School District Pushes Forward **Despite Funding Cuts**

The news sounded all good when reported by Senator Ted Lieu a couple of weeks back during his State of the State address. He confirmed that every school district in California will receive more money next year than in 2013, with base grants up by an average of \$537 per pupil. The goal was to offset the adverse impacts of Governor Brown's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) that gave school districts more flexibility in spending, but also took monies away from some districts--including many in the South Bay--in favor of those in more disadvantaged areas.

Though pleased to see matters improve compared to what could have been, El Segundo Unified School District Superintendent Geoff Yantz said there is still a long way to go to get back to square one. "Public schools have received additional allocation because the voter-approved Prop 30 and the economy are doing better, but the new funding formula is still taking money away from districts like El Segundo and others with similar demographics and allocating to districts with higher percentages of foster youth, students who are English language learners or those on free or reduced lunch," explained Yantz. "In the end, based on calculations of an eight-year projection, in 2021 we'll receive one more dollar per student than we did in 2007. It'll basically be the same revenue 15 years later except with 2021 costs." Yantz emphasized that had Lieu not lobbied hard for the extra monies to soften the effects of the Governor's initial proposal, El Segundo Unified and other comparable districts would now be in a far more serious world of hurt.

That said, the Superintendent added that El Segundo will get nowhere near the \$537

per pupil total mentioned by Lieu. "Some districts may be getting \$1,000 and others \$100 per student—we're only getting a few hundred thousand dollars more overall," he said, adding that \$250,000 represents just one percent of the District's budget. "There are winners and there are losers and we're losers in this."

To further illustrate his point, Yantz noted

that El Segundo Unified must now kick in \$510,000 out of its general fund to continue its participation with the Torrance-based Southern California Regional Occupation Center (SoCalROC) that provides college preparatory programs and support services for local students. The Governor's funding formula inadvertently eliminated categorical

Steve Tsumura: Keeping Hazards in **Check For Nearly a Quarter-Century**

nutshell, City of El Segundo Environmental Safety Manager Steve Tsumura said his job requires him to be a scientist, an engineer and a lawyer. That's quite a bit to have on one's plate--but given that State laws and regulations have become increasingly complex as well as voluminous, it's not all that surprising. A City employee for 23 years, Tsumura's responsibilities include regulating all hazardous materials and wastes, underground and aboveground tanks, explosive and toxic chemical risk management plans, emergency response, stormwater and industrial wastewater controls. He has overseen investigations of various chemical releases from plating fires to highway spills and also serves as the Fire Department's Public Information Officer, working with news media on incidents involving fires, chemicals or entrapments.

A third generation Japanese born in Burbank and a graduate of James Monroe

High in the San Fernando Valley, Tsumura Asked to describe what he does in a went on to Cal State Northridge (CSUN) where he earned both Bachelor of Science and Masters degrees in Environmental/ Occupational Health Science. "Originally, I was pursuing a dental degree, but came across the environmental field as part of the core requirements for science," Tsumura recalled. "I knew then I wanted to work in this field due to a professor named Dr. Kelly. He was energetic, witty, and had an interesting way of teaching." Tsumura added that he often compares notes with area aerospace and refinery health and safety representatives who also happened to attend the same college. Credentials include state registration as an environmental health specialist and national accreditation as a certified industrial hygienist.

After settling on a specific career path by the end of the 1970s, Tsumura paid his dues (and his tuition) working as a valet and then as a bartender at a kosher restaurants in Sherman Oaks. His first summer job in

Local Business, Nonprofit **Host Pet Lover's Event**

Cats, dogs and pet enthusiasts will gather on Sunday, August 4 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. for the Pet Lover's Event at Manhattan

In its third year, the family-friendly pet adoption event takes place two times a year at the car dealership located at 1500 N. Sepulveda Blvd., and has drawn large crowds of current and prospective pet owners.

"It is a service to help dogs and cats get adopted and it is a drop in event for people to come and go as they please," Director of Public Relations for Manhattan Beach Toyota Al Wise said. "We have a nonprofit organization that we work with called the Lovejoy Foundation that is bringing the dogs and cats. They are a wonderful organization that we support and partner with and with them we have been able to adopt out some dogs and a few cats."

The day's festivities will include raffles all day and will also provide fun activities for attendees such as contests including;

This outreach-based event has drawn up to 500 people during past events. It has been three years since the beginning and now the event has developed into a well-organized function. However, getting things started depended on a lot of hard work and a little bit of luck.

"We had an agency lined up [for an event] that canceled at the last minute. So here we were about to have our Pet Event with no pets to adopt out," Wise said. "We went searching for an agency and we found one that hosted small events that took place at a church on know if anyone would show up; but that first event we had about 500 people show up."

New to the event this year is the presence of the Gourmet Grilled Cheese Truck. There will also be more than 14 vendors, including the adoption agency, pet photography, pet insurance and pet accessories which, adds variety to the services and products offered by the large number of vendors. Many of the vendors will provide free samples of their product.

