Math Students Compete at Engineers' Games; Look Forward to Engineering Careers

When Morningside High School students Adam Villalpando, Elliot Villalpando and Salvador Gonzalez were selected to be a part of Raytheon's Engineers' Games, they didn't know what to expect but they were sure that they wanted to be there.

"I am actually trying to major in engineering and I have been interested in the subject since middle school," said Adam Villalpando, a Morningside senior and President of the Society of Hispanics Professional Engineering. "The competition offered me more insight into what I want to do. It was fun since I got to spend the day with my little brother and we were able to share a passion that we both have."

Engineers' Week, which was celebrated February 18-22, has different activities every day and began the week with MathMovesU Day. Tuesday was the Tech Honors Recognition Lunch, Wednesday was the Engineer Games and Lab Tour, Thursday was Innovation Day and Friday wrapped up the week's events with Society of Women Engineers Shadow and Engineer Day.

"I wish I had been able to do something like this when I was in high school--at that time math was math, but you couldn't really see what kinds of problems you could solve with it," said Noel Ellis, 2013 Engineers Week Chair for Raytheon SAS and Acting Director of the Electronics Engineering Center. "We studied science, but I really wasn't sure what engineering was and as a result I was good at math and I was good at science. But what do I do with that? This is all about getting the students to understand what engineering is and how we apply math and science to solving difficult problems or easy problems. It is the applications taken to solve a problem."

Morningside has been working with Raytheon for several years now and the experience has always been well-received by students and teachers. "This is my first year, so it was new to me--but I was able to select the students that were interested in engineering and computers, which is why I selected those three students," math teacher Jane Hang said. "This is a very great experience. I think they [students] can learn a lot from the outside world by getting a lot of information, including hands-on experience with engineers through companies like this. It is very good for the students and we want

Passover and Easter celebrations are upon us and Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Los Angeles (spcaLA) offers solutions and preventative measures so that the holidays will be happy and stress-free for everyone, including pets. Those preparing for Passover may wish to feed their pets food containing only unleavened grains, as well as avoiding the mixture of meat and dairy. For suggestions of pet foods appropriate for Passover, please call or visit the spcaLA Marketplace in Long Beach (562-570-4926). The Marketplace carries a variety of grain free pet foods and foods that contain meat but no dairy. Easter and spring might be a time for bunnies and chicks, but they require a lot of care and attention. After the novelty of a pet rabbit or baby chick has worn off, and the daily responsibility of feeding, cleaning, exercising and giving attention to the animal has set in, all too often the animal is dumped either in a park or in a shelter. Play it safe and buy your child an ultra soft stuffed rabbit or chick instead. That way there are no consequences if they become bored with the daily chores. For those adamant about getting a live animal, always adopt one versus buying and remember that it is a lifetime commitment. Lilies are beautiful but are poisonous to dogs and cats and can cause kidney failure. Easter time brings lots of candy into the household, especially chocolate. And just like most people, pets love chocolate. The big difference is chocolate can make animals very sick, so keep all candy, especially chocolate away from your pets. Baskets filled with goodies are a big hit on Easter. While Easter grass may make the basket look inviting, it can be very dangerous to animals. If ingested, the grass can cause a serious intestinal blockage that may require surgery. Instead of the plastic grass use a safer alternative such as straw, tissue paper, or newspaper shredding to fill the basket. •

Gutierrez, Hawthorne Enjoy Big Week

Sophomore Dominic Gutierrez enjoyed a big week as Hawthorne High's baseball team enjoyed three consecutive blowout wins last week. At Leuzinger on March 19, the Cougars scored their second rout of their cross-town rival Olympians, winning 17-2. In a doubleheader against St. Monica from Santa Monica last Saturday at Hawthorne, the Cougars enjoyed two 10-run mercy rule wins over the Mariners by scores of 13-3 and 11-1.

In the three games combined, Gutierrez went six for eight with 11 runs batted in and eight runs. He was two for two with five RBIs, two runs and two doubles in Hawthorne's doubleheader opener. In the nightcap, Gutierrez went two for two, drove in three runs, scored two and had a double.

Also in the first game of the twin bill against St. Monica, Jonathan Marquez went three for three with one run scored. Winning pitcher Mark Laffoon went four innings, allowing one earned run and three hits. He struck out five batters and walked three. Against Leuzinger, Gutierrez was two for four with three RBIs, two runs and a triple.

Hawthorne (7-4) had a balanced offensive attack. Jose Sandoval went three for four, drove in three runs and scored once. Moses Chavez was two for four with two RBIs and two runs scored. Javier Martinez went two for three with two RBIs and two runs. Antonio Ramirez went two for three, drove in a run and scored twice. Gutierrez was also the winning pitcher by hurling four innings. He allowed one hit on two hits and struck out five. Highlighting the Olympians (1-9) was sophomore Angel Vital, who was two for three with a double.

Hawthorne hosts Lawndale in non-league play today at 3:30 p.m. The Cougars then will play in the St. Paul Easter Tournament from Saturday through next Wednesday. Hawthorne begins the Ocean League at home against Santa Monica on April 9. Leuzinger hosts Animo Leadership from Inglewood today and Lynwood next Wednesday in 3:15 p.m. non-league games.

LAWDALE ROUTS LEUZINGER

After falling to Culver City 9-1 on March 19 at home, Lawndale High's baseball team rolled over Leuzinger 12-1 last Friday at Lawndale. Keying the Cardinals in their win over the Olympians was senior Steven Rudolph, who was two for three with three RBIs. Arnold Escobedo went two for five and scored a run.

Freshman winning pitcher Miguel Osorio went three innings, allowing one run and four hits. He had four strikeouts and only one walk. Relievers, senior Sergio Blandon and freshman Luis Valencia, held Leuzinger scoreless, giving up just one additional hit over four innings. Ben Cady went three for

three for the Olympians.

