

# City of El Segundo Banking on **Future Commercial Projects**

Despite staff estimates that economic development efforts will yield about \$350,000 in new annual revenues for the City of El Segundo over the next few years, potential commercial activity in town could markedly increase those numbers. Planning and Building Safety Director Sam Lee noted that in making budget projections, it is better to be on the conservative side rather than counting eggs before they are hatched. Here is a look at some of the commercial projects currently in the El Segundo pipeline along with some future possibilities not quite set

### Ready to Go

As part of its consolidation, aerospace giant Boeing will build a 6,009-square foot addition to its existing S-17 building located at 930 Selby Street to accommodate an employee fitness center. The company will also convert 27,584 square feet of the S-20 industrial building (formerly used by Satco Company) to an office use and then add another 5,800 square foot of office. Finally, Boeing plans a three-story, 25,308 gross square foot addition located at the northeast corner of its existing three-story S-50 building at 1700 E. Imperial Avenue.

Federal Realty hopes to complete by the summer of 2015 the 113,000-square foot complex called The Point at the hard corner of Sepulveda and Rosecrans as part of Plaza El Segundo. The center will include 55,000 square feet of high-end retail and 33,000 square feet of restaurant space, with the rest dedicated to office. The Point will also feature a large courtyard roughly the size of a football field.

Developed by Mar Ventures, the 1.55-acre Grand Kansas development will feature a couple of two-story buildings totaling 31,000 square feet, with individual work spaces as small as 2,000 square feet available for prospective tenants. The architectural plan features brick, concrete and glass exteriors

### **School Board Meets New Richmond Street Administrator**

in full swing, the El Segundo School Board held a quick Tuesday night meeting that moved at breakneck speed, with nary a special presentation or discussion item dotting the limited agenda. But the Board members did get to briefly meet the new assistant principal at Richmond Street Elementary, Dr. Rebecca Godbey, who will start her work in the El Segundo Unified School District later this summer.

Godbey comes to El Segundo from the Culver City Unified School District, with more than a decade of experience teaching students, ranging from kindergarten through grade four. "I am looking so forward to working at the school, and thank you so much for giving me this opportunity," said Godbey. "I know that it will be a great year."

The consent agenda featured Board approval of a new teacher technology boot camp slated to take place on August

15. The boot camp, which is expected to Now that summer vacation time is attract about 15 teachers, will run from 9 a.m. to noon. Participating teachers will then have the opportunity to stay over and review, practice and perfect their technology skills pertaining to databases and programs they will be using during the school year.

The action items included acceptance of the previously mentioned \$950,000 bestowed upon the District by the El Segundo Ed Foundation; \$75,000 headed towards Richmond Street, raised by that school's PTA; and \$20,000 from the El Segundo High PTA. Clerk Jeanie Nishime represented her colleagues by thanking the above groups for their tireless fundraising efforts. "I would like to thank our generous donors for their amazingly generous gifts to us."

The Board also approved the new Advanced Placement Spanish book that will debut at the High School this fall, the Middle School Theater class, and the


### **Donald Joseph Nelson**

along with high ceilings and a roof deck. Lee views the project as a perfect tie-in with the City's efforts to market the burgeoning Smoky Hollow area to small technology, entertainment and other creative businesses. "We hope this will be a gateway project that we can build on to draw more people to Smoky Hollow," said Lee. Expected to be ready for occupancy at the beginning of 2014, the buildings will be adjacent to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) inspection facility, offices and laboratory currently under construction.

and Mariposa. The new restaurant should be completed in 2014.

### **Future Projects**

Plans to build a five-story, 190-room hotel at 888 Sepulveda are in the works but on hold. "The owner is not a hotel developer," said Lee. "However, he is motivated and hopeful to get construction going in 2014 and hopefully have the hotel open in 2015." Three years ago, the City Council approved plans for a six-story, 152-room Cambria Suites Hotel on Continental Boulevard between Grand Avenue and El Segundo Boulevard. There is no construction timeline as yet, but Lee

Corporation recently purchased 24 acres of the Campus El Segundo site, with initial plans to build 150,000 square feet of office and 13,000 square feet of retail space. "The developers are open to ideas for future phases, but may opt to do a two- or three-story building," said Lee. New owners are also in place for a structure at 1222 E. Grand. They hope to revamp the site into two creative office buildings that will be sold separately.

After being vacant the last few years, the former Fire Station 2 site on El Segundo Boulevard will have tenants in 2014. Property owner Brian Sweeney is in the process of developing the property for a Farmer Boys restaurant and a 7-Eleven scheduled to open this November.

After spending an almost combined \$150 million over the last few years on their facilities, local data center operators Equinix and T5 Partners are ready to expand further. Equinix plans a \$12 million addition in the near future to possibly double its operations in the next few years, while T5 will add another 175,000 square feet for a \$100 million project.