"They [attendees] can expect to have some fun; they can expect to have some food and to meet some like-minded people that also love animals," Wise said. "If they have an animal, they are welcome to bring it. If they do not have one, then they can come and play with the ones that we have or adopt one that we have to give it a good home. We also have a groomer that comes out and does some grooming. There is something for everybody."

When Malcolm Au became a Cub Scout never thought about the day when he would be done with his Eagle Scout Project. "It [Scouts] has helped me learn how to deal with people and I can honestly say that I made lifelong friends with Scouts," Au said. "These guys are really awesome and they taught me different things every day. When you go camping and are out in the wild, you rely on these people that you know so well. My family has helped me a lot too, so we have grown closer in that aspect as well."

Deciding on Camp Eucalyptus for his Eagle Scout Project was as simple as asking what was needed. So the focus of the project became to rebuild the old fire circle, fix a water spigot sticking out of the ground that puddled and create a mud trap. Lastly, it was decided that art should decorate the north wall of the building. Rebuilding the fire circle required the purchase of bricks and cement, while the water spigot was surrounded by a wooden frame and filled with gravel so that the water no longer puddled.

funding for SoCalROC, threatening to close the facility in the process. Lieu and others succeeded in earning a two-year reprieve to buy time to save SoCalROC-but school districts must now pay for the service out of their own pockets.

Funding in general has been a major challenge for the last five years. The State instituted a 23 percent across-the-board cut when the recession peaked in 2008—resulting in a staggering loss for El Segundo Unified. The District will receive \$2.2 million less in 2013-14 under the LCFF than it did in 2007-08 under the prior Revenue Limit Formula (RLF). If the RLF were still in place today, the District would receive \$4.8 million more annually than it will under the LCFF.

The State's actions in 2008 forced the El Segundo School Board to make some difficult and painful decisions in order to maintain programs, staffing and the quality of education. "Those decisions, along with the support from the City, Ed Foundation, PTAs and local corporations like Chevron, have put us in a good position now," said Yantz. "There are districts still laying off people, using reserves or having furlough days. Not us. We've been fortunate to restore programs that have been eliminated or reduced, and our reserve levels are adequate. We've got wonderful, engaging courses that are new at the Middle School and High School and some initiatives going in place that will certainly make our schools that much better."

One program that didn't come back was class size reduction previously mandated at

a 20:1 student/teacher ratio for kindergarten through third grade rooms and for ninth and 10th grade English and math. While those class sizes increased a bit in El Segundo, they are still at very efficient levels, according to Yantz. Meanwhile, the only teaching position eliminated was for woodshop-but that became absorbed into an engineering program thanks to grant monies provided by Chevron. On the non-teaching, or classified, side, the District added back all of the eliminated positions and the majority of the reduced staff hours. Among the various costsaving measures implemented, the District has also reduced energy consumption by 35 percent after putting an initiative into place in 2008.

Despite the State funding cuts, the District's short-term prospects are good, with the ability to cover costs and even add some support staff while remaining solvent over the next three years. At the same time, Yantz cautioned that this level of prosperity won't be sustainable given that California is 49th in the country when it comes to funding education and that the LCFF will continue to hurt districts like El Segundo. "The State has put us in a position to be increasingly dependent on our local sources of funding," Yantz said. "We have to be mindful of what programs and class sizes other neighboring districts are offering and how their local community is supporting the schools. School districts like El Segundo are completely dependent on their local sources of revenues such as

residents, school district and of course all the City employees I've had an opportunity to work with," Tsumura added.

Another major accomplishment under Tsumura's watch was the Fire Department becoming a Certified Unified Program Agency, or CUPA. The CUPA is responsible for carrying out State-mandated hazardous materials regulatory programs and overseeing emergency response and public outreach about any incidents. "The State had originally denied us the certification, but with the help of various businesses, legislators, and County Board of Supervisors, El Segundo was one of the few cities that won their appeal," said Tsumura.

In the near future, Tsumura hopes to gain electronic data from various small businesses that handle chemicals to provide paperless documentation of hazards that may injure local firefighters or citizens. This became a statutory requirement in 2013, entailing a computer database to manage thousands of chemicals used in the community daily. According to Tsumura, businesses are now much more cognizant about chemicals than they were 20 years ago. "They no longer leave drums of chemicals in the alley or street," he said. "On one occasion, someone dumped diesel fuel into the storm drain, which led to the street beneath the drainage area and took all night to clean up." The Fire Department promotes awareness by sending out routine newsletters and offering training programs. Even so, Tsumura occasionally has no choice but to take legal action against offenders. "In the future, I forecast there will be a need to conduct self-audits of chemical hazards with oversight conducted via a Web portal. If necessary, an inspection may be conducted of questionable situations, but overall this would lower the cost of compliance for the businesses."

Despite the complexity of his job and the multiple hats he wears, Tsumura still looks forward to coming to work every day, holding his Fire Department colleagues in the highest regard. "Chief [Kevin] Smith has been the most disciplined and open Chief I've had—I know that he thinks of the overall good for



the Department and makes decisions based on fact versus personal feelings. The Fire Marshal [James Carver] has worked with me my entire career here and is my go-to person for fire laws and City history. His mind is like a steel trap and retains everything." Tsumura went on to praise El Segundo's dynamic business community and autonomy in the development of the CUPA program, adding that he has also tried to emulate certain longtime community leaders and learn from their experiences by being upfront and sincere in working with the media and general public.

