The El Segundo City Council Approves TopGolf Agreement

In a marathon meeting that stretched past 12:30 a.m. and featured well over 30 public speakers on the topic, a majority of the El Segundo City Council agreed to move forward with plans to convert the driving range of The Lakes at El Segundo into a TopGolf facility. Mayor Bill Fisher and colleagues Dave Atkinson and Marie Fellhauer voted in favor of the proposal, with Mayor Pro Tem Carl Jacobson and Councilmember Suzanne Fuentes opposed. Tuesday night's vote came after more than a dozen public meetings on the matter since August 2012. "The reason I want to do this is for families," said Fisher, who also sees TopGolf as an economic development tool for El Segundo. "This is one more amenity that will pull businesses into El Segundo."

With the vote, the Council approved the terms of a 20-year ground lease with local developer CenterCal Properties for the driving range portion of The Lakes that will not become official until completion of a one-year due diligence process (open through the end of 2014) in which various conditions must first be met. The existing nine-hole golf course will remain under City-controlled management.

The due diligence period conditions include design and permit approvals, environmental review and a construction contract, among other items. At Fellhauer's request, the agreement will also include a "shared principles" amendment in which TopGolf will state its intent to continue and expand existing youth instruction programs and local school team access; attempt to retain current golf pros; maintain the integrity of the golf course and seek to upgrade its rating; and offer

discounts to El Segundo residents, seniors, military personnel and early morning golfers.

Upon completion of the due diligence, CenterCal would then sublet the driving range property to real estate investment trust 30 West Pershing, which would in turn sublet it to the Dallas-based TopGolf for final operation. The ground lease includes six five-year extension options after which the property reverts back to the City. A default trigger to return the driving range to the City is also in place after seven years if TopGolf fails to perform. Under the lease terms, the City will receive \$425,000 annually for the first five years, with a 10-percent increase

every five years beginning in year six. The City will also receive \$18,000 for each of 10 months during the construction period to recoup lost net income since the golf course will be closed for four to six months and the driving range for eight to 10 months.

In a comparison of revenue and savings projections, City Economic Development Analyst Ted Shove said the City would net \$332,000 in additional monies annually with TopGolf compared to The Lakes staying as is. The total does not factor in depreciation, which would increase the net to \$540,000, according to Shove. Those figures came under

fire, as local resident Mike Dugan claimed that the City's forecasts were incorrect and The Lakes as it stands today makes more money than a TopGolf facility would generate. Later, Fellhauer stated that Dugan's information was "inaccurate." Looking at projected 2012/13 numbers for The Lakes, Shove indicated that the expenditures (including administrative costs and loan repayment) will exceed revenues by \$3,900--and that the City's general fund has historically subsidized operations that are supposed to be self-sufficient.

Under the revamped facility plan, CenterCal will construct a new clubhouse and more than double the current parking allotment. For the golf course itself, Hole 1 will go away to accommodate the extra parking, with a new Hole 3 to go in over the northernmost pond. The design includes options to convert Hole 9 and possibly also Hole 2 to Par 4s, with additional plans to incorporate the existing lake into ground play and add obstacles such as sand traps.

For the driving range, TopGolf will build three levels with 102 total hitting bays (nearly double the current configuration), a full-service restaurant, corporate meeting areas and an outdoor roof terrace. TopGolf Chief Development Officer Randy Starr explained that golf instruction and team practice will take place on the ground level, with a putting green connected to the teaching area adjacent to the golf course. The ground level will also include a family lounge. The main and upper levels will allow for "friendly competition," according to Starr, where up to six people can share a single bay. TopGolf driving ranges employ a patent-protected technology gaming system where each ball contains a silicon microchip to track (and reward) distance and accuracy. Players stationed at one of the hitting bays can compete against one another by shooting for different targets ranging from 25 to 215 yards away.

During his presentation, Starr spoke to various concerns expressed by citizens over the past year and a half, maintaining that TopGolf is not a fad and that revenues have increased at all its facilities every year. For those worried that The Lakes will lose its family-friendly atmosphere, Starr contended that TopGolf's other complexes are "overrun by families" particularly during weekends and after school, and challenged people who don't believe this to go to one of the company's facilities. He added that worries

that TopGolf is a bar are unwarranted and that the data shows less than 10 percent of total sales are alcohol-related. Starr also addressed a widely circulated and heavily criticized TopGolf video showing people dressed in bathing suits and partying. He explained that the footage is from a single three-hour event called "Suits and Boots" that occurs once a year and raises \$100,000 for charity. "This is not a typical night at TopGolf," Starr emphasized. Earlier, Shove revealed police department findings that other TopGolf facilities have no increase in alcohol-related incidents compared to The Lakes despite a larger number of annual visitors.

