DWP Under Fire at City Council Meeting For Separate Incidents

Though not on the agenda, recent incidents involving the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power's (DWP) Scattergood plant garnered most of the attention during Tuesday night's El Segundo City Council meeting. During public communications, DWP project manager Louis Ting confirmed why a jarring, "pipe organ-like" sound emanated from the plant last Thursday night. He said an "unforeseen noise" occurred during a pipe clean-up. Steam, he explained, escaped into the atmosphere from non-muffled pipes. Ting went on to note that DWP shut down the units after the blare and installed additional scaffolding and noise blankets so that the cleaning could resume without further ado until its completion this past Monday. Another DWP representative characterized the event as a "unique situation" since this was the first such clean-up in 15 years and the agency "underestimated" the sound mitigation.

Mayor Suzanne Fuentes said the incident "caused a lot of ill will in the city." Councilmember Dave Atkinson, who lives close to the plant, reported that he received no advance warning about the clean-up although Ting indicated that DWP's contractor had posted notices on residents' doors. Atkinson described the sound as "louder than airplane noise" and felt there was no excuse for it happening at night.

Moments after apologizing for last Thursday, DWP had to answer for another incident that took place on September 28

unbeknownst to most of the Council members. Local resident Julia Cohen asked why it took 10 hours to shut down the plant that day despite a "rubber-burning smell." She learned that the odor was due to sulfur dioxide pumped into the air and local citizens were "breathing in toxic fumes." While assured the agency would monitor the air in the future, Cohen was reluctant to trust the situation. "We have to be way harsher...and hold them accountable," she said of future dealings with DWP.

DWP's Wes Pyle called the discharge an "unusual event" related to firing up a new cogeneration unit. "We did not expect to have this sort of release," he said, adding that it took some time to "discover what that was." Pyle explained that a leak turned out to be the culprit and crews ultimately shut down the unit, repaired it and eventually started it back up with no additional issues since. With "lessons learned," he said there will be more due diligence in preparation for the next unit first fire. Councilmember Marie Fellhauer was not satisfied. "I'm okay with lessons learned on noise, but I'm not okay with lessons learned compromising the health and safety of our community—not at all," she said. Fellhauer also asked if there was a way to test for leaks before firing up the entire entity.

At the Mayor's request, the Council will receive additional information from the El Segundo Fire Department in conjunction with DWP and LA Fire Department officials on

understanding the incident and determining the toxicity level of sulfur dioxide. Pyle noted that residents complained about both the smell and throat irritation.

Also on Tuesday, the Council heard a presentation from West Basin District IV Director Scott Houston regarding the agency's preparation of an environmental impact report (EIR) for a proposed desalination (converting ocean water to drinking water) facility. The study will evaluate treatment and purification process alternatives, possible impacts, and recommended design features or mitigation measures. Two potential locations include the south end of the NRG El Segundo Generating Station and the AES site in Redondo Beach. Houston estimated the EIR findings should be complete by next November and if all goes through, the facility could open by 2023. But first, he emphasized, the plan will have to make sense environmentally, be energy-efficient and economically responsible. Houston noted that desalination technology existed in the 1940s but was extremely cost-prohibitive. It is now roughly the same price as recycled water—and even less so if the future facility runs at 60 million gallons a day as opposed to 20 million gallons.

Per City Manager Greg Carpenter's suggestion, the Council will get a fiscal impact analysis as part of the EIR to determine potential utility user tax revenues from plant operations. Atkinson announced his

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Film Review

Brie Larson, Jacob Tremblay Beautifully Take on the World in the Emotional Film Adaptation, *Room*

Hands down, I have not felt so much emotion from a movie since I was 13-years-old watching *Titanic* for the very first time. What I experienced while watching *Room* was a combination of gut-wrenching sorrow, enthusiastic triumph, and sympathetic love all wrapped up in a tightly packaged 118 minutes. Already touting Oscar buzz, and rightfully so, *Room* is one of those special films that gets everything right- from phenomenal performances to ingenious storytelling and visceral camerawork. Films like this don't come in spades. If there is one movie to see this weekend, heck- this year, make sure it is *Room*.

Brie Larson delivers one of the strongest performances of her career as Ma, a victim of a kidnapping who has been forced to create a home out of the petty 10"x 10" woodshed where

love and how through the power of imagination one can survive anything.

