Four Candidates File for City Council Seats; Fuentes and Dugan Opt Not to Run

The field is set for the April 10 municipal election, as four candidates will vie for two available seats on the El Segundo City Council. Regardless of who emerges victorious, there will be changes on the dais – as both incumbents, Mayor Suzanne Fuentes and Councilmember Mike Dugan, will not run again. Fuentes will wrap up an eight-year tenure, the last four as Mayor, while Dugan will leave the Council after one term.

Asked about her decision, Fuentes explained, "I didn't intend to be a lifelong officeholder. In the past eight years, I met my goals to structurally balance the City's budget, control spending and increase new businesses and revenue. I will next spend more time with family and friends."

In his choice not to seek reelection, Dugan noted that he has accomplished most of what he sought out to do and that the City is on a better path than it was four years ago. "I would like to thank those who placed their trust in me and I hope that I have served them well," he said.

While nine individuals pulled nomination papers since the filing period began last month, four ultimately returned them to the City Clerk's office by the 5 p.m. deadline on Jan. 17. The candidates are Maria Barden, Lance Giroux, Scot Nicol and Chris Pimentel.

A 23-year El Segundo resident, **Barden** is married with two children and works as a health administrative specialist at UCLA. She has been president of her home owners association for 11 years, and a PTA Run 4 Education volunteer for 10. She won the El Segundo Very Special Person Award and PTA Honorary Member Award. "I am running for City Council because I am committed to El Segundo's future," Barden wrote in her candidate statement. "My husband and I raised our two daughters here and I know what makes our city a special place to live and raise a family." Barden listed El

Segundo's financial health as her top priority, with goals to remain business-friendly, grow the local economy, maintain a balanced budget, address infrastructure needs, provide resources to public safety departments to keep the community safe, and improve youth programs and senior services/quality of life. "I support the development of integrated transportation systems across our region designed to reduce traffic congestion and minimize parking problems," she added. "In addition, I will fight to ensure our community thrives while confronting the challenges of zoning and air quality."

Giroux, an El Segundo resident of 17 years, is married with two young children and is the vice president of sales for a local company. He is the current El Segundo Little League president (since 2013) and was president of the Girls Softball board from 2013-'16. He

is also an active member of the El Segundo Kiwanis Club. "I have found success in these roles by carefully listening to the perspectives of others, and then making decisions that reflect diverse points of view," he noted in his candidate statement. Giroux feels that these leadership positions, coupled with an extensive background in domestic and international business, have prepared him for the next step in serving the community. "As a concerned resident, homeowner and vice president of a local company, I want to protect the values that make our city the best place to build a family and life together -- quality public services, strong schools and a deep sense of community," he wrote. "...Let us preserve what we love about this city, while searching for new and creative ways to help us grow and prosper together."

El Segundo School Board **Fetes Cross Country Teams**

Nineteen El Segundo High School cross country athletes and Coach Marcos Bolanos were honored by the El Segundo School Board Tuesday evening for their recent accomplishments, which included both teams winning Ocean League titles, competing in the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Finals, and garnering a slot in the CIF State Championships that took place in late November.

This was the first time that both the boys and girls teams elevated to the state finals in the same season, with the boys returning from the competition after finishing ninth in the meet, and the girls placing seventh.

Said Bolanos: "This was truly an amazing year for the program and school. It was the first time in school history that the boys team qualified for the state championship race. Over the course of the past six years, we have developed a truly special program -- and for the kids to realize so many goals this season, culminating with state, was a magical experience. They work so hard each year, only taking four weeks off from running, and really throw themselves 115 percent into this sport. I can't even begin to describe how proud I am of this team. Both winning league, girls finishing third in Southern Sections, guys fourth,



Health Officials: Flu Shot Still Good Idea

Los Angeles County health officials said Friday the influenza outbreak that overwhelmed hospital emergency rooms and contributed to at least 96 deaths so far in January has peaked, and that the annual flu shot isn't to blame.

