# **Chevron Ready to Roll in New Drum Set**

If you happen to be out and about in the South Bay after 10 p.m. the next three Wednesdays and find a good viewing spot, you might have an opportunity to witness an event that may not come around again until the late 2050s or so.

While it might not attract the same crowds the Space Shuttle Endeavour did last fall, it will be quite the undertaking and a memorable sight when Chevron transports six giant steel drums from King Harbor in Redondo Beach to the company's El Segundo refinery.

Used to manufacture petroleum products such as gasoline, diesel and jet fuel, the 100-foot-long, 28-foot-in-diameter coke drums each weigh about a half a million pounds.

They will replace Chevron's existing 45-year-old coke drums that have reached the end of their useful life cycles. The new coke drums will be nested in a tall derrick structure that is a unique feature of the refinery landscape.

In addition to replacing the old drums-which will be cleaned, cut up on site and recycled--Chevron will also execute additional safety and seismic stability upgrades on the derrick structure. The project itself will bring between 2,000 and 3,000 short-term jobs to the area and be completed in 2014.

Built in Spain (the United States has no steel fabrication shops with the manufacturing capabilities for this job), the drums arrived late last month at the Port of Los Angeles via a specially designed cargo ship after a month-long, 7,330-nautical mile journey to the West Coast.

Over the next three Monday nights, the drums will move two at a time from the Port of LA to King Harbor. After two days in a staging area, they will make the 4.5-mile trek to Gate 21 at Chevron's Rosecrans Avenue entrance where they will be put in place by one of the world's largest cranes.

To navigate through city streets, crews will

tote the drums on three consecutive Wednesday nights beginning February 20 between 10 p.m. and 5 p.m. at the not-so-breakneck speed of one to three miles per hour.

But with a million pounds of cargo in one load, a Toyota Tundra (the truck that towed the svelte-in-comparison, 300,000-pound Space Shuttle and transport vehicle) won't quite do the trick.

To get the job done, the refinery will instead use a custom-designed, Caltrans-approved, 432-ton vehicle that boasts 32 axles, 128 wheels, 80-yard dollies, and a truck in front and in back for traction and braking.

The sheer size and height of the load will also require infrastructure improvements and other preparatory work by Southern California Edison crews beginning this Monday, as well as other mitigations from Chevron.

These will include raising power lines, replacing power poles, trimming trees to clear the pathway, and removing and replacing portions of the median.

In the specific case of El Segundo, one-half of Rosecrans is within the city limits. "Trees will be trimmed and streetlights removed for the duration of the coker movement [three weeks]," said Public Works Director Stephanie Katsouleas. "Medians will be removed and reconstructed and the signals at Pacific [Avenue] will be replaced."

To minimize traffic impacts, Caltrans worked with Chevron to develop a temporary road closure plan. The first is set for Monday, February 18 between 10 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. at Herondo/190th.

The same area will also close during those hours the following two Mondays. Sepulveda/ PCH and Rosecrans will have closures each of the next three Wednesdays, as the cargo rides up PCH and Sepulveda through Hermosa Beach and Manhattan Beach on the way to El Segundo.

On those nights, the road closure will begin at 10 p.m. in Redondo Beach with the rota-

tion of streetlights. At 11:15, the first drum will roll north onto PCH, with the second to follow 15 minutes later.

The cargo will then likely reach Aviation Boulevard by midnight and Manhattan Beach Boulevard by 1 a.m. before turning west onto Rosecrans at 2 a.m. The first drum will enter the refinery at 2:45, followed by the second at 3:15. The same process will repeat on February 27 and March 6.

"The Chevron El Segundo Refinery team has been working with local city governments, businesses and the public to ensure that everyone is informed about the move in order to minimize temporary impacts," said Lily Craig, External Affairs Manager for Chevron. "We've received a lot of enthusiasm about the project from local Chambers and service clubs with folks looking forward to seeing these drums head to the refinery. It's not quite the Space Shuttle or 'The Rock,' but amazing nonetheless."

Unlike the Space Shuttle, citizens will get more than one shot to catch the move in progress.