Room tips much of its success to the powerhouse performances of industry veterans Joan Allen and William H. Macy. Their heart-wrenching reunion with Ma is near impossible to get through with dry eyes. As I stated earlier, Brie Larson solidifies her reputation in this business as she takes Ma to the darkest of places. We follow her emotional journey so closely that we may begin to lose ourselves in her struggles as a mother, and relate to her even if we don't have children ourselves. And I can't say enough about Hollywood's next rising star, 9-year-old Jacob Tremblay, who brings beauty to the ugliness of his circumstances in *Room*. His innocence and extraordinary talent make him the perfect "Jack," no one could have played

she is being held captive. The film begins on the morning of her son Jack's (Jacob Tremblay) 5th birthday. Jack doesn't know of life outside of their room, or "Room" as it's so innocently named, and Ma has purposefully kept it that way. She creates a vast and exciting wonderland inside this tiny space; from telling stories to coming up with creative rituals to pass the time and intellectually stimulate him. Jack's sense of wellbeing and happiness are all Ma cares about, however, she knows that the two of them can't stay locked in Room forever. One night Ma hatches a risky plan that could either result in living happily ever after in the real world or risk never seeing each other again.

Imagine never knowing anyone other than your mother. Not knowing what a dog looks like, what rain is, or how the wind feels when it blows on your face. This is the life Jack leads, yet despite the absence of materialistic items, he is happy. He is curious when he sees a mouse, whom he simply names "Mouse," eating crumbs from the floor. The single skylight gives Jack an outlet to dream about space and planets. All of this is made possible by Ma who, herself still a child, refuses to give up on a future for herself or Jack. This special bond between mother and son is a testament to

the part as well. His ability to carry a scene and evoke mature emotions with the purity of his childhood makes him so sympathetic and a magnet for our eyes on-screen.

Room is an adaptation of author Emma Donoghue's best-selling literary work of the same name, and those familiar with the novel will certainly not be disappointed in this cinematic interpretation. Keeping true to its integrity, director Lenny Abrahamson (Frank) delicately transforms the 2-dimensional pages of the book into a visually stunning, highly engaging experience.

I left the screening literally speechless: not only do I think *Room* is one of the best films of the year, it sets the bar for other filmmakers attempting innovative storytelling and dynamic character development. *Room* isn't just a movie, it truly is a full body experience and although it can be uncomfortable at times, it pushes the audience to tap into emotions in a way that has rarely been done before. We embrace everything and are mesmerized by it.

Eagles Defining Win Against Culver is Costly

The El Segundo football team defeated highly regarded Culver City Centaurs 42-31 in a key Ocean League matchup. The Eagles had spotted the Centaurs a 24-14 first half lead before outscoring their guests 28-7 in the second half for the win. It was a signature win for the Eagles and head coach Steve Shevlin's program that continues to defy gravity and post wins against quality opponents.

The win, which puts the Eagles in the driver's seat to advance to the CIF post season for a school record eighth consecutive season, may have come at a price though. A number of vital players to the team's success were injured. Shahman Moore, Taj Balogun and Brandon Weldon all left the game without returning and their status against Hawthorne on Friday night is doubtful.

The game could have had a very different ending had it not been for some game changing plays on both offense and defense. Taz Tauaese ripped off a 55-yard touchdown run with the Eagles trailing 14-0 in the first quarter. Then Dylan Radke forced and recovered a Centaur fumble that led to a go ahead touchdown for the Eagles. With the Eagles holding a 28-24 lead late in the third quarter Culver City quarterback Jonathon Martin scrambled his way for an 82-yard run. He was caught at the El Segundo 4-yard line by Haamid Brooks. Though the Centaurs would end up scoring two plays later Martin was injured on the play and left the game and wouldn't return.

Coach Shevlin thought the loss of the Centaur quarterback was a big blow to the Culver City offense. "They weren't the same without their quarterback and the momentum swung our way."

The Eagles were out of sorts and maybe a little challenged in the first quarter. They were forced to use all three of their timeouts in the first quarter. Culver City's momentum was halted briefly when Tauaese busted off a 55-yard TD run to make it 14-7. The Centaurs answered El Segundo's score when Martin completed passes to Mason Mulvihill for 15 yards and Kyle Johnson for 51 yards that set up Deven Osborne's 8-yard TD reception to make it 21-7.

Eagle quarterback Jason Kehl went to work and did his magic by orchestrating a nine play 61-yard drive to help prove a point. "There's a lot of heart in our team and after being down two touchdowns we had to prove how good we can be," Kehl said.

