## Estela Rivas-Bryant: Empowering Young Women Through Ice Hockey

When I caught up with El Segundo resident Estela Rivas-Bryant for our phone interview, she had just returned from a cooler environment than I had. I was returning on a Sunday morning during the recent Labor Day heat wave from a dive-spot establishment in Manhattan Beach after a cheap breakfast. My vehicle noted that it was 105 degrees outside, which I did not believe. It may have been hotter.

She, however, had returned to El Segundo from participating in a women's ice hockey tournament in Lakewood, where the temperature outside, she said, was 106; hopefully, the Zamboni machine and all the ice-cooling features were working on the ice and in the building. Her squad did not win the tournament, but Bryant, who plays on the defensive side of the ice, seemed OK with the results and was eagerly looking forward to attending a women's professional soccer match with friends, family, and teammates.

Bryant is the President and founder of the Empowerment Effect, a non-profit organization that hosts ice hockey clinics for young women, 7-16. The gals are coached by a staff of volunteers who have mastered ice hockey skills.

So, what is the goal of the Empowerment Effect? "Our mission is to create a safe space where girls can and will be empowered to grow and flourish as confident, engaged young adults.

"Led by strong, passionate women from our local ice hockey community, our objective

is to teach valuable life lessons, primarily through the sport of ice hockey, to build a more positive and inclusive society," informs the company's website, [www.theempowermenteffect.org](http://www.theempowermenteffect.org).

Bryant has been drawn to the sport of ice hockey for 20+ years. Growing up, she was not exactly immersed in team sporting endeavors, maturing on a farm that raised chickens, and cultivated Christmas trees.

Her parents, she said, were always working.

She remembers her upbringing as "going to school, doing your homework, and doing your chores." That, she said, in hindsight, fomented the discipline instilled in her early years, "the best work-ethic that I could have received."

Bryant currently helps produce podcasts for Religion of Sports, a company helmed by footballers Tom Brady and Michael Strahan. As noted, she was raised in the Inland Empire "before it turned into the

## Studio Printing's Ed Su on the Importance of Community

One of the defining features of El Segundo is the variety of businesses it attracts. There are realty offices, restaurants, and jewelry stores, all within a two-block radius. You can get a pedicure, grab a burger, and resize your ring all before noon!

But these small businesses are more than just a sales pitch for the city. Each presents a space for the community to grow and thrive, building on existing relationships—and creating new ones—with the people of El Segundo.

This is especially the case for Studio Printing. Starting in the 1990's, the company was originally a graphic design studio

composed of three separate companies subleasing space from the El Segundo Herald. During this time, their business focused primarily on creating layouts for advertisements, but they always outsourced work as a printing company. In 1994, Ed Su purchased the business he still owns today.

Four years later, in 1988, the company officially took on the name Studio Printing, shifting its focus from graphic design to printing. But, as Su explained, this transition hasn't always been easy. "A lot of things don't get printed anymore," he said, "But luckily, we still have a good selection of customers who still need that service."

## Film Review

### ‘Speak No Evil’ May Be The Most Disturbing Movie of the Year

After watching *Speak No Evil*, I was only barely prepared for what horrors lay ahead in this smart, disturbing and heart-pounding new Danish horror film.

When a Danish family of three vacations in Italy one summer, they are pleased to meet a fun Dutch family at their shared lodging. Bjørn (Morten Burian) and his wife Louise (Sidsel Siem Koch) are excited to bond with the charismatic Patrick (Fedja van Huêt) and Karin (Karina Smulders). It’s also fitting that their young daughter Agnes (Liva Forsberg) is also around the same age as the couple’s son, Abel (Marius Damslev).

It’s a fun affair but the magic of the Tuscany vacation becomes a distant memory when Bjørn and Louise return to their humdrum lives (he’s

clearly unhappy with his normal life). It’s not until a year later when a postcard arrives—a photograph of both families together from their idyllic Italian summer—that their spirits lift. They’ve been invited by Patrick and Karin to reconnect and spend the weekend at their home; and offer that excites them, to which they accept.

A short 8-hour car trip away, Bjørn, Louise, and Agnes arrive at their host’s house deep in the woods (the kind of place that would be very regrettable to get stuck in, on the unlikely chance that any danger should arise). They are instantly greeted and welcomed by fun-loving Patrick and Karin, and the promise of a fun weekend lies ahead.

However, small awkward cues arise in Patrick and Karin’s hospitality that cause

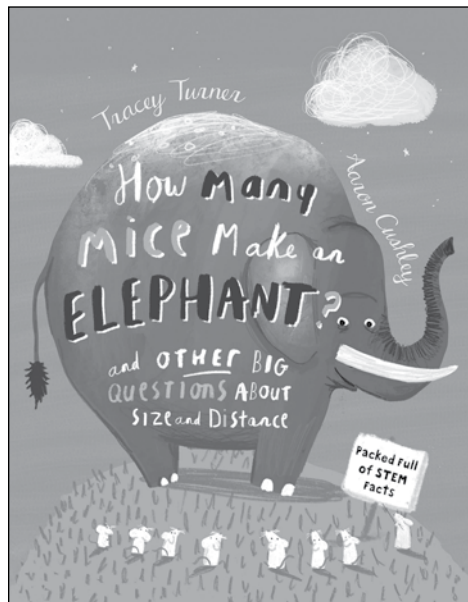

Also highlighted on the page are desert facts like rainfall, and temperature, which are interspersed

with funny features such as camels wearing sweaters to keep them warm on cold winter desert nights.

