Economic Development Head Looks to the Future

Now two and a half years into his job as Economic Development Analyst, Ted Shove sees the next few years as critical for the City of El Segundo to build on efforts to recruit new businesses to the area and retain companies already in the fold. Originally brought on to implement the City's Economic Development Strategy, Shove is the point person who handles outreach to potential and existing firms and makes frequent presentations to businesses, community groups, citizens, City staff and the City Council. His job description includes planning and coordinating all program activities related to business recruitment and retention, as well as keeping up with laws and regulations impacting local economic development. He also conducts technical studies and research, develops and implements advertising campaigns over various types of media, and evaluates and administers contracts for outside services connected to economic development. In short, he is a virtual one-stop economic development shop packaged in a single human being.

During his tenure thus far, Shove pointed to such successes as the creative retention effort to keep Nano H2O in town, expansions of Beyond Meat and Caban Resources, and the arrival of Millennium Space Systems. Over the last two years, El Segundo was also a finalist in the Los Angeles Economic Development Corporation's Most Business Friendly City award competition. And on a personal note, Shove just last month earned a Certified Economic Developer (CEd) designation from the International Economic Development Council (IEDC). In doing so, he had to travel to Minneapolis where he passed a rigorous and comprehensive three-part, two-day examination that tested his proficiency and judgment in the key areas of economic

development—including business retention and expansion, marketing, finance, workforce and community development, entrepreneurial and small business development, real estate, strategic planning, technology-led economic development and management.

A Texas native who grew up in the San Bernardino area and graduated from Cajon High School, Shove spent four years in the Navy before returning to the Inland Empire to attend California State University, San Bernardino, where he earned a B.S. in Health Science and Human Ecology with a concentration in Environmental Health Science in 2004, and

a Master of Public Administration in 2006. Prior to working in El Segundo, he served as Economic Development Administrative Analyst for the City of Hesperia. Shove is married with two middle school age children.

Despite the achievements since joining the City, Shove emphasized that there is still much more to be done in order to push El Segundo to the next level. Among his top priorities is to foster the recently revived Economic Development Advisory Council, keeping the group active and continuing to facilitate the transfer of real-world business and

New Ed! Chair Sees Outreach as Key in Building School Support

The past year saw the El Segundo Education Foundation (Ed!) reach the \$1 million mark in its annual fundraising effort to help local schools. While he thinks achieving that milestone was "an amazing feat," new Ed! Board of Directors Chair Alex Abad believes the group can and will do better. Since assuming the organization's leadership role on July 1, the long-time El Segundo resident and real estate agent has begun the process of engaging the community with the goal of upping the ante. "That million is already allocated to programs that were previously committed, so the money is already spent," Abad said. "Now we have to start out brand new and I hope we can improve upon \$1 million."

In order for Ed! to reach even greater heights, Abad believes raising awareness

goes hand in hand with raising funds. "As I look at the need, there's definitely a deficit in the amount of support that we get," Abad admitted. "Parent participation monetarily in El Segundo is right around 35 percent, compared to neighboring beach cities that have 70 to 80 percent. We have done amazingly well here and there is room for improvement. This is where I want to raise the bar and make it that much better for the years to come."

Abad believes increasing the aforementioned support levels to well over 50 percent over the next couple of years is realistic and his plan is to reach out to both residents and businesses to spread the foundation's message. His first step is implementing a small marketing/public relations group to ensure Ed! can do the most effective job

"Free" Money Results in Ingratitude

George Funk wrongly criticized the City Council for providing "\$0" in school support (7/10/14 letter). Rest assured, the Council is providing generous financial support to the ESUSD's public schools. In fact, the City still provides a gift of \$500,000 per year in services, paid for by City taxpayers that ESUSD would otherwise have to pay.

Who provided school crossing guards before the City did it? ESUSD. And before that there were no crossing guards.

Funk wrote, "I have to question our city council's priorities, " but then claimed the City should give "\$250,000 to \$750,000" to the schools.

