## Newly Elected Lawndale City Clerk Carries Family Legacy Forward

Rhonda Hofmann Gorman stands on some seriously tall shoulders. She was appointed to her first political office as City Clerk of Lawndale just last month, but her family's legacy in city governance harkens back more than three decades. Gorman now bears the torch carried by her father, the late Harold E. Hofmann, a venerated council member and mayor of Lawndale for over 23 years.

"It will be three years in October," Gorman said, who still feels the sting of losing her father and her greatest mentor. She recalls the lively and sometimes heated discussions they would have, going around and around, only to have him admit he agreed with her stance all along.

"There was a lot of training going on," Gorman said, noting her father got a kick out of playing devil's advocate, and getting her worked up. "He would tease me, but he wanted a lively debate."

"He knew I would want to run, that I would want to serve this community someday," Gorman said. But fear of nepotism concerns being raised kept Gorman in the background. "I couldn't even serve on any boards or commissions."

Instead, the senior Hofmann wisely pushed her to find leadership roles in education, where she became active on school site councils and advisory boards at Lawndale schools. There was also the campaign trail, yet another training ground. "My mom and I ran his campaigns," Gorman added.

Gorman learned the power of the vote early when, as a young voter, she campaigned for her dad and a fellow candidate. "I walked the streets of Lawndale campaigning for [Hofmann] and Neil Roth." But when it came time to vote, friends advised her that she needed to choose. She shouldn't vote for both; that would

effectively cancel out her vote. "Just vote for your dad," they said.

"I went home crying that night. I burst into the house in tears," she said, confessing to her parents that she had neglected to cast a vote for Roth. When the tally came in, her father won—by one vote! Naturally, the close result warranted a recount, and eventually Hofmann was confirmed as the winner. But, it had a lasting and visceral impact on Gorman.

As City Clerk, Gorman will oversee municipal elections, certifying results and the swearing-in of new delegates. She hopes to use her new platform to increase voter turnout. In a city of 33,000 plus folks, residents mostly ignored the April election, where the office of mayor was up for grabs as well as two city council seats.

"I call it my right to gripe," she said. "Being a registered voter, that means I can complain," Gorman said. "Getting the word out and advertising voting initiatives is key."

Gorman said she was very surprised to get unanimous approval from the five-member council. "I didn't anticipate it, I was very surprised," she said. "I was sitting there, thinking, 'I need three.' But I'm pretty vocal and involved; they know on every issue how I feel, so I'm very pleased with it."

Gorman currently works in the neonatal intensive care unit at Providence Little Company of Mary Medical Center in Torrance.

In her spare time, she fosters dogs. Her latest charge was rescued from Alondra Park where it had been abandoned, along with its sibling that wandered into the street and was hit by a car. Gorman gets them ready for adoption—getting them shots, neutered, and monitoring their temperament before they are released.

A longtime volunteer at Environmental Charter

High School, Gorman remembers Secret Service agents and other White House staff crawling all over ECHS in 2010, when the school was nominated as a top five high school in the country by President Obama, who planned to present the award at graduation ceremonies.

Another school captured the honor but, says Gorman, those other contenders were schools with 100 year histories. ECHS is in its 20th year in 2016. Hilda Solis, Secretary of Labor in the Obama Administration, spoke on behalf of the president.

Gorman has a native's eye-view on the city's unique development. "I've watched Lawndale do a lot of incredible things in the last 30-40 years.

"There have been some really phenomenal thinkers, people who really questioned where they wanted to see the city go," Gorman said. "Now things have gotten a bit easier and handleable. We are at the final end of those projects."

"Our reserve fund, that's something we're very proud of," Gorman said. "It took 20-plus years to grow that reserve. The current council is all on the same page of keeping that reserve healthy. Our employees don't have to worry that they will be laid off or fired."

A final tribute to Harry Hofmann, the giant who paved her path, bears noting: Gorman says her use of her maiden name is not so much about women's lib or feminism. In fact, it was her late husband's idea. She says Joe insisted the whole family take the Hofmann name as their own. "He had our kids take it, too. It's really a gift from my husband.

"Joe, who is referred to incorrectly as Mr. Hofmann, felt so strongly after spending time with my parents and seeing their impact in the city, he insisted, 'I should have taken your last name.'" •

# Film Review

## Comic Gem out of New Zealand 'Hunt for the Wilderpeople' Bursts with Laughs

Coming off of his 2014 little seen but well-received New Zealand vampire mockumentary "What We Do in the Shadows," writer/director Taika Waititi fleshes out his cheeky brand of deadpan humor in his follow-up comedy "Hunt for the Wilderpeople." This fun adventure story bursts with laughs, surprisingly heartfelt pathos, and can be considered his all-around best movie yet.

