Council Gets First Look at Raytheon Development Project

One of the largest proposed developments in El Segundo history is now in the early stages of environmental review. During its meeting on November 20, the El Segundo City Council got an early look at a 142-acre, 3.7 million-square foot project brought forth by Raytheon. If approved, the local aerospace giant could enhance its property at 2000 E. El Segundo Boulevard with 1.9 million square feet of potential future development in addition to the existing 1.8 million-square foot campus.

A scoping meeting for the "El Segundo South Campus Specific Plan" took place on November 5 with the public comment period concluding November 28. The future approval process will include a general plan amendment, zoning change and development agreement, among other requirements. A draft of the environmental impact report (EIR) is scheduled to be available by late spring 2013, with the final document coming in summer to address land use, noise, utilities, traffic and other possible impacts. The El Segundo Planning Commission will weigh in on the project in the fall, with the Council to follow.

Though too early in the process to confirm exact uses and final design, the project could include a mix of new single-tenant office space (initial estimates for 1.565 million square feet), light industrial (150,000 square feet), retail/ restaurant (133,000 square feet), warehouse (82,000 square feet) and open space.

In a presentation to the Council Tuesday, Planning and Building Safety Director Sam Lee noted that the City's objective should be to have a "well-designed and diverse commercial and industrial development" that also offers "circulation improvements with expansion of the road network and improved

public access." Speaking to the latter point, Lee said the conceptual plan includes an extension of Nash Street to Hughes Way, extension of Continental Boulevard into the site and potentially through to Hughes, and a possible roadway to Coral Circle.

"If approved, the project allows Raytheon to do long-term planning to better utilize their

property," said Lee prior to the Council meeting. "From the City's perspective, it's an opportunity to improve traffic circulation in El Segundo's southeast quadrant, as well as adding jobs and expanding the City's tax base." Because of the early nature of the project, the City Manager advised the



TREAT YOUR TREES: FEEDING YOUR TREES

Scientists discourage us from fertilizing or feeding our trees. If we enrich the soil in and around the planting hole, roots will be less inclined to reach out into the natural surroundings. This makes for an unstable tree with a shorter life. There are, however, exceptions. Fruit trees require at least annual feeding to increase yield. We also need to amend the soil when we know it is depleted of nutrients or polluted. Such is the case with the Trees to the Sea and Millennium Row. Among recommended natural fertilizers for trees is compost. Spread it on the surface of the tree's root zone before you mulch. Just for clarification, mulch is fresh organic material, and compost is decomposed organic matter. Earn a Tree Caregiver Certificate by taking one each of five free Treat Your Trees workshops. 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Man's Hobby Leads to Career

For Josh Horton, juggling began as an afterschool hobby that he was good at and genuinely enjoyed. Thanks to the partnership between Illinois State University and his elementary school in Normal, Illinois, Horton was connected to the Junior Gamma Phi Circus, the oldest collegiate circus in the United States, and was able to learn juggling at a young age. Since then, his childhood hobby has transformed into a career that takes him to different corners of the country.

"My elementary school had an afterschool circus program where once a week they taught us the basics of all the different circus skills, and juggling was the one thing that I was really good at and enjoyed the most," Horton said. "So I practiced juggling from elementary school all the way through eighth grade."

After eighth grade, Horton stopped juggling for a while. At the end of his freshmen year in high school, he moved to California after his mother obtained a job at Pepperdine University. Once in California and during his sophomore year in high school, Horton decided to enter the talent show at school and showcase his childhood juggling talent. Little did he know that his participation in the talent show would get him back to practicing the hobby that he was so involved in back in Illinois.

"I began watching YouTube videos, I learned about the Juggling Federation, which is one of the competitions, and I got a trainer that lived nearby who began to train me. That's when I started competing and that's how I got back into it," Horton said. "I was captain of my high school basketball team and I eventually quit basketball to juggle more because I liked it that much more and at that point I was competing."

During high school, Horton was fully engaged in developing his skills and devoted three to four hours of practice every day. At the time he even became more involved in competitions, which further fueled his desire to grow as a juggler.

"It was a combination of fun, addiction and commitment. I was doing a lot of different things and it was very difficult," Horton said. "It is definitely a talent that you have to work at."

By the time Horton enrolled in college, Eastern University in Pennsylvania, juggling would transition from a hobby to a way to make money while he completed his degree in entrepreneurial studies. However, the change in setting forced Horton to tackle new challenges.

