New Projects Spur Hope for City's Financial Future

With its fiscal health strongly tied into business tax revenues, the City of El Segundo hopes future new commercial activity will help shore up its coffers in the years to come. In addition to working with existing tenants to ensure they are still happy and staying put, Economic Development Analyst Ted Shove continues to promote El Segundo's various amenities to a variety of potential newcomers. In the meantime, several key projects are now in the works that could reap major dividends for the long haul once (or in some cases, if) they are up and running.

Scheduled to finally be raring to go in August, the long-planned modernization of NRG Energy, Inc.'s El Segundo power plant is near completion. The repowered facility will provide 550 megawatts of new gas-fueled generating capacity—enough for over 400,000 homes—that can be online in just 10 minutes. It's still unclear what the City's take in annual tax revenues will be, but much of it will hinge on how often the plant is operating. "They're trying to secure future contracts to run at closer to 100 percent," said Shove. If so, it could mean well over \$1 million for the City's general fund every year.

After acquiring Plaza El Segundo in January 2012, Federal Realty confirmed its plans to build the next phase of the retail complex at the hard corner of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans. Banners promoting The Pointe have been up for months along fencing on Sepulveda, though the exact timeline for construction to begin is still unknown, as are names of prospective tenants. Still, the City

has high hopes for the success of the new development in terms of future tax dollars given the recent uptick in retail sales and success of the existing Plaza stores. "Building The Pointe will largely depend upon when they finalize their site plan," said Shove.

"Depending on the revisions that are made, additional CEQA [California Environmental Quality Act] provisions may be required...so they are being very careful on the front end to optimize their site without unnecessary

Fundraiser Contributes to Tradition of Community Service

Thanks to Community Support Day, \$7,365 was raised for Sandpipers, a 100 percent volunteer organization dedicated to serving the needs of the South Bay community through philanthropic efforts. Community Support Day, which took place on Monday, February 25, was when Whole Foods donated five percent of all sales to Sandpipers in order to help support the group's charitable outreach to those in need throughout the South Bay.

"Whole Foods was wonderful. We reached out to them in a sort of cold call and they were so terrific," Sandpipers President Debbie Felt said. "It started in December during our Holiday Home Tour where they sold hot chocolate and other things and that was when they told us they wanted to do a five percent day with us. The Whole Foods Event was perfect. It was wonderful. For me as President, it is about bringing the people together and making sure that people are thanked for the job they do."

Since opening its doors in 2007, Whole Foods Market, Plaza El Segundo has donated more than \$63,000 to local organizations including the El Segundo Education Foundation. Working with Sandpipers was just part of the store's commitment to giving back to its community. "As a company, we are committed to being an agent of change—not only in how our shoppers look at food, but also in the communities in which they live, work and play," Whole Foods Market Marketing Supervisor Lisa Zollner said. "More locals should be aware of what they [Sandpipers] are doing in and around the South Bay."

Sandpipers began in 1931 with seven women who started the Holiday Basket Program (which is still hosted to this day) when they went around during the Depression and prepared holiday baskets with food and basic necessities for some families. For the past 81 years, Sandpipers has expanded its reach in assisting the less

Top Golf Concern

The City of El Segundo's process of evaluating the proposed offer from Top Golf to convert The Lakes of El Segundo's golf practice facility into a Top Golf restaurant/bar and golf-game like facility is winding down. It is time that people ensure they are continuing to make their perspectives heard.

What Top Golf proposes will add limited additional revenues to the city. While Top Golf argues that the facility will remain open to all and be reasonably priced, the truth is, as one can see from their web site and in spite of their statements to the contrary, that their prime market is young adults with the associated bar and restaurant revenues. Even their lowest tiered pricing for golf practice is significantly higher than the Lakes pricing.

As a result, our teenagers will have much less access. Seniors and others who enjoy the reasonable pricing to practice golf will be priced out of using the facility. Top Golf's investment to the facility requires these kind of revenues to make the investment worthwhile.

While the details of the financial differential of Top Golf over the Lakes remain murky, the Lakes can increase its already profitable revenues without gutting this jewel. Top Golf's incremental revenues to the City are not significant.

The central question is clear: does the city prefer a slight increase in revenues and the emergence of another bar aimed at young adults over the access of the public facility to teens, seniors and golfers?

additional entitlement work." Shove reported that the rest of Plaza El Segundo is indeed thriving, with a low vacancy rate, stable tenant mix and very few shops out of business.

