# **Boyles Looks Back on Mayoral Tenure**

At the first El Segundo City Council meeting of 2025 last week, Drew Boyles was back on the dais after his recent reelection to a third term, garnering the most votes in the town's history. Only this time, he did not take his familiar spot in the center seat as Mayor—a position he held since April 2018—and that suits him just fine. "I had a good run, and it was time," he said. "New Mayor Chris Pimentel has done an excellent job as Mayor Pro Tem over the last four-and-a-half years. He earned the opportunity and will be an outstanding leader for our city. Meanwhile, we still have plenty of work to do, and I'm excited to support him and the rest of my colleagues in this endeavor."

In assessing his over six-and-a-half years as Mayor, Boyles was proud of the Council's achievements and pleased with the current state of the City of El Segundo. Yet, to understand the scope of his accomplishments, he thought it important to look back at what led him to run for Council in the first place.

A successful long-time entrepreneur, Boyles owned and operated as many as three dozen 1-800-GOT-JUNK? Franchises and also founded HazAwayToday.com, among other ventures. As such, he became involved in the global Entrepreneurs' Organization and was president of the Los Angeles chapter in 2013 when then-Mayor Bill Fisher asked him to lend a hand in helping attract new businesses to El Segundo. "With the connections I had, I started bringing entrepreneurs to El Segundo to get their opinion of our community as well as promote our nimble, responsive, and business-friendly city," Boyles said. Encouraged to apply for a seat on the City's Economic Development Advisory Council (EDAC), he obliged. "I interviewed with the City Council, was appointed, and became Chair a few months later," Boyles said.

The two years on EDAC proved life-changing, as Boyles was instrumental in fostering El Segundo's new branding messages: "The Place Where Big Ideas Take Off" and "The

Most Important 5 Square Miles" in Los Angeles County. "We promoted our city through multiple media channels, courting hundreds of new businesses with the highest venture funding per square mile and the highest density of intellectual capital," he said.

Noting that business taxes make up an astounding 98 percent of the city's general fund revenues, Boyles said it was critical to tell a "compelling story" to entice new companies to settle here. The effort paid off, with many new and diverse businesses settling into town. It also left Boyles hungering to do more. "I never planned to get into politics, and it was a least likely scenario... but after experiencing successes with EDAC and learning more about the City, I became less skeptical of local government and was convinced I could have a meaningful impact on the city I love," he explained,

Boyles ran for Council in 2016, won as the op vote-getter, and promptly earned selection as Mayor Pro Tem at his very first meeting. His colleagues appointed him Mayor in 2018 and did so on two additional occasions. Bringing his business acumen to the table, he made it a priority to emphasize the importance of viewing both residents and businesses as "coveted customers" with the goal to "innovate and deliver top-notch services." He championed the Net Promoter Score process to survey local constituents to measure their levels of satisfaction with City services across all categories. "I pioneered accessibility and approachability, bringing information to the public through a variety of means," Boyles said. "It was always important to me that we do our best to anticipate our constituents' questions, comments and needs and get in front of it. This is still a work in progress for us."

With a better understanding of resident and business needs, Boyles and the Council targeted several key areas. In public safety, the group approved and recruited an all-time high sworn police officer budgeted headcount (72) while investing in the latest crime-solving technologies such as drones, live 911, pursuit

The city brought on a full-time Emergency Services Coordinator (an idea he credited his predecessor, Mayor Suzanne Fuentes, for promoting) to bolster disaster preparedness. "During Covid, we were the gold standard for preparedness, communication, and execution, releasing video updates daily," Boyles said.

The Council also ratified arbitration agreements with all seven collective bargaining units (the first city in LA County to do so). "We first had to restore relationships, as we were at an impasse in union negotiations and also needed to achieve structural compensation changes," Boyles \said. "We have improved relationships over time while reaching concessions both sides can live with."

Under Boyles, the city continued to analyze, discuss, and negotiate concessions with LAX. These included improvements to the Residential Sound Insulation (RSI) program and working to reduce local adverse impacts from aircraft gate capacity increases, Imperial Highway restoration, and future planned projects.

While continuing to promote El Segundo as a high-tech business hub, Boyles stressed the need to maintain the community's small-town character. He traveled to Sacramento and advocated regionally to lobby against split housing

She was active in her church, Baycities SouthBay, where most recently she volunteered at a local elder care facility, reading scripture and providing

discourse to explain the passages and how they apply to us today. She once told her family that she was older than most in the care facility.

Her pastime was filled with Scrabble games, puzzles, Bible study, family visits, and extensive local and world travel. She will be remembered as a loving, caring, and generous matriarch, always ready for a new adventure, however big or small.