"Halfway through college, I was still very into juggling at that point and decided that I didn't want to do anything else other than juggling," Horton said. "At that point, I had been a gold medalist and world champion. I was one of the best jugglers in the world, but I was a very terrible performer. I was not only scared in front of audiences, but I did not know how to entertain audiences. That took a lot of learning and just as much practice as the particular skills that are involved with juggling."

Creating a show and stage personality were just some of the adjustments Horton had to make for his new juggling career. However, the changes have provided Horton with a lifestyle that he never imagined and that he fully appreciates.

"You can't just make a living out of being a good juggler. You have to deliver a good show, so I had to begin working on comedy, audience participation bits and other unique ways of presenting my show," Horton said. "A lot of people think that for jugglers the dream job is being with a circus, but circus performers do something like 420 shows a year. That would kill me--that would make me not love juggling."

Horton found a home in El Segundo, which makes it easy for him to meet the demands of his busy traveling schedule. However, he is still on a mission to gain more of a presence as a performer in his new city.

"I am trying to get more stuff to do in the city, but I do fly a lot. I am up at San Francisco often, but I am working on it more," Horton said. "There aren't a lot of jugglers in this world and Los Angeles is one of the places that has always had a lot of jugglers. Event planners and corporate and event people have their jugglers whom they have been going to forever, so I just need to make myself more known in the city. I am getting a lot more stuff here."

With his experience as a performer, Horton is confident in his ability to continue growing in the entertainment business and has aptly integrated his juggling, performing and business management skills. "I am a professional out of college. I don't have another job-this is my full-time job," Horton said.

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Local Crime on the Rise in Wake of Prison Realignment Law



Local police officials believe California's prison reform law may be the biggest reason for a recent increase in property crimes in El Segundo. While a still dicey economy and reduced police presence in town due to City budget cuts may also be to blame, the implementation of AB 109-the prison realignment bill passed in October 2011—could be the biggest culprit. According to an El Segundo Police Department advisory in September, AB 109 has put more criminals on the streets. "Many prison inmates have been released back into South Bay communities and continue to be released on a monthly basis," the report read.

The main impetus for AB 109 was to reduce California's maxed-out prison population and cut State costs in the process. As explained on Governor Jerry Brown's website, "AB 109 changes the law to realign certain responsibilities for lower level offenders, adult parolees and juvenile offenders from State to local jurisdictions." So in essence, the burden of supervising those sentenced to prison for so-called "triple-non" (non-violent, non-serious, non-sexual) offenses now falls on counties instead of the State. "But the County prisons were already overcrowded--and now with the State releasing prisoners and holding the County accountable, the County is releasing prisoners earlier," explained El Segundo City Councilmember Marie Fellhauer, who is also a board member of the Independent Cities Association (ICA) that has targeted regional awareness about AB 109 as a major priority.

Fellhauer does not take much stock in a report a few months back that the recidivism (former prisoners arrested again) rate for inmates being monitored through AB 109 post-release community supervision is much lower than the State average. According to the July data, 24 percent of offenders released to County probation since the law went into effect had been arrested for new offenses—as compared to a 67.5 percent level statewide. "When you have repeat offenders in State Prison who have committed higher level crimes, that's why they're there," Fellhauer said. "But at the local level, how do we know if there is recidivism if they [former prisoners] aren't being monitored? In the past when someone was released on parole or probation and didn't check in, it was a violation. Now, along with realignment there is also a lack of supervision. They used to have to report in and be monitored by a parole or probation officer and that's not always the case anymore."

Concern about the law extends across the state. In a press release this month from the Criminal Justice Legal Foundation (CJLF), Kern Sheriff Donny Youngblood is quoted as calling AB 109 "probably the worst piece of legislation" he has ever seen. "We were not prepared for this dump of what we got," he went on to say. "We know some of these people are going to re-offend... We know that realignment's going to cause more victims."



Other law enforcement officials cited in the report confirmed they too were experiencing upticks in property crimes. Even worse, they see a rising trend of more dangerous criminals on the loose. The press release quoted Kern County Probation Chief David Kuge as saying, "We've seen close to an increase of about 800 more felony probationers than we did at this time last year... We are not getting low-level offenders...we're getting very serious, and dangerous, and violent people back to supervise at the community level." Sonoma District Attorney Jill Ravitch added that she "fears the elimination of prison reduces the incentive for some people to obey the law. Most felonies are no longer prison eligible and people sent to jail are serving half time because of a change in the way credits are accrued."