What could be one of the largest commercial projects in El Segundo history, Raytheon's proposal to enhance its south campus with 1.9 million square feet of new development (on top of the existing property's 1.8 million square feet) is now in the entitlement phase. A draft of the environmental impact report (EIR) will likely be available in late spring, with the final document coming in summer to address land use, noise, utilities, traffic and other possible impacts. The El Segundo Planning Commission will weigh in on the project in the fall, with the Council to follow. The project could include a mix of new single-tenant office space (initial estimates for 1.565 million square feet), light industrial (150,000 square feet), retail/restaurant (133,000 square feet), warehouse (82,000 square feet) and open space.

Arguably the most promising opportunity for long-term business growth in El Segundo is in the Smoky Hollow district. A visit from a panel of experts representing the Urban Land Institute last spring yielded a report that likened Smoky Hollow's future potential to that of Santa Monica and Culver City. Staff is currently working on a specific plan to address parking, fiber optic infrastructure and design elements to hopefully transform Smoky Hollow into a mixed-use office/industrial hub with a particular emphasis on hi-tech, creative and Internet firms. In the meantime, a hometown success story and tenant in that area—Caban Resources—is in the midst of

a physical expansion and Smoky Hollow revitalization project.

Tying in with Smoky Hollow, Mar Ventures is developing two buildings on Grand and Kanas encompassing 30,000 square feet of space earmarked for creative office uses such as start-up technology, entertainment and advertising that tie in with the City's plans for Smoky Hollow. Expected to be ready for occupancy at the beginning of 2014, the buildings will be adjacent to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) inspection facility, offices and laboratory currently under construction.

Hotels add a steady flow of transient occupancy tax revenues and the City hopes to see at least one more facility follow in the footsteps of the just opened Hyatt Place at the 46-acre Campus El Segundo (which the City hopes will spur additional commercial development at the site). One possibility is an already approved location at 888 N. Sepulveda. The property owner is working with the City to make alterations to the specific plan to develop a hotel more consistent with the market demand.

Also on Sepulveda, the public will soon be able to weigh in on In N' Out Burger's proposal to build a drive-thru restaurant at the site of the current Sizzler. Originally brought before the Council over a year ago, the plan ran into some initial resistance due to concerns about traffic in the already congested section at the corner of Mariposa Avenue and parking issues in the Sizzler lot.

One of the more controversial projects in recent memory, TopGolf's proposed revamp

Concise School Board Meeting Approves Assemblies

Tuesday night's meeting of the El Segundo School Board featured a relatively sparse agenda, with both of the special presentations (including one by El Segundo High School ASB students that had recently attended the Sacramento Safari) postponed until the next regularly scheduled meeting slated for April 23.

The consent agenda portion of the 37-minute meeting featured the ratification of the Peruvian Ensemble assembly that took place

Also approved were revisions to Board policies and administrative regulations in regards to student records and confidentiality. The revisions are in accordance with recent regulations mandating a time limit in which districts must reply to a request for students' records when the latter exit a school.

The information pending action portion of the meeting included the High School summer reading list, which while similar to last summer's list, deleted "Gatekeepers" for ninth grade honors English. Facing the reality

last Thursday at Richmond Street School. The assembly, set up through the Performing Arts Center of Los Angeles County, exposed students to the exciting music, dance and culture of the early Incas.

Fourth grade students will have the opportunity to engage in hands-on experiences that attempt to recreate the adventures and hardships endured by early California settlers during the boisterous Gold Rush period. The Board approved the Special Education Extended School Year Program, which is available to help students who are at risk of experiencing a significant regression of their skills over the summer vacation period. The programs will run from June 24 thru July 19 and will include a preschool inclusion summer camp, as well as a special grade six through 12 class.

The action items included the acceptance of gifts, including an \$8,000 bestowment by the Center Street PTA to their home school; a \$1,000 gift from Northrop Grumman Foundation to the High School; and a \$1,000 gift from the AFCEA education program, earmarked for the students at Center Street.

that some students, no matter how motivated, may not prioritize summer reading and mandatory assignments, the Board discussed the fact that students enrolled in College Prep English courses will not be required to read and complete a written assignment. This summer learning activity will now be presented to the students as an option that will garner them extra credit. The feeling was that in the past, a majority of the students who had not completed the required assignments began the fall semester in catch-up mode if they hadn't finished summer work, "putting them behind the eight-ball," according to Superintendent Geoff Yantz.

All selections have been added to the list with an eye towards appealing to both male and female readers and providing them with exciting options for their summer reading."

