# A Day in the Life of the New Pool

It was 5 a.m. on Monday, April 29, pitch dark with no semblance of sun expected in sight for over an hour. Most of us with even semi-normal schedules were still sound asleep, at least an hour or two away from coffee and not yet ready to welcome in the new workweek. But at that pre-dawn moment, staff had already convened at the City of El Segundo Wiseburn Unified School District Aquatics Center (Aquatics Center) to prep for opening. Three lifeguards, a senior lifeguard and a cashier were raring to go to begin the morning ritual, or what Recreation Coordinator Linnea Palmer refers to as "opening procedures." This entails pulling 16 covers off the 10-lane, 53-meter pool, setting up pace clocks and turning on the scoreboard.

The first groups began shuffling in shortly before 5:45 a.m. They included members of Southern California Aquatics (SCAQ), the largest masters swimming program in the country with a strong El Segundo component; and Tower 26, which specializes in triathlon swim training. They used the pool until 8 a.m. and 7 a.m. respectively. Water and Deep Water Aerobics classes took place between 7:30 a.m. and 9:15 a.m. Tower 26 returned to use the pool between 11:30 and 12:45 p.m., with SCAQ masters swimming another hour between noon and 1 p.m.

With schools and clubs taking up the lion's share of afternoon and evening time, the mornings present the most opportunities for different groups and individual users to grab some pool space. "We are getting quite a few regulars and new people calling and stopping in," Palmer noted. "Each day, we are getting busier and busier, so I expect a crowd come summertime. We have been able to host quite a few swim meets, including league finals and prelims for

high school, the first Los Angeles Junior Lifeguard test and our first CIF water polo game."

Meanwhile getting back to this past Monday, the City continued to provide the constant staffing of three lifeguards, a senior lifeguard and cashier at all times throughout the day and evening (with replacements as shifts changed). The lifeguards oversaw both the competition and smaller instructional pool and made sure to maintain the proper chemical mixes. The "mid-day" procedures included pulling out 50-meter lane lines, moving two bulkheads to mid-pool length and putting in 18 25-yard lane lines. Mid-programming operations required staff to pull all 18 lines out for water polo, attach water polo goals to the bulkheads, and pull out flags.

By the afternoon, specific groups began to utilize their designated time slots. First up was El Segundo High swim practice from 2 to 5 p.m. The Wiseburn-Da Vinci seminar swim class followed from 3 to 4 p.m., with the Wiseburn-Da Vinci High swim team practice going from 4 to 6 p.m. The joint-use agreement for the facility guarantees each of the school districts three hours of weekday use during these desired hours.

With the high schools eventually filtering out of the pool, the Alpha Aquatics swim club enjoyed two hours of time (5 to 7 p.m.), with Beach Cities Swim Club taking two hours from 6 to 8 p.m. The South Bay United Water Polo Club, amenable to off-peak hours, practiced from 7:15 to 9:15 p.m.

With the Aquatics Center wrapping up for the day, staff embarked on "closing procedures." Palmer said the process includes "putting 18 lane lines back in, putting away all pace clocks, putting away the water polo equipment, and putting back on the 16 pool covers." The pool covers are critical in keeping the water

temperature and chemicals stable, while also reducing maintenance costs associated with heating the pool or replacing evaporated water.

While most days are not totally predictable, the tasks noted above are certainly part of a necessary routine. Meanwhile, the Aquatics Center's popularity continues to grow. "We have sold 266 memberships since we have been open," Palmer reported. "Since selling the memberships, 2,320 check-ins have been done during our drop-in hours using passes." The facility has seen 1,074 adult, 220 youth and 132 senior drop-in visits. All this since early January.

early January. With so much attention on the new facility, what's the latest news on the longstanding Urho Saari Swim Stadium (The Plunge)? According to Recreation and Parks Director Meredith Petit, staff is in the midst of preparing a Request for Proposal (RFP) to solicit qualified aquatic design firms to compete a Scope Assessment and Feasibility Study towards which the El Segundo City Council had allocated \$100,000 this year. "The study will reveal renovation options for the City to consider, which will be based on community feedback, a technical review and condition assessment of the facility and programming goals," Petit said. "Now that the Aquatics Center is up and running, we need to better define the role of The Plunge to meet the needs of the community. This study will likely commence in August/September of this year and take about six months to complete." To get the financial ball rolling, El Segundo Unified School District has committed to help fund about a quarter of the renovation costs (up to \$1 million). Richard Lundquist and the South Bay Sports Health and Recreation nonprofit (instrumental in raising additional monies towards the Aquatics Center) also pledged to help raise funds. •

