Da Vinci Student Awarded Scholarship

The Wiseburn School Board congratulated Daisy Chavez, a senior at Da Vinci Science Academy, on being awarded the Caldwell, Flores Winter's Foundation award, which includes a \$1,000 scholarship. During the April 24 meeting a representative of the financial planning company presented Chavez with the award.

Chavez will use the scholarship to assist her in attending Sacramento State University to study biology. District Superintendent Tom Johnstone said she was a "very deserving recipient" of the award. He told Chavez that he expects her to be well suited to college. "Daisy, we are very proud of you," said Johnstone. "We know you are very well prepared and you'll go up there and be very successful. Keep up the good work."

The scholastic financial firm funds an annual scholarship open which is open to all graduating seniors in California. Caldwell, Flores Winters representative Patricia Raphael said the firm looks to help students overcoming challenges on their path to high education with the scholarship. Board president Roger Banuelos expressed the Board's gratitude to the company for their assistance in fueling the success of one of the district's students. "Thank you for . . . the scholarship," said Banuelos. "It really does go a long way."

Also during the meeting, the Board was addressed by Bill Magoon on behalf of the residents of the "Choice Blocks," made up of the four blocks south of 138th Street between La Cienega Boulevard and Inglewood Avenue, during the public comment portion of the agenda. Magoon said the residents of this area are once again looking to leave the Lawndale

Elementary School district and Centinela Valley Union High School District and join the newly formed Wiseburn Unified School District. However, Magoon said they are facing a problem with building enthusiasm for the possibly long political battle. "We have started this again," said Magoon. "We had a lot of momentum last time, this time not so much. People have in some respects lost hope and faith because it didn't happen the first time. And there's a little bit of apathy about it, which has been me nervous."

The residents of the Choice Block have cited both the stronger academic record in Wiseburn and the looming threat of additional property taxes under Lawndale and Centinela as motivations for pushing to join Wiseburn. What Magoon thought would further energize the residents is a Board resolution supporting the community in its efforts to join the district. "They want some support from you," said Magoon. "They want to know that this Board supports this effort and that this Board is behind this effort 100 percent. And kind of what they're looking for is something in writing, so they know you're behind this."

The Board agreed to approve a resolution stating their support, which will be signed during the Board's May 8 meeting. Banuelos explained that Magoon's belief that these four blocks belong in Wiseburn is in line with beliefs of the Board, which views every neighborhood in the Wiseburn community as part of the district. "We view everyone who lives in the Wiseburn area as being in Wiseburn, as part of our school district," said Banuelos. "We support this effort, you definitely have our support."

More personally, Board member Dennis Curtis said he has been fighting for this change for over two decades and will continue to push for the Choice Blocks to join the district. "This has been a hot ticket item," said Curtis. "This has been on my radar for over 20 years. At one time I thought we had all figured out. This is still on my to-do list. You have my support, no matter what it takes. I want to dispel any inkling of, 'Well they don't care,'" because I personally do." Board member Blanca Estrada also expressed that making these blocks into a full-time fixture of the district is a personal goal of hers. "It one of the big things I'd love to do as a Board member," said Estrada.

Magoon said he and his neighbors won't give up on their goal of moving into the Wiseburn School District. He hopes for an agreement that keeps Lawndale, Centinela Valley and Wiseburn school districts out of the courtroom, but the recent issues with the Centinela Valley Union High School district has made the prospect of joining Wiseburn especially pressing. "The residents, the neighbors, want to be part of the district. They always have and always will. It's everybody's hope we can resolve this amicably," said Magoon. "At the same time, we as a community, we're determined to get what we want - what we've deserved from 30 years. We're just done. Everyday it's shenanigans in the paper."