At the age of 54 with nearly 30 years of environmental work under his belt, Tsumura has never regretted his career choice—even though his responsibilities keep him so busy that he rarely has time to go fishing (his favorite hobby), very seldom even completes a meal and hasn't taken a vacation in several years. "My family went to China in 2007 while I was being audited by the State," he lamented. Fortunately, his other family at the Fire Department was there to support him and continues to do so. "When I come to work, I very often pull out my house keys to open up for the day. We do treat each other like family here-good or bad-and so we never really leave home..." •

I am very grateful for that. I have learned so many things this whole time. It is not just about putting on a uniform and going places."

and have great friends. I will definitely stay involved with Scouts and help my brother and others who are around. It has been a fun couple of years doing this stuff. I do want to stick around and help the younger kids to leave a legacy where they stay around and help the younger kids."

With his Eagle Scout Project completed, Au will seek to use his spare time to focus on his senior year in high school. "This year is going to be about me focusing on a bunch of school stuff," Au said. "I am President, so I have to focus and make the school the best it can be. I have a full year ahead of me as a senior and I look forward to it. I remember being in fifth grade and just having fun with Scouts. My advice to everyone is to have fun, live in the moment and suck the fun out of life when you can."•

The grossly painted harridan, oversold so many times before, made her entry from stage left--ignoring the disdain with which her audience greeted her. Present were businesses, 60 percent of which said they had either frozen hiring or cut existing employees because of her. Thirty-eight percent said she has caused them to pull back from planned business growth. Twenty-four percent believe they will drop employee health insurance entirely. Ironically, the President speaks of economic growth while he touts her as his primary accomplishment.

In the audience, front and center were unions, led by the Teamsters, who finally understand that the harridan damages unions. Since 62 percent of all jobs created under this "recovery" have been to part-time workers, temporary workers, and the lowest earning segment of the economy, there will be fewer targets for unionization who can afford to pay union dues. In a terse and critical letter to Democrats, the unions have complained of being duped by the Administration since 40-hour workweeks, the backbone of the middle class, are disappearing.

Seated in the orchestra section were healthcare insurance companies such as Aetna, United Healthcare, and Anthem Blue Cross, all of which have withdrawn from the California Insurance Exchange. The GAO estimates that in 2011, Medicare and Medicaid paid a whopping \$50.7 billion in fraudulent payments while the 10 largest insurance companies earned only \$13.7 billion. In other words, the government lost nearly four times as much as the largest insurers earned!

With only two months before Obamacare is to be implemented, doctors are nearly clueless about how the law will affect them. In a CNBC poll, only 11 percent of doctors believe the law will open as scheduled. Asked how policies purchased from exchanges will impact their business, 78 percent were slightly familiar or not familiar at all. Eighty-one percent were either slightly familiar or not familiar with rates exchange insurers will pay. Doctors were unaware that under Exchange rules, a patient can go up to three months without paying premiums and still not get dropped.

Doctors know they will see a greater work load, but 70.5 percent say they have no idea how the claims process works.

The left wing of the audience was occupied by Democrats whose support for Obamacare has fallen by 20 percent. In a poll conducted jointly by Republican and Democratic pollsters, 56 percent of the public favors dropping Obamacare entirely.

Keeping the Lights on Benefits Everyone

Newly elected Assemblyman Al Muratsuchi introduced Assembly Bill 66 in June to require the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to mandate an "electrical corporation to include in an annual reliability report, information on system reliability, including the frequency and duration of interruptions in services." This is in response to the power outages that have occurred in the Rancho Palos Verdes area—where since 2008, an average of 26 power outages have been reported a year. Under Assemblyman Muratsuchi's bill, the CPUC would develop the report with the expectation for it to use the information within to remedy the problem.

While the legislation introduced was in response to a regional problem, its outcome will impact the entire state. It should not be too much to ask that the CPUC demonstrate at the very least a level of competence and transparency that would make California residents not have to worry about power outages. We all expect to come home to watch TV, do some online shopping and update our Facebook status without interruption. I am sure that most of us are reasonable enough to understand that even the most efficient and well-operated system can from time to time have a setback. However, 26 power outages annually for the past four years is a major malfunction. Whatever the issue that is causing this in the RPV area should have been taken care of a long time ago.

Thank you, Assemblyman Muratsuchi for

requiring the CPUC to provide a report and subsequently fix the issue, but we really should not need a law asking the CPUC how to do its job. If the clerk at 7-Eleven forgot how to make coffee 26 mornings every year...wait, he would be fired after two mornings with no coffee. It is great that there are requirements being established, but the truth is it's absurd that they are needed. Why haven't heads rolled because of this? So many power outages for such a long time indicate more than just a problem with the system--it demonstrates a high level of incompetence by those responsible for addressing the issue. Such was the level of dysfunction that one of our elected officials had to remind the CPUC how to do its job.