Listing benefits for El Segundo, Starr said TopGolf will create 400 permanent jobs (not including construction), provide a minimum \$20 million capital investment and add \$265 million to the local economy, while continuing The Lakes' traditions of youth programs and serious golf practice. He added that the company will allocate \$300,000 towards annual marketing to partner with the Chamber of Commerce, service organizations, schools and charities. "We are committed to being a good partner and neighbor—we're here to stay," said Starr, adding that TopGolf is expanding across the country and thus has a major incentive to perform well.

Many of Tuesday's public speakers came from El Segundo, with a slight majority expressing opposition to TopGolf. Of the two Council members who voted against it, Fuentes reported that she visited a TopGolf complex--and though she was generally complimentary about the operation, she questioned the contract itself, calling it "very complicated" with no provision for success-sharing. "I don't think it's a good enough deal," she said. "There's no teeth to the document." Jacobson said he was also concerned about the language in the contract and felt the City was "going in the wrong direction."

Explaining how she came to support the project, Fellhauer said she was initially torn and decided to secretly fly to Houston with her husband (with no City reimbursement) to check out the facility there on a Friday afternoon. She reported it to be mostly full, with ample amounts of kids under five with their parents, serious golfers and "corporate people drinking Cokes and Sprites." She added that she was appalled by the fear tactics

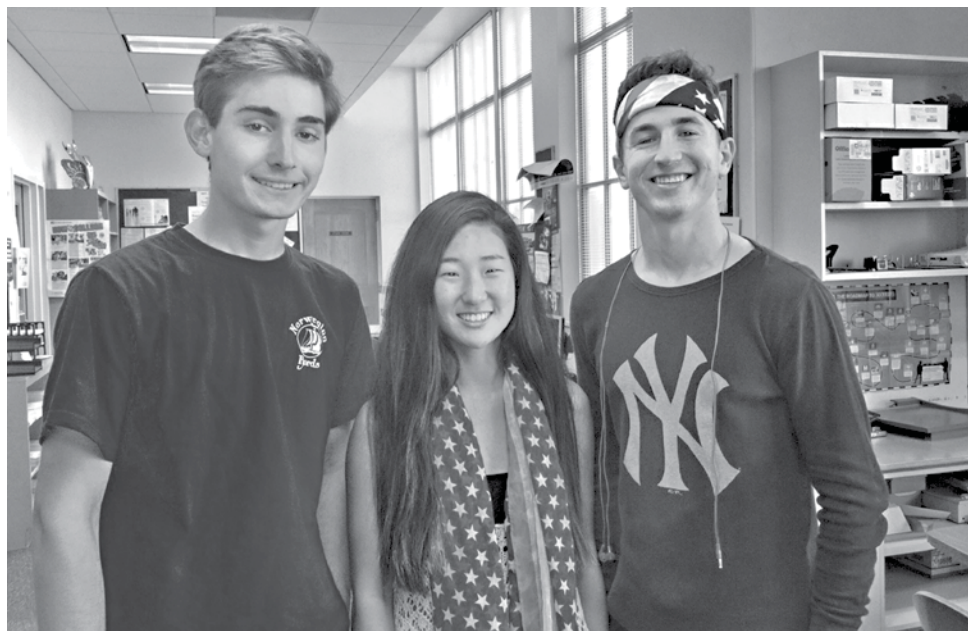

Apology Doesn't Solve Problems, Highlights Inefficiency

As the problems to register for health coverage under the Affordable Health Care Act, Service Administrator for Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Marilyn Tavenner apologized before Congress for the complicated rollout. Unfortunately, an apology four weeks after the rollout and with little having been solved in those four weeks is no more than a reminder of how ill prepared everyone in charge was.

Tavenner's opening statements that they know how eager consumers are to purchase some type of coverage comes across more as an attempt to divert attention from what really matters which is that the majority of people attempting to use HealthCare.gov are struggling to make a purchase. At the core of this issue is that everyone responsible for making sure that this website and that these health care options be made available by now, have failed. The Affordable Care Act was passed back in 2009. That means that those who have championed this law and have fought for giving more Americans access to health care coverage were not able to figure out the logistics of their brainchild in four years. That is flat out embarrassing.

I've said it before and I stand by it now, I am looking forward being able to purchase my own health insurance. I was uninsured throughout my 20s as I worked part-time jobs and made my way through school. Now, as an independent contractor, I am responsible for my own health care coverage and this is

supposed to be a legitimate option for people like myself. Unfortunately, the only way to sign up for coverage has turned out to be a headache and Tavenner's apology is simply a reminder of everyone's failure to properly prepare, in four years, for this moment.