# **Chevron's Donation Buys Fire Department New Engine**

The El Segundo Fire Department received a donation from the Chevron refinery totaling \$758,720 that will be used to purchase a new fire engine. This is one of two donations that Chevron has pledged to the department, the other being a \$213,389 donation that will be used to purchase a new rescue ambulance. Both the fire engine and ambulance have been custom designed by El Segundo fire personnel to meet the unique demands of the community. The fire engine is being built by Pierce and will be identical to the 2016 fire engine in service today. The rescue ambulance is being built by Braun Northwest with custom design features like liquid suspension for patient comfort during transport to hospitals. El Segundo Fire Chief Chris Donovan stated, "These two purchases will complete the modernization of the entire El Segundo Fire Department fleet, placing the City in a solid position for the next 10 years." The City will be adding to the Chevron donation by purchasing another front-line rescue ambulance from Braun Northwest, placing a new fire engine and two new ambulances in

service by the end of the year. Chief Donovan indicated that between the generous donations from Chevron and State reimbursements from brush fire responses, no general fund dollars are being used for the \$1.1 million apparatus purchases. Donovan added, "The existing budget within the equipment replacement fund for a new fire engine can now be used for other purposes and it will be up to the City to determine how best to redistribute over \$225,000 that had been earmarked for the fire engine purchase."

Chevron El Segundo Refinery Manager of Corporate Affairs Rod Spackman remarked, "We were recently presented the opportunity to provide funding for a new fire engine and emergency ambulance for the El Segundo Fire Department. We have appreciated the opportunity to work collaboratively with the Chief and City in both identifying needed equipment and providing resources to further enhance the department's exceptional community emergency response capability."

# **Prosecutors Embody the Spirit of Mental Health Awareness Month**


Los Angeles County didn't wait for the start of May's National Mental Health Awareness Month to announce something that had never been tried before in California. Defendants with mental illness won't see the courtroom if they agree to get treatment.

District Attorney Jackie Lacey explained that L.A. County defendants can go through a mental health diversion program rather than go to trial if they qualify. Advocates for criminal-justice reform long have argued for more compassion for people with psychological and emotional disorders, urging courts to send those defendants into treatment programs rather than jail or prison populations.

"Our goal is to protect the public and to assist people in getting the mental health and other services they need to be productive members of our community," District Attorney Lacey said at the January launch of the mental-health legal unit.

Local prosecutors, judges and parole officers are being recruited to adopt a new mindset toward mental illness and how long sentences without treatment worsen people's conditions in jail and prisons. Inmates who go undiagnosed for episodes of bipolar or traumatic stress disorders -- both common among adults and youth -- often serve longer sentences because they act out and defy authority while they're incarcerated.

The prosecutorial review team is the latest effort in Los Angeles County to offer legal and physical protection for people with mental disorders. Lacey's office in October was honored for a partnership to train 1,400 police officers, sheriff's deputies and law enforcement personnel. The first responder training was a collaboration with the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health See Mental Health Awareness, page 13

## **Eagles Heading to the CIF Playoffs**

The El Segundo High School softball, baseball and boys volleyball teams are all headed to the CIF playoffs that started this week. The softball team shares its Ocean League title with Culver City, but will enter the playoffs as the number one team based on a coin flip. ## Wiseburn Board Looks at CGI Learning in Math at Burnett

#### By Duane Plank

Last Thursday evening the assembled members of the Wiseburn School Board gathered to view a special presentation helmed by Kim Jones, the principal at Peter Burnett Elementary. Captioned "Collaboration and Outreach to Support Learning in Mathematics," the 25-minute presentation also highlighted the largesse of the Wiseburn Education Foundation (WEF) in supporting funding for Wiseburn Unified School District programs.

Jones and her Burnett team of presenters, including special education teacher Madison Scar, fifth grade teacher Trisha Maano, and fifth grader and student council president Isabella Farrokh-Siar, talked about the utilization of Cognitive Guided Instruction (CGI) in the field

of mathematics, and how its tenets dovetail with districtwide goals and standards.

CGI, a recent phenomenon in the instructional toolbox in education, aims to bolster a student-centered approach to teaching math -- building on what students already know -- and expand their intuitive approaches to problem-solving. CGI instruction is based-on listening to students, answering their inquiries and engaging with student thinking, with the goal of uncovering and expanding student understanding.

The presentation delineated the Burnett goals, including building the capacity to support the implementation of CGI practices schoolwide; fostering data-driven formative instruction; and

leveraging the expertise of teacher-on-special assignment Andrea Kabwasa and content expert Danielle Moore.

Jones spoke of complementing the usage of textbooks with new best practices, as well "not teaching to the test," but teaching the students what they need to know. The hope is to build a foundation where the students take ownership of their learning, with creative partnerships in the classroom that will further teacher efficacy, ramp up personalized learning, and foster ongoing professional development for teachers.

