Council Candidates Weigh in on the Issues

Each week leading up to the November 5 election, the Herald will publish El Segundo City Council candidate responses to questions covering various matters of local concer

1. Do you support new taxes and/or fee increases to enhance City revenues? What should we do to bolster the budget?

Drew Boyles: Since my election to the El Segundo City Council in 2016, we have worked diligently to strengthen our economic foundation without raising taxes on residents. In 2016, our General Fund revenues were approximately \$65 million, and today they are nearing \$95 million. We've also initiated numerous capital improvement projects to enhance our community. In a state and county with already high taxes and fees, I remain committed to tirelessly growing our business sector, which contributes 98% of our General Fund, ensuring that El Segundo stays a safe, vibrant and independent city.

Chris Eidem: I do support new taxes on larger businesses, However, higher taxes for our residents and smaller businesses are something that I would not be in favor of. With a question of this importance and impact, I would speak with the community, our Council members and small businesses to get a full spectrum of input to have a solid plan of action.

Lance Giroux: Relying solely on taxes to foster prosperity can be a short-sighted strategy that has pushed businesses away from California. This past year, the Council approved a necessary increase in our fee schedule for the first time in five years, ensuring we can effectively manage our facilities amidst rising costs. Additionally, our Business License Taxes were adjusted for the first time in 50 years—a decision supported by residents—yet we remain below the regional median. With 98% of the City's General Fund revenues coming from business taxes, we must focus on attracting and retaining businesses by creating an environment that welcomes and drives new ideas, growth and concepts. We must address their needs and

invest in innovation while exploring potential changes in zoning to support the growth of our creative economy. It is essential to have experienced and knowledgeable City leaders to effectively and responsibly manage this key issue.

Michelle Keldorf: I have supported new tax measures backed by the majority of El Segundo residents, such as Measure C in April 2018 and the revisions to our Business License Tax structure in November 2022. In the current economic climate, the greatest potential for strengthening City revenue lies in comprehensive land use planning. With four square miles of commercial business and adjacent industries supporting one square mile of residential area, El Segundo is wellpositioned to generate additional revenue for resident services. My commercial real estate background and experience on the Planning Commission have given me a deep understanding of the relationship between land use and budgetary goals. A significant

portion of our annual revenue comes from Business License Tax, Utility Transfer Tax, Transient Occupancy Tax, and Sales Tax. I support strategic planning efforts to attract the types of businesses that contribute to this vital tax base.

John Pickhaver: I don't support any new specific taxes or fee increases at this time. While I am not categorically opposed, I believe right now we have a good balance of taxes and revenue. In 2022, voters passed Measure BT which increased the Business License Tax and went into effect this year. It will always be my priority to review our budget, find efficiencies as a first course of action, and minimize the impact of new increases as judiciously and broadly as possible. Over the next four years, I'd consider increasing the City's sales tax by 0.25%. This new revenue stream could be earmarked for capital improvement projects, helping to ensure top-tier amenities and infrastructure

Sales Tax Not in the Cards

After El Segundo waited almost six years for a chance to use voter-approved Measure C, the City Council opted Tuesday to wait awhile longer. The reason? Shoppers in the city might be paying 10.5 percent sales tax if Los Angeles County's Measure A is approved next month.

According to City Manager Darrell George, the combined tax increases presented a "double whammy" to El Segundo residents who supported Measure C. In 2018, the city's voters were promised they wouldn't pay more in sales taxes if Measure C passed, Mayor Pro Tem Chris Pimentel reminded the council during an earlier discussion in August. At that meeting, members learned the state needed El Segundo to decide whether to

activate Measure C.

The county's decision to go back to voters with another sales-tax-funded homelessness measure triggered El Segundo's Measure C, which had been dormant since 2018. On Tuesday, the council had three options: impose the entire 0.75 percent sales tax, choose a lower rate hike, or suspend Measure C and leave the salestax rate at 9.5 percent.

Council members unanimously chose to suspend their taxing authority indefinitely. If Measure A passes, the city can revisit the tax-increase option without having to go back to El Segundo voters for approval, the City Attorney Mark Hensley learned after asking the state for clarification on how a freeze on Measure C would work.




Check It Out

Many kids love non-fiction titles. Fun facts, colorful pictures and interesting info help engage curious minds and learn more about the world around them. A new kids non-fiction title to note is Deborah Freedman's *Partly Cloudy*. This narrative non-fiction title blends social emotional learning with weather facts, to answer the question, "What do you see when you look at the clouds??"