During the informational calendar portion of the meeting, Yantz spoke of a District fundraiser that was to take place at a local restaurant, as well as a Friday Board of Education retreat. Yantz also detailed the upcoming April events, including PTA

fortunate through the hard work of volunteers willing to give their time for the well-being of others. Sandpipers sponsor programs to provide college scholarships for local students, take children living in shelters or dealing with domestic violence for back-to-school shopping, host a Holiday Baskets Program for over 100 families in need every year, and oversee a Community Grant Program that helps fund local social service agencies.

"As President, for me, it has always been about the heart. It has been about making people feel good, which in turn makes me feel good," Felt said. "It makes me feel good to be able to do all of the things that we do because we absolutely change people's lives--whether it be through our emergency case work, such as when we work with local agencies that will tell us of a woman in a domestic violence situation who might not have money for rent and we can step in and pay it for her. We are about helping people already in the right direction to give them that little push."

Sandpipers serves the South Bay, including the areas as far north as the 105 Freeway and as far east as the 110 Freeway. Through networking with various agencies like Harbor Regional, Sandpipers is able to reach hundreds of families each year. For Felt, who joined in 2004 but was part of Sandpipers as a child, the organization is a great way to lead by example. "I always knew about the Sandpipers and when I was younger, I would participate

in the many different events, such as the sugarplum tree where we have ornaments to offer foster kids present," Felt said. "It was important to me that my kids saw me doing these types of things--especially today when in our society and where we live, everything is right there. I just think that it is really important to know that they [kids] should be really thankful for what they have."

While the South Bay is fortunate to report lower numbers of poverty-stricken families than other parts of the Los Angeles area, the Sandpipers recognize that there is still a need for aid and they are happy to provide it. "There are always going to be people that have more than them and less than them, but one can still has to be kind to people," Felt said. "When I joined, I met a bunch of people and it was great and so far has been a really great experience. I have done a lot of different jobs with the Sandpipers and never did I think that I would become President."

Felt added, "We all really work together and there is not just one person making things happen--we need everyone to do what they are doing and fulfilling their requirements in order for us to continue doing all the stuff that allows us to work. It's amazing given that we don't pay anybody or have any sort of staff."

In later speaking to Republicans, he went on, "Our biggest problems over the next 10 years are not deficits. The biggest problems we face are unemployment, stagnant wages, slow growth and widening inequality."

The President's perspective is bolstered by New York Mayor Blumberg who said the U.S. is so wealthy it can borrow indefinitely. *New York Times* columnist and economist Paul Krugman believes we need to spend more--not less.

In examining the President's economic credibility, it should be pointed out that his last two budgets were defeated in the Senate by a vote of 99-0 and in the House by 144-0. In other words, no Congressman or Senator of either party echoed the President's views. This year, the President has so far chosen to go AWOL on the budget. His budget is now more than a month late and the President says he is having trouble printing the document!

Democrats will no doubt kill the bill because their President has a different agenda.

Clearly runaway spending is the backbone of the Democratic platform. If we look at the growth of the national debt, we see that it has exploded by 60 percent over the last four years...from \$10.6 trillion to \$16.5 trillion. At the same time, our nation's productivity has struggled to breach two percent per year--a debt to growth ratio of greater than 7:1. Yet Obama says this is not a problem. Our debt is now greater than our productivity, but Obama says this can be ignored.

Question of the week: "What impact will Sequestration have on South Bay communities"?

Congressman Henry Waxman replied:

I am deeply concerned about the impact of sequestration on South Bay communities. California's economy has only begun to recover, and the cuts to key domestic and defense programs will slow its growth. The cuts, which began two weeks ago, could add up to as much as \$10 billion for California alone, and could put 200,000 jobs at risk.

The aerospace and defense industries, which employ tens of thousands of people in the Los Angeles region and play a significant role in the economy, face large cuts. California's 64,000 civilian military workers also face furloughs and smaller paychecks beginning next month and stretching out for the remainder of the fiscal year. Sequestration will cause significant economic disruption for a number of major employers in the South Bay area, including the Los Angeles Air Force Base, Northrop Grumman, Raytheon, The Aerospace Corporation, and related subcontractors.

Defense is not the only part of the budget that will be slashed. Key education programs also face major cuts. The Los Angeles Unified School District will lose about \$37 million in Federal aid. The University of California system broadly, and UCLA in my district, will suffer from cuts to Federal research money, work study jobs and student aid programs. And 80,000 UC students could face higher bills next year because of cuts in Pell grants.