Those wishing to view the transport can follow the instructions of the California Highway Patrol and local police departments on site to identify the safest areas along the route to catch a glimpse. While Chevron's equipment won't drum up as much enthusiasm as Endeavour, they are critical to the refinery's operations. "The coke drums are a very important component of the Chevron refinery, which supplies over 20 percent of the motor vehicle fuels used in Southern California and 40 percent of the jet fuel at LAX," said Craig. "We appreciate the cooperation of local businesses and residents to help make this project a success so that the refinery can continue providing these much-needed resources throughout the area."

Paul Harvey, the irrepressible late raconteur, stole the Super Bowl ads war with his story called "And God Created the Farmer." Harvey's former radio program had included a segment entitled "The Rest of the Story," in which he told a story the way it was presented by conventional media, but would give us the rest of the story as a follow-up. If he were alive today, the rest of the story would look like this:

Newsflash: "The economy created 157,000 jobs in January, but unemployment rose from 7.8 to 7.9 percent."

And now the rest of the story: "169,000 people dropped out of the workforce, so unemployment rose."

Newsflash: "The economy grew by 2.2 percent in 2012."

And now, the rest of the story: "Our national debt grew during the same period by eight percent, so our debt grew 3.6 times faster than our growth in productivity."

Newsflash: "Senator Feinstein, testifying before the Senate Judiciary Committee while to try to take me out, I was going to take them with me."

Newsflash: "The FBI announced that 11,493 people were killed by firearms in the U.S."

And now the rest of the story: "Non-firearm homicides totaled 16,799 and the most popular weapon of choice was the baseball bat." Maybe Senator Feinstein should refocus the Senate on banning that mass killer.

Newsflash: "The LAEDC reported that personal income grew in December by a striking 2.6 percent."

And now the rest of the story: "The primary reason personal income grew in December was that more than 600 firms paid extra dividends to avoid the tax increases coming in January. If the dividend payment had been made one month later, taxes on those dividends would have risen from 15 to 20 percent and investors would have had to pay the 3.8 percent Medicare tax due in 2013 on dividend income. Of those 600 firms, half were in the S&P 500 and paid out a staggering \$14.4 billion. Of that amount, \$1.3 billion went to officers, directors and large

proposing a wide-ranging limitation on the right to bear arms, said, 'We can't have a totally armed society.'"

And now the rest of the story: "On April 27, 1995, Senator Feinstein said, 'I know the sense of helplessness that people feel. I know the urge to arm yourself because that is what I did. I was trained in firearms. I'd walk to the hospital when my husband was sick. I carried a concealed weapon. I made the determination that if somebody was going

investors, saving them 37 percent in taxes."

There are two lessons to learn from this story: First, the wealthy will find every legal means to avoid payment of taxes. Second, this one \$14.4 billion tax avoidance maneuver alone illustrates the shaky footing on which Obama has predicated an annual \$62 billion revenue increase from taxing the rich. Ain't gonna happen, folks. They're successful because they're smarter than the average bear.

# **Gun Control in California**



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

# No Gold in San Francisco

Now that football season is over and that empty feeling has sunk in for all of us, it is the perfect time to reflect back on a season past that has been, all in all, very successful for the team from the San Francisco Bay.

A loss in the Super Bowl is clearly never easy to handle, so fans of the 49ers may be feeling just a tad bit more empty than most of us right about now. But those same fans of the team can look back and say that the Niners at least made the game respectable.

From the looks of things early on, it was as if the team had no business even being there--kind of like Raiders vs. the Buccaneers in the 2002 Super Bowl.

But these Niners are nothing at all like those Raiders. Instead of fading off into oblivion, San Francisco, coach Jim Harbaugh and quarterback Colin Kaepernick should have no problem returning to the grand stage very soon.

Losing was an unfamiliar feeling for many 49ers' fans, players and coaches alike. After losing only four games all season long, San Francisco also lost in the Super Bowl--something they hadn't done in their five previous appearances in the big game.

Most fans will point to the guys wearing black and white and blame them for their team's misfortune on the night. Flags have been thrown all year long down the field at less contact than what Michael Crabtree was hit with on that pivotal play in the final stages of the fourth quarter on Super Bowl Sunday.

But when you dig yourself as deep of a hole as the 49ers did in that game, it would really be unfair to try and extract what would have been a game-winning call from the referees.

From the very first play of the game, the 49ers were not ready to play. A first down and a 20-yard reception erased because of an illegal formation on a play that should have been practiced continuously over the two weeks that the team had off made it clear to see that big brother John Harbaugh and his Ravens were simply more prepared for the glitz and glamour of one of the world's biggest stages.