Officials say the H3N2 influenza virus making the rounds in South Bay communities, schools and workplaces reached a peak much earlier than in previous years. This year's flu shot is reportedly between 10 and 30 percent effective against the powerful strain of influenza. Still, county health officials and local physicians continue to

recommend a flu shot for anyone over six months of age

"The vaccine may not completely prevent the flu. But it does help the body launch an immune response," said Dr. Deborah Lehman, who is an infectious disease specialist and professor at the UCLA School of Medicine.

The Los Angeles County Public Health Department reminds residents that being vaccinated against flu protects a person who receives the vaccine and reduces their risk of contracting influenza and spreading it to others. Receiving the flu vaccine is "the most effective way to protect yourself and others"



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Wiseburn School Board Addresses High School Campus Construction Costs

In a meeting that took a little more than an hour Tuesday night, the Wiseburn School Board unanimously passed nearly every item on its agenda, most of which were construction change orders and contingency distributions that added costs to the new Wiseburn High School campus.

That campus, a 210,000-square foot, stateof-the-art building and grounds that will include an outdoor swimming pool, gymnasium, soccer field and outdoor gathering spaces, is a landmark for Wiseburn Unified School District on several fronts. Located at 201 N. Douglas St., El Segundo, the building was previously used by Northrop Grumman to design fighter aircraft and is part of the area's rich aviation/aerospace history. Now, as the culmination of a seven year-project, the building is home to three charter high schools: Da Vinci Communications, Da Vinci Science and Da Vinci Design in a unique partnership between a public school district, Wiseburn; and charter school operation, Da Vinci. The facility's ground floor is occupied by administrative offices for Wiseburn and Da Vinci. The remaining three floors each hold a specific Da Vinci school that has its own principal and faculty. Each of the three Da Vinci schools is open. However, much of the remaining 13.7-acre campus is under construction, including the pool and gym.

At Tuesday night's meeting, held in Wiseburn's District Office Boardroom inside its administrative offices on the building's first floor, Vince Madsen, the District's director of facilities planning, outlined the project's additional costs and change orders, answering questions from the School Board members. He noted that Phase I's financial "book" should be closed sometime after April and that the District should be able to get reimbursed for some of the project's additional costs. Phase II has been "slowed down" by the discovery of methane and additional soil and cement work. He called the discovery and its accompanying required work a "million-dollar ouch," adding that it is "an unforeseen condition."


Madsen added that the District met all of its building requirements and regulations in advance of the project, which included "so many borings [into the ground] per square foot" and that there would have been "more up-front costs to do more borings." He noted that the spots where problems were found that require additional work and cost were notably the places where they didn't happen to bore. "So this is a rough one," he said of the added and unforeseen expenses. Board member Nelson Martinez added verbally to the discussion, agreeing with Madsen's assessment and calling the additional work "unpredictable and unforeseen." Madsen also pointed out that \$933,000 was in the budget for contingencies and that "there was no budget for bad dirt." He predicted that though the project is \$43,000 over budget for the pool (where much of the soil remediation and abatement has been necessary), reconciliations by project end are on track to stay within its budget.

In other news, the Board heard about Dana Middle School students visiting the new campus to tour the four-story building and each Da Vinci high school; the potential to change the name of Peter Burnett Elementary School (Burnett, California's first governor was a racist); going paperless; and the search for a new superintendent (Superintendent Tom Johnstone will retire in June after 10 years with the District). The Board will meet Feb. 8 to vet candidates, with 28 applicants currently for the position.

Deputy Superintendent Chris Jones updated the Board on that day's visit to the campus by half of the students from Dana. He said the students toured each of the building's four floors with three student tour guides, one from each Da Vinci high school. He noted that it "was an exciting day" because it gave Dana students a first-hand look at each school and the learning that was taking place. "On each floor, they [the student tour guides] focused on what is interesting, different about a particular one of the schools and then they also had a chance to talk about where things are similar and where there is interaction [between each high school]," Jones said. "I heard some really positive comments, kind of excitement about getting to high school -but also just kind of a wow factor of I think

A resident in town since 1996 and graduate of El Segundo High School, Nicol is a local real estate agent and restaurant owner who is married with two children. He joined the El Segundo Planning Commission in 2012 and previously served on the Environmental Committee, Centennial Committee and El Segundo Unified School District Superintendent's Roundtable. He is also a 10-year member and former president of Kiwanis where he has helped raise over \$350,000 for children in El Segundo. "I know I have more to offer my community," he wrote in his candidate statement. "My candidacy is rooted in a desire to support the town that I love at a higher level." Nicol added that growing up and volunteering in town makes him uniquely suited to represent the community. "I believe that by attracting and retaining businesses that are good neighbors while promoting the vitality of our downtown, we can achieve a financially healthy El Segundo that sustains our small-town charm," he stated. "I will also work with public safety officials to ensure a standard of excellence is upheld."

