Local Resident Launches Fundraiser to Help Victims of Nepal Quake

When a catastrophe occurs in a remote part of the world, it can still hit close to home no matter where you happen to be located. Such is the case for South Bay resident Sudip (known to friends as Steven) Giri, whose native land Nepal continues to endure the devastating impacts of a devastating 7.8 earthquake late last month that killed at least 8,000 people, injured more than 18,000 others, and leveled much of the capital city Kathmandu as well as surrounding areas. In addition to countless aftershocks, a second major quake followed on May 12 with a magnitude of 7.3 that resulted in more than 40 additional deaths and over 1,000 injuries.

Giri, who moved to El Segundo in early 2013, received a call from his mother shortly before midnight on April 25 telling him that his family house had been destroyed as a result of the quake from which she had barely escaped. "She was worried sick because she was not able to reach my brother who lived nearby," he said. The quake's epicenter was just 30 miles from Giri's hometown of Ramkot. After several harrowing hours, Giri was relieved to learn that his brother had survived the quake. "He barely made it out alive from his office along with his three friends," he said. "But not everyone was so fortunate. He also mentioned the names of six people whom I knew personally who had perished in the disaster."

With the cellular network down most of the time, Giri found it nearly impossible to reach his parents over the next couple of days. His dad finally called to report the family was sharing a canopy and food with a group of neighbors. During this period, heavy rains hit the area and the group had to fend off

opportunistic looters. Giri's family salvaged whatever they could of their belongings from the ruins of the house and stored the items in a neighbor's home. "My house where I grew up and have all my childhood memories has been demolished," Giri wrote on his blog nepalneedsnow.wordpress.com. "Although my home and neighborhood will never be the same, I am fortunate enough to have all my family members and loved ones alive."

The tragic stories coming out of Nepal spurred a number of Giri's friends, former and current co-workers, and volleyball teammates (he plays five days a week at Recreation Park) to reach out to him. Encouragement from his manager at Gunthy-Renker (where he works as a member of the Business Intelligence team) inspired him to start a rebuild effort immediately. With the help of his long-time girlfriend Ankita Thapa, Giri established a Crowdrise website to launch a fundraising campaign first concentrating on the areas of Ramkot and neighboring New Baneshwor. The first \$2,500 came in after just 24 hours and as of press time, the "Nepal Needs Now" effort had accumulated over \$6,000. An additional fundraiser at El Segundo Middle School organized by the Hilltop Church collected \$5,000 more last week, while co-workers and friends also amassed about \$12,000 in donations. "We need even bigger support from El Segundo," Giri said. "All donations no matter how small or big, are very much welcome." The goal of the effort is to provide the survivors with basic needs to keep them safe and healthy until international aid organizations arrive, or until the families can relocate to more stable areas.

Every dollar makes a huge difference in

the lives of the impacted families of Ramkot, Giri noted. As an example, just under \$3,000 was able to provide tents, mats, blankets, salt, rice, vegetables, oil, gas and a generator to support the basic needs of 10 families (52 members) in the neighborhood. "Restoring my neighborhood will take a significant amount of funds and even more support," Giri wrote on his blog. "As such we have redoubled our efforts to share our story and, it is hoped, focus more attention on the tragedy in Nepal."

Giri was quick to credit Thapa for her steady support in the cause. "She has relentlessly worked on this fundraiser and has reached out to her friends at ITU [International Technological University] where she is working on her MBA in Bio Management," he said. "She has been a huge inspiration and I couldn't have gotten this far without her."

Giri grew up in Kathmandu and was valedictorian of his high school in the village of Bansbari. He and Thapa came to the United States separately eight years ago as international students attending University of Central Oklahoma in Edmond. "We were both enrolled in the same English class and that's where we met," Giri said. The two started dating and both moved on scholarships to East Central University in Ada, Oklahoma. After graduating in 2010, Giri next headed to Reading, Pennsylvania for a job at Wells Fargo in the IT department, while Thapa remained in school to complete her bachelor's degree in Molecular Biology. Giri later earned his MBA in Finance from Oklahoma Christian University. The couple moved to California in 2012. Prior to his current stint at Guthy-Renker, Giri worked for Cetera Financial See Nepal, page 2

Manhattan Beach Officers Receive Medals of Valor

Two Manhattan Beach Police Department officers received the Medal of Valor "Life Saving Award" given by a committee of the joint South Bay Chambers of Commerce. The awards were presented at a luncheon on May 20th, and the guest presenter was KTLA anchor Glen Walker.

Officers Klosowski and Hidalgo received recognition for responding to a call regarding a woman who had passed out while eating at a local McDonald's and was not breathing. Within seconds of hearing the call being dispatched to the Manhattan Beach Fire Department, Officers Taylor Klosowski and Justin Hidalgo who were in separate cars both recognized the grave nature of the call and both decided to act. They both responded Code-3 and due to the fact they were already in the area, they both arrived before the Manhattan Beach Fire Department.