Sequestration slows economic growth and is harmful to our national security. We have an obligation to put partisanship aside and make budget decisions that reflect the priorities of the American people. President Obama has offered to work with Congress on a comprehensive plan to reduce the debt, create a fairer tax system and rebuild the middle class, all of which are necessary to strengthen our economy. I hope the Republican leadership will work with Democrats and the White House to work together in a responsible, bipartisan way to end these arbitrary and harmful budget cuts. •

Eagles Go Little to Win Big Game

It's a new age and new era in the game of high school baseball. Long gone, at least for the El Segundo High School baseball team, are the days of multiple home runs in the same game. The Eagles recently executed five bunts and scored single runs in the first four innings against perennial powerhouse Long Beach Wilson for a 4-2 victory.

Alberto Concepcion hit 20 home runs his senior year and Travis Mc Andrews hit 14 in the same year. The 1998 team had home run production from each of its nine starters and Robbie Estrada hit home runs from each side of the plate three times in his varsity career. But those days are a mere reflection in the mirror now.

Eagle head coach Steve Shevlin believes there is a safety issue in place to help guard against balls being hit dramatically hard. "With the changing of the bat specifications, the bats nowadays really don't provide the pop that bats had five years ago," he said.

High school and college teams have adapted to a different style of play now and it appears the Eagles have jumped on board. The art of pushing runners into scoring position has returned to baseball. "Bunting was somewhat of a lost art, but it's back," said Shevlin.

The Eagles lost a doubleheader to their nemesis and archrival Mira Costa. In the first game, they lost a heartbreaker 5-4 in nine innings and then fell 3-0 in the second game. In both games the Mustangs did the little things, including bunting, to win both contests. In each game, the Eagles could not get the timely hitting and hit in five double plays overall. In years past both teams would see how far they could hit the ball, but not in this doubleheader.

The Eagles faced Long Beach Wilson in the second round of the Redondo Tournament. The Bruins are routinely one of Southern California's top high school teams that produce a wealth of talented players. On this year's roster, they have three high-profile players in Cal State Fullerton-bound shortstop Tim Richards, centerfielder Tyler Vaughn and sophomore catcher Chris Betts who has already verbally committed to the University of Tennessee.

After the doubleheader loss to Mira Costa, the Eagles went into their next practices working on the small things that win games. In the first inning, Kevin Schreiber used his speed to beat out a push bunt. Austin Brasher reached first base on a fielder's choice, putting Schreiber on third. Brasher stole second base and when the ball caromed off his helmet, Schreiber scored easily.

In the second inning, Mike Pagan continued his torrid hitting pace with a double down the left field line. Seth McKenna beat out a drag bunt and Pagan scored when the ball sailed off the first baseman's mitt.

In the third inning, Eric Gronhagen blistered a single up the middle. Brasher was safe on a sacrifice bunt that the second baseman mishandled. Connor Underwood executed another sacrifice bunt and Gronhagen scored when the pitcher's throw went wild, also sending Brasher to third base. Chris Gutierrez sent a long fly ball to centerfield that LB Wilson's Tyler Vaughn played perfectly. With Brasher tagging Vaughn unleashed a strike to the plate, but Brasher slid safely under the tag. The Bruins appealed Brasher leaving early and he was called out.

In the fourth inning, McKenna walked and Schreiber push bunted for another single. McKenna took third base on a back pick to first base and scored on Gronhagen's two-out RBI single.

Defensively, the Eagles played perhaps their best game of the season. With Ryan

Pordes in command on the mound, he let his defense make the plays. McKenna made three tough slow rollers at third base while Lars Nootbaar showed his brilliance at shortstop. In the outfield, Pagan, Gronhagen and Hunter Lewis tracked down everything hit.

On the mound, Pordes was in total command when the umpire's off-kilter strike zone wasn't confusing the senior right-hander. He gave up two runs, scattered four hits, struck out two and walked four. He threw 88 pitches in his complete-game victory to improve to 2-3 on the year. "That's a good hitting team, but my defense really played well behind me," he said.

The Eagles played host to St. John Bosco on Tuesday and traveled to Beverly Hills for non-league games. They begin the Atascadero Tournament on Monday that runs through next Wednesday for spring break.

The frosh/soph team ran its record to 7-3 with a 7-2 win over Palos Verdes and a doubleheader sweep over Mira Costa 13-0 and 5-1. Shane Keil and Bradley Heckman each tossed two shutout innings in the win over PV. Jason Kehl had three hits and drove in two runs, while Alex Rios had two hits and scored twice. Wyatt Boyce drove in two runs and Frankie Martinez scored twice to lead the offense.