In Downtown El Segundo, the City recently approved signage and exterior work for the 99 Cents Only store set to go into the former Cooke's Family Market site on Grand and Richmond. The applicant also submitted plans for an interior remodel of the building with a goal to open by October 2013. A couple of blocks away at the site of the old post office on Main Street, Ole Smoky Tennessee Moonshine will move its corporate offices into 2,000 square feet of space, with an additional 800-square foot retail and tasting room area. The company makes its own moonshine (distilled whiskey) sold in jars.

And as reported last week, the Planning Commission has approved a proposal for In-N-Out Burger to build a drive-through to replace the Sizzler located in the Queen Esther Square shopping center at Sepulveda is hopeful it will still happen. Meanwhile, ownership at the longstanding Hacienda Hotel is expected to officially change hands this month. "The new owners are looking at a few options, including splitting the hotel into two different hotels," said Lee. "That would reduce the number of rooms. There is also talk of a retail and restaurant presence as well as a new parking structure."

Raytheon's proposal to develop 1.9 million square feet at its 142-acre south campus will go to the Planning Commission later this year and the Council in early 2014. However, El Segundo's largest employer is unsure what it wants to do with the site, according to Lee. "If the company consolidates across the country, they will want to build on this site," he said. "If they don't consolidate, they may sell the space. It's probably a 10-year project timetable, but if approved, development will double." In May, Raytheon announced it would move its headquarters staff (approximately 170 employees) from El Segundo to McKinney, Texas as part of a reorganization plan.

Phase II of Plaza El Segundo planned on 62 acres to the southeast of the existing site is on hold pending the extension of Park Place that is pivotal for vehicle access. "They are working on conceptual designs for road improvements," said Lee. "If this project moves forward, there will be another 400,000 square feet of retail and restaurant that could significantly help our sales tax base."

And finally, the former site of the Trisonic Wind Tunnel at 400 Duley Road, built by North American Aviation in the 1950s and eventually gifted to UCLA in the late 1990s, is now under new ownership. Demolition of the facility took place in 2011, leaving a 3.5-acre parcel ripe for development. "They [new owners] want to have 40,000 square feet of industrial space and 20,000 square feet of office, though there are no dates yet," said Lee. •

# SBWIB Connects Job Seekers, Businesses One City at a Time

Comprised of representatives from El Segundo, Manhattan Beach, Carson, Gardena, Inglewood, Lawndale, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach and Hawthorne, the South Bay Workforce Investment Board (SBWIB) has been providing employment and training services in the South Bay for years. Through its One-Stop Business and Career Centers, the SBWIB has been able to provide an abundant amount of employment services to the residents of the South Bay, including job skill assessment, career coaching and individualized skill development, among others.

"The way it works is that we are either inundated with people being laid off and we try to meet the needs of these individuals or we have new companies that come in and need to hire new people," SBWIB Executive Director Jan Vogel said. "We do other things too such as afterschool programs like the local teen centers. We try to create a good foundation for those youths so they can be productive in the workforce. We also do mentoring programs and anything to do with jobs and the economy."

Recently, the SBWIB has begun having a stronger presence in of El Segundo where representatives have made themselves available to the public in the West Conference Room at City Hall. The next scheduled outreach dates in El Segundo are scheduled for July 25, August 22, September 26 and October 24 all from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. In addition, the representatives from the SBWIB will be at the Lawndale Library from 2-5 p.m. every Wednesday.

"We customize the approach and have enough choices and enough different training options that the individuals in those cities can benefit from it," Vogel said. "If you are a dislocated aerospace worker from El Segundo, then you need different kind of services than an individual on public assistance or one that has never worked before. It is a different need, so we try to find out how we can best assist them. The people that are residents in Redondo Beach are looking for something different than Inglewood residents. So we have a One-Stop Center in Redondo Beach that fits more to the Redondo Beach and beach cities needs than those Inglewood where the needs are a bit different."

With a strong emphasis on the local devel-

opment of resources for potential employees and employers, the SBWIB has found a wide range of methods to reach the residents in the communities it serves. Through the Hawthorne Teen Center, the SBWIB has been able to provide an afterschool setting where kids can further develop academic and social skills. By the end of July, it is expected that Inglewood will open its own teen center thanks to the collaborative efforts of the City and SBWIB.

"The kids in Hawthorne have been grateful for the services there and there have been some Gates Millennium Scholarship awardees [three], so hopefully the success will be replicated in Inglewood," Vogel said. "It is for academic enrichment and also recreational, but we want them to do their homework and what they have to do before they come in and be recreational."