A six-year resident who is married with three children, Pimentel is a risk management executive and a combat veteran who worked with the Department of Homeland Security, large corporate consultancies and major media companies to "protect people and organizations from threats of terrorists and risks of mismanagement." He also coached local Little League and soccer. "I've heard the common message: we have a great city that is facing major challenges," his candidate statement reads. "How do we open our doors to growth without risking the heritage that makes our town unique? How do we keep our neighborhoods safe and honor our commitments to our protectors? How do we provide the services that our seniors and students deserve? I am confident by listening, asking questions and shared hard work, these problems are solvable and the battles our winnable. We can attract the investment to grow our local economy, we can work with our responders to build a secure community, and we can fund the services our seniors deserve."

Individuals who pulled papers but chose not to file include former City Council members Marie Fellhauer and Mike Robbins, retired El Segundo Police Captain Bob Turnbull, retired Executive Assistant to the Police Chief Margie Randall, and former Recreation and Parks Commissioner Cindee Topar.

The filing period ran from Dec. 18 to Jan. 12, but then extended through Jan. 17 when the two incumbents did not return their paperwork. Two of the four candidates will be elected to the Council in April. A week after the election, the new Council will vote to appoint the next Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem.

According to the City Clerk's office, sample ballots will be mailed out between March 12 and 20. Candidates must provide a rundown of campaign contributions on March 1, March 29 and April 9.

Measure C, the proposed sales tax increase also on the April ballot, will be addressed in an upcoming article. •

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

Eagles Look to Rebound in Second Half

The first round of the Ocean League schedule wrapped up last night for the El Segundo Eagles. It didn't go quite as planned for the basketball teams, but both soccer teams have done well and the girls water polo team is

The boys basketball team had gone 12-4 before starting a rigorous Ocean League schedule that included games against Culver City, Beverly Hills, Lawndale and Santa Monica. All those teams were ranked in their respective divisions this season and the Eagles needed to play perfect basketball to compete. With injuries to two starters, it was a challenge for El Segundo.

With losses to Culver City and Beverly Hills already, the Eagles faced a tough and physical Lawndale team on the road and came up one point short of an Ocean league victory in losing 37-36. The Eagles played brilliant defense all game long and had a one-point lead and eight seconds left on the clock. The final defensive stand fell short as Lawndale hit a buzzer-beater with no time left to earn the victory.

In addition to the painful buzzer-beater loss, El Segundo junior captain Miles Jones was lost for the season with an injury he sustained in the third quarter. In his absence, junior forward Dylan Aubert led the way with 18 points and hit the key free throws to put the Eagles up one in the closing moments of the game.

The injury to Jones comes at a real inopportune time since junior forward Michael Lynch has been out for a few games with a concussion and isn't expected back until this week. So with the Eagles not having their top scorer and top rebounder, the future looks to be a challenge going forward.

El Segundo got its first league win against Hawthorne by a score of 38-17 to improve to 13-8 overall and it puts the team in contention for a CIF playoff berth. The Eagles played with tenacious defense that held the Cougars to a meager 23 percent shooting from the field. El Segundo also forced 16 turnovers.

The Eagles went on a 7-0 run to start the second quarter and led 13-3. Ben Peterson came off the bench to hit a long three-pointer to give El Segundo a 16-4 lead before halftime. With Jones and Lynch out the rest of the game, the team picked up its defensive effort and it paid off.

Dylan Aubert's trio of three-pointers gave the Eagles an insurmountable 28-11 in the third quarter and the team went on for an easy win. Aubert led his team with 18 points and seven rebounds, while Kyle Freeman and Elijah Mark each had six points.