ESUSD is a separate political subdivision (government entity) from the City, with its own independent governing board, powers and responsibilities, tax revenues, budget, and

employees. The City Council has a legal and fiduciary responsibility to govern and fund the operation of the City, not the School District, and vice-versa for the School District.

The City's total annual budget, including capital improvements, is about \$60 million to serve about 17,000 nighttime population and 60,000 daytime population. The City must provide and maintain enormously expensive police and fire departments, streets and sidewalks, water mains, sewers, parks, and public facilities and services. In comparison, ESUSD's annual budget is about \$29 million for enrollment of just under 3,500 students.

City Council should require that the School Board put ESUSD employee compensation data on their website before providing support.

Funk's attitude demonstrates what happens when people get "free" money and "free" stuff.

Keep Your Pet Safe During the Summer Season

Now that summer is in full swing, let's spend some quality time with pets. Our great weather makes it perfect for walks and outside playtime. We like to take our dog on weekend trips with us, while some people will need to board their pets or have a pet sitter watch them during a vacation. For those who enjoy the road trips with their pet, here are some tips to make your road trip safer and more enjoyable:

Plan ahead.

Make sure the place you are going is pet-friendly; this includes not just the hotel but also any parks or other places you will be visiting. Many cities are becoming more pet friendly and allow dogs on outdoor patios. However, many state parks and beaches have strict rules on pets and do not allow them.

If you are traveling to areas that are known to have tick or other parasite problems, check with your veterinarian on the best and safest product for your pet. Bring a flea comb and a tick puller tool with you. On hikes, check your pet for ticks at least every 4 hours.

If you know your pet gets motion sickness, there are safe and effective antiemetics available. They may need to be given several hours ahead of leaving on the trip to be effective.

Make Sure Your Pet's Identification is Current.

It sounds so basic, but you'd be surprised how many pets go missing and are unable to be reunited with their owners due to old or incorrect identification. Your pet's collar tag should have a current phone number. Register and update your microchip information; microchips are useless unless you register the number. Have your veterinarian scan your pet's microchip to make sure it is working properly. Look up the chip number and see what information comes up. It may not be registered or the information may be incorrect. It's easy to update information before you leave on your trip. All pets (even birds and other exotic pets) should be microchipped. It's safe and affordable.

Going outside?

Stay hydrated. Bring fresh water and a collapsible bowl. Stop at a safe area every 2 to 3 hours for potty and water breaks. Always leash your pet even if they are well trained.

Before letting your dog hit the ground, check the pavement with your bare foot. If it's too hot for your feet then it's too hot for your pet. Get over to the grass or shade right away. Dogs don't complain even when their pads are getting burned, but we see many cases of blistered footpads every year.

Once upon a time, a band of hard working but compassionate residents built a house, and what a wonderful house it was! It was, in fact, the envy of the neighborhood. Ever mindful of their heritage as immigrants themselves, the builders put into practice the message emblazoned on the Statue of Liberty, "Give me your tired, your hungry, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." The group therefore established a legal immigration framework that struck a delicate balance; on the one hand, providing a refuge for the downtrodden, while on the other hand preserving the economic structure of the house and its culture based on hundreds of years of history.

Evidence of the implosion of traditional employment is everywhere, most clearly reflected in our

rate of apparently permanently unemployed. As the previously dominant sources of employment atrophy, the geniuses who create the technology, and those that finance it, have become today's financial mandarins. No tax code changes or attempts at financial redistribution can change the underlying reason for the mal-distribution. The technological substitution of machines for people is well underway.

If this revolution has damaged residents of the great house, the technological storm has devastated neighbors even more dramatically, since they started from a lower technological and educational base. The irony of the technological age is that while it creates poverty, it also creates great wealth. In this new reality neighbors invade the great house by the millions to get a piece of that wealth; the laws on immigration be damned. Asylum grants in 2013 were triple the number in 2012, and 10 times what they were in 2008.