Kehl found Ashton Saltz open for 18 yards and four plays later Tauaese caught a screen pass for 19 yards. Tauaese would get the call to finish the drive by following the line play of George Hayes, Duncan Papalii, Jacob Palomo and Jess Caravello on a four yard run into the end zone to make it 21-14. The Centaurs would end the first half having to settle for a 30-yard field goal after driving to the Eagle's 13-yard line for a 24-14 lead.

That defensive stand at the end of the first half may have been the biggest game

The Los Angeles Dodgers are incapable of winning in October. No matter how much money the team spends, no matter how many big name pitchers are on the staff, the Dodgers continue to find a way to fall apart in the playoffs. Last Thursday night at Chavez Ravine, it was more of the same to end their playoff lives. A 3-2 loss at the hands of the New York Mets in Game 5 of the MLB Divisional Series put the latest exclamation point on yet another Dodgers meltdown. Dodger supporters will tell you that there is reason to be optimistic about the ball club, but positivity remains lacking in a team that can't score runs and put up wins when it truly matters the most.

Dodger Stadium has never been so quiet before. Well, that is unless you count last year. As A.J. Ellis struck out to bring the Dodgers down to their last out, the silence that blanketed a stadium with the largest attendance in the league this year was a firm reminder that the Dodgers don't have what it takes to compete in playoff baseball. A team that has struggled all year long against above-.500 ball clubs, the Dodgers were simply out-pitched, out-hit, and out-managed by Terry Collins and the New York Mets. For a third consecutive year, in a third consecutive playoff series, the Dodgers disappeared into thin air, almost as if they had never even been apparent in the first place.

In the 27 years since going to the World Series last, the front office has changed, players have changed, ticket prices have changed, but the Dodgers' inability to produce

when it matters most, and ability to let all of their fans down, remains the same. "Been standing here before," Dodgers outfielder Carl Crawford said with a blank look on his face. "Same ending again." \$300 million worth of payroll and literally the most expensive team in the MLB couldn't get the job done and continued the narrative that you simply can't buy championships. All of the expectations put on the Dodgers were beaten by a group of young, hard-throwing Mets players that weren't bought, but came up through their farm system and simply wanted to win more. Instead of thinking they were owed a series win, the Mets went out and took it.

"There are really no words to describe how you feel right now," Dodgers manager Don Mattingly said. "You come to spring training, you work all winter, you scratch, you fight all year long to get into this situation and you have a chance. It comes to a crash." The Dodgers' season may not be the only thing coming to a crash-ending. Expect the Dodgers' roster, starting with Mattingly, to look completely different at the start of next year. Between Andre Ethier catching a foul ball in right field that led to a Mets run, the entire Dodgers team forgetting basic fundamentals and leaving third base wide open to the opposing team and players yelling at Don Mattingly in the dugout on live television, it's evident that it's time to make some changes. More changes, though, doesn't necessarily mean more winning.

With 13 runners in scoring position, the Dodgers managed just two hits. If you've been a fan of the Dodgers, not even in just this

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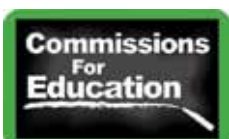

FIND THE RIGHT FINISH FOR THE JOB

Consider the amount of dirt and activity your walls will be exposed to before choosing your paint sheen. Flat or eggshell

sheens should be used in low-traffic areas, because they hold dirt and are more difficult to clean. Semi-gloss and gloss finishes are best suited for high-traffic or active areas, such as a child's bedroom,

because they can be easily washed without losing their luster.

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WORK FROM THE TOP DOWN

If you're painting a room, start with the ceiling first. If you're painting another area or structure, begin with the highest point.

USE THE PROPER BRUSH OR ROLLER TECHNIQUE

When utilizing a brush for tight trim work, dip half the length of the bristles into your paint, then gently tap the brush on the side of the can rather than wiping

it across the lip. Be sure to hold the brush handle near the base to ensure maximum control, applying light pressure to the surface being painted. When using a roller on larger surfaces, slowly roll the brush into the paint tray, ensuring an even coat on all sides. Use the ridges in the upper portion of the tray to remove excess product, then paint the surface in a capital "M" motion. Continue this motion until the area is completely covered.