Rose was a true blessing to all who knew her, and her family is comforted knowing she is in God's heavenly kingdom, worshiping and praising the Lord.

# **Board Highlights District Financials For 2025-2028**

The Jan. 28 Board of Education meeting was a limited affair, clocking in at just over 30 minutes for one of the shortest board meetings in recent memory. It came less than a week after district Superintendent Jason Johnson led a special workshop on Jan. 22 to revisit his 100-day action plan and outline future priorities for board governance. Several students attended the workshop to offer insight and feedback, including ESHS ASB President Grady Lubs.

Key 2025-2028 district goals and priorities emerged from the workshop, including the improvement of vertical articulation from the elementary to high school levels – especially concerning mathematics – fostering more funding and support for the special education department, and refocusing on the district's

sports programs to help with the retention of student-athletes. Johnson also emphasized tending to the district's ongoing challenges, such as balancing the budget, completing facility improvements, and navigating political and social dynamics on campus.

President Frank Glynn kicked off the Jan. 28 meeting by announcing the suspension of one of the district's permanent classified employees. The suspension, which will be served over three days without pay, was approved unanimously by all five board members.

Meanwhile, external auditor John Whitehouse from Christie White and Associates delivered a mandatory audit report for the fiscal year 2023-2024. His report outlined how the district's net position reflected an **See School Board, page 4** 

# **Protecting Seniors from Scammers: A Growing Threat**

In an increasingly connected world, seniors are becoming prime targets for scammers who use sophisticated tactics to exploit their trust and digital unfamiliarity. According to the FBI, elder fraud accounted for over \$3.4 billion in losses in 2023, and experts warn this number could grow exponentially in the years to come. While technology has brought immense benefits, it has also opened doors for malicious actors to victimize some of the most vulnerable members of our society.

This issue hits particularly close to home for me. Someone very dear to me fell victim to a scam last year, losing \$27,000 of his life savings. The emotional toll was devastating, and the experience inspired me to write "Cybersecurity for Seniors Made Easy". My goal is to empower seniors and their families with the knowledge and tools they need to protect themselves in today's digital landscape.

### Why Seniors Are Targeted

Seniors are often targeted for several reasons. Many grew up in a time when trustworthiness and personal connections were more common. Scammers exploit this generational trait, assuming older adults may be more likely to trust strangers. Additionally, seniors are more likely to have accumulated savings, making them attractive financial targets.

The rapid pace of technological change has also left many seniors struggling to keep up, creating gaps in digital literacy that scammers can exploit. Common schemes such as phishing emails, fraudulent tech support calls, and romance scams rely on confusion and fear to manipulate their victims.

### **Common Scams Targeting Seniors**

Some of the most prevalent scams targeting older adults include:

Phishing Emails and Text Messages: These fraudulent communications appear to come from trusted sources like banks, government agencies, or tech companies. They often ask for sensitive information or prompt the victim to click a malicious link.

**Tech Support Scams**: Scammers impersonate tech support agents, convincing victims that their devices are compromised and charging them for unnecessary or fake services.

**Romance Scams**: These scams prey on loneliness, with fraudsters building trust over time before asking for money under false pretenses.

**Grandparent Scams**: Impersonators pretend to be a grandchild in distress, urgently requesting financial assistance.

Lottery or Sweepstakes Scams: Victims are told they've won a prize but must pay upfront fees or taxes to claim it.

El Segundo's soccer team had an important Bay League game when they faced off against the Redondo Union Sea Hawks for the third time this season. The two teams had split their previous games, with El Segundo winning 4-3 in 2OT but suffering a 4-0 defeat in the rematch. The Eagles came into this matchup itching to settle the score, but unlike their last two meetings, this would be on El Segundo's turf. After a scoreless first half, the Sea Hawks scored two second-half goals and defeated the Eagles 2-0.

In the first half, Redondo constantly knocked on the doorstep as waves of pressure kept El Segundo's defense on high alert. With stellar play by defenders Erik Fallon and Max Abroms, the Eagles neutralized Redondo's first-half offense.

The Eagles also produced plenty of attack ing opportunities. Their offense kept on the gas, applying pressure to Redondo's defense through a mix of counterattacks, set pieces, and dangerous crosses. The biggest chance of the half came early on, when in the fifth minute, junior midfielder Kai Fujimoto struck

a half volley with conviction, barely missing wide left. After 40 minutes of play, the Eagles went into halftime tied 0-0.

approximate \$2.2 million deficit over the last fiscal year; expenses of \$68.4 million exceeded revenues of \$66.2 million, creating the shortfall. Post-audit, Whitehouse noted the rendering of three unmodified opinions on the district's federal and state compliance, and the financial statements overall. "An unmodified opinion is the best opinion you can receive from an external audit firm," explained Whitehouse.