On March 19, Lawndale had a hard time containing Ocean League power Culver City. It was the Cardinals' second loss to the Centaurs. At Culver on March 15, Lawndale lost to the Centaurs 4-3. "In the first game, we had a mental breakdown," Lawndale head coach Tony Parente said.

Parente, a standout player at El Segundo High under the late legendary head coach John Stevenson (1933-2010) during the 1980s, is in his first season as head mentor for the Cardinals. "I'm trying to bring that same exposure I had at El Segundo to

The Cardinals are off to a 7-3 start, their best since Lawndale High reopened in 1998 (closed down from 1981-98) and had their first baseball team in 2003. "Previously, we lacked leadership," Parente said. "We have players who have played together their entire life. A good nucleus helped."

Host Lawndale meanwhile, rolled over cross-town rival Environmental Charter 13-1 on March 20. The Cardinals visit Hawthorne in non-league play today at 3:30 p.m. Lawndale opened the Pioneer League at North Torrance last Tuesday and host the Saxons Friday at 3:15 p.m.

The Horrors of the WBC

The World Baseball Classic (WBC) has proven to be effective for the globalization of baseball. For approximately three weeks out of the year, the tournament displays national baseball teams featuring professional players from the highest level leagues around the world, including Major League Baseball (MLB). The tournament not only provides a platform for the best players from around the world to compete against one another while representing their home nations, but it also helps to promote the game around the globe. For that reason and that reason alone, Bud Selig and the rest of the executives in charge of MLB have become married to the idea of the WBC. The players who participate in the Classic may be putting themselves at a greater risk than most teams' owners and general managers would like, however. With the risk of injury to key players on contenders' rosters, is the World Baseball Classic worth the three-week display of talent that most baseball fans don't even avidly follow anyway?

Though Japan has dominated the World Baseball Classic since the inception, there is no denying that the Dominican Republic has been and is one of the greatest teams to exist in the tournament's history. Featuring some of the best baseball players from Major League Baseball, the Dominican Republic made short work of this year's tournament in beating Puerto Rico 3-0 in the final while capping off an undefeated run at the championship. One of the key contributors to the country's success (in addition to many others) was the Los Angeles Dodgers' very own Hanley Ramirez. The Dodgers acquired Ramirez from the Miami Marlins at last year's trade deadline to fill in at third base and shortstop for the club.

In just half a season last year, Ramirez brought power from the plate that was otherwise nonexistent for the Dodgers in previous years while also fitting in nicely with the rest of his teammates. Now, however, the Dodgers may be looking at spending an extended period of time without Ramirez after he tore his right thumb ligament diving for a ball in the WBC. With a star-studded roster like the one that the Dodgers display this year, the only thing that can stop them from being an elite team is having to deal with injury. Already worried about Zack Greinke and Carl Crawford, the Dodgers now must focus their attention on getting Ramirez back into playing shape as well. "It's bad, it's bad," said Ramirez. "It's something I can't control. It could happen anywhere. Unfortunately, it happened in the WBC. It's very disappointing." But would the injury really still have happened if Ramirez was at spring training in Arizona with the rest of the club? It's a question that will certainly never reveal an answer, but sustaining an injury of that magnitude that will now have the star shortstop missing opening day and the first two months of the season would seem very unlikely to happen in spring training.

While Ramirez even through his injury seems to be in favor of the WBC, many

athletes have been barred from participating by their teams or have simply declined the invitation outright. Detroit's Justin Verlander, Tampa Bay's David Price and even LA's Clayton Kershaw all turned down bids to play for their respective countries in the tournament. The risk of injury is obviously the biggest cause for concern from players and coaches around the Major Leagues, although many, like Dodgers' General Manager Ned Colletti, contend that injury could happen anywhere and at anytime. "Things happen all the time. Injuries happen to teams all the time," Colletti stated. "We have to play without [Ramirez] for eight weeks. I think our offense is still good. There's nothing more we can do about it." At the moment, Colletti is correct. Come next time, however, the GM may think twice before letting any of his players participate in a tournament that concludes only two weeks before the season begins.

The concept of the World Baseball Classic simply does not seem important enough to merit as many setbacks as it does. In addition to injury risk, players will lose time that they need to get familiar with their teams. Spring training is a time for catchers to get used to catching pitchers, pitchers to get used to throwing to catchers and hitters to get work on their mechanics. Instead of worrying about their teams, managers like Don Mattingly begin to worry if players like Hanley Ramirez will return to the club in one piece. The WBC is not the Olympics. Baseball was voted out of the Olympics for the 2012 games and the WBC doesn't get nearly the same viewer interest as the Olympics. That being said, don't look for the tournament to disappear anytime soon. The Commissioner and other key MLB executives are "1,000 percent committed" to the idea of the tournament. "It's a worldwide event and it's an unqualified success," said MLB Executive Vice President Tim Brosnan, who chooses to look past all of the negatives that the tournament may present. "People can talk negatives all they want. I can cite 1,000 positives for every negative."

Despite the fact that potential all-stars get injured and other all-stars choose to not even participate, it looks as if the Classic will be around for good. The games don't come close to selling out, even with highly discounted tickets. In America, only five newspapers from outside of the Bay Area (where the championship game was held) even sent reporters to cover the championship round. Even so, the passion that was shared in many countries outside of the USA goes unequaled--and both the Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico this year gained a national identity as the two nations received the chance to celebrate as their own stars took center stage. So for now, Dodger fans' cries will fall upon deaf ears. They will be without a starting shortstop for almost half of the season, but that's the way the ball rolls. The World Baseball Classic will indeed be back in effect again and Major League Baseball fans everywhere will have to begin their worry once more. •