Diverse topics including oceans, forests, space, dinosaurs, sports, icebergs and skyscrapers will appeal to a wide array of readers while unexpected facts such as blue whales’ earwax and kangaroos the size of grapes surprise even adult readers. Colorful spreads, playful illustrations and casual writing style pack a lot of info into an enjoyable exploration for students and casual readers alike.

(BPT) - Myelofibrosis is a rare blood cancer that develops when a disruption occurs in blood stem cells, resulting in excessive scar tissue formation (fibrosis) in the bone marrow, where most blood cells are produced. To help compensate for abnormal blood counts, splenomegaly (enlargement of the spleen) occurs in most patients, which can cause pain below left side of the ribs and fullness. [1] Other symptoms experienced by patients with myelofibrosis includes feeling tired or weak, bruising or bleeding easily and severe anemia, which is a lack of healthy red blood cells. [2] If you are one of the thousands of people living with myelofibrosis in the U.S.

BCL-2 family of proteins prevent apoptosis from occurring. [5]

Navitoclax has not been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or other regulatory health authorities. Safety and efficacy are under evaluation.

If you are over 18 years old with a diagnosis of myelofibrosis, you may be eligible to participate in one of these clinical trials.

crazy place that it is now.” Her parents had moved to the United States from Mexico; Bryant is a “first-generation” American. Her siblings include an older sister, an attorney for the federal government in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and an older brother, a nurse working in the emergency room of a hospital in Seattle, Washington.

She moved to El Segundo around the year 2000 to attend college and, as she says, “never left. Who does not love El Segundo?” She took classes at El Camino College and then transferred to Cal State University at Dominguez Hills.

On the Endowment Effect website, it is noted that Bryant’s “super-power” is “momma bear.” She stressed how she is all about nurturing the skills of community folks and, sometimes, just “listening” to their stories and thoughts.

profit and embrace would-be hockey players from all levels of society.

Her parents are still living in the Inland Empire, but for her Bryant found El Segundo to be the perfect fit for her and husband Robert. It was and is a place, she said, “where I just needed to be.” She rented a room in town when she embarked upon her collegiate career. “I just needed to get out of Moreno Valley,” Bryant shared. “I did not know where I wanted to be,” she said, “but I knew it wasn’t there.”

She went “into TV production as a career, doing 10 years of unscripted reality,” traveling the world for her profession, always returning to El Segundo, which “felt like home.”

She said she takes comfort in feeling secure when her 13-year-old son, Lucas, an eighth grader at the Middle School, leaves for school in the morning and returns later in the day

for more than 20 years. Emailed Kemptes: “We met playing ice hockey together. We have played on multiple teams and multiple rinks throughout our friendship.

“Estela is one of the toughest and most caring women I have ever met. She is a consummate giver. You will not find another person that works harder to give back to her family, her friends, and her community, no matter what else is going on in her life,” continues Kemptes. “I was visiting her at the hospital after she had had emergency spinal surgery. Just hours after her surgery, still laid up in bed, she was on the phone with a medical equipment provider coordinating a delivery with them to make sure a very sick friend was going to get what she needed. She became a personal advocate for that friend to ensure she received the best medical care

possible during her terminal illness when another doctor wrote the woman off.

“Anyone familiar with Wayne Gretzky knows he was not just The Great One because of his talent and the goals he scored, but how he elevated those around him. Estela makes everyone around her a better person. She elevates us all to do more, to give more, to be more. That is the kind of person she is. That is the person I want on my side and who I will follow into any battle that comes her way.”

Rivas-Bryant and her team continue to empower young women through their teamwork, talent, and sportsmanship on the ice. Who knows if they will have a part in developing the next female superstar on the ice rink, a younger version of the iconic Hilary Knight, star forward of the United States national women’s hockey team? They just might. •

unexpected moments of unease to Bjørn and Louise. Little things that were so touching over that summer—Patrick’s compliments over Louise’s vegetarianism—are forgotten, with wild boar being that night’s main course. But Bjørn and Louise, not wishing to rock the boat, brush it off, and continue with the weekend. It’s not life or death, anyway.

It should be said at this point that *Speak No Evil* makes no attempt to hide its horror leanings. Tafdrup uses a sweeping symphonic score of strings that cause your body to tense up during their car trip to the house, and the loud, rustling of leaves once they’re there only stir further dread. But it’s the small moments of observed human behavior that Tafdrup is so skilled at capturing, making the audience cringe with discomfort, building a slowly rising tension.