In her time at the presentation podium, Maano reflected on her journey towards participation in the CGI program, evincing her excitement about the new instructional opportunities, allowing "students to become the teachers." She was effusive in her praise of the CGI-based initiative, citing how "this is a journey that we are all taking together." She said she embraced the cross-curricular tenets, "learning from each other," and noted how she was excited that "this is a journey that we are all taking together."

Next up, Wiseburn-Da Vinci Athletic Director Rogelio Diaz spoke of strides made in the athletic programs ramping up at Wiseburn High School, including the exploits of the swim team, the track team and the baseball team. Board member Nelson Martinez thanked Diaz and offered anything needed in terms of resources that the Board can add as the District enters the beginning phase of developing the Long-Range Facility Master-Plan (LRFMP).

Post the Burnett presentation and Diaz comments, members and District administrators reported out, culminating with comments from Superintendent Dr Blake Silvers.

Dr. Neil Goldman recognized the update from Diaz and the Burnett presentation. "Very impressive, very inspiring," he said. Member Israel Mora spoke of the recent exploits of the Da Vinci robotics team, with Vice President/Clerk Roger Banuelos adding to Mora's comments, pointing out that the Da Vinci robotics team had captured a world championship. Banuelos called the Burnett presentation "wonderful," and praised the poise of fifth grader Farrokh-Sir, who was featured in the video presentation. He also spoke of the synergy between the development of the robotics programs at the elementary schools with the opportunity for robotics students to continue participating "at an amazing level" as they ascend the Wiseburn education ladder. In her comments, Board President JoAnne Kaneda said that it was "pretty cool" that many successful facets of the Wiseburn educational experience were detailed in the first 45 minutes of the Board meeting. "Look at what we have managed to accomplish as a team," she said, noting a wide range of accomplishments.

Assistant Superintendent, Educational Services Dr. Aileen Harbeck reported about the April 23 District committee meeting regarding the mandated Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP). The LCAP dovetails with the state's new Local Control Funding Formula (LCCF). Stakeholders were invited to the meeting, with Harbeck noting great representation from all school sites, including teachers and parents, as the meeting reviewed the current status of compliance with LCAP metrics.

In his remarks, Silvers read a resolution touting the work of retiring Maintenance II worker Edgar C. Sanchez after 23 years of service. Prior to the meeting, Silvers lamented the District's loss of the popular Sanchez, stating that "he is an all-around great guy. One call away, a real fix-it guy. And he does it with a smile, a real sincere person. He is a tremendous asset to the District, diligent and quick to find the problem...and the solution."

Prior to the meeting, Silvers talked of the LRFMP and targeting improvements in Wiseburn athletic facilities and libraries. With much of the construction winding down, he thanked Facilities Administrator Annie Aung for overseeing the final portion of the construction and working through final "punch lists." He also spoke about the District gearing up for graduation festivities, which may be held (if the logistics work out) for the first time on the floor of the newly constructed gymnasium facility at Wiseburn High School. "That's a big deal for us," Silvers said, noting how prior graduation ceremonies had taken place on the grass at Dana Field, which he admitted "was hot as heck." He said the District was waiting for floor coverings to arrive that would be utilized to protect the gymnasium floor during the set-up and take-down of graduation furniture.

Silvers also mentioned a key agenda item that would hasten the laying of turf on the Wiseburn High soccer field. The Board later in the meeting decided to table any action on that issue until at least the May 9 meeting. The agenda item discussed on Thursday evening featured Wiseburn taking a loan out to finance the turf field that could end up saving the District \$200,000 to \$300,000. Silvers also

mentioned the planned upcoming demolition of the Da Vinci Connect building on Aviation Boulevard, with DaVinci Connect being relocated on District-owned land located behind the Big 5 store on El Segundo Boulevard.

The Board later grappled with what exactly to do to secure funding for the soccer field, which has apparently lagged because of issues arising from the degraded quality of soil on the spot selected for the field -- as well as cost overruns related to the construction of Wiseburn High

The Board and Silvers discussed the current options, with Mora firmly believing that the "window to build the soccer field is now," while hoping work could take place when the students are out for their summer break. If the current plan on Thursday evening's agenda had been adopted, there was a possibility that

the District would save more than \$200,000. However, Silvers referred to extenuating considerations that still had to be adjugated, and he would have a "hard time recommending" that the Board approve the current field financing agenda item.

A spirited discussion among the Board members and administrators ensued, with the final decision being made to table the item until the May 9 meeting. Said President Kaneda, "While we try to be fiscally conservative, this is something that we need to do. We just need to find the way to do it. The goal is to make this work."

