# Manhattan Beach Coordinating Council Plans for Luncheons and Scholarships

The Manhattan Beach Coordinating Council has planned a full schedule for the 2012-2013 school year. Luncheons, hosted at Verandas on Rosecrans Avenue, will feature talks by important community leaders and also honor students from American Martyrs School, Manhattan Beach Middle School, and Mira Costa High School.

Some of the speakers who are confirmed are: George Butts from the Community Emergency Response Team, who will talk about the CERT program; Gretchen Oshita of MindUp Program, whose topic will cover the core of children's resiliency and learning; Dr. Greg Allen, founder of Freedom4U, talking about how to communicate with teens and understand their hidden logic; and Wayne Powell, Manhattan Beach mayor, covering everything you wanted to know about your city.

Throughout the year the organization will be collecting money so that it can award scholarships to Mira Costa Seniors at its May meeting. Last year it awarded \$24,000 to six students. The money comes from sponsors, associate fees, and monthly luncheon raffles. Individuals or organizations can become sponsors at one of three levels--platinum (\$1000), silver (\$500), or bronze (\$300). Associates pay \$40 for a year's membership.

"We are very happy that we are able to provide financial help to worthy students," says Jill Brunkhardt, President of the Council and Public Relations Representative for Chevron. # Former City Manager Dolan Must Pay City \$45,000 City, Wins Motion For Attorney Fees

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Susan Bryant-Deason granted the City of Manhattan Beach's motion for attorney fees and awarded the City \$45,186.99 in fees and costs. Superior Court Judge Susan Bryant-Deason previously dismissed the former City Manager Geoff Dolan's lawsuit against the City and its former City Attorney in its entirety for alleged breach of contract and invasion of privacy. The issue arose from the City's release of public records in response to a Public Records Act request from, among others, well-known open government advocate Richard McKee, as well as disclosures made during the course of litigation that was subsequently filed by McKee. Dolan contended that the release of public records violated the terms of a separation agreement he had with the City. However, the City's conduct arose from protected activity and the Court found there was no evidence to support Dolan's arguments. An appeal, however, has been filed by Dolan.

The City sought to recoup \$88,760 in attorney fees and costs. Roxanne Diaz,

legal counsel for the City, stated: "The award of fees reaffirms the City's victory in this matter. In addition, we are pleased to recover a portion of public funds we were forced to expend in order to defend our obligation to disclose records and information related to the former city manager's resignation."

Commenting on the City's victory today, City Attorney Quinn Barrow stated: "It was important that the City's litigation counsel expend the time needed to bring this case to an early end at the trial court level. This was a complex matter where there were five causes of action against two separate defendants and the fees expended by the City were reasonable." Taking into account the award of fees granted to the city, City Attorney Barrow further stated: "Looking at the big picture, in the end less than \$100,000 was spent to successfully make this controversial litigation come to an end. It should not be lost on anyone that the Court dismissed all of Mr. Dolan's five causes of action and found there was no evidence to support his claims."

Geoff Dolan is personally responsible for payment of the fees and costs award. •

# **Expert Answers to Common DMV Questions**

By George Valverde – Director, California Department of Motor Vehicles

Do you have questions about general driving related requirements like registration and insurance? Are you unclear about laws and restrictions related to driving? The California Department of Motor Vehicles has answers. Save Time. Go Online at www.DMV.ca.gov.

Q. If I am in a carpool lane and an ambulance or police car with flashing lights is behind me, can I move across the double-yellow lines or do I have to wait until I come to the passing section to move over?

**A.** You can move across the double yellow lines if it is safe to do so. Anytime there is an emergency vehicle behind you, you are required to move over. More information is available in the "Sharing the Road" section of the California Driver Handbook, available by visiting: http://www.DMV.ca.gov/pubs/hdbk/shr\_bus\_sc\_trly\_ev.htm

Q. I have a car with historical plates and never had to take it for a smog check because I thought it was exempt. My friend said that they are actually not exempt. Is this true?

A. Vehicles assigned Historical Vehicle License Plates were incorrectly being exempt from smog certification requirements. Vehicles that are 1976 year-model and newer assigned Historical Vehicle License Plates are not exempt from smog requirements based on designation as a historical or collector vehicle. Permanent exemption from smog requirements is based on the year-model of the vehicle (i.e. manufactured prior to 1976) and other specified criteria, and not the license plate assigned to the vehicle. However, if a historical or collector vehicle (regardless of the license plates assigned to it) is at least 35 years old, the vehicle is exempt from certain portions of the smog test as required by the California Health and Safety Code, provided the vehicle meets the specified criteria. •