Two bunnies are examining the sky and have two different interpretations of what they see in the clouds. One is fanciful, "cotton candy ... Rapunzel's hair," and the other rabbit is

Saturday Night: Pitch Perfect Casting Brings This SNL Biopic to Life

In his latest film *Saturday Night*, director Jason Reitman reminds us why we should all want to stay in on the weekends. Re-tracing the chaotic hour and a half before the live airing of NBC's inaugural episode of SNL, *Saturday Night* is a full-throttle, non-stop whiplash of hilarity and hijinks. Be prepared to laugh so hard it hurts as you relive one of TV's most historic and hectic nights. Now playing in select theaters, everywhere October 11.

Nearly 50 years ago, a young group of misfit comedians and writers changed the trajectory of television forever. *Saturday Night* begins at 10:00 pm, when Lorne Michaels (Gabriel LaBelle) arrives at 30 Rockefeller Center for the final dress rehearsal of his new show. Immediately, chaos envelops him. There's a llama in the loading bay,

John Belushi still hasn't signed his contract, the stagehands are stoned, scripts are being neutered by the NBC compliance officer, and the lighting director just quit. To put it mildly, it's a disaster.

To top it off, the cast is out of control. The combined untamed energy of Chevy Chase (Cory Michael Smith), Dan Aykroyd (Dylan O'Brien), Gilda Radner (Ella Hunt), Jane Curtin (Kim Matula), Laraine Newman (Emily Fairn), Garrett Morris (Lamorne Morris) and John Belushi (Matt Wood) is enough to make Lorne combust with anxiety. But there is not enough time to panic. With NBC executive David Tebet (Willem Dafoe) expecting perfection and rival funnyman Johnny Carson (voiced by Jeff Witzke) expecting failure, Lorne Michaels can only do one thing: trust his instincts. And right now, his instincts are telling him that this ragtag troupe of performers will somehow be able to pull it all together just before the clock strikes 11:30 pm.

Flag Football Seniors Honored

The El Segundo High School athletic department really knows how to honor their seniors in appreciation for their commitment and dedication to the sport they play. And in its inaugural season the flag football program paid tribute to their ten seniors before their last home game against West Torrance. Jazlene Ramos, Nyla Cho, Shelby Jackson, Maggie Green, Lexi Heredia, Olivia McPherson, Ava Gardner, Victoria Rodriguez, Charli Pages, and Allie Stevenson were honored for their commitment, dedication and for paving the way for more girls to play.

The first time the Eagles faced West Torrance, they fell to the Warriors on a last-minute play. This time around, it would be a different story. Senior quarterback Allie Stevenson demonstrated why she is considered one of the top quarterbacks in the Pioneer League. She led the Eagles to a 33-0 win over the Warriors by tossing five touchdown passes.

After an interception by Ava Gutierrez gave the Eagles great field position, Stevenson connected with sophomore receiver Sarah Farah for a touchdown. Gutierrez, who made three interceptions, made her second interception on the Warriors' next possession. It set up another touchdown pass from Stevenson to Farah to give the Eagles a 12-0 lead.

Early in the second half Stevenson hooked up with Jaz Ramos on a pass over the middle. Ramos evaded two defensive players and outran the others for a 42-yard touchdown. The Eagles benefitted from another interception turnover. This time, Stevenson marched the Eagles down field, where she found Ramos open for a 10-yard touchdown pass and a 26-0 lead. With just under ten minutes remaining Stevenson found Farah open for her third touchdown reception and a 32-0 lead.

As good as the offense was the defense was just as stellar. Rebecca Rodriguez had two sack of the quarterback and several hurries. Gutierrez's three interceptions each led to touchdowns. The win keeps the Eagle's playoff hopes alive.

The Eagles traveled to face the Torrance Tartars, the Pioneer League defending champions. The high-scoring Tartars haven't lost a league game in two seasons. The Eagles played them tight the first time around at home but fell 19-14 on the last play of the game.

The Eagles traveled to play the Tartars but came up short again, falling 19-13. It was a well-played game, and the Eagles made sure Torrance knew they would not be pushovers. Even though El Segundo was handicapped with a few players out due to injuries, they hung tough against the Tartars. Offensively, Jaz Ramos scored two touchdowns, and Sarah Farah scored the extra point. Ava Gutierrez played well on defense, while Ramos had two interceptions.