Also disturbing is the fact that it took four weeks for someone to address the issue. It's difficult to determine why it took almost an entire month for anyone to come out and acknowledge the deficiencies of the rollout but it remind me of Washington's inability to be accountable. In any other job having four years to prepare for something like this rollout would result in unemployment. Unfortunately, Tavenner isn't an election official so we can't oust her for her role in this snail-paced rollout and nor do we have any idea who is directly responsible for this failure.

Despite Tavenner's apology and her taking responsibility for the program's failures, there aren't any signs of reprimands for anyone involved with this fiasco [at least for now]. All that is left is waiting to see how long it is going to take the same people who got this wrong the first time, despite an almost four-year head start to get it right the second time around. Apologies mean a lot when they come immediately and in this case should have been accompanied with an explanation as to how this will be fixed. Sadly, the apology comes a month after the initial problems were encountered and with no real solution in sight. Maybe they need four more years to get it right. •

Eagles Rally Behind Rincon's Injury to Win Title

Seldom will you see a high school football team needing increased motivation to play harder. But that's exactly what happened when El Segundo High played host to Centennial in a key Pioneer League matchup. The Eagles, who never trailed in the contest, took control of the game in the second half after defensive lineman Michael Rincon was injured. The result was an inspiring 34-20 win that secures, at the very least, a share of El Segundo's last Pioneer League title.

When a team is challenged on the field, it will do most anything to keep the odds in its

favor. A year ago, Centennial used an illegal player to increase its chances of winning. Though it helped, the win against the Eagles was overturned because of that illegal player.

This year, the Apaches used some different tactics to stay in the game. This year it was illegal blocking--i.e. chop blocks. By definition a chop block is "a combination block by two or more teammates against an opponent other

set up a 27-yard field goal by Gabriel Rocha with 3:33 left in the first half.

One of the key plays of the first half came when Joey Garza split the defensive line and sacked Shaw on third and long. Centennial was forced to punt and the Eagles ran the clock out to head into halftime with a 17-14 lead. "We lacked the emotion I thought we needed in the first half and we committed too many mistakes," said defensive coordinator Dan Heck.

The Eagles had just three possessions in the third quarter and the offense just couldn't get untracked. Penalties, incomplete passes

and a fumble prevented the Eagles' offense from scoring.

Ryan Kelly's fumble near the 19-yard line gave Centennial a golden opportunity. On the first play, the Eagles' Michael Rincon was blocked near the line of scrimmage and continued to lie on the ground after the play was over. He was the victim of a chop block that caused a stir on the El Segundo sidelines.

than the runner, with or without delay, where one of the blocks is low (at the knee or below) and one of the blocks is high (above the knee). The El Segundo coaching staff continually expressed their concerns to the officiating crew throughout the first half, but just one flag was thrown and that one was on the Eagles.

El Segundo took an early 7-0 lead after its first possession. The Eagles took over at midfield and pass completions from Lars Nootbaar to Connor Underwood and Jamie Stewart put the ball deep into Apache territory. Of all the penalties, a chop block was called on the Eagles during the drive. Three plays later, Dathan Bailey found an opening on his way to a six-yard touchdown run.

On the Eagles' next possession, Nootbaar found Stewart open on a pass over the middle and the speedy receiver outran the Apache secondary for a 60-yard touchdown and a 14-0 El Segundo lead. Centennial responded on its first play with a 77-yard touchdown pass from Russell Shaw to Cory Willis to cut the lead to 14-6 after the PAT failed. Centennial scored a safety when Nootbaar was called for grounding while throwing from the end zone to make it 14-8.

The Apaches tied the game midway through the second quarter on a seven-play, 45-yard drive capped by Shaw's TD pass to Johnny Bailey. The PAT attempt failed when Jackson Walz and Jason Johnson stopped Shaw short of the goal line. Isaac Luna's interception and runback to the Centennial 16-yard line helped

No call or flags by the officials were thrown--the result of a poor officiating crew in a play that may cost Rincon the rest of his junior year.

The Eagles were assessed two major penalties for unsportsmanlike conduct because of the non-call on Centennial. Eagle head coach Steve Shevlin tried in vain to explain his concerns while the El Segundo sidelines were going ballistic. The officials wouldn't hear any of it other than from one of the players on the field and a sideline coach. That resulted in two penalties, putting the ball in play at the El Segundo four yard line. Centennial gained three feet, six inches on the first play and then the Eagles' inspired defense kept the Apaches out of the end zone on the three ensuing rushing plays. The Eagles had held strong and had not given up the last six inches. That stand may be one of the best defensive efforts in Coach Shevlin's 20-year career. He said much of that was the result of emotion the team had when Rincon went down. "That should never have happened to Michael," Shevlin said. "We complained about their [Centennial] chop blocking throughout the game. It's a shame. Michael is one of the best-liked guys on the team and he may be out for a long time."