Johnstone hoped for a quick resolution to the issue. No stranger to long political battles himself, he referenced the district's long road to unification but said this conflict will be dealt with faster. "It won't take 14 years this time," said Johnstone. •

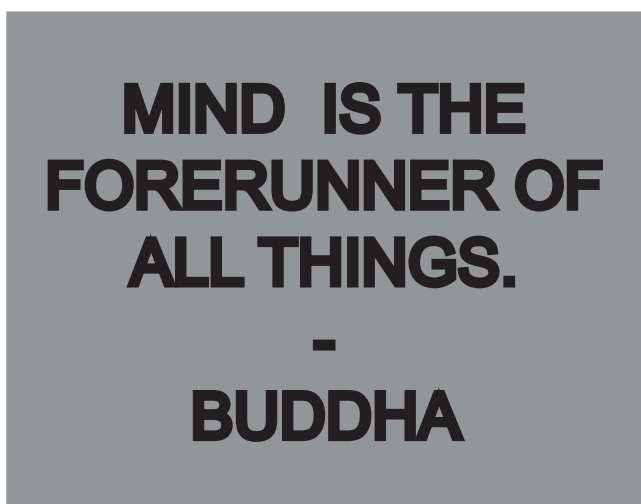

Traveling Smart

Traveling to the East Coast this past week reminded me of how much we have come to depend upon technology. It is changing everything. Hawthorne Keeps Pace by Routing Inglewood

Hawthorne High's softball team remained in second place in the Ocean League with a five-inning mercy rule 16-2 win over Inglewood last Thursday at Hawthorne. The Cougars, who improved to 3-1 in league and 11-5 overall, dominated the Sentinels right from the start. They blew the game open with six runs in the bottom of the third inning.

Kerri Ludman sparked Hawthorne's offense by going three-for-three with four runs batted in and two runs scored. Casandra Perez hit a three-run home run for the Cougars. Winning pitcher went five innings, allowing four hits to Inglewood, which is 0-4 in Ocean play.

On April 15 at Culver City, Hawthorne downed the Centaurs 12-6. The Cougars surged out to a 10-1 fifth inning lead, then coasted to an easy win. Hawthorne will visit Morningside next Tuesday at 3:15 p.m. before showing down at Santa Monica next Thursday at the same time.

So instead of giving us quality news coverage, productive analysis of events, or constructive criticism of any sort, these news agencies provide all of the material needed for The Daily Show to succeed. 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Looking Up

Evidence of 26 Atomic Bomb Scale Asteroid Impacts since the Year 2000

At a press conference April 22 at the Seattle Museum of Flight, three prominent astronauts supporting the B612 Foundation presented a visualization of new data showing the surprising frequency at which the Earth is hit by asteroids. The astronauts were guests of the Seattle Museum for a special series of public events on Earth Day 2014.

Dr. Ed Lu, former US shuttle and Soyuz astronaut and co-founder and CEO of the B612 Foundation, was joined by former NASA astronaut Tom Jones, president of the Association of Space Explorers and Apollo 8 astronaut Bill Anders, first chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and former chairman and CEO of General Dynamics, to discuss findings recently released from the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Organization, which operates a network of sensors that monitors the Earth around the clock listening for the infrasound signatures of nuclear detonations.

Between 2000 and 2013, this network detected 26 explosions on Earth ranging in energy from 1 to 600 kilotons—all caused not by nuclear explosions, but rather by asteroid impacts. To put that in perspective, the atomic bomb that destroyed Hiroshima in 1945 exploded with an energy impact of 15 kilotons. While most of these asteroids exploded too high in the atmosphere to do serious damage on the ground, the evidence is important in estimating the frequency of

The Earth is continuously colliding with fragments of asteroids, the largest in recent times exploding over Tunguska, Siberia, in 1908 with an energy impact of between 5 and 15 megatons. More recently, we witnessed the

600-kiloton impact in Chelyabinsk, Russia, in 2013, and asteroid impacts greater than 20 kilotons occurred in South Sulawesi, Indonesia, in 2009, in the Southern Ocean in 2004, and in the Mediterranean Sea in 2002. Important to note as well is the fact that none of these asteroids were detected or tracked in advance by any existing space-based or terrestrial observatory.