It is sad that we have become such an incompetent state that power outages can paralyze a region within our borders twice a month since 2008 without any signs of improvement. Is it because our bureaucracy has become too big for its own good? Probably. Is it maybe that we don't have the right people in the right positions to run these entities? Very likely. Or maybe those responsible just don't care. That is also a likely possibility. The one thing we know for sure is that the CPUC has failed our neighbors in the RPV area and hopefully Assemblyman Muratsuchi's bill will fix the problem so that these power outages do not spread to the rest of the state. I don't know about everyone else, but I certainly do not miss the blackouts from the Enron days. •

How to Replace Important Documents

If your wallet has ever been lost or stolen, you know what a pain it is to replace your driver's license. That goes double when other vital documents like your, passport, birth certificate or car registration are misplaced or destroyed in a natural disaster. Without the proper ID, you can't start a new job, buy a house, apply for

insurance or a host of other common transactions.

Here's a guide on how to get copies or

Here's a guide on how to get copies or replacements for many common documents:


Birth, death, marriage and divorce certificates. These records come from the states where the events occurred. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has a handy directory that provides links to the appropriate agencies in all U.S. states and territories, including costs and mailing instructions (www.cdc.gov/nchs/w2w.htm).

Passport. Immediately report lost or stolen passports to the U.S. State Department by calling 877-487-2778. If it happens overseas, contact the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate. Visit http://travel.state.gov/passport/lost/lost_848. html for further instructions.

Driver's license, car registration. To learn how to replace your driver's license, vehicle registration or car title (which you'll need to transfer ownership), or to access other motor vehicle services, contact the Department of Motor Vehicles. Go to www.usa.gov/Topics/Motor-Vehicles.shtml for links to each state's DMV.

Social Security card. These days, you may not actually need to replace a misplaced Social Security card. If you know your Social Security number, you generally can still collect Social Security benefits, get a job and apply for government benefits and services. However, if you do want to replace the card, you'll need to gather documents proving your identity and citizenship and complete an application (www. ssa.gov/online/ss-5.pdf); then mail or take the paperwork to your local Social Security office.

Military service records. Veterans often need copies of their military service records to



Green card. If your U.S. Permanent Resident (Green) Card is lost, stolen or damaged, or if your name or other important information has legally changed since it was issued, you may request a new card from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) by filing Form I-90 (available at http://www.uscis.gov). If you're outside the U.S. and lose your green card, contact the nearest U.S. consulate or USCIS office before applying online for a new card.

Medicare card. To replace a lost, stolen or damaged Medicare card, follow the procedures at https://secure.ssa.gov/apps6z/IMRC/main.html. To replace a Medicaid card, contact Medicaid (www.medicaid.gov).

Tax returns. If you need exact copies of previously filed and processed tax returns (including attachments), you may order them from the IRS by submitting IRS Form 4506 (at www.irs.gov). There is a \$57 fee for each year's return you request. Before ordering an exact copy, however, ask whether a "tax return transcript" or "tax account transcript" will suffice. These abbreviated printouts of returns are often acceptable substitutes for student loan and mortgage lenders and are free. To order transcripts, go to www.irs.gov/ Individuals/Order-a-Transcript.

School transcripts. If you need to order high school or college transcripts, it's best to contact the school's registrar or student services office directly for instructions. (Some websites that claim they can expedite the process have proven unreliable.)

<u>Down Memory Lane</u>

El Segundo's Aerospace Pioneer

Long before the word aerospace had been coined, in 1932 Jack Northrop started

El Segundo on its way to becoming the "Aerospace Capital of the World" by establishing here his first Northrop Aircraft Company.

Jack was born September 10, 1895 in Newark, NJ, and was raised in Santa Barbara CA. It was 1911, a mere 8 years after the Wright Brothers' first That single experience was enough to spark flight when chance brought a sixteen year old boy by the name of John Knudsen Northrop to a grassy plot of Santa Barbara. He was one of a handful of spectators who witnessed a French aviator assemble a pusher biplane then proceed to briefly fly it around town, and finally land it in front of the old Potter Hotel. That single experience was enough to launch a distinguished career in aviation.

After graduating from high school and gaining some maturity as a garage mechanic, architectural draftsman-engineer and builder, he obtained a job with Loughead (later Lockheed) Aircraft as an mechanical draftsman-engineer. It was at Loughead where he first revealed some of the pioneering genius he would demonstrate throughout his lifetime.

In 1916 he designed the wings for the F-1, at the time, the world's largest flying boat. His career was interrupted when the U.S. entered World War One and he was drafted into the Army Signal Corps. After nine months of army service, he was furloughed back to Loughead because he was needed to direct the engineering effort to design the two new Curtiss HS-2L flying boats.

After this work was completed, in 1919 he designed the S-1, a sport plane, actually a flying automobile with a monococque fuselage and wings that folded so it could be stored in a residential garage. It was originally designed to be a \$2500.00 sport planes for pilots returning from the war. But the idea was ahead of its time. Surplus military aircraft, selling for less than \$400.00, began flooding the market place and in 1920, the Loughead finally collapsed.