By its laws, its policies, the speeches of its leader, and its refusal to close the door to the invaders, the great house encourages this barrage of lawlessness, and in fact, rewards the successful invaders. Today's challenge for the great house is to determine whether it can continue to support its millions of domestically disenfranchised workers, while adding millions of neighboring poor as well. In the long run, the delicate balance between compassion and society's prosperity requires that its educational system be able to educate the masses, converting the 99%-ers into 1%-ers. But as John Maynard Keynes, the hero of the Left, has warned us, "In the long run, we're all dead." Let's hope Keynes is wrong again. •

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

Trade Kemp Now

It has been easy to not pay attention to the Los Angeles Dodgers this year, simply because it has been difficult to find them playing on television anywhere around the city of Los Angeles. At a time of the year when there are no other sports going on but golf, the Dodgers are usually the center of attention for the city. For those who haven't been able to keep up, this year isn't much different than last, at least record-wise, for the Dodgers. At right around 10 games above .500 with near 60 games left to play, everyone expects the team to get hot, blow past the San Francisco

Giants and rally toward a record similar to the one they finished with last year at 92-70. The Giants may not be the only thing in the way of another first place finish and NL West pennant, though. With a crowded outfield and the strong possibility of an unhappy player, the Dodgers must trade Matt Kemp now if they want to get better as a team.

News recently surfaced late last week that Matt Kemp would be open to a trade if he can't get time in the Dodgers outfield as an everyday center fielder. Rewind three years ago to 2011 and Kemp at center field would have been an obvious decision. With a .324 batting average, 126 RBIs, 39 home runs and 40 stolen bases in 161 games played, Kemp should have won the MVP and almost finished with a 40-40 season (40 home runs, 40 stolen bases) and a triple crown, which is almost unheard of for a center fielder to

accomplish. His 2011 season was a monster season and Kemp was only 26 years old. On the heels of that season, the Dodgers signed Kemp to an 8-year, \$160 million contract because frankly, with numbers like those, who wouldn't?

Now fast-forward to even one year later. In the 2012 season Kemp's numbers dropped drastically. In only 106 games played, .303 with only 69 RBIs, 23 home runs and nine stolen bases. Still not horrible for a major league center fielder, but nowhere near the numbers from 2011 that got him his exorbitant contract. This year, Kemp isn't

looking nearly as good. The season is only just past halfway over, but Kemp is batting .266 with 35 RBIs, eight home runs and his stolen base potential is all but gone at five. Once a five-tool player, it is becoming increasingly obvious that while Kemp can still swing a bat every now and then, he is not nearly the player that he used to be that had the potential to hurt an opposing team all over the field.

Unfortunately for the Dodgers, Kemp doesn't see things the way the stats show them or the way managers Don Mattingly sees them. Recently moved to left field, Kemp misses the old days and wants to relive them as an everyday center fielder. "Whatever they want to do, we're favorable to," Kemp's agent Dave Stewart told Foxsports.com. "As long as it gives him an opportunity to play every

These young athletes are the future of El Segundo baseball and will no doubt continue the successful legacy that has helped make El Segundo famous for the past 50 years.

In the future look for Wyatt Coulter, Joaquin DePablo, Jack Fruchtmann, Eddy Grant, Cooper Katskee, Nolan Kelly, Brendan McAndrews, James Pearson, Lloyd Sapanza, Connor Smith, Jack Stoker, Cooper Stolnack and Chance VanderLinden to continue the legacy.

The Section 4 championship game was another well pitched and played game. West L.A. had defeated El Segundo 1-0 in eight innings to force a true championship game with the winner advancing to the North Sub Division in Lompoc. El Segundo's pitching has been dominating at times in both the District 36 tournament and it continued in the Section 4 tournament championship game. Lloyd Sapanza

continued the pitching staff's masterful effort in the winner take all against West L.A. The crafty left-hander pitched a complete game three-hitter; he walked one and struck out six. After a lead off single in the second inning Sapanza retired 13 consecutive hitters.

El Segundo had its own problems against West L.A. pitching, getting just three hits. McAndrews led off the first inning with a single but was erased on a fielder's choice. In the second inning Coulter drew a walk and Sapanza singled and both later scored on the

same wild pitch. Coulter slid in safely but on the play the ball was tossed wide and that allowed Sapanza to come around and score from second base.

