mother" over his first for this reason. But the film is moreover a character study about Val's shortcomings as a first mother herself. That said, while the movie is more dramatic than comedic, it has a natural levity that lends itself to a something deeply felt but also feel-good. *The Second Mother* is now playing in LA at the Laemmle Royal. •

Legal Aid for Elders

Preparing for College? Include Legal Documents and Important Discussions

Unless you have the proper legal documents in place, once your child turns 18, you no longer have access to their health information or academic information and most importantly, you do not have the legal right to make medical decisions on their behalf. Preparing these documents before your child leaves for college is more important than furnishing a dorm room.

Preparing to send a child away to college for the first time is exciting, but there are serious issues to consider. A recent article from *The Atlanta Journal-Constitution*, "How to prepare for kid going off to college" addresses issues concerning healthcare and credit card finances.

Health care: When a child turns 18, you are able to continue to keep him/her on your insurance plan, but they're considered a legal adult under HIPAA as far as disclosing health information. As a parent, you're no longer legally permitted to access their health information when they go off to college and get sick or if they're in a car accident and in the hospital. Because of the HIPAA restrictions, you should have an estate-planning attorney draw up a health-care power of attorney which names a parent or parents as their health-care agent. That way you can speak to healthcare professionals on their behalf if they are incapacitated, and you can obtain their medical information. Have a conversation with your child about the changes that happen when they become an adult and how a health-care power of attorney will protect them. Keep a copy of the document at home and have your son or daughter keep a copy at school. Scan it as

well so you have it in electronic format to email to a physician or to an ER if needed.

Credit cards: Anyone under 21 applying for a credit card must have an independent source of funds to pay the bills, so that's good news for parents. Many college freshmen use credit cards cosigned by parents. Parents should sign up for mobile alerts to monitor their student's expenses, and talk to them about budgeting.

If your child goes on a shopping spree and there are payment issues, your credit is going to take a hit. You can avoid this by paying the bills yourself and having your kid reimburse you for his or her expenses each month. You can also go with a debit card instead of a credit card. When the money is gone, it's gone. Another option is to add your child as an authorized user on your account so that he will have his own card and start to build a credit history. However, you're the one managing the account.

While you're thinking about all of these important issues, you also should take the time to review your estate planning now that your son or daughter is an adult and possibly is no longer living at home. Talk to your estate planning attorney about some of the common changes people consider at this point in the life of a family.

South Wears Down Lawndale

Lawndale High's football team began its season in what was expected to be a good match-up between two of the South Bay's top quarterbacks, the Cardinals' Chris Murray and the Spartans' Gabe Zuniga. Both had good moments but South's depth and experience proved too much for Lawndale in the end as the Spartans prevailed 33-21 last Friday at Lawndale.

The Cardinals jumped on the Spartans quickly as Zach Cooper raced 80 yards for the touchdown and a 7-0 lead. South, though, tied the game when Zuniga completed a drive on a one-yard sneak.

The score remained tied at seven until Lawndale came back to grab a 14-7 lead when Murray tossed a 24-yard touchdown pass to Bryant Perkinson with six seconds left before halftime.

The Spartans, however, came back with Zuniga's second one-yard TD run to get within 14-13. South lined up for the tying point after touchdown but a pair of off side penalties on the Cardinals enabled the Spartans to go ahead with a two-point conversion. Zuniga took just a few steps into the end zone and South led 15-14 with 6:39 remaining in the third quarter.

South, then, turned to junior fullback Cameron Dillon, who proved dominant in the fourth period. He had several good runs in its drive that went from late third quarter to the first part of the final period. It ended with five seconds into the fourth quarter when he gave the Spartans a 21-14 lead on a one-yard run.

Lawndale, though, bounced back after getting good field position at the South 45-yard line with Perkinson's punt return. The Cardinals took 10 plays before Murray raced into the end zone from six yards out and the extra point was good for a 21-21 tie with 5:32 to go in the game.

From there, though, the Cardinals had trouble holding Dillon and Zuniga and they were also hampered with several critical penalties. The Spartans took a 27-21 lead with 3:42 remaining on Zuniga's six-yard

scoring pass to Noah Harrison. Zuniga's three-yard keeper to the end zone sealed the game for South.

Penalties plagued Lawndale as the Cardinals were flagged 15 times for 130 yards.

"We'll learn from that," Lawndale first

year head coach Travis Clark said. "The kids are trying their best. We had no scrimmage coming into the game. There were some bad breaks."

Murray completed 11 of 24 passes for 140 yards and one touchdown. Perkinson had six catches for 118 yards and one TD. For the Spartans, Zuniga completed 13 of 24 passes for 138 yards and one TD. Dillon ran for 83 yards and two TDs.

Perhaps the toughest part of the schedule for the Cardinals is the first two games as the next one is expected to get only harder. Coming to Lawndale will be CIF-Southern Section PAC Five Mission League power Crespi from Encino for a 7 p.m. on Friday.

Last Friday at Crespi, the Celtics lost their season opener to Orange Lutheran from the prestigious Trinity League 43-28. Crespi was tri-Mission League champion with La Puente Bishop Amat and Gardena Serra last season. Also in 2014, the Celtics rolled over Lawndale 49-0 at Crespi.

EL SEGUNDO DOWNS LEUZINGER

Last season, Leuzinger High's football team was routed by host El Segundo, led by premier football-baseball athlete Lars

Nootbar who is now at University of Southern California on a baseball scholarship, 51-0. With a lesser experience Eagle team, the Olympians improved some but still lost 34-14.

Leuzinger tied the game at seven early in the second quarter when quarterback Jeremiah Smith completed a 59-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Andre Hunt, but El Segundo proved too much for the Olympians from there.