With the aircraft business in the doldrums, Jack returned to work for his father in the building trades. Three years were to pass before he was able to return to his chosen vocation. In 1931, he was hired by Douglas Aircraft Company in Santa Monica. Douglass had won a contract to build the famous Army Air Service "Round the World" Cruisers, and his first engineering challenge was to design the Cruiser's fuel tanks.

After his regular working hours at Douglas, Jack studied the concept for a high efficiency all wing aircraft. More about that in Part Two.


In 1927, Northrop and Allan Lockheed joined two other associates to form the Lockheed Aircraft Company in Hollywood, CA.

Jack Northrop's name in aviation history was firmly established as the designer of Lockheed's first airplane, the remarkable Vega of 1927. This was the most advanced airplane of its time, both structurally and aerodynamically, and a breaker of many records.

Flown on many historic flights by Amelia Earhart, Art Goebel, Wiley Post and pilots of the Herbert Wilkins Artic and Antarctic expeditions, the Vega became world famous. Later, Northrop designed the fast World Express, a parasol-wing version of the Vega. This was another record breaker in the hands of Frank Hawks and Roscoe Turner during the early nineteen thirties.

Dissatisfied with the status quo and wanting to experiment with radically new designs, Northrop joined with Ken Jay in 1928 to form the tiny Avion Corporation in

Burbank, California. Here he did some primary development work on the unique all-metal, multicellular, "stressed skin" construction, which was to become the standard for future aircraft. He also renewed his revolutionary Aircraft should be consolidated with Stearman Aircraft (another division of United) in Kansas. Not wanting to move his plant to Kansas. Northrop broke with United in 1932 and formed a new Northrop Corporation,




Wiley Post and Harold Gatty flew around the world in the Winnie Mae in 1931.

wing studies, which culminated in the fabrication of the very first of the Northrop flying wings. Its first flight took place in 1929 at the Burbank Airport.

Later, William E. Boeing, founder of Boeing Aircraft and Transport Corporation showed a decided interest in Northrop's new all metal Alpha airplane and the inventiveness of Jack Northrop himself. Intrigued by the combination of fresh financial backing and modern facilities, the youthful Californian accepted Boeing's overtures. The decision in 1929 turned Avion Corporation into Northrop Aviation Corporation, a division of the giant

in partnership with Douglas Aircraft, in El Segundo, California. (Douglas Aircraft held 51 percent of the stock.) Shortly thereafter, the new all- metal Gamma was developed. It was purchased by the Army Air Corp; commercial models went to leading pilots of the day for record-breaking flights. During the early thirties it was flown by TWA to carry mail and cargo.

One Gamma achieved fame as the "Experimental Overweather Laboratory" owing to its pioneering substratosphere flights which extended from 1936 through 1940. Later Northrop designs from the El Segundo plant

United Aircraft and Transport Corporation, which also included Boeing.

In his new Burbank factory Northrop produced the Alpha high performance transport for TWA, the Department Commerce and the Army Air Corps. These sleek lowwinged machines featured Jack Northrop's all aluminum stressed skin structure. Alpha was soon followed by the Beta, a small sport plane with similar design characteristics.

Once again, the great depression settled over the country, aircraft sales went from boom to bust. As an economy measure United management decided that Northrop included a long series of military aircraft for the U.S. and foreign countries. Derivatives of these designs played key roles during World War II.

In 1938 the Northrop Corporation became known as the El Segundo division of Douglas Aircraft. But Jack Northrop was not satisfied with mere production design. He decided to start fresh once again so that he could concentrate on experimental design. It was obvious by now that he would never be content unless he was expressing his creativity in his own company, which he opened in 1939 at Hawthorne, California. •




So my youngest son turns 13 this Friday. How this happened I don't know but it did. He is such a good eater and always willing to try something new.

Eagles Spring Sports in Review

The El Segundo High School athletes in the spring competed at the highest level, but there were challenges along the way. The boys' volleyball team won a league title with a young team. The girls' softball program looks to have a bright future with a number of young players on its roster, while the baseball program saw a new head coach take over. The track team competed in all of its meets on the road, while the swim team was once again one of the top programs in the South Bay. There were league champions, but no CIF titles this year. However, a number of athletes were named to All-League or All-South Bay teams.

There were epic games and dramatic comebacks. There were games in which the Eagles were huge underdogs and won. Then there were games in which they were favored, but lost in disappointing fashion. Overall, it was a good spring for the Eagles.

Boys' Volleyball

Head coach Anjinho Bacil said before the

season that he thought his team's chances hinged on how well his young players could improve over the season. It was apparent from early on that this team could and would hold its own with other top programs. Not only that, but since the Pioneer League has excelled lately it was promoted to the CIF Southern Section Division 2 for the playoffs.

Assistant coach Tim Hovland thought the move to Division 2 would be a stretch for the Eagles, but he was still encouraged with the team's play. "We're good--really good-and we'll be better in the future," he said.

The Eagles ran the table to win the Pioneer League with impressive wins over CIF power South Torrance. Their epic 25-22, 25-20, 30-32, 23-25, 15-13 five-game win over the Spartans legitimized their rise to South Bay prominence. El Segundo swept Burbank in the first round of the playoffs, but fell to fourth-seeded San Marcos in the second round.