The emotion the defense brought gave the El Segundo offense the shot it needed. Nootbaar directed the offense on the longest drive in school history and for that matter tied a national record for the longest drive. He drove his offense 99-plus yards in 15 plays,

Looking For Gold

After a thrilling opening night for the Los Angeles Lakers, at which they took out the much-heralded Los Angeles Clippers, who share the same building and are expected to contend for a championship this year, the Lakers let it all slip right out the window by getting routed by the Golden State Warriors 125-94 the next day.

Naturally, the Lakers aren't going to go undefeated or even compete for one of the league's best records this year. Fans must restrain their expectations now. This season is not one that is going to be one of the greatest of all time, especially with Kobe coming off of a horrific injury. These Lakers aren't going to win many second of back-to-backs this year, even if they happen to be against the likes of the Charlotte Bobcats or New Orleans Pelicans, rather than the Warriors. These Lakers, with Kobe, Pau Gasol and Steve Nash, are still an old team and will have to maintain healthy in order to get into the playoffs and make any kind of a dent. Even coach Mike D'Antoni knows that it's going to be a bumpy road, but if the Lakers can find gold in some of the younger players on the roster, a championship may not be as far away as it currently seems.

Credit still must be given to the Lakers for beating the Clippers and handling them in the fourth quarter with only bench players for the entire 12-minute span. Last year, with Kobe, the Lakers lost four of four games against the Clippers, giving a spark to what is now considered an inner-city (or inner-arena) rivalry. The Warriors showed the same type of exuberance and energy in their home opener the very next night that the Lakers did versus the Clippers as they destroyed the purple and gold. Let's face it, though -- no one thought that the Lakers would beat the legitimate champion-contending Warriors on that night.

So who are the Lakers? Are they the team that came out with energy and took it to the Clippers, or are they the team that came out and laid down against the Warriors? Possibly both. The remainder of the season will certainly tell, but by looking at just the first two games of the season we can begin to make some assumptions, at least. The Lakers are supposed to be a defensively weak team this year. That's no shock considering D'Antoni is the head coach and dinosaurs like Gasol and Nash must protect the center lanes of the court. That fact certainly reared its ugly head when the Warriors put up 125 points against them. Kurt Rambis was brought in as an assistant coach to shore up the defense and he will certainly have his work cut out for him this year, but don't expect the Lakers to easily beat any teams that are offensively savvy this

season. With Bryant sidelined due to injury, the leaders on the court are going to have to be Gasol and Nash. Nash will most likely always sit out the second of back-to-backs this year to preserve his health, leaving the team almost directionless in his absence.

Once again, that was the case against the Warriors and the Lakers took an ugly loss. The starters are also old, and like Nash will need a lot of rest in a long 82-game season. It may take some work to keep everyone healthy. That responsibility will belong to D'Antoni again this year, like it did last year when Kobe was overplayed and tore his Achilles.

Despite those weaknesses, the Lakers do, believe it or not, have a few strengths to contrast. One thing that has been overwhelmingly obvious since the tip-off of opening day at Staples Center is that these players have chemistry together. That's right--Dwight Howard is gone and apparently happy in Houston. That means that now, everyone gets along with one another on the Lakers. Chemistry is one thing that can bring a team a long way and the Lakers certainly look to have it early on this year. Youth may have a lot to do with that. Jordan Farmar, Jodie Meeks and the electric Xavier Henry have used their youth and provided a spark from off of the bench that has given the Lakers an aspect that has been absent on the team for a long time now. Those three, plus the likes of Jordan Hill and others, give the Lakers a bench that can run and score and keep the team in the game when the starters must rest. That bench was the same one that scored 76 points against the Clippers last week. An even mix of veteran leadership with Pau and Nash mixed in with the youth described above can possibly make the Lakers a threatening team this year. Any time you add Kobe Bryant to that mix near the middle of the year, it certainly can't hurt either.