KEEP YOUR WORKSPACE VENTILATED

This season's temperatures are perfect for a do-it-yourself (DIY) project so take advantage of it. If your project has you painting indoors, open the windows and allow a fresh breeze into your painting space while you work. And when the project is done and your paint has dried, keep the windows open for a few hours to ensure your new room looks as great as it smells. If your project has you painting outside, make sure that the weather forecast is clear for a few days so that your newly-painted project has ample time to dry. •

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Beware of Xylitol Toxicity in Pets

Most people are aware that certain foods that are safe for humans may not be safe for our pets. Chocolate is a good example. Delicious for people; but dogs are unable to metabolize an ingredient in chocolate that acts like a stimulant and can cause hyperactivity, seizures and death in dogs. But lately, Xylitol toxicity in dogs is becoming more common and is far more dangerous than chocolate.

Xylitol is a sugar substitute found in many foods. Xylitol is most often associated with candy and gum but products such as peanut butter and spreads may contain this ingredient. Besides having a sweet flavor, Xylitol will hold moisture in a food product to keep it soft and spreadable and therefore may be found in products that you would not expect to have an artificial sweetener. Xylitol may be listed on product labels under other names such as Eutrit, Kannit, Newtrol, Xylite, Torch or Xyliton. Some manufacturers may place a warning label on their product but most do not.

Even in tiny amounts, Xylitol is deadly to dogs. A single stick of sugar-free gum can be toxic to a 20-pound dog. In people, Xylitol is absorbed slowly and has little to no effect on blood sugar or insulin levels. However, dogs absorb Xylitol quickly, usually within 30 minutes. Xylitol causes a strong insulin release resulting in profound hypoglycemia. If the blood sugar drops too low, the dog will die.

In addition to causing low blood sugar, Xylitol may cause severe liver damage in

some dogs. This can result in bleeding, liver failure and death. Vomiting is most often the first symptom. Lethargy and weakness are signs of hypoglycemia and may occur rapidly. However, some dogs may have delayed hypoglycemia for as long as 12 hours. Diarrhea, collapse and seizures have also been seen after Xylitol ingestion. There is no antidote for Xylitol toxicity. Pets that develop neurologic signs such as seizure and coma will have a poor to grave prognosis.

All Xylitol exposures should be immediately evaluated by a veterinarian! Because Xylitol is absorbed rapidly, early intervention will result in the best prognosis. Remember to bring the packaging or wrapper of the product your pet ingested if possible. It may be helpful in determining the amount of Xylitol your pet has ingested.

Please spread this important information to your fellow pet owners:

Xylitol is deadly to dogs, even in tiny amounts. Xylitol is an artificial sweetener but is found in all kinds of foods not associated with sweet taste. (Xylitol may be listed under different names). Xylitol toxicity involves rapid hypoglycemia and liver damage. Early intervention is crucial with Xylitol exposure. Please have fun with your pets this Halloween season but remember to be extra careful with the candy and treats.

Legal Aid for Elders

What If You Cannot Afford Long Term Health Care for A Dementia Patient? Consider Planning For Medi-Cal

The brochures look more like travel adventure materials than information for long term care facilities for frail and cognitively impaired seniors. Scenic mountain views and adobe style mansions with gourmet chefs and a schedule of daily activities is not what most of us think of when we consider caring for an elderly dementia patient. And the Villas at Houghton, a facility that certainly raises the bar for care, isn't even the most expensive, at \$52,750 per year. Most people will not have access to that level and quality of care, but all will likely be surprised at the cost of long term care.

Several key points about long term care are clarified in a recent article from The Arizona Daily Star, "Costs pile up fast for dementia care." Don't count on Medicare. The median annual cost for a private room in a skilled nursing facility in Tucson last year was more than \$90,896. Assisted living costs about \$45,000. In a 2015 annual Cost of Care survey, results showed that Americans paid approximately \$16,060 more per year in 2015 for a nursing home than they paid in 2010.

Remember that Medicare doesn't pay for long-term care, including home care, aside from 100 days of skilled services or rehabilitative care. After that, it's up to the family to figure out how to pay. The options include long-term care insurance, public assistance through Medicaid programs for people over 65, Veterans Aid, or private pay. On average, an American turning 65 today will incur \$138,000 in future long-term services. This cost could be financed by setting aside \$70,000 today.

A loved one with dementia will increase the costs for round-the-clock care and a secure place to live, with the disease lasting up to 20 years. Caregiver costs, including hospitalizations, skilled nursing facilities, home-health services, day-care services for adults and assisted living add up, and the cost is enormous. One way to ease the emotional cost is to create a plan and provide relief to your family.

