Board Noted the Importance of Technology Initiatives

With the academic and fiscal years winding down, Tuesday's meeting of the Wiseburn Board of Trustees advanced business at hand while looking forward to 2016-17.

Shannon Tupper, technology/library clerk, gave a wrap-up on technology at Peter Burnett Elementary School. Tupper thanked the Board for their vision and trust in funding three loaded Chromebook carts, giving every child at Burnett access.

"We really appreciate that you had the faith in us to do that," Tupper said. "The Board's largesse allowed the program to develop far and beyond what was initially expected."

The technology was intended to give fourth and fifth grade students practice for standardized testing, which is delivered completely in digital format. With the added roll-out in third grade, every student had access to the state-of-the-art tablets.

"Having one-to-one devices has been transformative," Tupper said. "It gave teachers the flexibility to do as much or as little as they wanted with the technology."

The kids have become extremely attached to their Chromebooks, even going so far as to name the tablets, she added. Tupper said students are now doing individual projects, as well as using Google applications to submit their work to teachers and to share peer-reviewed feedback with their classmates.

Supervisor Dr. Tom Johnstone conveyed the Board's appreciation, saying their vision was tantamount to their confidence in Tupper. "We gladly supported the technology being widely used at Burnett, under your direction. We saw it as the absolute best use of your time," he quipped. Board Member Neil Goldman thanked Tupper for being such a great advocate for the district's students. "These kinds of programs embody our mission," Goldman said.

A community representative reported on the current situation with Little League in the district, saying that the already contentious situation has taken a turn. He reported that an investigation into election fraud has been implemented and

there is a Change.org petition gathering steam to push for suspension of members who have broken rules.

"We are fighting for a better league," rep said. He said he was asked by a certain group to represent their concerns at the Board. Because Little League games take place at local schools, district action is critical at this juncture. Johnstone said the board would have to get involved.

"I'd like to see some balance," Johnstone said, noting that the conflict appears to fall between two groups. He said that he will have to push the current governing body to take action. He added that Wiseburn has had a strong Little League program since the mid-1950s.

Member Goldman asked for a moment in acknowledgement of the attacks in Florida, saying this is the largest terrorist attack since 9-11.

Board Member Roger Banuelos, noted that with his youngest son's graduation, his family will complete eleven years at Burnett. "I used to dream of seeing our kids from CDC to graduation and now we're talking about beyond high school. I'm really proud of that," Banuelos said. He thanked the board for a "great year."

David Wilson, chief business official, reported that the state budget had been adopted and the Wiseburn Board will meet for a budget workshop and public hearing June 28, with plans to adopt the official budget for 2016-17 at a follow-up meeting June 29.

Chris Jones, deputy superintendent, gave a report on the current trend in "future ready" initiatives. This involves getting schools focused on properly integrating technology innovations into academic operations.

"We have renegotiated to add twenty plus hours at our help desk," Jones said. "We now have 17 full time technology mentors. They'll be equipped to take a leadership role in helping principals determine how to use technology at the onset, not as an afterthought. It's going to be a very exciting year."

Board Vice-President JoAnne Kaneda, chairing the meeting in the absence of President Israel Mora, noted the importance of technology

initiatives. "When we support these kinds of programs, we don't just see linear growth," Kaneda said. "We've grown exponentially, with the expertise of people like Tupper."

Vince Madsen, director, facilities planning, reported on construction progress, saying final budget projections on the Wiseburn high school site will be presented to the board at the next meeting. "All change orders have been incorporated into the budget," Madsen said. "Including the unexpected \$400,000 Cal-OSHA mandate for guard rails."

Action items included a proposal for new flooring at the Wiseburn project and a decision to reject painting bids that were over budget. Madsen reported on the "resilient flooring" installation and said new bids are being sought immediately to insure painting at Cabrillo is completed by the start of school. Both items were approved unanimously.

Consent items were also approved unanimously. Included in the routine actions were additional CELDT testing hours, field trips and conference attendance, kindergarten assessment testing, moving stipends and employee and consultant agreements.

Eight personnel matters, initially handled in closed session, were on agenda. All were acted upon and approved unanimously

In his report, Johnstone noted an impressive number of students at the Burnett 5th grade awards assembly receiving honor roll commendations as well as the Presidents' award from Barack Obama for high academic excellence. He reported visits to the east coast to observe schools on a K-14 system. Students graduate with their first two years of college already complete. This kind of programming can effectively "fix the broken pathway," encouraging seamlessly matriculate to higher education.