No team has ever come back from more than 10 points down to win the Super Bowl.

In just his 10th start ever, though, Kaepernick almost made that happen. With three straight chances from the five yard line, Kaepernick threw three straight incomplete passes, all intended for Michael Crabtree. It was almost

as if the coaches of the Niners had a pool in Vegas with Crabtree scoring the go-ahead touchdown to ultimately win the game for their team.

A quarterback with the legs and speed of Kaepernick and a running back who had just previously galloped for a 33-yard run to get the team to the seven and they throw three passes instead of using the run-option that has been so successful for them all season long.

Instead of blaming the refs for the game, 49er fans should blame coaching and playcalling like that. Hindsight is 20-20, however.

When it comes down to it, it is pretty obvious that the 49ers will be competing for additional Super Bowl titles for many years to come in the NFC.

Jim Harbaugh isn't going anywhere, Kaepernick isn't going anywhere and now they have all the experience that is necessary to come out strong next year.


"This will all be motivation," said San Francisco offensive lineman Joe Staley.

Motivation is, indeed, what is needed. The Ravens had it because of Ray Lewis. Now the 49ers will look to gain it all summer long because of the endless visions that they will have of Lewis falling to the ground and crying into microphones as they remained five yards short of winning the game.

Jim Harbaugh did a poor job of play-calling toward the end of the biggest game of his NFL career. We tend to forget, he is still a relatively new NFL head coach.

Likewise, Kaepernick is a brand new NFL quarterback. It was obvious to predict that he would come out with butterflies on the biggest stage of his career in only his 10th start ever. The thing that makes Kaepernick different than any other run-option quarterback is that he is just as good in the pocket as he is running the ball. He doesn't often make mistakes, though in the Super Bowl his nerves got to him and he and the coaching staff made plenty of them.

Should the 49ers make it back to the Super Bowl next year, or in any of the next five to seven years, their fans can expect to see a different a team--a team that doesn't give the opposition a free 30 minutes of football and a team that learns from the mistakes it made in the final minutes of the game. With that maturity, the 49ers would have indeed won this Super Bowl and will indeed win the next one in which they are fortunate enough to play. •

# <u>Ask the DMV</u>

# **Expert Answers to Common DMV Questions**

Do you have questions about general driving related requirements like registration and insurance? Are you unclear about laws and restrictions related to driving? The California Department of Motor Vehicles has answers. Save Time. Go Online at www.DMV.ca.gov.

Q. I was thinking of that the DMV should offer a breast cancer license plate as one of the special interest license plates. Is this something the DMV would consider?

A. That is a great idea! However, the DMV does not have the power to decide which plates can be established. An organization must first get a state agency sponsorship of the proposed license plate. The plate design must contain a message that publicizes or promotes a state agency or the official policy, mission, or work of a state agency. At least 7,500 pre-ordered applications for that special interest plate must be received by the department before a new special license plate can be created.

Q. I went to get a smog check for my car and it passed, but the DMV contacted me saying they never received a certificate. Now what do I do?

A. You can ask the smog shop to resend the certificate to the DMV, but be sure that they have all the correct vehicle information. You can also take the smog test results document into the DMV yourself (appointment suggested). Q. Can I take the driving test before I take my written exam? A. No. It is required that you pass your written exam before you can take the driving test. This is to ensure that you know the rules of the road before you get behind the wheel. The DMV is a department under the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency, which is under the direction of Acting Undersecretary Brian Kelly. The DMV licenses drivers, maintains driving records, registers and tracks official ownership of vehicles and vessels, investigates auto and identity-related fraud, and licenses car dealers, driving schools, and traffic violator schools. 
5. Don't be afraid to ask questions.

She was concerned - she knew at her age the likelihood that she might need an MRI at some point was high.

After talking with her doctor and asking plenty of questions, Rose learned that the FDA had approved the first pacemaker that was fit for use in the MRI environment. Today, after getting her pacemaker, she's feeling great and is back to her regular life, swimming, knitting and playing with her five grandkids. Her friends



call her the "Energizer bunny," and with her pacemaker she says she feels better than she did before. For Rose, asking the right questions made a life-changing difference.