Upcoming District events include late-May school site open houses, with the next regularly scheduled meeting calendared for Thursday evening, May 9. •





#### from page 3 to boost mental health and general wellness,

and the County's Chiefs of Police to train frontline law enforcement officers. Officers learned how properly to handle calls involving people with mental illness.

The National Alliance on Mental Health tracks the most common disorders among American adults and children. NAMI reports that 18 percent of U.S. adults experience an anxiety disorder like post-traumatic stress disorder, phobias or obsessive-compulsive behavior. One in 25 adults experiences a mental disorder that interferes with normal life activities, according to the alliance.

People with a substance abuse or who've been homeless show the highest rates of mental illness, according to NAMI. It's almost 50 percent for drug users and 26 percent for those living in homeless shelters. In the past in L.A. County, the cases of defendants with histories of drug use and bouts of homelessness wouldn't have stood out to prosecutors.

But that changed in January with the launch of the Mental Health Division within the district attorney's office. The dozen prosecutors assigned to the new unit are trained to handle clear-cut cases involving defendants who've been declared mentally ill. Lacey's legal team works with the county's 1,000 prosecutors to review and recommend which defendants are mentally incompetent. Even borderline cases are referred to the unit.

Defendants who ask for alternative sentences because of psychological or emotional disorders are eligible for the diversion program in Lacey's office. The DA's team says it must balance compassion with public safety so that dangerous defendants who don't need mental health treatment aren't allowed to evade prosecution. "We also want to make sure that jails and prisons are reserved for the most serious and violent offenders," the DA said.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month nationwide, and this year the outreach will explore topics of animal companionship, spirituality, humor, work-life balance, and recreation and social connections as ways according to NAMI. The DA's office calls the new division "the first of its kind in California and, possibly, the nation"

Lacev has told the 1,000 prosecutors in her office they can consider a person's mental health and history in deciding whether to recommend diversion. Her new unit can help the prosecutors work through the decision-making and protect the program's integrity. "With this policy, I am encouraging my lawyers to make courageous decisions and do the right thing," Lacey said. "We must make informed decisions to ensure public safety and help another human being in crisis."

California's penal code created the diversion option for people with mental disorders to seek treatment when they are charged with a crime. Once the defendant completes treatment, the criminal charges will be dismissed and the criminal record is sealed. Misdemeanor and felony defendants can be considered for mental health diversion.

A 2015 report by the Center for Prison Reform based in Washington, D.C. noted that defendants avoid the stigma of a criminal record and jail time when they use a diversion program. This helps them to find employment and move back into the mainstream, the authors said. Diversion programs also benefit the criminal justice system, allowing it to focus on more serious offenders. The county and state corrections departments save too.

Incarceration costs for inmates with mental illness run higher than other prisoners because of medication, treatment and what the report calls "disruption." Diversion cuts down on hospitalization and crisis services for county and state corrections, the center reported. It estimates the criminal justice system can save \$47,000 for each nonviolent felony drug offender diverted into a treatment program. Recidivism rates are lowered by 26 percent when mental health courts handle such cases. Los Angeles County has a mental health court, which works in tandem with the DA's office and the county Mental Health Department. •

The last film that portrayed a bombshell literary forgery was the Melissa McCarthystarring, Oscar-nominated biopic Can You Ever Forgive Me? In it, washed up author Lee Israel forged letters from literary greats and sold the "authentic" works for cash. It shocked the literary community, but not in the way JT LeRoy's outing did in October of 2005. Thousands of people were deceived, lied to, and ultimately embarrassed for falling under the spell of JT LeRoy's facade.

The story and the film are fascinating examinations of fame and the bizarre nature of celebrity. Solid performances from Stewart and Dern coupled with the fast-paced style of Justin Kelly's directorial choices make JT LeRoy completely enjoyable as well as being

Knoop). In the film JT LeRoy, directed by Justin Kelly, Savannah is played by Kristen Stewart in a role that feels tailor-made for her. Embodying Knoop's androgynous style and questioning gender identity, Stewart channels the struggle of living a double life -- her own private one and the very public, yet completely fabricated public one.

Laura Dern plays the punky feminist Laura Albert, a gifted writer who found it easier to express her dark thoughts through the personas of other people. JT LeRoy's success wasn't planned, but once Albert's debut book (which was "written" by LeRoy) became a bestseller, she knew she wouldn't be able to keep his identity hidden forever. After enlisting the help of her sister-in-law, Knoop, to physically portray LeRoy at book signings and special events, the two embark on a wild ride that wouldn't be believable if it wasn't true.

a cautionary tale of sorts. Long story short: don't believe everything you read.

JT LeRoy is now playing in select theaters (including Laemmle Monica Film Center) and on demand. •