El Segundo's other run came in the fifth inning. McAndrews singled and scored with two outs on a wild pitch to give ESLL a 3-0 lead. In the sixth inning West L.A. threatened to extend the game with a one out single. But Sapanza retired the next two hitters including a strike out to end the game. Afterwards, manager Travis McAndrews had high praise for his team's effort. "We didn't hit like we had been but give the credit to their (West L.A.) pitching. We played solid defense and Lloyd (Sapanza) was on his game."

McAndrews said that playing consecutive close championship games could benefit his team instead of getting blowout wins. "We'll be facing good teams so playing in two close games to win the Section tournament should give us the experience in a tight game in the Sub Division tournament. For their efforts the team traveled to Lompoc to play in the North Sub Division tournament. It's the final stop before the Southern California best of three championship series against the South Sub Division winner. "This is a fantastic opportunity for these guys and something they'll always remember," said McAndrews.

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and how to bang them

Hello all you foodies out there. If you haven't seen the movie "Chef" you need to. It tells a great story about the business that I'm in and how it can be both rewarding and detrimental to one's lifestyle.

When I went through my apprenticeship in the 70s we had a class of 20 apprentices. All 20 graduated and went off into the industry searching for a culinary epiphany. Slowly I lost track of them but then through Facebook I was able to find out what happened to them. Not to my surprise I was the only one who is still in the business. All the others got out because of a number of reasons. The most prevalent reason was the mental stress and physical strain on the body.

I am now starting my 44th year in kitchen and still love it. I have had three orthopedic surgeries and need to have TWO MORE. I have friends that have turned to drugs or alcohol to combat the pain. Some have even lost their homes and families. I would not wish this career on my worst enemy but for me it has been a great ride and I'm still cruising.

Here is my version of the pork sandwich that is portrayed in the movie.

The Chef

Cuban Pork Sandwich

Marinade ingredients:

- 2 pounds boneless pork loin
- 4 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons ground cumin
- 2 tablespoons ground paprika
- 1 teaspoon chili flakes
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup lemon juice

Roasting instructions:

- Place the pork in a large container and season with all the ingredients.
- Let sit overnight. Roast in a 325-degree oven for 1 hour covered, then turn oven up to 375° and cook uncovered for 15 minutes more or till cooked to an internal temp of 145°.
- Cool and slice as thin as possible.

Sandwich ingredients:

- 6 bomber rolls
- 6 teaspoons spicy mustard
- 6 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 red onion shaved
- 20 pieces sweet pickles
- 12 slices manchego cheese
- 12 slices mozzarella cheese
- 1 stick butter

To make the sandwiches:

- Cut open the rolls.
- Spread one side with mustard and one side with mayonnaise.
- Layer out the roast pork, onions, then pickles, and top with the cheese.
- Place the top on the sandwich, brush with butter and place on a hot flat top griddle.
- Set a brick or weight wrapped in foil on top of the sandwich and press down on it.
- When golden brown, repeat on the other side. Or if you have a sandwich press use that.

day. He'd like to eventually go back to center field. He's not opposed to right or left, but his hope at some point is to get back to center." Unfortunately for Kemp, it doesn't look like a move from left to center field would be in the best interest of the club. With numerous errors in center after he returned from injury earlier in the season and a clear deterioration in speed, it looks as if his days as the captain of the outfield at Chavez Ravine are all but over.

The Dodgers outfield is crowded as is: with Kemp, Carl Crawford, Andre Ethier, Yasiel Puig and even Scott Van Slyke, who has been one of the Dodgers best hitters when he has gotten time at the plate, Mattingly has had to do some juggling with the lineups. Early in spring training, Kemp declared, "I'm not a fourth outfielder. We can cut that off right there. I won't accept that role." Unfortunately for Kemp, it looks like he's going to have to if he wants to remain a Dodger. Trading Kemp would be in the best interest of both parties involved. The Dodgers are already going to have to eat a large portion of his contract (\$107 million remaining from 2015-'19), but getting rid of him and even Crawford and Ethier by the trade deadline would make this club that much better.