It's obviously still early in the year and considering only two games of the season have been discussed, different variables can, of course, change. Coaches and players alike are getting used to each other and the system being run on the floor, so it is not time to panic quite yet because of a 31-point loss in Oakland. One thing remains certain, though --with a whole list of players in their contract years, there are a lot of people with something to prove, including D'Antoni, if he wants to be around to coach the team again next season. This year will certainly be an interesting one in Laker Land where despite their finish this season, the Lakers look for gold out of one or two key players who could possibly help them in their quest to become a championship-caliber team again in the near future. •

When Mixing Medication and Food can be Deadly

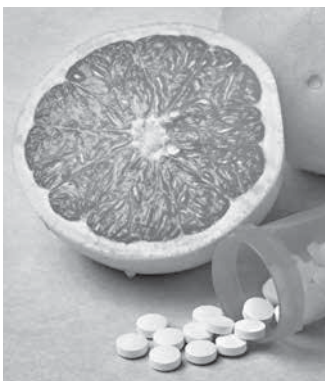
(BPT) - More than one-third of adults in the U.S. have high cholesterol and high blood pressure. Yet many of those treated for these conditions don't realize they are putting themselves at risk by not understanding the basics about their medications.

Many commonly prescribed drugs have potentially fatal side effects when mixed with other medications, over-the-counter drugs, supplements and even foods. This is true for the widely used cholesterol-lowering drugs known as statins, which can be deadly when mixed with grapefruit juice. These medications include atorvastatin, simvastatin, lovastatin and fluvastatin.

"Most people don't know that something as common as drinking grapefruit juice when taking statins can increase the risk of muscle pain and have serious adverse side effects that can be life threatening," says Ed Dannemiller, specialist pharmacist in the Express Scripts Cardiovascular Therapeutic Resource Center (TRC). "The juice can substantially raise the concentration of statins in the body and make them much more potent."

As a specialist pharmacist, Dannemiller is one of a team of experts who are specifically trained to help patients with heart disease understand everything they need to know about their medications, including how their diet and other medications they take may affect their health. They also work closely with physicians to prevent potential problems that medications may pose to their patients.

"Another popular drug, warfarin, which is a blood thinner that helps prevent heart attack and stroke, can react harmfully with a number of commonly used products," he says. "When warfarin is mixed with antidepressants, alcohol, ibuprofen or aspirin, and even herbal



products like ginkgo biloba or garlic, patients may be at risk of internal bleeding."

If you are one of the millions of Americans being treated for one of these common conditions, Dannemiller offers these tips to help prevent medication interactions.

Ask before you use: Check with your doctor or pharmacist to find out what

foods, medications and supplements should be avoided when taking a medication. Some combinations cause bad reactions by making the drug more potent, while others can make the medication less effective.

Read the fine print: Always read the caution information provided in the medication package and make sure you understand how and when to take your medications. Instructions such as taking your dose with food or on an empty stomach should not be overlooked. Also, taking too much or too little of a drug can significantly impact how well the drug works.

Look beyond prescriptions: Make sure your physicians know all the other medications and supplements you're taking, such as herbal remedies and over-the-counter products, including vitamins since some interactions can cause life threatening side effects.

Follow doctor's orders: Taking your medications as prescribed by your doctor is essential for ensuring that they'll effectively treat your condition. Don't ever stop taking your medications or simply use them "when needed" without talking to your physician or specialist pharmacist. Even if you have no apparent symptoms, you may still be at risk. For example, blood pressure can reach dangerous levels, yet a patient may not be aware of any of the warning signs. Remember, just because you don't notice any symptoms doesn't mean that your disease is under control. •

Seniors: Be on High Alert for Scams

I look forward to the day when we no longer need to warn senior citizens about scams designed to separate them from their hard-earned money. I'm not holding my breath, however. According to the FBI, senior citizens make attractive targets for con artists for a variety of reasons:

- They're more likely to have a nest egg, own their home and have good credit.
- Seniors are less likely to report fraud because they don't know where to report it, don't realize they've been scammed, or are too ashamed at having been duped – possibly fearing they won't be trusted to manage their own finances going forward.

- When elderly victims do report crimes, they often make poor witnesses because of faulty memory.

- Seniors are more susceptible to products promising increased wealth, cognitive function, virility, physical conditioning, anti-cancer properties and so on. Here's a roundup of common telemarketing scams targeting seniors and how you can avoid them:

Be wary, even if callers appear legitimate. Caller ID "spoofers" pretending to represent your bank, credit card company or government agencies may try to trick you into revealing personal information under the pretext of fixing a security breach. When in doubt, hang up and contact the organization yourself.

Other common telemarketing scams include:

- You've supposedly won a free prize but are asked to pay for handling postage or taxes. By law, you never have to pay for any legitimate prize.

- Get-rich-quick schemes, like those involving Nigerian princes trying to smuggle funds out of their country using your bank account in exchange for a cut of the amount.

- The "Grandparent Scam," where someone pretending to be your grandchild calls in a panic, claiming to have been arrested or injured (often abroad) and asking you to wire them



money – and not tell their parents because they're embarrassed.

- Soliciting funds for fake charities, especially after natural disasters.