Every year, the Department of Labor negotiates with the State of California to establish the performance standards. The State in turn will tell the 49 different Workforce Investment Boards what they are expected to do. The SBWIB has the highest performance from every board in the state. A year ago, it received the national award as one of the best in the country.

"The good news is that we are the best in the state. The bad news is that they expect us to keep going until it is impossible," Vogel chuckled. "We are proud of the fact that they expect more from us because we are indeed the highest performing workforce board in the state. We intend to keep achieving as best we can. The formula dollars keep going down every year with the federal budget the way it is, but we try to make do the best we can."

In order to fulfill the training and preparation aspect its goal, the SBWIB has a list of schools and courses on the directory that are available for free to the public and as long as there are funds. "We have more schools on our local directory than any other directory in the state," Vogel said "We screen these schools for competency, we make sure they are fiscally solvent and we demand that there be a 70 percent hiring rate when training is over. We have lots of occupations in this directory and hundreds and hundreds of different courses."



### **Another Man's Opinion**

The California Assembly's Judiciary Committee passed AB5, the Homeless Bill of Rights, in a 7-2 vote. Unlike current laws and ordinances that tend to criminalize homelessness, AB5 is a significant attempt at helping individuals without shelter rather imposing a punishment. AB5 was authored by Assemblyman Tom Ammiano from San Francisco and it overcame strong opposition through a well-organized grassroots movement of homeless and poor people. AB5 serves a reminder to us that everyone deserves the same protection under law regardless of socioeconomic status.

The National Center on Family Homelessness reports that California ranks second worst in the nation in the number of homeless children. It is estimated that 160,000 men, women and children experience homelessness. With so many people living under the homeless label, it is unreasonable to criminalize everyone. Furthermore, how can our legislators justify the prosecution of individuals so down on their luck, circumstances or whatever you want to call it that we simply label them criminals? Granted, there are homeless people who chose to live on the street--and that presents a problem to the rest of the general population. However, that does not mean you become a sub-par human, let alone citizen of this state entitled to equal protection by the law.

Currently criminalization of homelessness comes in the form of laws that make it illegal to sleep, sit or store personal belongings in public spaces, with enforcement against homeless people for violating laws like loitering (which is very selective), jaywalking or open container ordinances. Furthermore, the removal of homeless people under such circumstances often results in the destruction of their personal property such as medications and personal documents. There are also laws against begging and panhandling, which also restrict groups from sharing food with homeless people in public areas. These laws are enacted to push the homeless population away from one's city, but it does not eliminate the problem.

Some of the measures proposed in the Homeless Bill of Rights include the establishment of hygiene centers such as bathrooms and showers, allowing individuals to rest or sleep in certain public spaces; access to counsel during civil prosecutions; and protecting people who offer food in public places. All of these amenities will cost taxpayers money. Yet, it is costing us money now to prosecute people and families for not having a place to live. Not only is it costing us money, but criminal prosecution is not resolving the homeless issue in any way, shape or form—and neither is prosecution mitigating the nuisances that are associated with the homeless population.

AB5 is not the ultimate solution to a neverending problem. However, it does decriminalize an issue that should have been humanized many years ago. At the end of the day, these are not 160,000 units or numbers or stats represented in a report. These are 160,000 men, women and children finding it more difficult to get back on their feet because of the tendency for localities to prosecute. Giving such people the amenities necessary to improve their personal existence even in the direst of circumstances will have a more positive effect on their attempt to escape out of homelessness. •

### Don't Get 'Spoofed' by Rogue Callers

When caller ID first arrived on the scene it seemed like a godsend to many people: Now you could easily identify who was on the line and ignore unwanted calls, whether from telemarketers, an ex-boyfriend or an unfriendly collection agency.

But as often happens, unscrupulous individuals soon began manipulating the technology to defraud people by pretending to be someone else. Their scheme is called "caller ID spoofing" and disturbingly, it's perfectly legal in many cases.

Here's how caller ID spoofing works and what precautions you should take to avoid being victimized:



Under the pretext of warning about an urgent situation (breached account, late payment, pending insurance claim, missed jury duty summons, etc.), the spoofer will try to coax you into revealing personal or account information, supposedly to verify their records.

Often these are robocalls, where a recorded voice asks you to stay on the line to speak to a representative or call another number for more information. Do not. If you suspect the call might possibly be genuine, contact the company yourself at the toll-free number found on your card, account statement or the company's website.

For a very low cost, businesses and individuals can use widely available caller ID spoofing software to generate calls that alter the telephone number and/or name which appear on the recipient's caller ID screen.

Police, private investigators and collection agencies have used legal spoofing services for many years. Others who might have a legitimate reason to hide their identity when making a call include domestic violence victims and doctors returning patient calls who don't wish to release their private telephone numbers.