This was a young team, but despite its youth there was plenty of experience and talent. Eric Chance, a basketball standout,

was the MVP of the Pioneer League and was named to the All-South Bay team. This two-year starting junior led his team in kills and was the leader on and off the court. When you add in another junior in Jason Brandlin, sophomores Brandon Kurke, Teddy Karrer and Nolan Sharp and freshman Steven Moye, you get the idea this team is loaded for 2014.

Swimming

The boys' and girls' swim teams again had successful showings this year and continued the program's rich heritage. Even a dilapidated swim stadium couldn't hinder both teams' successes.

Toby Contarsy and Jonathan Combs led their team in winning fashion. Contarsy took second in the 100 freestyle and led off the winning 200 freestyle relay in the Pioneer League. Combs, a standout on the water polo team, took second in the 100 butterfly and anchored the winning 200 freestyle. The boys' 200 freestyle relay team of Contarsy, Combs, Matt Giglio and Jase Emery won the

Pioneer League.

Juniors Kira Makuta and Payton Perrotta led their team this year and had impressive showings in the CIF Southern Section Division 2 finals. Makuta took sixth in the 500 freestyle and had a 1:52.61 in the 200 freestyle. Perrotta edged out her teammate for fifth place in the 500 freestyle with a 4:58.70 and placed fifth in the 200 freestyle.

Track and Field

Anna Farello capped her stellar running career by winning Pioneer League medals in the 1,600 meter and 3,200 meter individual and anchored the 4x400 relay where her team finished second. It marked the fourth consecutive year that she had qualified for CIF in at least one event. She holds school records in the 800m, 1,600m, mile and 3,200m.

Other girls who had impressive seasons were Marcela Desir, Genevieve Johnson, Kaley Owens, Greta Studier and Kristen Virkler.

On the boys' side, Blaize Ali-Watkins' medaled in the 100m and 200m and won the long jump at the Pioneer League finals. Other CIF prelim qualifiers included Connor Forsythe (3,200m), Joshua Pacheco (100m), Noah Stone (110m hurdles) and Kristian Thomas (long jump).

Softball

What more could a program endure? The softball team started the year with a number of injuries, and at least one prominent player decided not to play anymore. On top of that, the team was thinking of a former alumni standout who was very sick.

With so many injuries to start the season, the Lady Eagles turned to freshmen Alyssa Pelegrin, Nayeli Diaz and Allison Tatnall to get the team going. The result was an impressive win over Ocean League and CIF power Santa Monica to start the year.

The team went 20-8 and was one of three squads in the Pioneer League to win 20 or more games. It played 12 different teams that reached the CIF Southern Section playoffs and it competed in the finals of its own tournament.

In May, the softball team held a fundraiser for former standout Lizzy Garland who was battling cancer. Garland played on the 2007 team that advanced to the CIF final game and the 2008 team that lost in the CIF semifinals. She was set to play for Cal Baptist, but had to redshirt because of a brain hemorrhage. She still celebrated with the team when it won the national NAIA title in 2009.

Sadly, Miss Garland lost her courageous battle with cancer on May 26. She was 23. The team and community paid a moving tribute to her and celebrated her life on the softball field where she excelled as a third baseman.

Baseball

The baseball program continued to be one of the South Bay's top programs. The Eagles won or shared in the Pioneer League championship at the varsity, JV and freshman levels. It was the JV's second consecutive league title and the fifth championship for the freshman team.

Steve Shevlin became just the third baseball head coach at El Segundo High in 53 years when he took over for retiring head coach Craig Cousins. Cousins, who inherited the team when legendary coach John Stevenson died unexpectedly, had won two league titles in his three years at the helm.

The team struggled to piece together any long winning streaks. At one point it was just 10-10, but finished the season at 20-14. El Segundo played 19 teams that reached the postseason and tied with Torrance and South Torrance at 7-3 atop the Pioneer League standings.





<u>Looking Up</u>

Earth's Photo Taken from 900 Million Miles Away

Our home planet and its Moon appear as a mere dots-the Earth a pale blue and the Moon a stark white—in new color images taken from nearly 900 million miles away by the cameras on NASA's Cassini spacecraft. The images were taken on July 19, 2013 during an event that was observed and celebrated worldwide.

The July 19 Earth-imaging event marked the first time Earthlings had advance notice that their portrait was being taken from interplanetary distances. It was the also the first time Cassini's highest resolution camera captured the Earth and its Moon as two distinct objects. NASA invited the public to acknowledge the occasion by either finding Saturn in their part of the sky and waving, or simply smiling and celebrating. At least 20,000 people around the world participated.

"We may not be able to see individual continents or people in this portrait of Earth, but this pale blue dot is a succinct summary of who we were on July 19," said Linda Spilker, Cassini project scientist, based at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. "Cassini's picture reminds us how tiny our home planet is in the vastness of space, but also testifies to the ingenuity of the citizens of this tiny planet to be able to send a robotic spacecraft so far away from home to take a picture of Earth and study a distant world like Saturn."