Second-year head coach David March has done an incredible job with his team. The style of defense he has employed is the stingiest in the CIF Southern Section Division 4AA. El Segundo gives up an average of 35.4 points per game, which is the best in the entire division.

With their 13th win of the season the Eagles became automatically playoff-eligible, but would have to await the decision of the pairings committee at the end of the season to see if they advance.

March had this to say about his team: "I am very proud of the group for staying together and handling the adversity of the season. We have dealt with losing key guys due to injury and illness, but our team chemistry has stayed high and other players continue to step up. Even after two buzzer-beater losses in the last five games, these guys have stayed positive and focused towards our goal of making the playoffs."

The Eagles faced Samo last night and travel to Culver City Friday night before wrapping up their regular home schedule next week against Beverly Hills on Wednesday and Lawndale next Friday with tip off at 7:30 p.m.

Lady Eagles Get First League Win

El Segundo has struggled to get wins this season. With wins over Lawndale 42-39 and Hawthorne 68-29 in the Ocean League, things could be going its way heading into the final stretch of the regular season.

Lawndale's success over the past three seasons has averaged 18 wins per season. The Lady Eagles had lost four consecutive times to the Cardinals, but it all changed on the road. In a tight game with nine lead changes and the teams tied going into the fourth period, El Segundo got a late lead and held on for the victory.

Reese Jones led all scorers with 11 points and pulled down 10 rebounds. Hannah Chang sank five of six free throws and Makaela Bordieri had five steals and three assists to lead the Lady Eagles.

El Segundo had its best scoring game of the year against Hawthorne when it defeated the Cougars 68-29. Remicia Germeille scored two buckets as the Lady Eagles outscored their guests 23-0 to start the game. Chang's three-pointer closed out the first quarter to make it 28-6. Kristen Tusbaki, who led all scorers with 13 points, sank a three-pointer to extend her team's lead as El Segundo outscored Hawthorne 20-0 in the second quarter.

Head coach Randy Kiehm emptied his bench in the second quarter and throughout the second half. All 11 players who played scored. Besides Tusbaki's career-high game, Chang had 11 points, Reese Jones had nine points, and Germeille and Kayla Smith-Petty each had six points to lead their team.

The Lady Eagles played host to Santa Monica last night and are on the road on Friday. They'll wrap up their home schedule next week by hosting Beverly Hills next Wednesday and Lawndale next Friday. Both games are set for a 6 p.m. tipoff.

Soccer Teams Thriving In League Play



The Eagles had their best scoring game in over three seasons when they pounded out a 6-2 win over Hawthorne. The last time El Segundo scored six goals in one game was against Gardena in a 6-0 win on Dec. 9, 2014. Against Hawthorne, the Eagles scored three

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The Lonzo Ball Effect on the LA Lakers

Nowadays, mentioning the last name of Ball may have the tendency to elicit feelings of annoyance as LaVar Ball's smug smile and constant commitment to bravado likely are the first things that come to mind. Very quietly, though, LaVar's son, Lonzo, is living up to the hype of the number two pick in the draft whether Lakers naysayers choose to acknowledge it or not. Lonzo, who is the only Ball family member that anyone should even care about, is proving himself as much by being off of the court as he has proven himself on it. Though he is only 20 years young and just a rookie in a league that is full of grown men and proven veterans, Lonzo has quickly established himself to be this year's most valuable player on the Los Angeles Lakers roster.

The Laker rookie point guard came of college at UCLA and quickly turned into one of the most polarizing players in all of the NBA. Whether that's because of his father's incessant gabbing or the game that he brings to the hardwood may never be fully determined, but Lonzo has certainly developed a knack to absorb scrutiny for anything and everything that he does with a basketball in his hands.

Coming out of college, the knock on Lonzo was that his jump shot would never make it in the NBA. In his first month or two in the league, Lonzo seemed to be proving all who knocked him right. His shooting percentage was in the cellar, his three-point percentage was horrible and his jump shot...well, if you've ever seen it, it certainly speaks for itself.