In El Segundo, ESPD officials point to a sampling of cases in recent months as evidence of an alarming trend. In the hours between the evening of September 1 and the following morning, local officers responded to 11 reports of theft from parked vehicles. Though many of the cars were not secure, the sheer number of violations in such a short time stood out. Over the same weekend period, officers also made several arrests—including three suspects with extensive criminal records. One spent jail time out of state and the other two were on active parole from the California State Prison system. On September 15, police discovered that three burglary suspects arrested that day on Utah Street were on probation for felony offenses and had extensive criminal records. Then on September 18, patrol officers responded to a call from the 700 block of Washington Street about a suspicious male walking in the area. Police eventually picked up the man on Sepulveda and found the latter in possession of stolen cell phones and money. The suspect had been recently released from State Prison under Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) that is part of AB109.

"With the implementation of AB 109 (realignment), coupled with prison overcrowding, El Segundo has seen a dramatic increase in arrests for crimes committed by persons on active parole, probation and those released from State Prison under the PRCS program," another ESPD advisory noted. "Residents are asked to continue their vigilance in reporting suspicious activity or persons in their neighborhoods."

According to year-to-date data, Part 1 crimes (major offenses including homicide, rape, robbery, felonious assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson) are up by eight percent--42 more incidents compared to last year at the same time--in El Segundo this year. While those under the PRCS program don't get directly released to El Segundo, it doesn't mean those former prisoners don't find their way into the community eventually. "Over 90 percent of the people we arrest for Part 1 crimes that occur in El Segundo are committed

This two-year starter has great court vision and has developed a knack for penetrating the ball inside and kicking out precision-timed passes. Engle is another player who has developed into a nice shooting guard, especially from long range. His ball-handling skills will also help break opposing teams' full-court presses. Jake Stone is another player that Gast believes will contribute and has one of the best shooting touches on the team. "He's a pure shooter," said Gast.

A year ago, teams tried pressing the Eagles and caused plenty of turnovers. With the changes Gast has made and the improvements of his players, he believes that could play in his team's favor. "Teams will try pressing us like last year, but it'll be more difficult for them to do--and if we execute, we should turn it into points," said Gast.

Gast is the consummate teacher and this team works as hard as any that he has coached. While he has seven or eight players in his rotation, his entire roster is capable of coming into the game and contributing in some positive way. "We don't have a lot of depth as far as size and experience is concerned, but anybody we bring in will certainly make a positive impact," said Gast.

Eric Chance is a two-sport star (volleyball) and should get plenty of playing time sparing Hayes in the middle. This 6'7" junior is a defensive specialist who can also post up. During scrimmages, he has made Hayes that much better by pushing the latter to the limit on both offense and defense in practice.

Senior Dominique Naea is a returnee who possesses good skills as an off guard. He's definitely a three-point shooting threat. Other seniors such as Chris Curcio and Justin Gray are players who have worked hard and have plenty to offer coming into the game off the bench. Curcio gets position inside for rebounding purposes while Gray's tenacity should equate into playing time.

Juniors Jackson Doering, Austin Hunkins and Malcolm Au are newcomers who bring different elements to the team. Not only do they push themselves in practice, but they help challenge the starters. Doering and

Gast's team has improved in each area of the game. They'll be much bigger up front. Hayes returns as the center and the 6'7" junior looks to be more agile with a better shooting touch than a year ago. His presence in the middle could be intimidating because of his size and reach.

According to Gast, the Eagles' success will run through forward Mike Olson. Though only 6'3", this senior sharpshooting forward has a great basketball mentality and plays with as much defensive intensity as anyone around. Gast will lean on him to be the court leader and unless he's in foul trouble or in a blowout, expect to see Olson on the court for most of the game.

Helping out at the other forward will be Ovie Tomikili. He is a promising player who has improved his game dramatically. With a keen shooting touch and good defensive skills, Tomikili should give opposing teams all they can handle. Au both can shoot from beyond the threepoint arc while Hunkins is a strong inside rebounding threat.

The future, according to Gast, comes in the form of 6'5" swingman Wyatt Boyce. He is another budding two-sport star (baseball) who is still learning the new offensive sets. With his athleticism and competitiveness, he should play anything but like a freshman.

It all adds up to a promising season for the Eagles. Though Gast won't make any bold predictions, he does believe the Pioneer League is wide open. "Lawndale has the size and Torrance is small, but they will have the quickest team," said Gast. "South Torrance is well-coached, but we matched up with them during the summer. We beat them two out of three times."

The Eagles' season started this past Tuesday with a game against La Serna and they play in the El Rancho Tournament starting next week. They'll open up with Hawthorne followed by Nogales and View Park during pool play. The Eagles host their own tournament for the first time in three years, beginning on Wednesday, December 11 and running through Saturday, December 15. •

Council that it would be inappropriate for the members to discuss their opinions at this juncture.