In the first game against Mira Costa, Albert Galicia pitched a five-hit shutout with no runners reaching scoring position. Wyatt Boyce hit a three-run homer in the first inning to give El Segundo the lead. Sam O'Connor singled home two runs in the third inning to increase the lead. Brandon Craig slammed the door on the Mustangs with a three-run double in the sixth inning. Rios had three hits and scored three times.

The second game was a pitchers' duel. Mira Costa scored their only run in the fourth inning to take a 1-0 lead. In the bottom of the sixth, Kehl singled with one out. Cameron Judge reached base on a sacrifice bunt. Rios then tied the game with a single to right field. After an intentional walk to Wyatt Boyce to load the bases, Chris Gomez drew a walk to give El Segundo the lead 2-1. With two outs, Brandon Craig hammered a three-run double to make it 5-1. Wyatt Boyce pitched five innings, allowing the Mustangs' only run. Rios relieved Boyce in the sixth and earned the win with two shutout innings.

The girls' team has made its debut as a sport from a club team. Coached by former All-Americans from UCLA Sarah Strock and Erica Zug, the team will play as a freelance CIF Southern Section squad. The team's skills will be tested all year long with just Bridgett Reed, Savannah Long, Claire Bowen and Kelsey Wood having experience. Diana Venegas could be the difference-maker in goal this year.

In the Eagles' 9-8 victory over a much more experienced Downey team, Reed scored five goals and had an assist. Wood had three goals and Carissa Avina had one goal and an assist to lead the Eagles' scoring attack. Venegas had 10 saves, including one towards the end of the game to save the win.

BOYS' LACROSSE

El Segundo finished third in consecutive California State championships before going winless last year. Last year's team made up of mostly freshmen will be a force this year and look to return to championship form.

Currently ranked 10th in the state, the Eagles will be led by seniors Brett Wood, Connor Sprague and Tyler Sikich. Sophomores Jake Barone, John Parks, Theo White, Nolan Roles and Shane Van Pelt give the Eagles a legitimate shot at contending with Santa Monica for the Pacific Lacrosse League championship. •



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Chevron's Lily Craig Takes to Dance Floor to Help Local Music Flourish

Though long known around town for her starring role with Chevron, Lily Craig never expected to be in the spotlight quite like this. On March 16, the refinery's External Affairs Manager took to the stage at Torrance's James Armstrong Theatre to trip the light fantastic and came away with third place honors in the second annual Dancing With the South Bay Stars event.

A fundraiser for the Torrance Cultural Arts Foundation and for the charity of each dancer's choice, the program featured eight contestants paired with professional dancers serving as instructors. Craig, a longtime El Segundo resident, was the only participant from outside of Torrance. "Sherry Kramer, who is on the Board of Directors of the Torrance Cultural Arts Foundation, approached me several months ago and asked me to participate," said Craig. "She had done it last year and it was a

successful event. I had initially said no. Then said no again. And yet another no followed. However, Sherry would not take no for an answer. So there I was with two new knees, asthmatic and as my son said "with a few years under my belt" trying to figure out if I could really do this. Panic struck. What had I agreed to do?"

Indeed, Craig didn't exactly come into the event with a dancing pedigree. As a young woman she used to belly dance just for fun, but there was nothing professional—unless you count "rocking out" at concerts. "But that's just because I can't help myself. I love rock and roll!" she said.

That love of rock and roll led Craig's instructor/partner Eddie Hairston (from Every Little Step Dance Studio in Torrance) to suggest the two practice the East Coast Swing for their routine. Meanwhile, she aptly chose the song "Now I Can Dance" by The Contours—a tune that served as a

motivational tool in the wake of her knee replacement surgery in 2011 that now allows her to move around much more effectively than she had for years. Due to her love of music, Craig selected the El Segundo Concert Band as her backup group and nonprofit fund recipient. The band's mission statement notes that "music enriches the life and nourishes the soul of the performer and the audience."

That resonated with Craig.

Actual preparation for the event became a whirlwind period because Craig didn't start her lessons (she would receive 20 of them) until the middle of January. While understanding Craig's limitations as a novice dancer in choreographing the duo's routine, Hairston still pushed his partner to try steps she never imagined she could handle. It was also quite a workout. "I had dreams of losing a bunch of weight while practicing my moves, but sadly that didn't happen," said Craig. "I was so fortunate that Joe Harding allowed me to practice at the Hacienda

Hotel, saving me hours in travel time."