Despite what those who are paid to speak might make up about Ball, it is clear that his presence on the basketball court is extremely valuable to his team. That fact can even be seen to be represented in his one year with the Bruins. While at UCLA, Lonzo's natural instincts had the clear ability to lead to efficient outcomes in the game. In the one and only year that Ball played for the Bruins, the team's offensive efficiency increased 49 spots. Teammates like T.J. Leaf, Ike Anigbogu and Thomas Welsh, who hadn't been heard of before Ball took the court, have not been heard from since. In addition to putting up his own stats once he became comfortable in the system, Lonzo made everyone around him better with his tendency to pass first and his brilliant court vision.

Sure, Ball may have struggled in his first few months with the Lakers, but it's important to remember that even Kobe Bryant struggled while showing flashes in his first year in Hollywood as well. Lonzo will never be Kobe, but now that he has settled in a bit, his value to the team has presented itself in more ways than one.

"This is why I think if you asked anyone in our organization all year about Lonzo's shooting struggles, we'd tell you, 'He'll be fine,'" Lakers head coach Luke Walton explained of Ball's

effect on the team. "We know how important he is to us with the way he plays, the way he pushes the ball, the way he just hits whoever is open every time -- that's contagious."

Before Ball sprained his shoulder and was forced to sit out a few games, the Lakers averaged 23.2 assists per game as a team through their first 31 games. In one of the first games without Lonzo against the Memphis Grizzlies, the team recorded just 14 assists in a doubledigit loss. Without their point guard, the Lakers average less points per game, have a lower field goal percentage and a lower three-point percentage on offense. More notably, the team is much worse on defense in Ball's absence. The Lakers allow nearly 107 points per game with Lonzo and a staggering 124 without him. When Ball is on the floor, opponents shoot close to 44 percent from the field. Without him, they shoot near 52 percent. With a record that is well under 10 games below .500, it's not like the Lakers are necessarily setting the world on fire when Ball is out there on the court either. When he is, though, the team at least looks a bit more competitive, even against some of the better rosters from across the league.

The Lakers managed to attain their first win of the season without Lonzo last Friday night in a 99-86 victory over the Indiana Pacers that saw Jordan Clarkson finish with one of the best games of his career. That victory put the Lakers at 1-8 without Ball -- a record that shed light onto coach Walton's previous statement: "I think it's much harder to win without Lonzo, but it's not impossible. There's games that we could have won he hadn't played in. We just didn't finish them out." Walton was right. Not only did the Lakers win for the first time without Ball against the Pacers, but they made it two straight without their starting point guard when Clarkson increased his value by putting up 29 and 10 against the Knicks last Sunday afternoon for the team's second win in a row.

While his last name may allow others to simply rush to judgment and accuse him of being the worst player that the league has ever seen, it has become clear that Lonzo is the heartbeat of the Los Angeles Lakers, despite Clarkson's recent efficiency. Without him, Walton and the rest of the Lakers coaching staff hope to instill a mindset that will motivate others to make the extra pass and get other teammates involved. When Lonzo is in the game, however, those intangibles simply happen because of his natural instincts. Ball may not be the best player in the league and the Lakers may still have one of the worst records in the NBA, but numbers never lie. Those numbers plainly state that the Lakers are a much better team with their MVP -- and one of the most underrated players in the league -- stepping foot out on the basketball court.

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

The Sun is Also a Star by Nicola Yoon

Nicola Yoon's books have been on my "to-read" list for a while and finally I've gotten to enjoy her latest The Sun is Also a Star -- a fantastically witty, smart, quirky and inventive book that I'm not surprised was a National Book Award Finalist.

The story takes place mostly in a day and is told in alternating chapters, primarily between Natasha, an undocumented Jamaican teen with a passion for science; and Daniel, a Korean-American poetry lover who struggles with the high expectations of his immigrant parents.

Interspersed are glimpses into the lives of surrounding characters such as the security guard who checks Natasha's belongings as she enters a government building, or the waitress who serves the couple for lunch. Also included are entries from concepts like "Love" and the "Universe." All of these varying perspectives contribute to a feeling of interconnectedness and understanding that while we may not agree with a character's choices, we can understand why they might have made them. Similarly, Yoon doesn't shy away from thorny issues such as race, immigration and even depression and suicide, but deftly explores how characters grapple with these issues and find a way to move forward.