With Van Slyke waiting in the wings and Joc Pederson tearing up the minor leagues,

Kemp's .266 average, Ethier's .250 average, and inability to hit anyone throwing with their left hand, and Crawford's .259 average clearly become expendable. The Dodgers should be looking to get younger and better if they want to win a World Series. Kemp (and even Ethier and Crawford) is heading in the complete opposite direction. Pederson, a true center fielder, would bring his .326 average, 18 home runs and 46 RBIs this year in the Dodgers AAA Albuquerque affiliate and fit in very nicely with Puig in right field and may even provide a spark for the ball club similar to the one that Puig provided last year. Put Van Slyke in left and the Dodgers immediately get younger and more dangerous.

It may be hard to let go of Kemp, especially when he has the potential to be the player he was in 2011. That player, though, is all but gone. Of course, for Kemp, it may be basically impossible to admit that he's not the player that he once was. The Dodgers, should learn something from their neighbors at the Staples Center who waited a little too long to get something back for Pau Gasol, who is now gone. Trade Kemp now and get assets back while his stock is still somewhat high. If the Dodgers want to win a ring, they may just have to begin making bold moves of that sort. •

El Segundo faced Northridge City Little League in the opening round. NCLL may have as much history as ESLL does when it comes to alumni playing professionally. The game was scoreless through the first four innings, with both teams showcasing one standout defensive play after another. In the top of the first, El Segundo's Connor Smith doubled to left and then advanced to third on an infield single by Cooper Katskee. Northridge starting pitcher Drew Gustafson bore down and registered his third strikeout of the inning to snuff out El Segundo's early threat. El Segundo threatened again in the top of the second. With one out, Sapanza singled to center. James Pearson followed with a single, but Gustafson got the next two batters to keep the game scoreless.

El Segundo finally broke through in the top of the fourth inning. Jack Fruchtmann led off with a double down the left field line. Joaquin DePablo executed a perfect sacrifice bunt to

move Fruchtmann to third base. Eddy Grant worked an eight-pitch walk. After a fielder's choice, Northridge reliever Will White threw a wild pitch, allowing Fruchtmann to score and give El Segundo a 1-0 lead.

El Segundo starting pitcher Connor Smith used an array of fastballs, sliders, change-ups and curveballs to keep the high-octane Northridge offense off-balance. In the bottom of the fourth inning, Northridge's Martin broke up Smith's no-hitter with a single. Northridge finally cracked the scoreboard in the bottom of the fifth inning on back-to-back singles by Uytioco and Brandon Garfinkel. Both runners advanced on a groundout to second. With one out Indiana Wijay hit a sacrifice fly to center, scoring Uytioco and tying the game at 1-1. Smith retired the first two batters in the bottom of the sixth inning before Romero connected on a two-strike triple to right center. development knowledge and experience to the City Council to assist in decision-making. "The EDAC has been a big benefit in collaborating with the City Council during its meetings for educating both groups and to keep the Council engaged in emerging economic development trends within the community," Shove said.

Shove was also pleased to see the recent selection of Paolucci Communication Arts as the City's public relations firm. "They will provide strategic community branding services," Shove said. "This also frees me up more to focus on outreach for business retention, attraction and expansion."

Speaking of attraction, Shove has set a target number to recruit 100 new businesses to town in time for the City's 100-year anniversary in 2017. If he succeeds, El Segundo will be able to celebrate not one, but two century marks. "Perhaps our most important objective is to establish a self-sustained economic development program that will have a long-term positive fiscal impact on the City's overall budget," Shove explained. Filling vacant office space will translate to increased business tax revenues—a key component in stabilizing El Segundo's general fund in the future.

Yet in order to promote economic development growth, Shove said it is vital to change the overall image of El Segundo for the City to compete with communities to the north like Playa Vista and Santa Monica in quality of life amenities and walkability for the workforce and residents. Those communities as well as Venice and Marina del Rey are routinely referred

to as part of "Silicon Beach" in reference to the high-tech companies clustered there—and Shove hopes outsiders will also begin to view El Segundo as part of this group. "We are a hotbed for high-tech and creative media firms and yet we don't get quite the recognition we should," Shove said. "So we have to work on changing the perception."