"While most large asteroids with the potential

to destroy an entire country or continent have been detected, less than 10,000 of the more than a million dangerous asteroids with the potential to destroy a major metropolitan area have been found by all existing space or terrestrially-operated observatories," stated Lu. "Because we don't know where or when the next major impact will occur, the only thing preventing a catastrophe from a 'city-killer' sized asteroid has been blind luck."

The B612 Foundation aims to change that by building the Sentinel Space Telescope Mission, an early warning infrared space telescope for tracking asteroids that would provide many years to deflect an asteroid when it is still millions of miles away. The B612 Sentinel Mission will be the world's first privately funded deep space mission that will create the first comprehensive dynamic map of our inner solar system, identifying the current and future locations and trajectories of Earth crossing asteroids. Sentinel will detect and track more than 200,000 asteroids in just the first year of operation, after a planned launch in 2018.

The B612 Foundation (<http://www.b612foundation.org>) is named for the asteroid home of the "Little Prince" in Antoine de Saint-Exupery's classic novel, *Le Petit Prince*. The Little Prince came to realize that what is essential in life is often invisible to the human eye.

Notice of adoption of Ordinance No. 2070 of the City of Hawthorne, California, which amended or deleted various chapters related to unclassified uses and site development plan

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on April 22, 2014, the City Council of the City of Hawthorne, California adopted Ordinance No. 2070 entitled "An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Hawthorne, California approving zoning text amendment No. 2012ZA12, amending various chapters and deleting Chapters 17.36 and 17.62 of the Hawthorne Municipal Code, removing unclassified uses and site development plan and all references thereto within the Municipal code

A summary of that Ordinance is as follows: Summary of Ordinance No. 2070

The term "unclassified use permit" is unique to the City of Hawthorne and is not recognized by State Law. Many of the uses called out in the Unclassified Use chapter of the HMC have, over the years, been classified in various commercial or industrial zones. Many others are obsolete or so special in their scale and impacts that they should not be considered under any circumstances or only with careful and in-depth study.

The unclassified uses section became a catch all when the zoning chapter of the municipal code added controversial uses or new uses that were emerging. The intent of the unclassified use permit was to identify uses that have characteristics of such unique and special form as to make impractical their being included automatically in zoning classifications. The authority for the location and operation of any of the uses listed in the chapter were subject to review by both the Planning Commission and the City Council. The purpose of review by both bodies was to determine that the characteristics of any such use shall not be unreasonably incompatible with the type of uses permitted in surrounding areas and for the further purpose of stipulating such conditions as may reasonably assure that the use would be compatible. However, a conditional use permit accomplishes the same task.

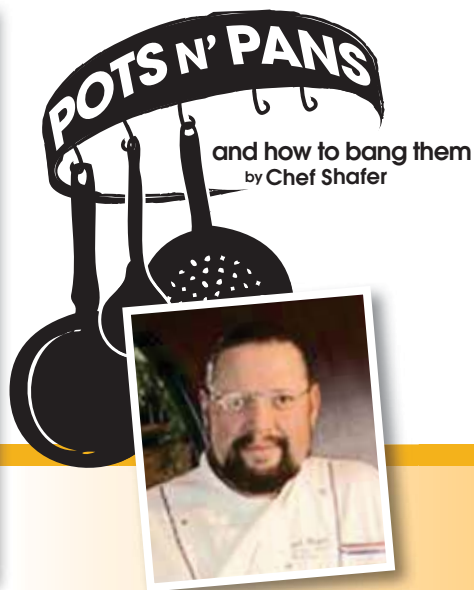

1 cup sour cream • 3 tablespoons powder sugar • 1 teaspoon lemon zest
Mix the sour cream and sugar together and pour over cooled pie.