<u>Film Review</u>

Don't Worry, He Won't Get Far on Foot at **Sundance: A Cartoonist Finds Second Life**

I was lucky enough to attend the world premiere of American indie icon and film director Gus Van Sant's newest film, Don't Worry, He Won't Get Far on Foot, at this year's Sundance Film Festival. Based on the memoir of the same name, Van Sant brings the real-life story of John Callahan (Joaquin Phoenix) to the big screen. Callahan, the late cartoonist whose early battle with alcohol addiction eventually led to a drunk driving incident that would leave him in near fullbody paralysis and confined to a wheelchair for the rest of his life, would use the limited mobility of his arms to go on to find catharsis in drawing cartoons - single-panel comics whose humor would come from illustrating the often wincingly dark absurdities of life. Van Sant mixes Callahan's humor with a painfully honest journey to make a beautiful portrait of how one finds solace in the face of tragedy, giving credence to the old saying that tragedy is just comedy plus time.

Van Sant, who wrote the screenplay of the film as well, gives Callahan's story an impressionistic wash, intercutting wheelchair Callahan's present-day wheelchair confinement with the earlier chapters of his life through flashback form. We see a younger Callahan guzzling booze straight by group sponsor Donnie (Jonah Hill), and it's here that the film finds its counterbalance to Callahan's reckless, untamed nature. Donnie, with long, flowing, spiritually enlightened blonde locks, is both sagely and sympathetic to the group -- and especially Callahan, whose scenes together prove master classes in performance. It's exciting to see Hill continue to surprise audiences with his film choices, as this performance is as equally fearless and honest as Phoenix's.

It should be pointed out that Don't Worry, He Won't Get Far on Foot is somewhat of a difficult watch -- not in a disturbing way, which some thematic elements are, but more that the film feels very much like a labor of love and is intentionally laborious. The emotional heft and weight that the movie brings can only be assumed to honor both Callahan as well as the person who first brought the project to Van Sant to star in back in the nineties. The late Robin Williams, who previously starred in Van Sant's Good Will Hunting, was also a comedian battling his own demons, and the film would remain in development for 20 years until Williams' untimely passing. Van Sant honors the artist's emotional journeys of the struggle to find meaning in the wake of tragedy (the film is dedicated to Williams) and shows that through self-forgiveness and

from the bottle, moments of the drunk driving incident with friend and enabler Dexter (Jack Black), and his physical therapy exercises with would-be lover Annu (Rooney Mara), as well as the story of Callahan entering a support group for his alcohol addiction. The recurring support group scenes prove to be the emotional core of the movie and lift the story from a standard biopic to a character study in therapeutic discovery and healing.

Bringing Callahan to the big screen in fearless form is Phoenix, who once again proves a master in being able to shape-shift into and humanize the oddball characters that he inhibits. Phoenix as the irreverent Callahan plays both sides of the aisle in a character whose devil-may-care benders evoke those of Hunter S. Thompson's. He's silly and funny, evoking his hippie stoner of Inherent Vice, but he also drifts into the emotionally conflicted soldier returned from war as seen in The Master. Phoenix in full-body paralysis is forced to confront his demons while attending addiction groups led

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

After student representative to the board Jake Nichols made his report, the third presentation of the evening also involved El Segundo High, with first-year principal Jennifer Tedford and her team discussing the redesign of the Business Pathway program at the school. The program was initiated in the 2013-14 school year and is aimed at students looking to pursue possible college and career options in economics, finance, accounting, marketing and other business-related programs.

Tedford spoke about the business-friendly scenario in El Segundo, which is ripe for expanding all of the business-related high school courses, as well as internships, that could be offered to prepare students for their matriculation after graduation. She also noted the different opportunities that will be explored, as she mentioned statistics delineating the fact that college students tend to focus on earning a Bachelor of Science in Business degree as they continue into college and their careers.

Tedford and her team answered questions about the reinvigorated Business Pathway, what it entails, and how El Segundo High students will reap the benefits of the program revamp. Aiding Tedford in the 30-minute presentation were counselor Stephanie Burns and teachers Bonnie Mae, Marcos Bolanos and Robin Espinosa.