According to Craig, the night of the dance was one of the most stressful and nerve-racking few hours she ever experienced. Being so out of her comfort zone was foreign to her, but she continued to remind herself that she was dancing for two worthy causes. "I also kept telling myself there was no way out—damn that Sherry!" said Craig. "Honestly, my other incentive was my daughter and son. I wanted them to be proud of their mother and to show them that age should never limit fun or growth. And you shouldn't let fear stop you from doing something worthwhile."

Prepping for the event, Craig spent an hour and a half doing her hair and two hours in makeup. Once called to the stage, the butterflies in her stomach fluttered out of control as she kept telling herself not to fall, to remember to smile and to "kick ball change!" She felt an immense sense of relief once the routine was over, thinking she had

She said she approached Craig with the goal of expanding outreach. As evidenced by the title, Kramer noted that the event is a spin on the popular television reality show *Dancing With the Stars*. Wolf and a few others came up with the idea to involve the community and create a fundraiser. "The idea to make the arts more participatory has long been a goal of mine as well as the Foundation," said Wolf. "This fundraiser was the perfect opportunity. In addition, we knew that while most of our 'stars' had people who would come out just to see them take part, the community leaders are very active in the community and connected to different organizations--so by including their charities was just another way for the Foundation to give back and help others through the arts."

For Craig, raising money to help foster local music programs was particularly rewarding. "I have worked and lived in El Segundo for 32 years. I have seen first-hand how the funds generated by the El Segundo Concert Band have significantly improved the band programs at El Segundo High School, the Middle School and the elementary schools, and I couldn't be more proud." •

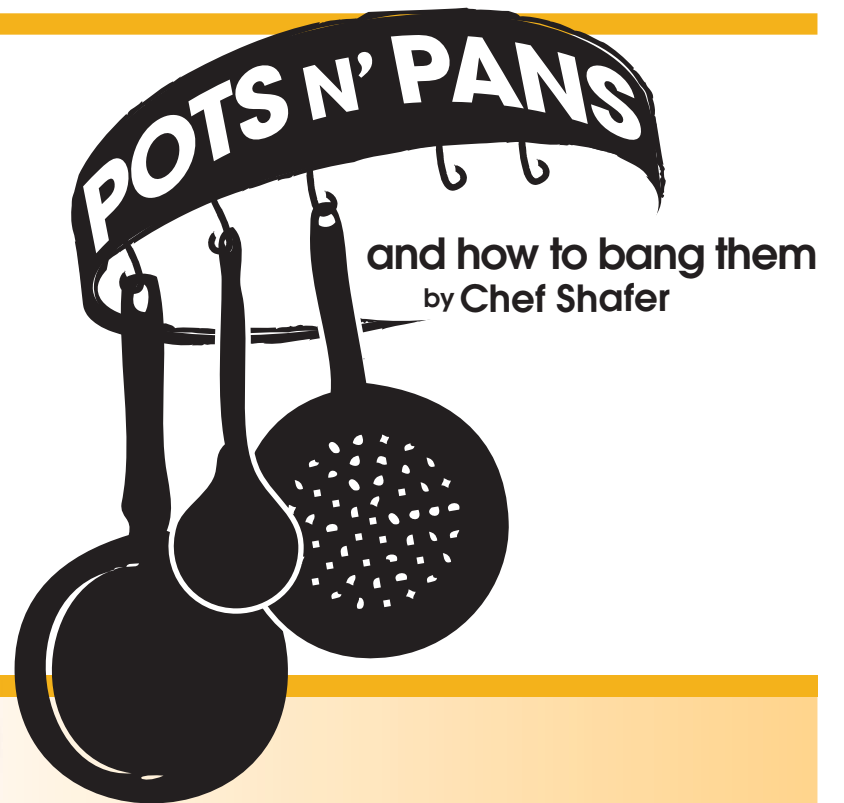
The Easter Bunny is hopping around the corner, and with the holiday an old favorite comes to mind- Deviled Eggs!