Pictures of Earth from the outer solar system are rare because, from that distance, Earth is very close to the bright Sun. Just as a human being can damage his or her retina by looking directly at the Sun, a camera's sensitive detectors can be damaged by looking directly at the Sun. Cassini was able to take these images because the Sun had moved behind the planet Saturn from the spacecraft's point of view, blocking out most of the light.

The Earth and the Moon can be seen in both narrow-angle and wide-angle images. In both cases, the illuminated portions are smaller than the smallest resolvable objects the cameras can see from the distance of Saturn.

At the time of this picture, the Earth and Moon shone through a gap between the thin G ring, just outside Saturn's main rings, and the brightest portion of the diffuse E ring created from the spray of geysers from the moon Enceladus.

"It thrills me to no end that people all over the world took a break from their normal activities to go outside and celebrate the interplanetary salute between robot and maker that these images represent," said Carolyn Porco, the Cassini imaging team lead, based at the Space Science Institute, Boulder, Colo. "The whole event underscores for me our 'coming of age' as planetary explorers."

The wide-angle image is part of a larger mosaic-or multi-image portrait-that imaging scientists are putting together of the entire Saturn system. The lighting conditions allow for special views of faint, dusty rings that are usually difficult to see from other angles or from ground-based telescopes on Earth. It will likely take another several weeks for the full mosaic to be completed.

Cassini's image carries on a NASA legacy of images of our fragile home from space, including the 1968 "Earthrise" image taken by the Apollo 8 Moon mission from about 240,000 miles away and the 1990 "Pale Blue Dot" image taken by Voyager 1 from about four billion miles away.

tax initiatives and foundations. Long term, in order to stay competitive, El Segundo is going to need to ensure that we're making similar investments in our local school system."

Though too early to say what those investments might entail, Yantz indicated that District officials will have to consider multiple options to ensure El Segundo continues to compete academically and otherwise with

areas such as Manhattan Beach and Palos Verdes. "We're in a good place right now, but if we accept the status quo, it will be difficult for us to provide comparable programs, class sizes, maintain facilities, and continue to retain and attract high-quality educators and support staff," he said. "The message right now is we must be aware of all this because of all the factors that have come into play." •

The City of El Segundo (City) prepared a Draft Addendum to the previously Certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) for the Sepulveda/ Rosecrans Site Rezoning and Plaza El Segundo Development to evaluate potential environmental effects which may be associated with changes in the previously-approved Plaza El Segundo Development that have been proposed by the project developer. The Certified EIR was a Program/Project EIR that analyzed the environmental effects of (1) a proposed General Plan Amendment, Zone Change and a Zone Text Amendment that would affect a land use re-designation and rezoning of approximately 85.8 acres of an 110-acre area located at the northeast corner of the intersection of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans Avenue ("Sepulveda/Rosecrans Site Rezoning") that would accommodate up to 850,000 square feet of commercial development in the Commercial Center (C-4) Zone; and (2) a proposed Development Agreement and Vesting Tentative Map to permit development of a shopping center of up to 425,000 square feet on a 43.3 gross acres (38.1 net acres) portion of the 110-acre site (the "Plaza El Segundo Development"). An EIR is a detailed informational document that analyzes a proposed project's potentially significant environmental effects. An EIR also identifies ways to reduce environmental project's effects and reasonable alternatives to avoid or minimize significant environmental effects. The addendum has been prepared under the authority of 14 California Code of Regulations § 15164(a) (CEQA Guidelines) which allows a lead agency to prepare an addendum to a previously certified EIR if some changes or additions to the previously certified EIR are necessary but none of the conditions described in CEQA Guidelines § 15162 of the CEQA Guidelines requiring preparation of a subsequent EIR occurred. The purpose of the addendum is to provide substantial evidence in the record to support the determination of the decision making body of the lead agency that none of these conditions has occurred as a result of the proposed changes in the Plaza El Segundo Development. The proposed project also includes an amendment to the previously approved Development Agreement for the Plaza El Segundo Development project that would include: 1) modifications to the project site boundary to increase the site area by 4.988 acres, 2) an increase in the allowable building square footage from 448,829 square feet to 498,442 square feet (an additional 49.613 square feet) 3) minor modifications to the allowable uses; 4) a modification to Section 4.1.3 to allow fast food restaurants within 90 feet of Sepulveda and Rosecrans Boulevards,

with no drive-throughs permitted within the 90 feet; 5) an amendment to remove the size limitations for retailers in the Smaller Tenant Standards specified Development Agreement Section 4.2.2 Limitations on Minimum Square Footage of Buildings and Space" for the Phase 1B portion of the project; and 6) a maximum of 240 square feet of office space for use by the El Segundo Police Department as a satellite office space. Other modifications to the Development Agreement may be made to reconcile changes in the property involved, the property ownership, the project description, and the other requested discretionary actions.