The next meeting of the Wiseburn School Board will be Tuesday, June 28 at 6:00 p.m. at Board headquarters. The meeting will proceed as a budget workshop, with a public hearing. A follow-up meeting the next day, Wednesday, June 29, at 7 p.m., will be held to officially adopt the budget. •

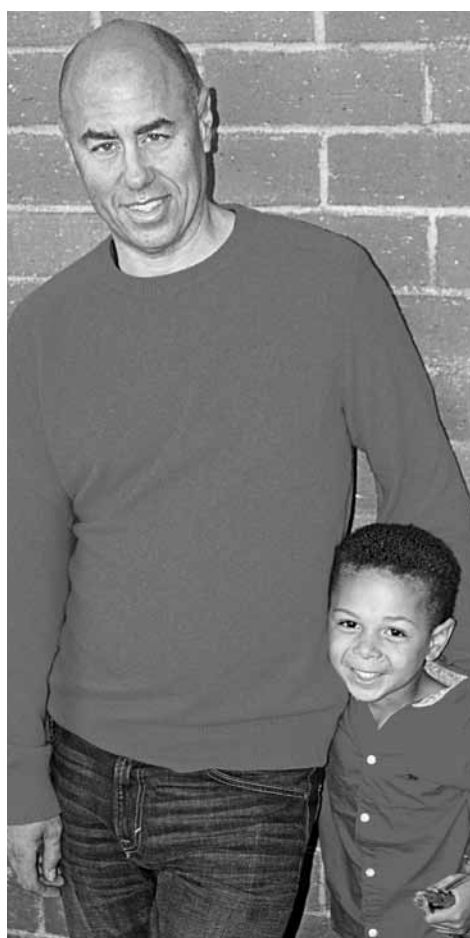

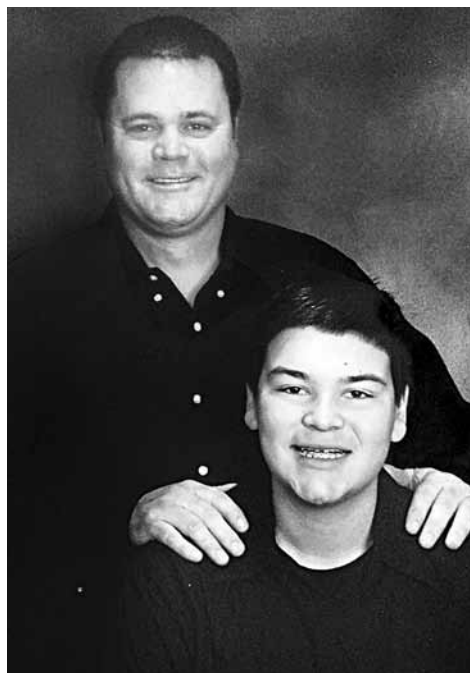

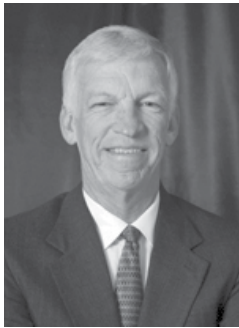

Centinela Valley Historical Society BBQ



The Rancho Adobe, considered the first house of the South Bay, was built in 1834 by Ignacio Machado.

A walk through the Centinela Adobe Complex represents a walk back in time, a throwback, but one brimming with vestiges of a past still within reach of today's modernity.

The crank phone on the wall, the vintage adding machines and typewriters give a glimpse of operations just a generational stone's throw shy of the digital divide.

This weekend, over 300 neighbors and friends attended the 41st Annual BBQ and fundraiser. Participants enjoyed a vintage car show, consumed a communal meal and toured the three buildings.

The two-acre compound houses three separate structures. The Rancho Adobe, considered the first house of the South Bay, was built in 1834 by Ignacio Machado. The Walter Haskell Research Center features a war room, with photographs and memorabilia from the Civil War through the Gulf War era.

The land offices of Daniel Freeman, a cottage

home with the first floor office preserved much the same as the original space, was relocated here in 1975 from the original site at Florence and Inglewood avenues. At that crossing where a railroad station, livery stable and boarding house stood in 1888, Freeman, a distinguished lawyer from Canada, sold the lots that would create the new town of Inglewood. Today, a walk-through gives one a sense of the bustling business handled here.

The museum complex, operated by the Historical Society of the Centinela Valley, is a repository of artifacts, furnishings and memorabilia from the mid- and late 1800s.

It's a place to visit often, taking in the essence of the pioneering families of this local community. You'll leave wanting more.

The Centinela Adobe Complex is open Sundays from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. A Fiesta Day event is planned for September. •