Waititi previously hit the nail – or rather, coffin – on the head in "Shadows" (starring the dryly hilarious Jemaine Clement) by making audiences laugh throughout the whole movie, not sparing any joke that could perfectly punch up a moment. It is clear Waititi is skilled and gifted in his comedic sensibilities. It's this strength of his that shines through in his movies, including "Wilderpeople," which shows his instincts as a comedian who understands how to craft a deadpan comedy that not only makes a movie move from beat to beat and joke to joke, but presents a heartfelt story as well. If it's Waititi's comedic style that makes "Wilderpeople" a gem, it's to the credit of the movie's cast who brings that comedy to life, their characters being both ridiculously funny and yet so rich in heart and empathy, giving substance to an otherwise quirky and off-beat indie film.

Our main character is Ricky, played by relative newcomer Julian Dennison in a breakout role. He anchors the movie not only with his weighty figure, but also with his cheeky one-liners and wannabe gangster rap attitude, a front that clearly reveals his reluctant wish for love, being that he is a foster care child. If his comically-anarchic swagger has upset other families, his new adoptive mother Bella (Rima Te Wiata) would love him just the same, allowing him to run away from home whenever he wants (just as long as he's back for breakfast). Certainly, the Child Services lady Paula (Rachel House) is happy

to be rid of Ricky as she covers up that his past is full of punching stuff, kicking stuff, burning stuff and stealing stuff. A watchful eye is also had by his weary "Uncle" Hec (Same Neill).

Without giving much else away, the movie turns into an unexpected adventure movie with Ricky and Hec finding themselves in the situation of being on the run from the authorities (and a hilariously diligent Paula), leaving the boy and his reluctant guardian to survive in the New Zealand forest with all of the dangers and enemies that wish to hunt them down. The comedy comes a mile-a-minute, balancing from light chuckles to hearty gut-laughs, yet is built on a foundation of love and acceptance, as Ricky and Hec both change and grow in spirit from the beginning to the end.

At a time when comedies in the U.S. range from the Hard-R genre a la "The Hangover" and "Trainwreck," "Hunt for the Wilderpeople" is a much-welcomed movie to watch with family and friends. It's certainly a film that will intrigue audiences to watch Waititi's previous movies, as well as anticipate his next big-screen outing (the sizably bigger "Thor: Ragnarok"), proving that Waititi has become a director that we should join on any adventure.

"Hunt for the Wilderpeople" is rated PG-13 for thematic elements including violent content, and for some language. 101 min. Now playing in select theaters. •

## The Right Way to Wash your Workout Gear



(BPT) - If you're finding more stains on your clothes because the weather is warming up, you're not alone. You may find yourself doing more loads of laundry during the summer, when outdoor activities like hiking and sports are likely to cause extra stains.

To help you take on your growing laundry pile, Whirlpool Corporation's Institute of Home Science cleaning expert Mary Zeitler weighed in on the best ways to wash workout gear and remove your toughest stains:

### Washing Athletic Clothes

Zeitler suggests turning running shorts, yoga pants, lycra and spandex garments inside out before washing. You should also wash these garments in warm - not hot - water, and stay away from liquid chlorine bleach which can break down the fabric.

### Dirt And Mud

Remove excess dirt and mud from the surface and rinse in cold water before adding to the washer. Wash in the warmest water safe for the garment with a gentle detergent and, if necessary, you can follow up with a

wash in color-safe bleach for colors or liquid chlorine bleach for whites. For grass stains, Zeitler says to check the care label and soak the garment in a mixture of detergent and water before adding to the warmest wash that's appropriate for the material.

### Sweat And Odors

Apply liquid detergent or a pre-treater to help loosen deodorant, which can trap sweat and odors. If the odors persist, you can always send the garment through another cycle before transferring to the dryer.

No matter what kind of stain you're working with, don't put your stained clothes in the dryer until you are sure it was successfully removed.

Another way to wash workout gear is to take advantage of the PowerWash System within the Maytag Front Load Washer, which provides great cleaning power and the ability to handle your toughest loads.

## Lennox 50/70 Stars Get Disqualified from Sub-Division

Over the past few seasons, the Lennox Little League had a lot of success with championships in District 37, California Section 4 and even Southern California. Lennox had one appearance in the World Series a few years ago.

The Lennox 50/70 stars, which include players ranging from ages 11-13 years, came off winning and going unbeaten in the District 37 and Section 4 Tournaments and, last week, entered the Southern California Sub-Division 3 Tournament at Matabutu Little League in Ventura. However, when the team arrived in Ventura, the players and coaches were told that they were already disqualified and had to forfeit out of the tournament, for some untold reason.

"We just got disqualified," Lennox manager Celso Castro, Jr. said. "There was a protest involved and they (tournament officials) didn't even tell us. All of our kids are the age they need to be and they are eligible. We appealed it but it's too late. I'm very upset since they did not give us a reason." According to Castro, the team is expected to hear about its disqualification this week.