Unanimous approval of the audit served as the Board's first action item, authorizing its submission to state agencies. Additionally, Chief Business Official Kimberlie Linz was officially designated by the Board, in a 5-0 vote, to serve as the district's official designee to submit applications for modernization and construction funding to the state allocation board.

Over at El Segundo High School, semester two is now officially underway. Students were gifted a morality boost during finals week, with ASB distributing lifesavers wrapped with notes of encouragement before exams were taken, cleverly dubbed "chill pills" for a dose of positivity and encouragement. The new semester promises several exciting upcoming events, including the school's first Winter Formal dance in many years on Saturday, Feb. 1, and the return of "Gundo's Got Talent," promising many exciting performances.

With a limited slate of action items, board reports took center stage for the remainder of the meeting. Board members maintain an active slate of community involvements each week, often using their reports to spotlight major community updates and schedule highlights. Within the past two weeks, President Glynn attended the governor's budget workshop in Anaheim to confirm the future security of state educational funding and attended a roundtable discussion at ESHS to integrate state-mandated ethnic studies into the tenth-grade English curriculum, among other engagements.

Vice President Tracey Miller-Zarneke attended multiple PTA meetings, noting the continuation of wildfire relief donation drives across the district. She also issued a reminder that the ESMS Winter Ball pop-up shop is still accepting clothing donations, serving as a green initiative for the next generation of student partygoers. Board Clerk Dieema Wheaton used a portion of her update to commend the mothers and daughters of El Segundo's National Charity League (NCL) chapter for assembling care packages for those affected by the wildfires and acknowledged El Segundo's firefighters for their continued bravery on the front lines.

Board members also welcomed Richelle Squire, the newly appointed Board-Certified Behavior Analyst, to the team as an official ESUSD employee. Squire took to the podium and cited the rigorous interview process as evidence of the district's commitment to compassion and care, further noting that during her first day on the job, she knew ESUSD was the right fit for her after interacting with students and staff firsthand.

"This is a community where you will be embraced," said Wheaton in her welcoming statement. "We are happy that you are now part of our family." •







# <u>Film Review</u>

### Maria Review:

### The Songbird Leaves the Cage

Director Pablo Larraín completes his trilogy of tragically glamorous women biopics in Maria, the story of famed opera singer Maria Callas. His first entry came in 2016 with the Natalie Portman-led Jackie, based on First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy, as she fights through grief and trauma post-JKF assassination. In 2021, Larraín crafted a stunning portrait of Princess Diana in Spencer. The film starred Kristen Stewart who gave a riveting performance as the headstrong Lady Di, earning her an Oscar nomination for Best Actress. On the heels of such positivity and accolades for Larraín's previous biopics, it seemed obvious that Maria, starring Angelina Jolie, would be another electrifying entry. However, with only one Oscar nomination for cinematography, it seems the operatic force of *Maria* has fallen on deaf ears.

Running just over two hours long, Maria tells the story of the world's greatest opera singer. The film takes place one week before her untimely death and recounts the last days of her life in 1970s Paris. Despite her glamorous public facade, the film uncovers that behind closed doors, Maria's life was anything but pitch perfect. Her unresolved health issues, tumultuous love life, and identity as a singer who now struggles to perform at her previous standards, envelop her in heartache and tragedy. Her goddess-like demeanor and ethereal voice mask a somberness that affects the life of a creative. The pain is never far away, but accessing that pain is exactly what makes Maria's art so poignantly beautiful.



Maria Callas offers something of a comeback for Angelina Jolie, whose last role was playing Thena in 2021's Eternals. Maria is a role that Jolie seems born to play. From her striking beauty to her American-Greek accent, Jolie seems to effortlessly transform into the complex headspace of the tortured singer. She brings out a sensitivity and humanness that makes us feel like we understand the inner workings of Callas' mind. However, the appeal of Jolie playing the titular prima donna is also the film's biggest distraction.

It's quite contradictory. The scenes when Maria Callas is in dialogue with journalist Mandrax (Kodi Smit-McPhee), her housekeeper Bruna (Alba Rohrwacher), and her secret lover Aristotle Onassis (Haluk Bilginer), is when the film feels strongest. It only takes Jolie mimicking Callas' extraordinary operatic singing for reality to kick in and pop any suspension of disbelief. Despite her best efforts, these moments look like obvious miming. It's very apparent that Jolie isn't singing and while this isn't a knock on her performance as a whole, these moments come off as overstriving and caricaturistic.