When it comes to paying for care, many people incorrectly assume they have too much money to qualify for Medicaid. Talk with an elder law attorney and see whether

you or your loved one qualifies because Medicaid can help pay for both in-home and out-of-home care. The individual must be medically eligible—cognitively impaired or unable to perform at least two activities of daily living on their own (like bathing and eating). Single applicants are not allowed to have resources of more than \$2,000. Applicants who do have more than \$2,000 should talk to an attorney about creating a burial fund, or buying a house or car, as these are all exempt.

Although the gross monthly income limit is \$2,199 for an individual, sometime those with a higher income can set up a "Miller Trust" for the money above that limit. For married couples where only one partner is applying, the income limit is either \$2,199 for the applicant, or an average of the two spouses, whichever is more favorable to the applicant.

It's important to remember that Congress set a five-year look-back period on gifts. So someone who gives money and other assets to children and other family members in order to be eligible has to do this five years before they apply. An elder law attorney can help a single person with too many assets to qualify to spend down those resources on long-term care or on any legitimate expense that benefits either the applicant or the spouse, and then apply.

Long-Term Insurance. People whose incomes are too high to qualify can consider long-term insurance or self-pay. With long-term insurance, typically the buyer defines a monthly amount they'd like to get for a set number of years. For example, a couple could each choose a \$2,000 benefit for five years, and they'd have access to a maximum \$125,000. However, buyers may have to supplement with their own money.

The best time to buy long-term care insurance is when buyers are in their mid-50s to early 60s. If you wait, you might have a medical condition arise and fail the underwriting. For example, a policy might guarantee \$5,000 per month for five years if the individual needs it. Expect the premiums to go up every five years, and note that they are not fixed like level term life. Some folks are surprised by big premium hikes and cancel the coverage. If you buy long-term care, read the policy carefully. •

The Most Treatable Serious Senior Health Issue: Loneliness

(BPT) - While Americans tend to associate the holidays with togetherness, joyful occasions and feelings of warmth and happiness, the season can also worsen feelings of loneliness and isolation for some people - especially older adults. Loneliness is not only bad for seniors' mental health, it can affect their physical wellbeing as well.

"The holidays can present families with an opportunity to spot signs of loneliness in their older family members and take steps to do something about it," says Dr. Kevin O'Neil, chief medical officer of Brookdale Senior Living. "Isolation and loneliness in seniors can lead to debilitating depression, high blood pressure, dementia and shorter life spans. Time and time again we see that when seniors overcome loneliness, make new friends and feel a part of a caring community, they're happier and their physical health improves."

Research illustrates the link between loneliness and the advancement of dementia, deterioration of physical health and shortened lifespans. Conversely, multiple studies show feeling connected and happy is good for your health and can lead to a longer lifespan. What's more, happiness really can be contagious. In fact, one study by researchers

at the University of California and Harvard University found surrounding yourself with happy people can make you more likely to become happy yourself.

"Social connections are vital for people of all ages," O'Neil says. "Emotional ties are even more important for seniors, yet they are also more vulnerable to losing those bonds through the death of a spouse, grown children busy with their own lives or the relocation of a long-time friend who moves closer to be near their own family."

As families gather for the holidays, they should be alert to signs their elders are feeling lonely or isolated, including:

- Your loved one has suffered a loss, either the death of a spouse or friend, or relocation of a long-time cohort.
- They give verbal cues, such as complaining they have no friends, feel confined to their home, have no one to talk to or severely miss a long-deceased companion.
- They exhibit signs of depression, including trouble falling asleep, irritability, loss of appetite and disinterest in activities that used to excite them.
- Their eating habits have changed. Seniors who are feeling isolated and depressed may

lose their appetite, or engage in unhealthy comfort eating.

- Personality or behavioral changes are evident. Your normally stoic loved one has become tearful, a chatty person becomes quiet, or an out-going personality is now withdrawn.

- They become "clingy," holding a handshake or hug longer than normal, and becoming upset when it's time for a visit to end.

- They complain of pain or health issues that the doctor can't explain. In some cases, the "illness" may be an attempt to get attention. In other cases, it can be a physical response to loneliness.

- A person who was once very capable may begin to have difficulty managing daily tasks or their finances.

"It's vital seniors stay connected," O'Neil says. "Every Brookdale Senior Living community has resident programming, activities and opportunities for seniors to develop closer relationships."

He recommends some tactics to help seniors combat loneliness:

- Get moving. Physical exercise increases the body's level of "feel good" hormones, and can contribute to improved sleep, as well as fewer aches and pains. Seniors should get 30

minutes of moderately intense exercise per day, and if you exercise with companions, you're also reaping the social benefits of the activity.