- Companies offering seniors free medical equipment or services. After you provide your Medicare number, they forge a doctor's signature and bill Medicare for unneeded goods

or services you never actually receive.

- Some particularly brazen thieves will even offer to help you recover money you've lost to other scammers (who are often part of the same operation).

Although direct telephone contact is common, scammers also use mailers, email, texts and advertisements to lure potential victims into contacting them for further information. A few tip-offs these offers – whatever the channel – might be bogus:

- The offer sounds too good to be true.
- High-pressure sales tactics – they won't take no for an answer have sensible-sounding answers for your every question or hesitation.

- You must make a decision "right now" because the offer will expire soon.

- Claims that you are one of just a few people eligible for the offer.

- Your credit card number is requested for verification. Never provide credit card or other personal information by phone, letter or email unless you made the initial contact.

- You are urged to provide money quickly and not given time to consider the offer.

- There is no risk. All investments have some risk, except for U.S. Government obligations.

- They refuse to provide detailed written information.

- You are asked to trust the telemarketer. Like your mother always said, "Don't trust strangers."

The Federal Trade Commission (www.ftc.gov) has a Scam Alert Blog that exposes the latest scams, as well as a site where you can file a complaint if a business doesn't make good on its promises or cheats you out of your money. •

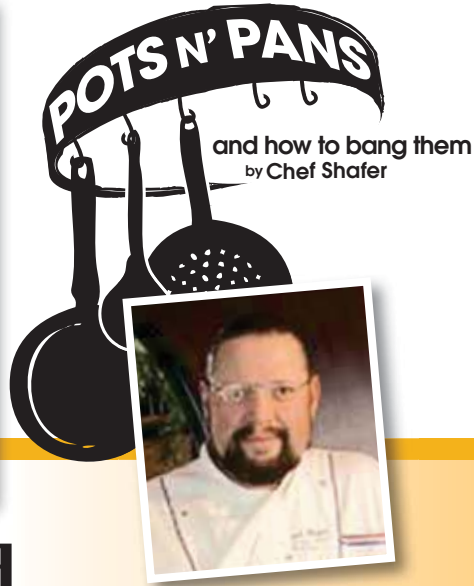

The fifth-ranked Eagles host South Torrance Friday at 7 p.m. on Senior Night. A win could propel the Eagles into one of the top four seeds for the playoffs and a guaranteed first round home game next Friday night, Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m. •

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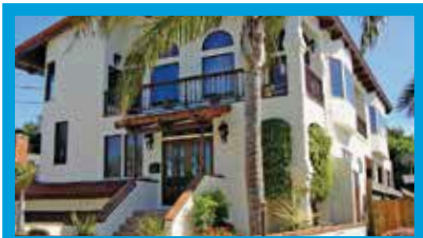

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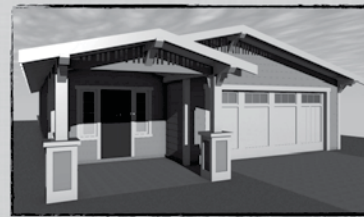

used to incite negative public opinion about TopGolf. "I'm ashamed of these individuals... spreading lies," she said. Fellhauer described TopGolf as "something different, but it is something better," and added that the only negative she sees is that the cost to hit golf balls will be higher.

As for those costs, Fisher contended that the price tag could actually end up lower because TopGolf charges an hourly rate (\$20 per bay) that can be split between up to six people regardless of the number of balls hit—and the time can be broken up into

20-minute increments. The Lakes charges a flat rate for balls (\$11 for two buckets, according to Fisher).

In the end, Fisher asked those opposed to TopGolf to consider whether the company would actually choose to run an operation that would hurt its business and also reminded those in attendance of his and the Council's own commitment to El Segundo. "It's incredible to me that anyone would think that we would vote for something that would put this city at risk—it blows my mind," he said. •

The Farthest Place: Astronomers Discover Universe's Most Distant Galaxy

Researchers from Texas A&M University and the University of Texas at Austin teamed up to detect the most distant galaxy ever found—one created only 700 million years after the Big Bang. Their research is published in the Oct. 24 edition of the journal *Nature*.

The galaxy, known by its catalog name z8_GND_5296, was observed as it was 13 billion years ago. That's the time it took for the galaxy's light to travel to Earth. Because the universe has been expanding all that time, the researchers estimate the galaxy's present distance to be roughly 30 billion light-years from Earth.

"Because of its distance, we get a glimpse of conditions when the universe was only about 700 million years old—only five percent of its current age of 13.8 billion years," said Texas A&M astrophysicist Casey Papovich, who is second author of the paper.