Officer Klosowski arrived first and entered the restaurant. When he located the elderly victim, she was still seated upright in a booth. Officer Klosowski physically pulled the victim from the booth onto the ground and began

life saving CPR. Officer Klosowski advised dispatch over the radio he was conducting CPR and continued to do so until Officer Hidalgo arrived. Although not required to,

Officer Hidalgo took it upon himself early in his career to become a certified EMT and to carry first aid supplies such as a bag valve mask with him at all times for just this type of emergency. Officer Hidalgo retrieved the first aid supplies he carries with him on patrol. He then entered the restaurant and immediately located the elderly victim on the ground being tended to by Officer Klosowski. Officer Hidalgo immediately assisted with lifesaving CPR rotating between chest compressions and using the bag valve mask he brought with him.

When the Manhattan Beach Fire Department arrived, they took over the victim's medical care. The paramedics were able to detect a heartbeat so they transported the victim to Little Company of Mary Hospital where she eventually transferred to the Intensive Care Unit. •

Marrying Over Fifty

Coming together at 50-plus is different from getting married in your 20s, particularly when it comes to money. "You've had a lifetime of solidifying your money beliefs" and behaviors, says Janet Stanzak, president of the Financial Planning Association. These are some ways to smooth the transition if you're tying the knot this summer.

It's true, marriage at 50 looks a lot different than marriage at 25. And no, we aren't talking about the latest wedding fashions or honeymoon destinations. Financially, there is much to consider when getting married past 50.

AARP Magazine published an article titled "4 Smart Money Moves If You Marry After 50" last summer (http://www.aarp.org/money/ budgeting-saving/info-2014/marriage-moneymatters.html) that did a great job of discussing some reminders before saying "I do" after you turn age 50. These reminders will work for you if you are walking down the aisle this June, July, or August.

Talk about prior obligations. With age comes various obligations like support payments and debts. Share your credit reports and scores, and review previous divorce agreements for details about cash flow, assets and debts.

Don't forget your adult children. Although

you may have considered what you'd like to do for them financially, and they've probably have some ideas about what they may one day inherit, a later-in-life marriage changes this. It also complicates your estate planning, so speak with an experienced estate planning lawyer about the changes. The article advises that you discuss your decisions with your new spouse and adult kids to hopefully decrease or eliminate the amount of controversy down the line. You can also formalize these plans in a prenuptial agreement.

In addition to a prenup, revisit your estate plan with a qualified estate planning attorney, in addition to your beneficiary designations. Wills finish second to legal titles to real estate or beneficiary designations on financial accounts, as well as retirement plans and insurance policies. Make any changes in writing, and be careful with Social Security, the article cautions.

On last thing: if you're close to 62 and want to apply for a former spouse's Social Security benefit, you shouldn't remarry, as you must be single at the time you apply.

Mad Max: Fury Road is a Towering Feat in Blockbuster Filmmaking

<u>Film Review</u>

Early into the film, Nux (Nicholas Hoult) screams the film's tagline with cultish insanity: "What a Lovely Day!" Indeed, there isn't a better way to summarize the visceral, unconventional, deranged journey that unfolds over the course of two jampacked hours in Mad Max: Fury Road.

An important note for potential viewers of this film is that despite the fact that it is a reboot of an existing character and world, Mad Max: Fury Road requires no preface or introduction. This is a film meant to be seen by new audiences, in direct contrast to so many of the reboots which are more a ploy of nostalgia for fanboys prior to 1990. The visionary George Miller, who has directed every film in the series, is back to tell more Max stories for an entirely new audience. And he doesn't hold back.

Without a second to waste, we enter the world of Max Rockatansky (Tom Hardy) and it's a nasty, fully realized post-apocalypse. Dystopias are all the rage in the wake of *The* Hunger Games, but none of them have nearly the level of detail and sophisticated madness that Fury Road displays. A major point of praise is that so much of the story is displayed through the visuals. The same goes for characters, plot points, you name it; this is an exercise in using dialogue to a bare minimum in favor of visual spectacle. The level of detail sets the bar extremely high for any future film trying to capture a futuristic world. Nothing is easy to digest about Fury Road: it is a wild ride of nonstop mayhem. In other words, it is an absolute blast.

One of the most exciting elements of the film is the stunt work. According to the director, 80% of what is onscreen is practical effects. Seeing some of the ludicrous stunts that are pulled off so magnificently is an incredible treat. The pacing of the film, while still remaining a nonstop thrill ride, builds

nicely as it continues to get progressively bigger without losing its genuine feeling. From time to time the film cuts to black to break up the sequences, and I found myself catching my breath each time.