Lennox won the district over Tri Park at Jim Thorpe Park in Hawthorne. It defeated Riviera of South Torrance, 7-5 for the Section 4 title on June 25 at North Venice Little League Field.

Lennox Seniors Fall to Manhattan: The Lennox Senior (age 14-15) Little League All-Star Baseball team started out well when they rolled over District 25 champion Santa Monica and powerful District 36 champion Manhattan Beach 7-6 in the first two rounds on July 2 and 3, in order, at Marine Park in Manhattan Beach.

After handing Manhattan Beach, which had some appearances in the World Series in recent years, its first section loss in the past few seasons, Manhattan bounced back to eliminate Lennox with wins of 10-6 on July 6 and 7-2 on July 7. "After beating Manhattan Beach the first time, we got a little cocky," Lennox manager Cellos Castro, Sr. said. "Things went wrong from there. They're Manhattan Beach."

In Lennox's win over Manhattan Beach on July 3, Victor Valdez keyed the offense with a double and two long singles. He drove in

two runs and scored twice. Chris McFeeters went 2-for-4 and drove in two runs. Winning pitcher Jesus Sanchez pitched six and two-thirds innings, allowing six runs but just two were earned due to three errors. Manhattan Beach still had the bases loaded with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning but closer Julian Diaz got the final batter to pop out, preserving Lennox's win.

Valdez had another RBI double and McFeeters continued to excel on offense over the final two games. Manhattan Beach moved on to the Southern California Division Tournament, which started last Saturday.

District 37 Big Leaguers Lose to Culver City: Shortly before his Lennox Senior Little League All-Star Baseball team played in the California Section 4 Tournament, Celso Castro, Sr. also guided the District 37 Big League (age 17-18) All-Star squad a week earlier. The squad comprised of players from Lennox, Hawthorne American, Tri Park and Lawndale Little Leagues. Unfortunately, they lost in the final to Culver City Little League, 9-5 in the decisive game on June 29 at Culver City.

District 37 began the tournament on June

26 by routing Santa Monica, 11-2. A day later, District 37 fell short of Culver City, 7-6. On June 28, District 37 bounced back with a 9-3 win over Culver, but it lost the final a day later. Ralph Garcia and Lawndale High standout Demetri McField each hit a home run on District 37's win over Santa Monica. Ralph Garcia had a pitching win over Culver City with a complete game. He gave up five hits and just one earned run to Culver City.

Holly Park Loses in District Final: The Hawthorne Holly Park Minor (ages 9-10) League All-Star Baseball team lost in the final of the District 37 Tournament to Westchester, 8-1 on July 6 at Carl Nielsen Youth Sports Complex in Westchester. Holly Park rallied out of the losers' bracket after losing its first game. It edged Lennox 6-5 in the losers' bracket final to advance to the championship series. Westchester moves on to the California Section 4 Tournament that started last Saturday in Rolling Hills Estates.

Lawndale's Junior (age 13-14) Little League All-Star Baseball team lost in three games (going 1-2) in the California Section 4 Tournament last week. •

## Ancho Chile Rubbed Smoked Beef Brisket



Recipe by omahasteaks.com, provided by BPT.

### Ingredients

- 1 Whole Omaha Steaks Brisket for smoking
- 2 cups white vinegar
- 2/3 cup yellow mustard
- 3/4 cup Omaha Steaks Ancho Chile Rub
- 4 cups Ancho Chile Smoking Spritzer, divided (recipe below)
- 8 cups apple or cherry wood chips, soaked in water

### Preparation

- Prep time: 1 hour, Cook time: 11-13 hours, Rest time: 1-2 hours*
1. Remove brisket from bag and rinse with white vinegar then rinse with water. Dry completely using paper towels.
  2. Slather brisket generously with yellow mustard. Rub generously with ancho chile rub and inject with 1 cup Ancho Chile Smoking Spritzer.
  3. Prepare smoker using 1 chimney of pure lump charcoal fully lit and one chimney of pure lump charcoal unlit. Make sure water pan is full and adjust vents until smoker maintains a temperature between 225 and 250 F.
  4. Place brisket on smoker fat side up and brush smoking spritzer over top. Every hour, check smoker temp, squirt with smoking spritzer and add handful of wood chips.
  5. After 3 hours, flip brisket fat side down and squirt with spritzer. After 6 hours, flip brisket fat side up. Wrap heavy duty foil around the last 3-4 inches of brisket tip to prevent it from drying out. Restock water pan and add lump charcoal as needed. Adjust vents until temperature is between 225 and 250 F. Beginning at 8 hours, check internal temperature every hour and apply spritzer and wood chips as needed. Between 11-13 hours, when internal temperature is between 195 and 200 F, if fork slides easily into brisket, it is done.
  6. Let brisket rest for 1-2 hours before slicing and serving.