Basic recipe

Pinch pepper
2 tablespoons spicy mustard

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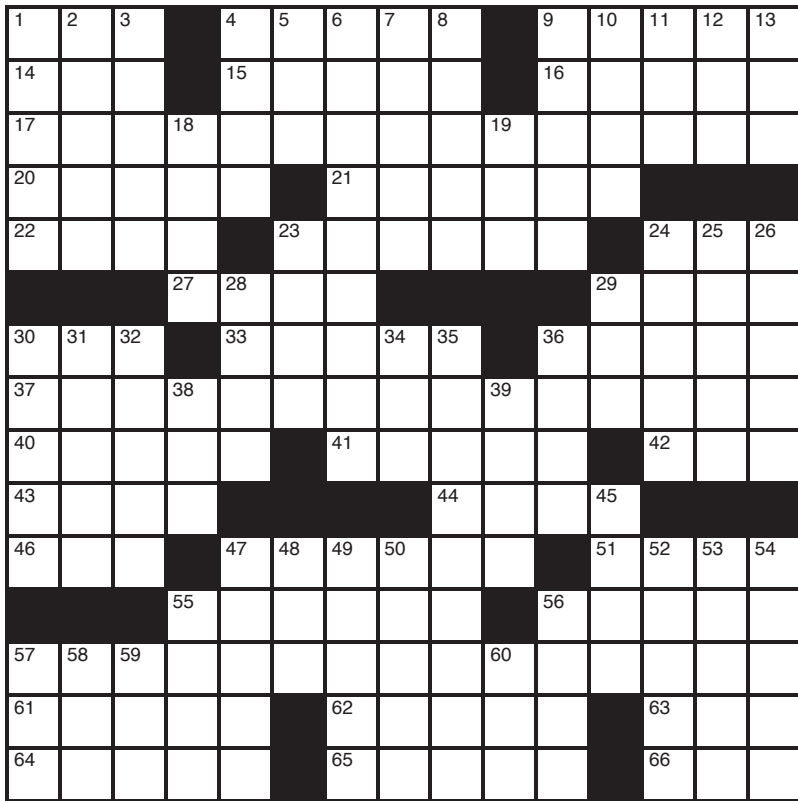

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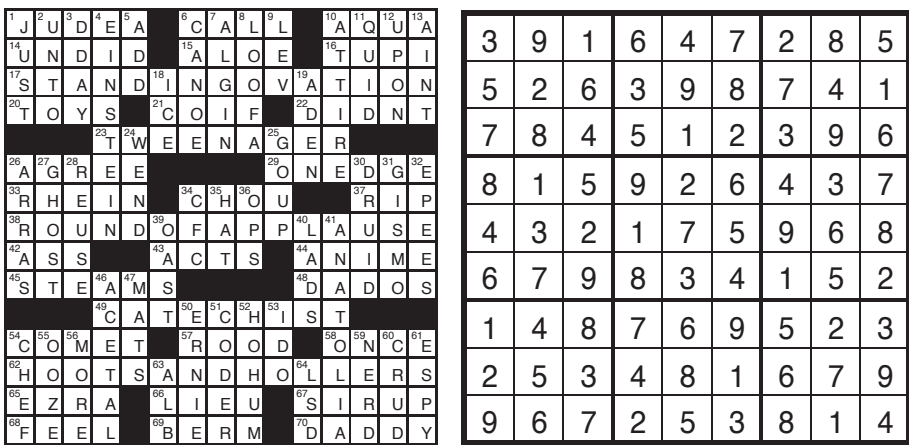

of The Lakes at El Segundo golf course will go before the Council later this spring for final resolution. Addressing complaints that an entertainment complex would destroy the family atmosphere there, TopGolf has made various tweaks to its original plan in hopes of swaying the general public and Council. If approved, the golf course will remain in place with a few enhancements, while the driving range will include TopGolf technological advancements that the company maintains will complement the existing facility and continue to foster youth programs.