Emailed Tedford prior to the meeting: "We have so much to celebrate at this school board meeting, including our cross country boys and girls teams who made it to CIF state finals, and our Business Pathway program, which has proposed changes in curriculum and staffing that will be a fantastic benefit to our students."

Post-presentation, El Segundo Unified School District (ESUSD) Superintendent Dr. Melissa Moore said she was very happy for all the work being done on the new pathway, the assembled instructional team members, and the fact that this type of pathway was not necessarily being offered in adjacent school districts. She felt this may make ESUSD a desirable spot for out-of-district students to consider attending.

The evening's final presentation, an audit report regarding the district's financials for the year ending June 30, 2017, was handled by Marcy Fimbres, an auditor with the accountancy firm of Christy White Associates. The report is mandated by the California Ed Code and must be made each year to the Board prior

Moore commented that she wanted to give kudos to the business department in the district, and all others involved with helping achieve a "clean audit" from the accountancy firm.

Tuesday's consent agenda included approval of numerous internship agreements for El Segundo High with local companies; an Eagles' Nest Preschool Aquarium Outreach Program assembly; and a DJ agreement with VoxDJs plus a food prep agreement with In-N-Out-Burger for services to be rendered at Friday night's El Segundo Middle School Winter Ball Dance. Moore spoke glowingly of the internship programs, which allow ESUSD students to work with and at the El Segundo Police Department, El Segundo Fire Department, and Kinecta Federal Credit Union, and gain job-related experience while still in school.

Also passed on the action item agenda was an agreement with PBK Architects for a school facilities support. This will also include work to "provide additional support to evaluate modernization eligibility and perform an initial assessment of eligibility for new construction funds" from the State of California.

At a price of 20,000, Moore noted that ESUSD is doing everything it can to leave "no stone unturned" to receive all possible monies from the State. She said potential dollars gained would offset any fees occurred to research and hire firms to aid in this endeavor.

The only information pending action item on the agenda, which will be brought back as an action item at the Feb. 13 meeting, was consideration of the Business Pathway program at El Segundo High. •

from getting the flu, according to health officials for the region.

Nearly half of Americans skip annual flu shots that some employers and health plans offer for free, according to U.S. Centers for Disease Control. For people with heart disease, a flu shot can have an additional benefit. Studies have shown that a flu vaccination can prevent heart attacks, according to medical researchers. "When people hear the vaccine isn't that effective, they assume there's no point in getting it — and that's very frustrating," said Dr. Lehman at UCLA.

Public health officials in the United States and Great Britain have called for greater public-information campaigns to boost flu vaccinations among patients with known heart conditions. The British medical journal Heart reported in October 2016 on the link between the flu and heart attacks. A "wealth of studies shows that heart attack risk is significantly increased within days of contracting the flu, and risk remains elevated for up to a year," the paper's authors wrote. In fact, their data showed that a flu shot was as effective at preventing a heart attack as quitting smoking or regularly taking cholesterol medicine. An annual flu vaccine can reduce cardiac risk by 19 to 45 percent, they found. In comparison, cholesterol-controlling medication lowers the risk by 25 to 30 percent, the authors wrote.

Even with its limited effectiveness, the current flu shot should ward off the more serious effects of the strong H3N2 virus making the rounds this month, health experts say. Healthy vaccinated children and adults may still experience a fever, cough and several days of discomfort. The current strain of flu is called the A variety, and the annual flu shot is most effective against the B type, according to health officials. A B-type of flu could make the rounds here in late winter or early

spring, they caution.

The flu outbreak is waning, but it's not gone by a long shot, so health officials advise residents and caregivers of children or the elderly to recognize the signs of distress due to the current flu strain, and to take emergency action if necessary. That includes these warnings from the UCLA School of Medicine:

- Elderly and people with compromised immune systems need to pay special attention to flu symptoms.
- Dehydration is a main danger because it can set off a chain reaction that makes it harder for the body to defend itself.