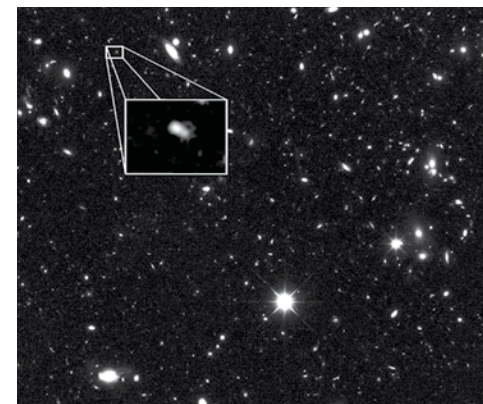
He explains that researchers are able to accurately gauge the distances of galaxies by measuring a feature from the ubiquitous element hydrogen called the Lyman alpha transition, which emits brightly in distant galaxies. It's detected in nearly all galaxies that are seen from a time more than one billion years from the Big Bang, but getting closer than that, the hydrogen emission line, for some reason, becomes increasingly difficult to see.

"We were thrilled to see this galaxy," said lead author is Steven Finkelstein, an assistant professor at the University of Texas at Austin. "And then our next thought was, 'Why did we not see anything else?' We're using the best instrument on the best telescope with the best galaxy sample. We had the best weather—it was gorgeous. And still, we only saw this emission line from one of our sample of 43 observed galaxies when we expected to see around six. What's going on?"

The researchers suspect they may have zeroed in on the era when the universe made its transition from an opaque state in which most of the hydrogen is neutral to a translucent

state in which most of the hydrogen is ionized. So it's not necessarily that the distant galaxies aren't there—it could be that they're hidden from detection behind a wall of neutral hydrogen fog, which blocks the hydrogen emission signal.


The *Nature* paper grew out of raw data gleaned from a powerful Hubble Space Telescope



imaging survey of the distant universe. Using that data, the team was armed with 43 potential distant galaxies and set out to confirm their distances.

On a crisp, clear April night, team members sat behind a panel of computers in the control room of the W. M. Keck Observatory, which is perched atop the 14,000-foot summit of Hawaii's dormant Mauna Kea volcano and houses the two largest optical and infrared telescopes in the world, each standing eight stories tall, weighing 300 tons and equipped with 10-meter-wide mirrors.

They detected only one galaxy during their two nights of observation at Keck, but it turned out to be the most distant ever confirmed. It had a redshift of 7.51—indicating that it was created about 13 billion years ago. Because the universe is expanding, the space between galaxies also is increasing. And as objects move away from an observer, their light becomes redder. In essence, the higher the "redshift," the farther away the object. Only five other galaxies have ever been confirmed to have a redshift greater than 7, with the previous high being 7.215. •

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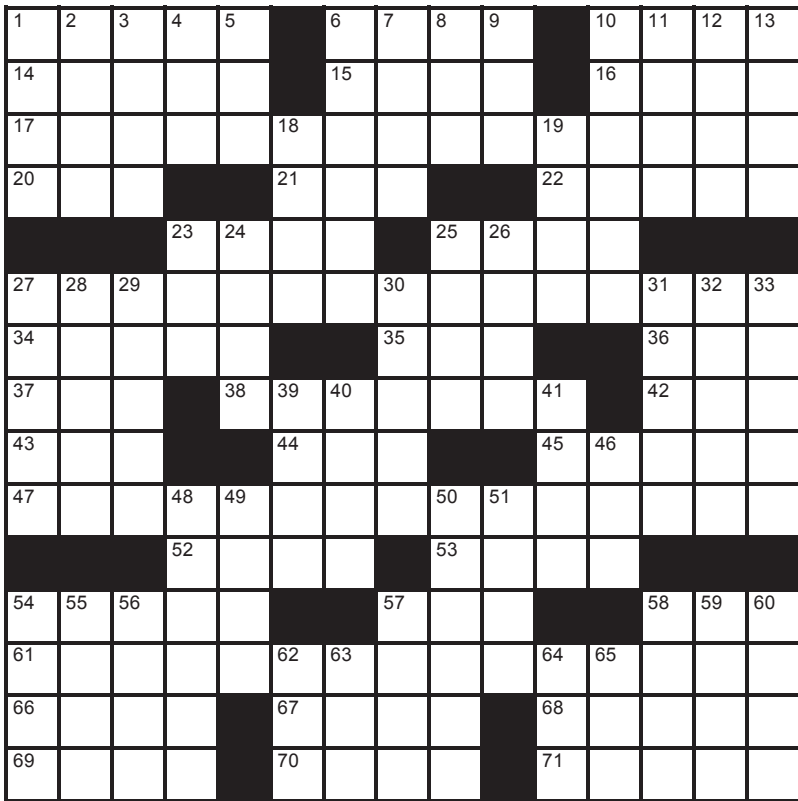