Also on Tuesday, a representative from Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA or Metro) updated the Council on four mass transit options currently under evaluation to connect the Metro rail system within a five square mile area to Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). Possibilities include a light rail branch extending off the Crenshaw/ Green lines with two or three stations inside the airport terminal area, as well as a light rail trunk that moves the Crenshaw/Green lines under the airport with a station in the terminal area. The study also includes options for an Automated People Mover (APM) from Century and Aviation and Bus Rapid Transit.

For part of the funding, the project will use \$200 million in voter-approved Measure R monies, with an estimated opening date of 2028—though there is considersable interest to accelerate the construction process. Meanwhile, MTA opted to delay starting its environmental impact statement until next summer to allow more time to coordinate with Los Angeles World Airports for the latter's projects, work with federal agencies and engage local cities and stakeholders.

In response to a recent lawsuit, the Council unanimously approved an "urgency ordinance" to remove parking restrictions on food trucks on public streets. Up to now, the City's code limited vending from any parked vehicle, wagon or push cart to 10 minutes only. Under the urgency ordinance, food trucks no longer have to comply with the 10-minute limit. City Attorney Mark Hensley explained that local police issued a ticket to a food truck vendor several months ago, prompting litigation against the ordinance by the Food Truck Association. Because there have been no public safety issues from food trucks, Hensley saw no reason to fight the lawsuit and recommended the urgency ordinance as a stopgap measure until staff comes back in three to six months with alternatives for a general code revision.

During presentations, the Council recognized Mattel for sponsoring the Annual Holiday Tree Lighting for the third consecutive year. The event will take place on Thursday, December 6 from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Civic Plaza. Santa Claus and Barbie will be on-hand, with each child receiving a Mattel toy from St. Nick. Festivities will also include free train rides, games and crafts for kids, local groups performing holiday songs and carolers strolling along the streets. Shoppers can buy items from the Farmers Market and craft booths. The actual Tree Lighting will take place at 5:30 p.m.

Speaking on behalf of the El Segundo Concert Band, Linda Cohen noted that the third annual Winter Wonderland will take place on Saturday, December 1 from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the El Segundo High School quad. The free outdoor event will feature snow, activities for kids such as a train and rock-climbing wall, and performances by all the various school bands in town. Cohen noted that last year's event drew 2,500 people and that it benefits the instrumental music program at all the El Segundo public schools.

In another presentation, Sue Carter asked for the community's help in The Friends of the El Segundo Public Library's "Saving El Segundo's Community History" project. As a "gift to the Library and the City," The Friends kicked in \$24,000 of its own money to digitally convert thousands of El Segundo Herald editions going back to 1916 preserved on now-deteriorating microfilm rolls as well as printed copies from 2008 to today. Carter reported that so far 24 rolls have been converted, with 10 more in process. But The Friends needs another \$20,000 to get the Heralds on the Library's website and has asked for donations from local citizens and businesses. Imagining the possibilities once the project is completed, Carter noted that "you could be sitting at home looking at a paper that was written in 1918" and that in going through the old editions, "you can see why we we're called 'Mayberry by the Sea.'" •

by people from outside our city," said Police Chief Mitch Tavera. "People released from realignment or early from the County come into our city and other cities to commit crimes. That is a huge concern for police chiefs throughout LA County because you will have as many as 30,000 people who should be incarcerated going back into the streets."

Lack of support staff is another major issue, Tavera pointed out. "These people [released prisoners] cannot live within society's norms, so we are setting them up to fail because there is no support structure for them," he said. "Only violent felons now go to the State Penitentiary and those considered less serious go to County jail, but I don't consider them less serious. It is incumbent on law enforcement to deal with these people through area and regional approaches."

The ICA hopes the city councils of its participating municipalities will pass resolutions speaking out against the effects of AB 109. Fellhauer plans to bring the document to her Council colleagues at an upcoming meeting.

"This law could impact independent cities like ours more than the contract cities," Fellhauer noted. "Some of the money that the State will collect from Prop 30 will go to subsidize law enforcement, but there's speculation that the lion's share will go to counties rather than independent cities to handle their jails. This realignment has a ripple effect and the cities are feeling that as well. There's a problem here and we have to get it addressed."

Meanwhile, the ESPD's plan of attack is to "proactively impact crime through directed patrol tactics, specialized deployments, apprehension of suspects, and public education and awareness efforts." The task at hand is a challenge given that the department now has just 58 personnel compared to 71 two years ago. "We are looking to hire, but it's a long process that does affect us," said Tavera. "When you have more personnel, you can commit more resources to quality of life or crime impact issues. We're not as efficient as we'd like, but we will continue to do everything we can." •