When it comes to big-budget blockbusters, this is what we should be asking for. With the amount of money that gets poured into these movies, seeing Mad Max is a reminder of the insanely good results that can be produced.

It's just as relevant to mention how well utilized the principal cast is. This isn't a movie grounded in flashy performances, but every character manages to say so much with so little. Tom Hardy may be my favorite working actor today, choosing such a wide range of daring projects and bringing so much poise to each one. There is an interesting parallel between this film and Locke, Hardy's film from last year in which he is the only actor on screen, and the entire runtime he is driving in a car talking on the phone. This time around, Hardy is once again driving a majority of the time, and dealing with similar themes of chaos and control.

But this isn't just his movie. Charlize Theron is just as much the lead this time around as Imperator Furiosa, and true to form, she is the toughest female lead you could possibly conjure. Pinning the two together creates a dynamic that is top tier.

The film goes at you very fast, and because the story is so richly detailed, it's hard to capture everything the first time around. I found myself wanting to watch the film again. Incredible CGI-minimal action sequences, top-notch production design, conventiondefying structure and story- if you haven't already gathered, this is not just another film, it is a towering feat in blockbuster filmmaking and a reminder of what movies aim to be. Mad Max: Fury Road is now playing at ArcLight Cinemas. •

Slow Cooker Corned Beef and Cabbage



Prep time: 10 minutes | Cook time: 8 hours | Servings: 12

Ingredients

- 8 small red potatoes
- 2 cups baby carrots
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 1 corned beef brisket (4 pounds), rinsed and trimmed
- 2 tablespoons McCormick

Mixed Pickling Spice

- 1 teaspoon McCormick Minced Garlic
- 1/2 head cabbage, cored and cut into wedges

Preparation

Protect Your Pets from Flea Infestations

April showers bring May flowers, but May showers bring fleas! The combination of humidity and warm temperatures allows fleas to breed quickly and thrive. Fleas are more than a nuisance. Many cats and dogs are allergic to the flea bites and will have severe dermatitis. Fleas can also transmit disease.

In cats, fleas can transmit Mycoplasma Haemofelis (formerly called Hemobartonella and Feline Infectious Anemia). This is a potentially serious disease for all cats but especially in cats already infected with Feline Leukemia Virus. The red blood cells

become altered and the cat's immune system destroys the cells leading to anemia. Fleas can also transmit the bacteria responsible for Cat Scratch Disease (Bartonella). Dogs and people can become very ill from this disease. The clinical signs range from weakness and lameness to fevers and meningitis, as well as affecting internal organs.

Fleas transmit Murine Typhus to people. This disease is seen frequently in Southern California. Murine Typhus is a rickettsial disease caused by a type of bacteria called Rickettsia Typhi that is transmitted via fleabites. Fleas carry the bacteria in their feces,

and often defecate while biting and feeding on blood. When a person is bitten by a flea and then scratches the bite, the bacteria from the feces can enter the wound and enter the blood stream. People become infected from fleas brought into the home by their pets, or by rats, mice and opossums carrying fleas around the home. Transference of the bacteria through the eyes, nose, or mouth can also infect people, or inhaling crushed or dried feces of an infected flea.

So how do we prevent these fleas in the first place? The first thing is to use flea prevention year round whether you see them or not. Trying to put out a fire is harder than preventing one. It helps to understand the flea lifecycle and how the modern medicines

Fleas are like most insects. They have four life stages: An egg stage, larval or maggot



stage, pupa or cocoon stage, and the adult. Only the adult stage lives on the pet and it spends its entire life of about 10 days to three weeks on the animal. During that time the female flea will lay about 50 eggs per day. That's 500 eggs from one flea. The eggs fall off the pet and hatch into the maggot stage. This stage can be as short as nine days. After molting, the maggots form a cocoon.

Once the flea reaches the cocoon stage it's almost impossible to kill. In fact, a flea in its cocoon can remain alive for over a year and withstand heat, cold and drought. The covering of the cocoon is sticky and picks up all kinds of dust and dirt making them difficult to see. The adult flea hatches from the cocoon when it senses movement, warmth and carbon dioxide. With 70-degree temperatures and 70 percent humidity, a flea can go from an egg to an adult in about 14 days. During the cold weather, the flea eggs and cocoons can take longer to go through their life cycle or may not hatch but they don't die. They can just sit and wait for the perfect weather and the perfect host to walk by.

Treat your pet year round with a professional medicine prescribed by your veterinarian. He or she will be able to recommend the best type of flea control for your pet's age, breed and health status. Avoid flea shampoo or sprays. These are marginally effective, can irritate skin and are potentially more toxic than newer products. Stay safe and see your veterinarian for more information about fleas.