"If children, the elderly and immunocompromised people don't get enough fluids -- or if they can't keep food and drink down -- they need more help than a parent or other caregiver can provide," UCLA health professionals caution.

Seek medical attention if a person with the flu has difficulty breathing or their breathing becomes fast. Children who are unusually irritable or sleepy should see a doctor right away, too.

Frequent hand-washing during the cold and flu season can help health people not get sick, experts say. Getting adequate sleep, exercise and eating a balanced diet also are keys to warding off cold and flu germs, they say. These common viruses spread in families, schools and offices through sneezing and contact with surfaces.

The county public health office lists the flu's symptoms as: fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headaches and fatigue. It adds that pneumonia is the most common complication of the flu, which can worsen asthma or heart disease. This year's H3N2 virus is responsible for at least 36 deaths in the county so far, compared with 13 deaths at this time a year

ago, according to the county health department.

L.A. County offers flu clinics to South Bay residents at two locations through Feb. 18. Call the Curtis Tucker Health Center in Inglewood at (310) 419-5325 or Torrance Health Center at (310) 354-2300 for clinic appointments. The public health centers are open weekdays and see patients on a first-come, first-served business.

During the first two weeks of January, nine percent of all emergency room visits were for flu symptoms and more serious complications, county officials said last Friday. Flu, like the seasons, follow a distinct pattern where these nasty bugs run hot and cold, the county's weekly "Influenza Watch" revealed in its Jan. 19 bulletin. "In a typical flu season, illnesses caused by influenza A viruses predominate early in the season," it

said, adding that the B-type viruses come in a second wave later in the flu season, which runs from October to May.

The H3N2 type-A virus peaked earlier than usual, officials say, and is widespread across the contiguous 48 states. It has contributed to 96 deaths -- mostly among older residents in their 80s -- as of Jan. 19, according to the county health department.

The CDC says that colds and flus are easily confused, though both are upper respiratory illnesses. Flus are worse than common colds, with more severe and intense symptoms, federal health officials say. The telltale sign of the flu is a fever, while a cold is more likely to bring on a runny nose or stuffed sinuses, the CDC says. "Colds generally do not result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections or hospitalizations," it adds. •

seeing the programs going on during the day and the learning that's going on during the day as they were walking around, and sort of a blend of all. That's what's really impressive. You can see -- even if you're looking through glass -- you can see the interaction that's going on, with often students leading a discussion or making a presentation so even if you're not inside that room you can see the seriousness of the activity and what they're doing, the concentration, the engagement," Jones told the Board.

Another staff member said it was interesting to hear the Dana students talk about the visit afterward, saying they thought they'd like to attend a specific Da Vinci high -- but after the tour, they were also considering another one of the Da Vinci high schools on the campus now that they knew more about what each one offers. Dana students

were transported to the campus in two school buses and divided into 16 different groups to ensure an intimate experience. The other half of Dana students will visit the school in early February. Board President JoAnne Kaneda thanked Jones for the information, saying, "This represents the sort of interaction and movement, communication, we're hoping to have in our district."

Superintendent Johnstone brought up a recent email he received addressing the aforementioned Peter Burnett's known racist beliefs, saying he researched a Sir Robert Burnett who was a land owner of Centinela Valley property after purchasing some from the Avila family in 1938. He said he would do more research on Sir Robert Burnett's background to see if Burnett Elementary School could change its namesake from Peter to Sir Robert. •

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
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BLT Salmon Caesar Salad

I won't get too graphic, but the sores and inflammation were so bad that I didn't even want to be touched. I certainly was not adoptable in that condition and that's when the big-hearted MSFR folks rescued me. They took me straight to their veterinarian where several different skin tests were performed and the final diagnosis was that my condition was called demodectic mange with an ear infection. Thankfully it's not contagious, so I just spent a few days at the animal hospital receiving treatment. Amazingly, I responded so well that I was looking and feeling much better after only one treatment and a medicated bath. I should be all healed and ready for my new home mid-January. It's been a bit of a rough road for this four-year old, female, purebred Miniature Schnauzer, but I know the best is yet to come! If you're looking for a petite youngster to share your life, I'm definitely the sweet gal for you. I even get along with other dogs, but do just fine by myself."