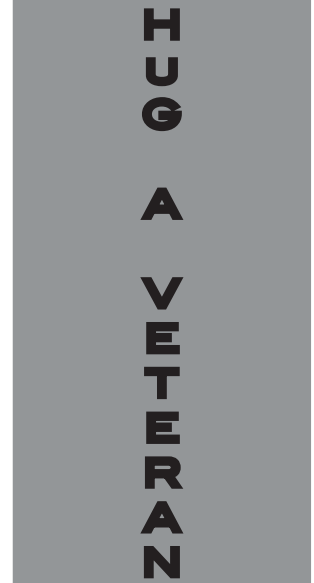

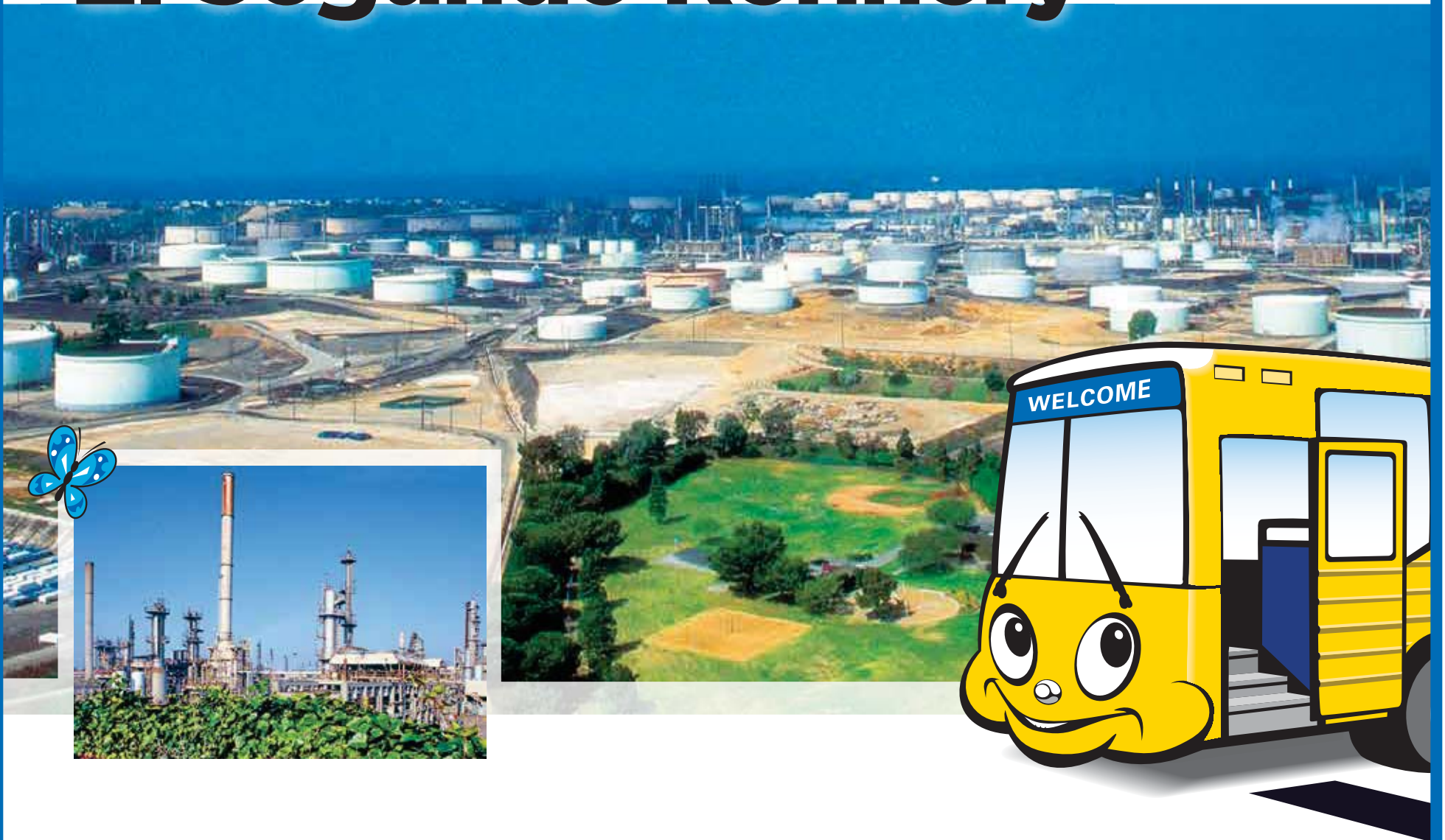