Shove's other notable wish list items include building a self-sustaining Downtown El Segundo, securing a new operator/business at the former Stick & Stein location on Sepulveda Boulevard, completing the third phase of Plaza El Segundo (now in preliminary design), winning the Most Business Friendly City award, and completing a five-year Economic Development Strategic Plan. He also hopes to build upon his recent career milestone by seeing the City itself achieve an Accredited Economic Development Organization designation from the IEDC.

While confident the above can be accomplished, Shove noted that the biggest challenge when discussing or selling the virtues of El Segundo is to understand what he is up against in terms of the competition. "It is easy to compare El Segundo when it is known what the other cities being considered by a business or developer lack in terms of community, quality of life and business environment," he said. "El Segundo has so much to offer. We have to get that message across and also continually work with stakeholders closely to ensure that we share the same vision within economic development and that we maintain our focus." •

"The perception from the community is that there's plenty of money coming from everywhere and therefore there's no reason for them to be concerned about contributing. We have to do a better job communicating why there's a great need to donate financially to help support many of the programs that Ed! actually funds."

The list of programs that rely on Ed! funding to survive include physical education, music, drama, counseling, engineering, biomedical science, literacy, math, robotics, International Baccalaureate, technology, and many others. To relay the importance of fundraising to support these critical programs and classes (and indirectly those who teach them as well), the public relations group will develop a communication campaign using print, social media and video clips. "The way we see it, students are the products of the school and the customer is the parent. Parents rely on the schools to provide a high quality of education so that by graduation time, the students are qualified to move on to take the next step of their desired careers and eventually grow up and earn a good living with high incomes to be able to afford to move back into the beach areas and reside where they grew up."

In order to drive home the message to those parents, Abad also wants to enhance the foundation's relationship with the community. "Ed! really is the El Segundo community," he said. "It is everyone who donates or volunteers their time in

support of the schools. People need to understand that if we all pitch in and do our part, we can ensure that the El Segundo Unified School District gets the support our students deserve."

In addition to bolstering parent support, Abad will also look to the business community — especially given the presence of El Segundo's high-tech industry and the largest concentration of Fortune 500 companies in Southern California. "We are blessed by the amount of industry we have," he said. "There are many industries that understand the value of having outstanding schools because that is a draw for them when looking to hire qualified individuals throughout the state."

Speaking of the state, public school funding from Sacramento has improved when compared to past years when the economy was at its lowest point. However, Abad warned that the Governor's new funding formula still takes money from districts such as El Segundo Unified to support areas with higher percentages of foster youth, English language learners and those on free or reduced lunch programs. According to initial calculations, El Segundo Unified will only receive one dollar more per student from the State by 2021 than it did in 2007 with the value of that same dollar buying less in the future than it does today. "This is just another reason why the El Segundo Education Foundation must work harder than ever to reach as many members of the community as we possibly can," Abad said. "The perception of El Segundo as a great place to live and our property values are directly tied into the quality of our schools and so we must do all we can to foster local education." •

Traveling in a car? Even though some dogs like to stick their head out the window, it’s not safe. Bugs and debris can scratch their eyes. Summertime also is foxtail time. These are little grass seeds that like to stick and burrow into the skin. Foxtails also love to go up noses, get into the eyes and ears. Bring tweezers or a small hemostat clamp to pull these out. You can usually find small clamps at pet stores or fishing tackle shops.

If you have to leave your pet behind, many of these tips will still apply. You may need to have some vaccinations updated for the kennel. Give yourself plenty of time to get

this done. Vaccines are most effective given about 2 weeks ahead of time. And while you’re gone, treat your home and yard for fleas. Roughly 95% of the flea’s lifecycle occurs in the environment. When you and your pets are away on a trip, fleas will continue to go through their molting process, ending up in cocoons. These cocoons can remain dormant for nearly a year waiting for your pet to return before hatching and feeding.