Approaching the story from this angle is what makes *Speak No Evil* such a unique and affecting movie. Creating characters with such developed stories and real human desires (Bjørn’s dishonesty with his boring life and Louise’s niceties to others) is a smart way of leading them into the danger ahead.

The way we act in everyday life—what we don’t say or wish to admit about ourselves, and what we hold back from others for the sake of being polite—can have the direst consequences. *Speak No Evil* very much intends to leave you speechless, and believe me; it will.

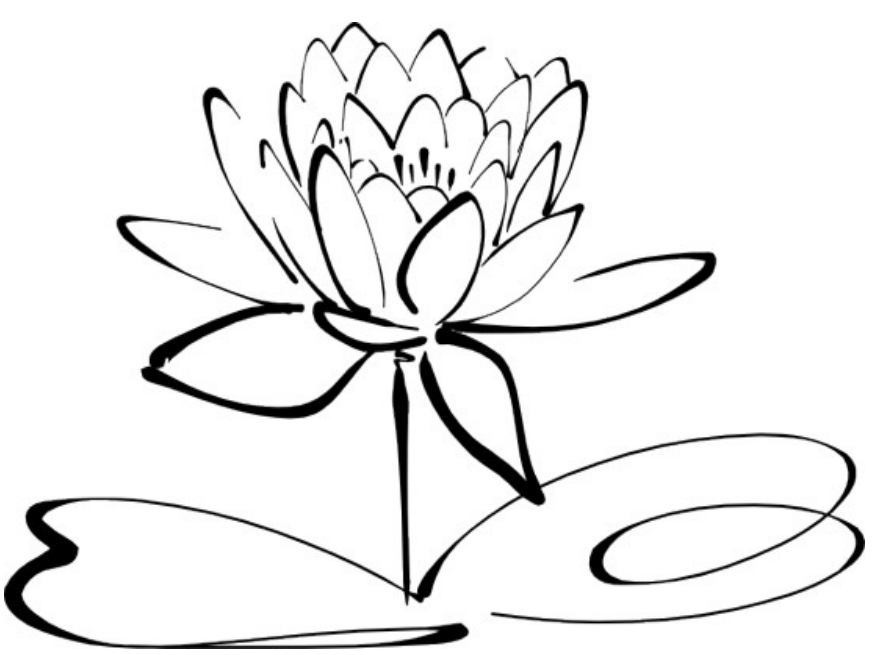

Studio Printing's services specialize in paper, primarily printing on banners, poster boards, envelopes, and business cards.

Even so, Su understands the variety of competition surrounding his business, including at-home color printers and other online services, some of which may offer lower prices. "Nowadays, printing technology is mostly digital," Su explained, "They used to be just a mechanical machine. Now everything is done directly on computers."

That being said, Su believes that Studio Printing is just as valuable as some of the more modern printing services. "We don't have to compete with them because we don't get a lot of small orders," he said. One reason for this is because of the size of their orders. For example, Su said that one of the smallest quantities for printing business cards is 250 cards, even fulfilling orders of 500 and more.

But aside from the sizes of the orders, Su explained that another defining feature of the business is the customers. "The only reason we survived this long is that we haven't lost many customers due to different situations," he observed, "We focus on quality. We are not necessarily the cheapest place in town, but we always do the work right."

Ironically, Su mentioned that he hardly sees any customers in person. "We print and ship, and we seldom see some of the customers," he observed. Because of this, he makes it a

habit to ask customers how they found the business, given its apparent anonymity, despite being in the community for such a long time.

"After 30 years in El Segundo, some people still don't know where we are," he explained. However, because of the store's proximity to the industrial district and the various businesses nearby, they receive attention from local

businesses. "Some of the new businesses in town, when they look for a printing company near their offices, they find Studio Printing,"

he said. Su also explained that the businesses usually always leave positive Yelp reviews, which also contributes to more orders.

But, as he explained, the most rewarding part of the job is attempting to tackle various

projects he encounters. "It forces me not to be complacent, and I always have to use my brain to figure out how to solve a problem," he said.

And in addition to being a small business owner in town, Su is also the current president of the El Segundo Rotary club. His approach to owning and operating Studio Printing is similar to his approach as Rotary president: giving back to the community. "The main goal is to help people," he said, "The community could be local, right here in town, or it could be in Los Angeles, or even internationally."

As part of giving back to the community, Su oversees a variety of community events, including joint projects with churches and other groups in town. The goal is to raise money to give back to the community.

Thus, Su sees his printing business and Rotary work as similar in many ways. In regard to Studio Printing, he is happy to be able to help so many local community organizations. "I'm proud of the business being in El Segundo and having survived this many years," he observed, "We've been able to help a lot of people and a lot of community groups along the way."

Whether it is printing posters for a new business on Main Street or volunteering at a fundraiser at a local church, Su is happy to be able to contribute to and build up the community around him. •