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



undefeated run to a CIF championship, last season meant the Eagles would be slotted into the more competitive Bay League for the first time in school history. After the 14-4 win over South Torrance in the opening round, the Eagles faced the Damien Spartans. The game was close from the start, but the Eagles hung on for an exciting 11-9 win.

City Council

Measure C allows El Segundo to collect a three-quarter-cent sales tax if the county tries to increase the current 9.5 percent rate through a ballot measure. Next month, the county is asking voters to repeal Measure H, which will expire in 2027, and replace it with Measure A. The replacement measure would be funded through a half-cent sales tax.

Council members first discussed the sales-tax matter on Aug. 20, and their remarks made it clear that implementing Measure C wasn't in their plans for 2024. Tuesday's public hearing led to a decision to suspend Measure C for now. El Segundo will stand down on an added sales tax to spare residents, business owners, and visitors any higher costs.

Had El Segundo used its full Measure C taxing authority, the city's sales tax rate could have reached 10.5 percent—the state's legal limit. Mayor Drew Boyles and the council agreed that going from the lowest tax rate in the South Bay to one of the highest sends the wrong message about doing business in El Segundo.

El Segundo's tax rate is 9.5 percent, making it one of the most affordable cities to shop, own a business, or visit. The beach cities of Manhattan, Hermosa, and Redondo also collect a 9.5 percent tax. According to the California Department of Tax and Fee

Administration, Hawthorne charges a higher rate of 10.25 percent.

Though El Segundo voters approved Measure C six years ago, it's never been activated. Measure C acts as a hedge against the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors collecting higher sales taxes and not sharing it with local cities. Measure C gave El Segundo the right to start collecting up to three-quarters of a cent, or 0.75 percent, if the county asked voters to pay more sales tax fund special programs, such as homelessness or transportation.

On Tuesday, Council members unanimously voted to suspend the city's taxing authority under Measure C, but they reserved the right to exercise the option in the future. The city will forgo an estimated \$9 million in new revenue from imposing a city sales tax, however, El Segundo's tax and fee collections so far this year are 3 to 5 percent higher than anticipated.

City Attorney Hensley also verified the council can choose to levy a smaller tax amount than the three-quarters of a cent that voters ok'd in 2018. Even though El Segundo suspended Measure C, it'll stay activated because L.A. County tried to get a tax measure passed.

L.A. County residents already pay a quarter-cent tax to address homelessness through Measure H, which voters approved

overwhelmingly in 2017. Recent reports, including a lower count of homeless over three nights in January, indicate that Measure H funds are paying dividends. According to Supervisor Janice Hahn's office, community-based efforts to get people off the streets and into shelters and permanent housing are working.

Measure A would replace Measure H and collect another one-quarter of 1 percent sales tax indefinitely, boosting the county sales tax rate to 9.75 percent. The council had a deadline to tell the state what it planned to do, or it risked losing its taxing authority.

At the request of L.A. County, lawmakers enacted the bill that raised the cap on how much sales tax a county can raise to fund special projects, with voter approval. That legislation complicated El Segundo's path to putting Measure C in action.

In other city actions:

- Police Chief Saul Rodriguez told residents to call 911 to report coyote sightings. Calling the emergency number is quicker than searching for a non-emergency number to call, he said. His officers are aware of the increased coyote activity and are using a drone to watch their movements. The plan is to locate the den and contact wildfire officers about relocating the pack from the

airport area. Coyote sightings have increased this summer, with one resident reporting on social media that a coyote was sleeping in the backyard.


for our community. Spread over a large pool, including from visitors who enjoy our restaurants and shops, the felt cost is minimal, and it aligns with what neighboring cities have done or are considering.

Carol Pirsztuk: For the past eight years on Council, I have focused on the City being fiscally responsible, including proposing the implementation of a net zero budgeting model, requiring the City to look internally for optimization before increasing the budget. In 2018, to keep our taxes locally, the residents passed Measure C by a resounding 85%, which would increase the sales tax by 0.75% only if LA County puts a measure on the ballot to raise the sales tax. Unfortunately, in 2023, AB 1679 was passed, which raised the LA County sales tax cap from 10.25% to 10.50%. Thus, if LA County Measure A passes this November, the sales tax will increase to 10.25%, and El Segundo's Measure C will bring the sales tax to 10.5%. The Council is working on a solution to keep the sales taxes locally, which the voters wanted, yet not go to 10.5%.

2. The workplace has changed with many people working remotely creating a glut of vacant office space in El Segundo. How do you propose our city addresses this?