- Sit down with a friend or family member and watch a funny movie or TV show together. Laughter's positive effects on the mind and body are well documented. Laughing together improves mood and can make people feel more connected.

- Make new connections. Sit with someone at lunch whom you don't know well. Ask a neighbor to go for a walk with you. Join a club or social organization.

- Help yourself feel better by helping others. Volunteering has many positive effects on mental health. When you volunteer your time to help others, you'll feel good about your actions and also expand your opportunities to meet new people.

- Learn something new - it's not only good for cognitive health, it gives you the chance to make new connections with other students. Take a craft class, go to a personal finance seminar or take a cooking class.

"Loneliness can be a serious health issue for seniors," O'Neil says. "Fortunately, it's also one of the most treatable." •

support for a desalination facility, calling it "something we need to do" because there is "only so much water in the world and it can't be reproduced." Meanwhile, two Council members from Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach recently announced their opposition to the project.

Pluto's Big Moon Charon Reveals a Colorful and Violent History

NASA's New Horizons spacecraft has returned the best color and the highest resolution images yet of Pluto's largest moon, Charon—and these pictures show a surprisingly complex and violent history. At half the diameter of Pluto, Charon is the largest satellite relative to its planet in the solar system. Many New Horizons scientists expected Charon to be a monotonous, crater-battered world; instead, they're finding a landscape covered with mountains, canyons, landslides, surface-color variations and more.

"We thought the probability of seeing such interesting features on this satellite of a world at the far edge of our solar system was low," said Ross Beyer, an affiliate of the New Horizons Geology, Geophysics and Imaging (GGI) team from the SETI Institute and NASA Ames Research Center in Mountain View, California, "but I couldn't be more delighted with what we see!"

High-resolution images of the Pluto-facing hemisphere of Charon, taken by New Horizons as the spacecraft sped through the Pluto system on July 14, and transmitted to Earth on Sept. 21, reveal details of a belt of fractures and canyons just north of the moon's equator. This great canyon system stretches across the entire face of Charon, more than a thousand miles, and probably around onto Charon's far side. Four times as

long as the Grand Canyon, and twice as deep in places, these faults and canyons indicate a titanic geological upheaval in Charon's past.

"It looks like the entire crust of Charon has been split open," said John Spencer, deputy lead for GGI at the Southwest Research

Institute in Boulder, Colorado. "In respect to its size relative to Charon, this feature is much like the vast Valles Marineris canyon system on Mars."

The team has also discovered that the plains south of the canyon, informally referred to as Vulcan Planum, have fewer large craters than the regions to the north, indicating that they are noticeably younger. The smoothness of the plains, as well as their grooves and faint ridges, are clear signs of wide-scale resurfacing.

One possibility for the smooth surface is a kind of cold volcanic activity, called cryovolcanism. "The team is discussing the possibility that an internal water ocean could have frozen long ago, and the resulting volume change could have led to Charon cracking open, allowing water-based lavas to reach the surface at that time," said Paul Schenk, a New Horizons team member from the Lunar and Planetary Institute in Houston.

Even higher-resolution Charon images and composition data are still to come as New Horizons transmits data, stored on its digital recorders, over the next year -- and as that happens, "I predict Charon's story will become even more amazing!" said mission Project Scientist Hal Weaver, of the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory in Laurel, Maryland. The New Horizons spacecraft is currently 3.1 billion miles (5 billion kilometers) from Earth, with all systems healthy and operating normally. •

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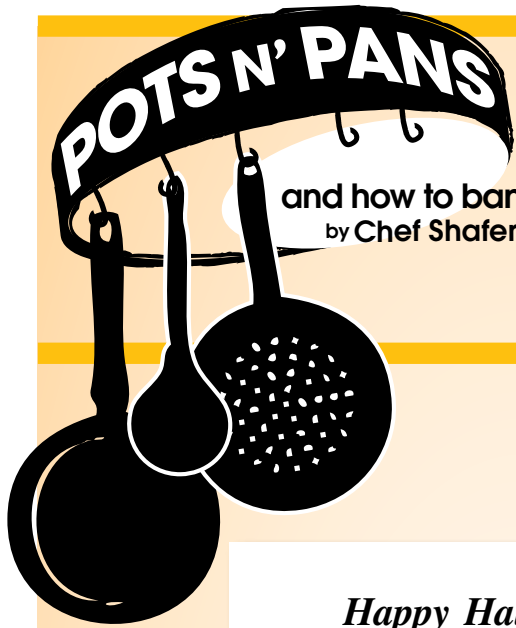