Beyond that, the lines of legality begin to blur. The Truth in Caller ID Act of 2009 prohibits anyone from transmitting misleading or inaccurate caller ID information with the intent to defraud, cause harm or wrongfully obtain anything of value. Violators can be penalized up to \$10,000 for each infraction. Unfortunately, such penalties haven't dissuaded many scammers.

One common scam involves spoofers pretending to represent a bank, government agency, insurer, credit card company or other organization with which you do business. They count on you being reassured after recognizing the company's name on your

Someone possessing such information could use it to gain access to your existing accounts to withdraw or transfer money, raise credit limits or snoop around your recent activity, among other intrusions.

ID thieves also can use your personal information to open new credit accounts (e.g., credit cards, mortgage or car loan), create a new identity or even obtain a job fraudulently. Often, you won't even realize something's wrong until a collection agency – or the IRS – starts hounding you for unpaid bills or taxes.

Another common caller ID spoof involves hacking into someone's voice mail account. Many cellphone users never bother to set up passwords on their voice mailboxes. And, since many voicemail systems grant access to callers phoning from their own number, a hacker could easily spoof your number and gain access to your messages.

Bottom line: You wouldn't give your personal information to a stranger on the street. Take the same level of precaution with strangers on the phone – or online. •

### Names for New Pluto Moons Chosen after Public Vote

Remember our ninth planet, little Pluto, which was kicked out of the Planetary Club not long ago and relegated to "Dwarf Planet" status? It has been found to have no less than five moons, and the two most recently discovered ones—previously known as P4 and P5—have now been given official names.

The International Astronomical Union (IAU), which is responsible for naming new sky discoveries, has officially recognized the names Kerberos and Styx for the fourth and fifth moons of Pluto respectively. These names were suggested by voters in a recently held popular contest.

The new moons were discovered in 2011 and 2012 during observations of the Pluto system made with the NASA/ESA Hubble Space Telescope Wide Field Camera 3, and increasing the number of known Pluto moons to five. Kerberos lies between the orbits of Nix and Hydra, two bigger moons discovered by Hubble in 2005, and Styx lies between Charon, the innermost and biggest moon, and Nix. Both have circular orbits assumed to be in the plane of the other satellites in the system. Kerberos has an estimated diameter of 13 to 34 kilometers, and Styx is thought to be irregular in shape and is 10 to 25 kilometers across.

The IAU acts as the arbiter of the naming process of celestial bodies and is advised and supported by astronomers active in different fields. On discovery, astronomical objects receive unambiguous and official catalogue designations. When common names are assigned, the IAU rules ensure that the names work across different languages and cultures in order to support collaborative worldwide

research and avoid confusion.

After the discovery, the leader of the research team, Mark Showalter (SETI Institute), decided to call for a public vote to suggest names for the two objects. To be consistent with the names of the other Pluto satellites, the names had to be picked from classical mythology, in particular with reference to the underworld—the realm where the souls of the deceased were thought to go in the afterlife. The contest concluded with the proposed names Vulcan, Cerberus and Styx ranking first, second and third respectively. Showalter submitted Vulcan and Cerberus to the IAU where the Working Group for Planetary System Nomenclature discussed the names for approval.

However, the name Vulcan had already been used for a hypothetical planet thought to exist between Mercury and the Sun. Although this planet was found not to exist, the term "vulcanoid" remains attached to any asteroid with an orbit inside that of Mercury, and the name Vulcan could not be accepted for one of Pluto's satellites (also, Vulcan does not fit into the underworld mythology scheme). Instead, the third most popular name was chosen—Styx, the name of the goddess who ruled over the underworld river, also called the Styx.

After a final deliberation, the IAU agreed to change Cerberus to Kerberos—the Greek spelling of the word—to avoid confusion with an asteroid called 1865 Cerberus. According to mythology, Cerberus, or Kerberos in Greek, was a many-headed dog that guarded the entrance to the underworld.


great lady passed away last week. She was the heart and soul of farmer's markets at Wilson Park and other venues. She set the standards that many, if not all farmers' markets should operate by.

2 pounds of mixed mushrooms, sliced

(I use Portobellos, Crimini, Shiitake, and regular white mushrooms)

<sup>1</sup>/4 cup olive oil

½ cup chardonnay wine

1 cup heavy cream

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

Salt and pepper to taste

4 fresh basil leaves, coarsely cut up

In a hot large sauté pan, pour olive oil then add the onions. Sauté for about one minute or until onions are translucent.

Add the mushrooms and sauté for another minute or so.

When the mushrooms are soft, add the chardonnay and let it reduce down by half.

Pour in the cream and let the mixture cook for one minute. Continue to stir as it will prevent it from burning or sticking.

Season with salt and pepper, then slowly add the butter while stirring to incorporate butter into the mix. Just before you serve the mix, sprinkle some basil and use the extras to garnish the dish.