Drew Boyles: Our office vacancy rate is currently around 25%—more than double our usual levels—with the Pacific Coast Highway corridor, particularly mid-rise buildings, being most affected. We are actively collaborating with the business and real estate sectors to tackle these challenges through creative solutions, including flexible property uses. El Segundo continues to thrive as the "Most Important 5 Square Miles," attracting more venture-funded, high-growth companies than ever before, and arguably more per square mile than anywhere in Southern California. Looking ahead, we will be updating our General Plan to optimize land use and zoning, aiming to maximize company and employee presence.

Chris Eidem: I feel that it's only a matter of time before people start going back to the office for work. My company had to navigate through Covid and "work from home" policies starting in early 2020. As time passes, we have implemented a nice balance between working from home and coming into the office at least three days a week. Working from home kills the workplace community and family vibes businesses have when present in the office. I feel that within time, our vacant buildings will be thriving again. I enjoyed Smoky Hollow when it was a light industrial area, so many cool businesses were pushed out when we started gentrifying that district of El Segundo. I would like to see a nice balance between tech, art spaces, and industrial in Smoky Hollow. I do not want to see it turn into a cyber office, art loft, and/ or more apartment buildings.

Lance Giroux: Our current business model east of PCH needs to be reimagined. The reliance on tax revenue from Creative Commercial offices has been significantly impacted by the pandemic and its residual effects. This has led to a noticeable decline in occupancy, with 25% of office space now vacant. It's crucial for developers and

businesses to adapt, and the City Council must be willing to collaborate in this shift. While I'm not advocating for large housing developments, we need to begin exploring viable options and consider potential zoning changes. The lack of affordable housing is a pressing challenge for our businesses, and addressing this is essential. Initiatives like TopGolf and California Smash are already contributing to the vibrant Live, Work, Play community that attracts more people to El Segundo. These concepts may offer valuable solutions to the challenges we face on the east side and help revitalize our vacant spaces.

Michelle Keldorf: Many organizations are rolling out "return to work" policies. While El Segundo's office vacancy was reported at just over 22% in 2023, roughly 380,000 square feet of new office space was approved for construction in 2024. This vacancy isn't just about remote work—it also reflects changing needs in the eyes of spaces employers and employees seek.

The City's role in managing outdated workplaces is to: Help streamline the process for commercial entitlements and building permits; Proactively update codes and development standards to better fit today's needs;

Encourage land use that aligns with our financial goals and the interests of residents. During my six years on the Planning Commission, I've worked closely with City staff on these efforts. I strongly support updating our general plan and land use strategies to drive revenue growth east of Pacific Coast Highway while keeping the community's best interests in mind.

John Pickhaver: We need to prioritize attracting businesses where remote work isn't the focus, like TopGolf and the indoor pickleball facility opening later this year. Additionally, we should promote and expand shared workspace options to retain and attract companies where employees split their time between the office and home. At the same time, this is an opportunity to explore what housing east of PCH could look like. We're facing a housing shortage and rising costs, pushing longtime residents out. By considering mixed-use housing in this area, we could create small businesses with residential units above, providing a built-in customer base. This approach would meet state mandates for new housing while spreading out density, making the west side of PCH less congested in the long run. Mixed-use development could alleviate housing pressure, foster local businesses, and ensure we maintain El Segundo's charm while accommodating growth responsibly.

Carol Pirsztuk: Over 90% of our city's revenue is generated from our business sector. The risk of long-term vacancies in our commercial zone could jeopardize the tax revenue necessary for the services the residents count on (police, fire, roads, etc.). To mitigate this risk, it is imperative that the City is proactive and flexible in attracting new emerging industries, such as El Segundo's successful partnership with SideBar Summit on SoCal Deep Tech Week and LA Tech Week. These alliances introduce El Segundo to new and growing businesses looking to relocate to an area close to the airport, Space Force & Air Force Base, and general space industry.

 are tender.
- Step 3: While the potatoes are cooking, heat the soup, milk and thyme sprigs in a 2-quart saucepan over medium heat until hot. Remove and discard the thyme sprigs.
- Step 4: Drain the potatoes in a colander. Return the potatoes to the saucepan and add the soup mixture. Mash the sweet potato mixture until smooth. Stir in 4 tablespoons hot honey and the brown butter. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve drizzled with the remaining 1 tablespoon hot honey and sprinkled with additional fresh thyme leaves, if desired.