Additional applications include: 1) an Adjustment to allow the width of a curb cut and the width of the driveway on Sepulveda Boulevard and the driveway on Rosecrans Avenue to exceed 30 feet pursuant to ESMC § 15-15-5(O)(1) and to allow an Adjustment to allow the shared use of one large truck and 6 small truck loading spaces for public/employee parking after 10:00 a.m. pursuant to ESMC § 15-15-7(A)(1); 2) a Variance to allow construction of a retaining wall in excess of 6 feet to a maximum height of 12 feet, with a 42" cable fence on top and to allow fill in excess of 6 feet to a maximum height of 12 feet pursuant to ESMC § 15-2-4(B)(3); 3) an Administrative Use Permit to allow the sale of beer, wine and alcohol at 6 eating establishments and 5 kiosks for a maximum total restaurant square footage of 28,764 square feet as permitted with an Administrative Use Permit pursuant to ESMC § 15-5G-4; and 4) modification to conditions of approval to reconcile changes in the property involved, the property ownership the project description, the requested Development Agreement modifications and other discretionary applications, and to add a condition relating to the use of a private water meter system to individually

PROJECT DESCRIPTION AND LOCATION

The Plaza El Segundo Development portion of the Original Project ("Sepulveda/ Rosecrans Site Rezoning and Plaza El Segundo Development") consisted of a 425,000 square-foot shopping center containing a mix of commercial land uses, including retail, grocery store, and restaurant uses on a 38.1 net acre site located at the northeast corner of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans Avenue extending northward along Sepulveda Boulevard adjoining the parcels fronting Hughes Way. Subsequent to the approval of the Original Project the project developer has constructed 378,829 square feet of the 425,000 square-foot shopping center. The shopping center consists of several one- and two-story buildings with a maximum allowable height of 65 feet. The shopping center contains large retail stores, specialty retail, a grocery store, restaurants, a spa and a small fitness center. All of this development has taken place on the portion of the Plaza El Segundo Development site located north of the Union Pacific Railroad ("UPRR") tracks and south of Hughes Way. The Plaza El Segundo Development site north of UPRR includes new streets with the southerly extension of Allied Way that connects to an extension of Park Place east of Sepulveda Boulevard. Total development constructed or under construction is 46,171 net square feet less than the allowable development analyzed in the Certified EIR. Additionally, the Certified EIR allowed for a daily maximum allowable trip count of 16,645 and the development currently constructed generates a total of 13,162 daily trips, which are 3,483 trips less than

The City of El Segundo (City) adopted an Addendum to the previously Certified Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) for the Sepulveda/Rosecrans Site Rezoning and Plaza El Segundo Development a Development Agreement Amendment and a Zone Text Amendment in February 2008 for minor amendments to the C-4 Zone development standards relating to permitted uses, setbacks and signs and an amendment to the previously approved Development Agreement for the Plaza El Segundo Development project that included a modification to the project site boundary increasing the Phase 1B area south of the UPRR tracks by 3.6 acres, an increase in the allowable building square footage, and minor modifications to the allowable uses. The Plaza El Segundo Development site was increased to 41.7 acres and the allowable building square footage increased by 23,829 square feet for a total of 448,829 square feet. The Phase 1B area south of the UPRR tracks would contain 70,000 square feet of the total 448.829 square feet allowed.

proposed project modifications described in detail above would be applicable to that part of the Original Project that has not yet been constructed, which is located south of the UPRR tracks at the northeast corner of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans Avenue. The proposed 13.05 acre shopping center expansion ("Plaza El Segundo Development Phase 1B") would consist of four one- and twostory buildings, totaling 119,613 square feet with a maximum height of 65 feet at the northeast corner of Sepulveda Boulevard and Rosecrans Avenue. The proposed shopping center expansion replaces the previously approved 8.13-acre, 70,000 square-foot shopping center expansion. Four of the commercial retail buildings will surround a large, landscaped and paved outdoor plaza that contains general seating and retail kiosks totaling approximately 2,100 square feet. The proposed development would conform to all of the C-4 development standards and the architectural style would be contemporary. A minimum of 645 surface parking spaces will be provided to serve the development.

The increased square footage and the proposed mix of commercial uses would remain within the daily maximum allowable trip count of 16,645 vehicle trips, the a.m. maximum allowable trip count of 779 trips and the p.m. maximum allowable trip count of 1,477 trips. The proposed project would generate 16,038 daily vehicle trips, 543 a.m. vehicle trips, and 1,476 p.m. vehicle trips. The Development Agreement permitted variations in the mix of uses as long as the daily, a.m. and p.m. peak hour traffic generation was not increased above the traffic generation associated with the

Access to the 13.05-acre portion of the Plaza El Segundo site would be via one existing driveway on Sepulveda Boulevard and one new fully signalized driveway/ intersection on Rosecrans Avenue at Village Drive. The development would tie into the existing City's water and sewer lines. Site remediation is underway and is ongoing in compliance with the mitigation measures adopted in the Certified EIR.

ANTICIPATED SIGNIFICANT **ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS**

Based on the analyses in the Addendum to the Certified EIR, following incorporation of mitigation measures, the project would have no additional significant and unavoidable impacts not previously identified. The project, as analyzed in the Certified EIR, has a significant and unavoidable impact relative to transportation/traffic, air quality, and construction noise. The project would also contribute to a significant cumulative impact relative to traffic/transportation, regional population growth and housing