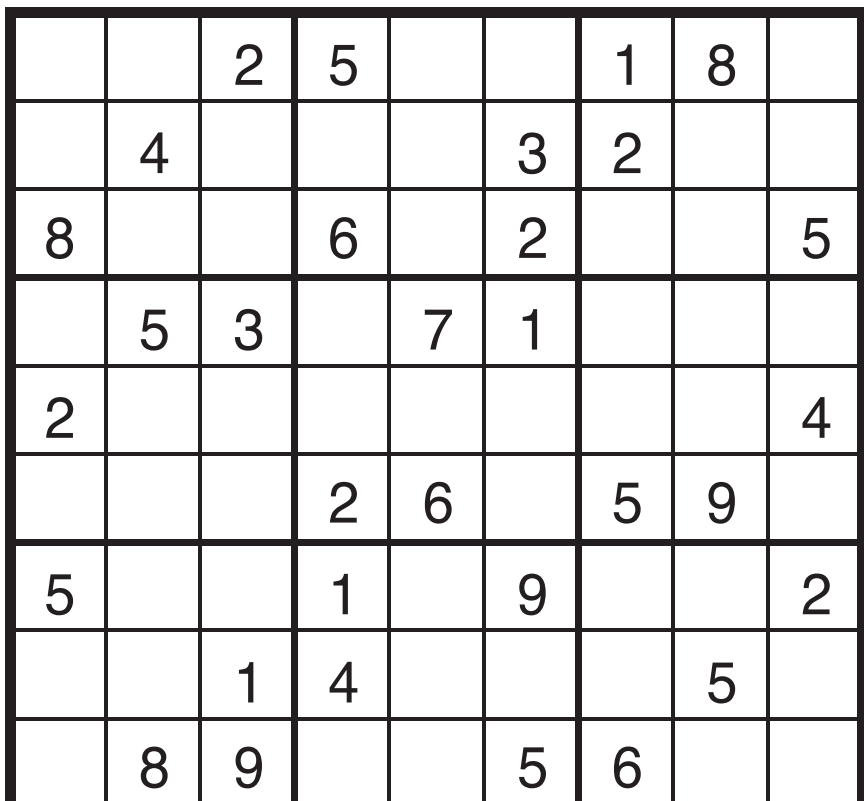
Finally, Shove noted that the commitment of City staff may save a key tenant from leaving town. Nano H2O, a clean technology manufacturer of nano-technology water

filtration systems invented and commercialized locally, recently faced a catastrophic blow from high fees for disposing test water it uses to run through filtration products as a quality assurance method. "Collaboratively, Nano H2O is now trying to secure a permit from the Lahontan Regional Water Quality Control Board that will substantially reduce their overall operating costs and allow them to continue to operate her in El Segundo," said Shove, who also credited Southern California Edison and the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation for assisting in the matter. The facility employs approximately 110 clean tech manufacturing employees. Its permit is now under review by the Environmental Protection Agency. •

We were done. Finished. There was four minutes remaining in the fourth quarter of the State Championship Game and the



El Segundo BU12 All Stars were down 5-2. There was a collective sigh from the Coaches and the Parents. Fatigue and disappointment began to surface in each of the player's body language. If it were another sport, there would be a glimmer of hope, a last inning comeback to win a baseball game, a basketball final basket buzzer beater—but in soccer, the odds of coming back from that kind of deficit simply does not happen.

Statistically speaking this team dominated the Area Tournament winning 6 games scoring 31 goals and giving up 5, they annihilated the competition in the

Sectional Tournament, winning 5 games scoring 12 goals and only giving up 2. "This team deserves to win the state cup; we have gone through so much, but today, simply was not our day. It's going to be a long bus ride home" I thought.

Tick...Tick...Tick... time was ticking; there was no time to spare. Our moment was NOW. "WHO WANTS IT" yelled Coach Ken. Four minutes remaining, the whistle blows—penalty in the box. El Segundo gets a penalty kick. Our center mid-fielder places the ball down, takes a deep breath and takes his shot. It's slightly over the crossbar. The whistle blows again—the keeper was off the line. We get a second chance. Our center mid buries his second chance in the back of the net. The score is 5-3, the crowd goes crazy—the momentum is shifting. Three minutes remaining, another penalty, just outside the box—one of our forwards takes the free kick. His shot is a perfect path toward our left midfielder who is next to the left goal post. The left mid jumps, aligns is head toward the goal, heads the ball into the corner—GOAL!!!!!! I jump, Coach Ken jumps, all of El Segundo side of the field jumps—the ground shakes.



"ONE MORE" I screamed. One minute remaining—the score is now 5-4. Time is running out, we take possession driving across mid-field the right mid sets a perfect cross to the left mid-fielder who kicks his leg up for a one-timer. GOAL!!!!!! WE TIED THE GAME!!! GOOOOOOAL!!!!!! The Score was 5-5, end of regulation.

I will admit at that point I was overwhelmed with emotion, but I knew we had taken the momentum from the other team and now there was no way were we going to lose this game. There were two overtime quarters—five minutes each. Within the first three minutes of the first quarter our forward drives into the box makes a cut left and is fouled in the box. The other forward takes the PK. This is it—the final blow, the dagger, the knockout punch. He moves forward and slowly takes a stutter step to read the keeper. The keeper moves right and he buries the ball in left corner. GOAL!!!!!! Score 5-6. The start of the

second overtime quarter, Coach Ken puts his left and right mids back on defense and we ran out the clock. Game over.