Maria blends the workings of a traditional biopic with surreal hallucinations and flashbacks, giving the film a unique narrative structure. Fans of classical music will find that Maria stays true to preserving the magic of the art form by showcasing it in such an aspirational and grandiose manner. Every song on the film's soundtrack is devastatingly beautiful, and I've had it on repeat ever since watching the film. Maria may not have earned a standing ovation as far as the Academy's voting body is concerned, but there is no denying that director Pablo Larraín is a master storyteller. And to Angelina Jolie, who brought Maria Callas to life by exposing her genius and singular talent to younger audiences, I say Bravo! •



Helen's careful life plods along with her scheduling a life around Gils availability and settling for second best and leftovers. But between the lines the reader senses there is a hunger in Helen for more and that she is on the perimeter of a life that is about to change.

Shortly after being admitted to Westbury Park hospital, William's Aunt dies. Helen takes it upon herself to find out more about William's past while at the same time encouraging him to attend her art therapy class. As she tackles William's past, her present life becomes clearer, and she sees that there are many ways a human can be mentally and physically restrained.

There are other beautiful characters in this book that bring color and vibrancy to this emotionally absorbing story that is layered with forgiveness, acceptance and joy.

I am personally looking forward to reading more from Clare Chambers and recommend this book if you enjoy insightful books about found family.

to protect single-family home neighborhoods.

In the realm of finances, the city's general fund grew from \$65 million to \$93 million over the last eight years with no tax increases to residents. Reserves also swelled to a historic high of \$25 million. This is despite the negative effects of the pandemic. "We also reduced our overall pension expense by over \$100 million through debt restructuring and aggressive pay-down tactics," Boyles added. The city additionally secured its first-ever AAA bond rating from Standard & Poors.

Regarding education, Boyles and the Council renewed their relationship with school districts. The city partnered through a joint-use agreement to invest in restoring The Plunge and operating the El Segundo Wiseburn Aquatics Center.

Boyles was pleased to note that the capital improvement budget grew from zero dollars in 2016 to \$35 million to fund projects such as The Plunge, Fire Station 1, the new entry sign at Main and Imperial, Rec Park field lighting upgrades, roadway improvements, a

data fiber ring, and the upcoming Teen Center renovations, among others. "We also invested heavily in data security, redundancy strategies, and broadband accessibility," he said.

Boyles pointed out that building relationships outside El Segundo proved crucial in making headway in various areas. "I worked with the federal government, the state, LA County, LA City, and other municipalities to help our city fight LAX expansion, Hyperion inadequacies, unbridled and unbounded housing mandates, and support for grants and infrastructure improvements (e.g., the award-winning El Segundo Boulevard rehabilitation subsidized by outside monies). In addition to serving as Mayor, Boyles was also Chair of the South Bay Cities Council of Governments and was a member of more than 10 local and regional councils, committees, and commissions representing El Segundo's interests.

"When I first ran for office in 2016, I promised to improve public safety and protect our small-town charm. Strengthen our financial stewardship and build back our relationship with the school district," Boyles said. "I am proud to say we accomplished all of the above. As a Council member for the next four years, my goal is to help our city continue to move forward and build upon the good work we've

He added "From the beginning, my wife, Lee, and my five kids, Ryan, Patrick, Dylan, Brynn and Merrick, have been incredibly understanding and supportive of my endless pursuit of new challenges, and this is no different. They have been my advisors and my foundation, and I'm not sure I could have done it without them. It definitely wouldn't have been as enjoyable. And my mother, Val Smith, has been a huge supporter. Finally, thank you to my core campaign committee - Heidi Weis, Tracey Miller-Zarneke, Lindsey Breeden, Patty & Jeff Brown, Eric Stoker, Chris Tichy, Mike Durand, Allen Smerdjian, Barry Gribbon, Michele Leach, Serena Burton, former Mayors Eric Busch, Dick VanFranken, Bill Bue. Suzanne Fuentes, Carl Jacobson, Bill Fisher, the late great Sandy Jacobs, former Councilman Scot Nicol, and somany others. Thank you to my amazing family, friends, and community!"

Reflecting on Boyles' contributions, Mayor Pimentel noted that there has only been a trio of three-term mayors in the history of El Segundo. "Mayor Boyles' energy, creativity, and business acumen made him the man of the moment. And none of this happened in a vacuum. At the same time, he understood the leadership challenges of the pandemic, social dynamism, and the changes in how residents interact with their government. His efforts to modernize and enhance how government communicates—through social media, reporting apps, newspapers, emails, and face-to-face coffees, are a fitting legacy for a natural people person." •
