A Lodge You May Want to Moose Into

The building is not particularly impressive. The truth is the structure shows its age outside and, for that matter, inside. Once seated, though, you become increasingly comfortable, even enthusiastic.

Antoinette is the host of Taco Tuesday at this place: "You should join! We do a lot of good things for the community. And, yeah, Taco Tuesday is great, but we also have lots of other fun stuff, like darts Thursday evening, which can get a bit noisy. Friday is steak and fish night, great price. Really delicious! Good bar, pool table, what's not to like?"

A short while later, she was among those fervently talking (perhaps yelling is a better description) at the big screen tv, hoping to inspire the Lakers to make a big comeback in their game that night.

I was sitting at a table with, among others, a Lawndale historian, a member of the Hawthorne City Council, a local retiree, and his wife, and a gentleman visiting from Japan who details luxury motor vehicles. All were quite friendly. Conversation was warm and cordial.

Eclectic that's the word I am searching for. *This place is eclectic.* On the wall nearby is a moose head, prominently protruding as if keeping an eye over all the activities and goings-on.

"Do you know how the moose name came about? Do you know?" Alex Monteiro, Hawthorne City Council member and one of the Administrators here stands in front of me: "The moose is one animal that will never abandon its young in the wild."

Did I mention where I am? The Hawthorne Moose Lodge, next to *Dino's*, the local, popular restaurant. There is official business conducted at the Lodge. In fact, there is quite a bit of serious work done by the

members. This is Lodge Number 1746 of the fraternal Moose organization. There are six Moose Lodges in the South Bay. Joining the organization, and becoming a member, is not very costly, nor are the annual dues.

But, well, hold on a second. Just what is this Moose organization? Research indicates its roots can be traced to 1888, with the first Lodge in Louisville, Kentucky. The core of the group can be summed up as follows: "A burden heavy to one is borne lightly by many."

Over time, the Mooseheart Child City and School has flourished, assisting needy children and teens. There is 1,000-acre campus 40 miles west of Chicago. Also, there is genuine care provided to senior members at Moosehaven, a 70-acre retirement community near Jacksonville, Florida.

The Moose Organization has over one million members, with a presence in more than fifteen hundred communities throughout the United States, four Canadian provinces, and Great Britain. Annually, the Moose organization is reported to contribute between seventy-five to one hundred million dollars' worth of community service, which consists of monetary donations, volunteer hours worked, and miles driven. Holiday parties, sports, dances, themed dinners, and live entertainment all are part of the fabric.

So, like Antoinette said, what's not to like? The Moose Lodge clearly is social and friendly. Among the luminaries who have been members of the Moose Organization are several of our Presidents, such as Warren G. Harding, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Harry S. Truman.

This is not to say the organization has always been exemplary. In the past, there were restrictions on the color of who could join. That has, of course, changed. Also, women are now finally part of the membership, not

separate, and are encouraged (empowered, really) to take on leadership roles.

But, I suspect you have heard an ongoing complaint about Southern California, that it is so big and spread apart, so much so that it's really hard to meet people. The fact is, you may not even know your own neighbors. Everyone rides separately in their cars, and the freeways are far too congested, detractors say. No one really cares about anyone else who is heard.

Well, hold on a second: Hawthorne is known as *the City of Good Neighbors*. In fact, Hawthorne has earned that good description.

The Hawthorne Moose Lodge is located at 1312 Inglewood Avenue. You can visit and be a guest on two occasions, but if you come a third time, you will then receive an application to join. It may be relatively quiet, depending upon when you are there, but chatting with people at the Lodge seems easy. Also, as you explore the Lodge, you will get a sense of what is coming up. Just look on the walls for postings about scheduled events.

I am not a betting person, but it would not surprise me if you returned. The Hawthorne Moose Lodge is like a pair of outstretched arms. Or, like someone standing on the front porch encouraging you to come in, take off your hat or coat, even put your feet up. Just bear in mind: You cannot read a book by looking at the cover, so if the outside of the Hawthorne Moose Lodge seems a bit non-descript and the inside quite a lot less than high-end, don't let that dissuade you.

The building dates from 1948 and was bought by the Moose Organization in 1972. The members typically meet twice a month, on the second and fourth Monday. There is good work to be done. Also, as mentioned, there is fun stuff. As indicated above, parts,

Film Review

Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse Is A Dazzlingly Spectacular Sequel

Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse is an incredible, mind-blowing work of art that is also one of the best films of the year. The film dives even deeper into the concept of the multi-verse(s), and its spectacularly animated sequences reach dizzying new heights in this sequel to 2018's Into the Spider-Verse, which won the Oscar for Best Animated Feature Film.

The story continues with Miles Morales (Shameik Moore) as he continues to figure out his life as New York's newest Spidey. Zipping through cityscapes with the greatest of ease, his biggest struggle is balancing his teenage life: honoring his commitments to his mother (Luna Lauren Vélez) and soon-to-be-police chief father (Brian Tyree Henry), looking

ahead to college and oh yeah, trying to save the world—all while keeping his identity a secret from those he loves. The only ones who know Miles' true identity are the league of Spider-Men who helped teach him the ropes (webs?) after crash-landing into his universe in the previous film. All of the Spider-Men, including punky introvert Gwen Stacy (Hailee Steinfeld), are spread across different worlds.

The film opens with Gwen's origin story shown over an incredible drum-solo montage that also illustrates each world's specific visual style (Gwen's is a watercolor one, while Miles' ink-blotted world more readily resembles comics). After Gwen is attacked in her world by the universe-hopping villain Vulture (Jorma Taccone), she also unexpectedly meets a few more Spider-Men and women (Oscar Isaac as Spider-Man 2099 and Issa Rae). These heroes are part of a "Spider-Society" that protects the multi-verses from "canon disruptions." Wishing to leave her world behind, she pleads to join theirs. Against better judgment, she decides to pop over to Miles' world for a quick visit.

While Miles has matured since the first film, although still wise-cracking and perhaps a bit too cocky in his Spidey role, he underestimates the arrival of a clumsy new villain, Spot (Jason Schwartzman). Spot warns Miles that he is his new nemesis and holds him responsible for his genetic mutation; being covered in spots that he can use to travel through space (a result of the first film's universe collider).

A surprise visit from Gwen excites Miles, and the two web-sling around the city in friendly flirtatious fun. But when he sneakily follows her and her Spidey task force into a

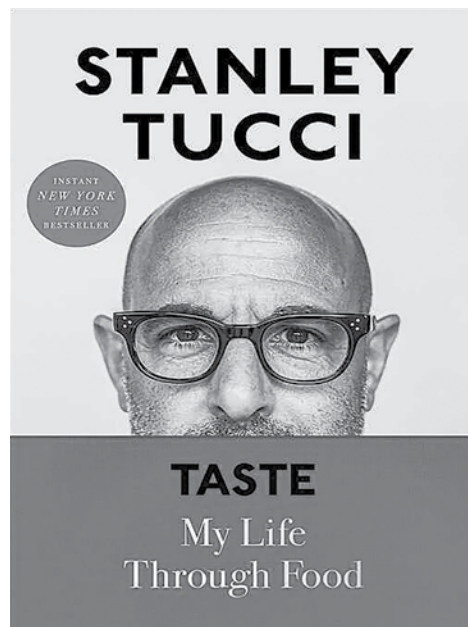
Check It Out

This book combines Stanley Tucci's life with his love for food and starts off with his early beginnings. 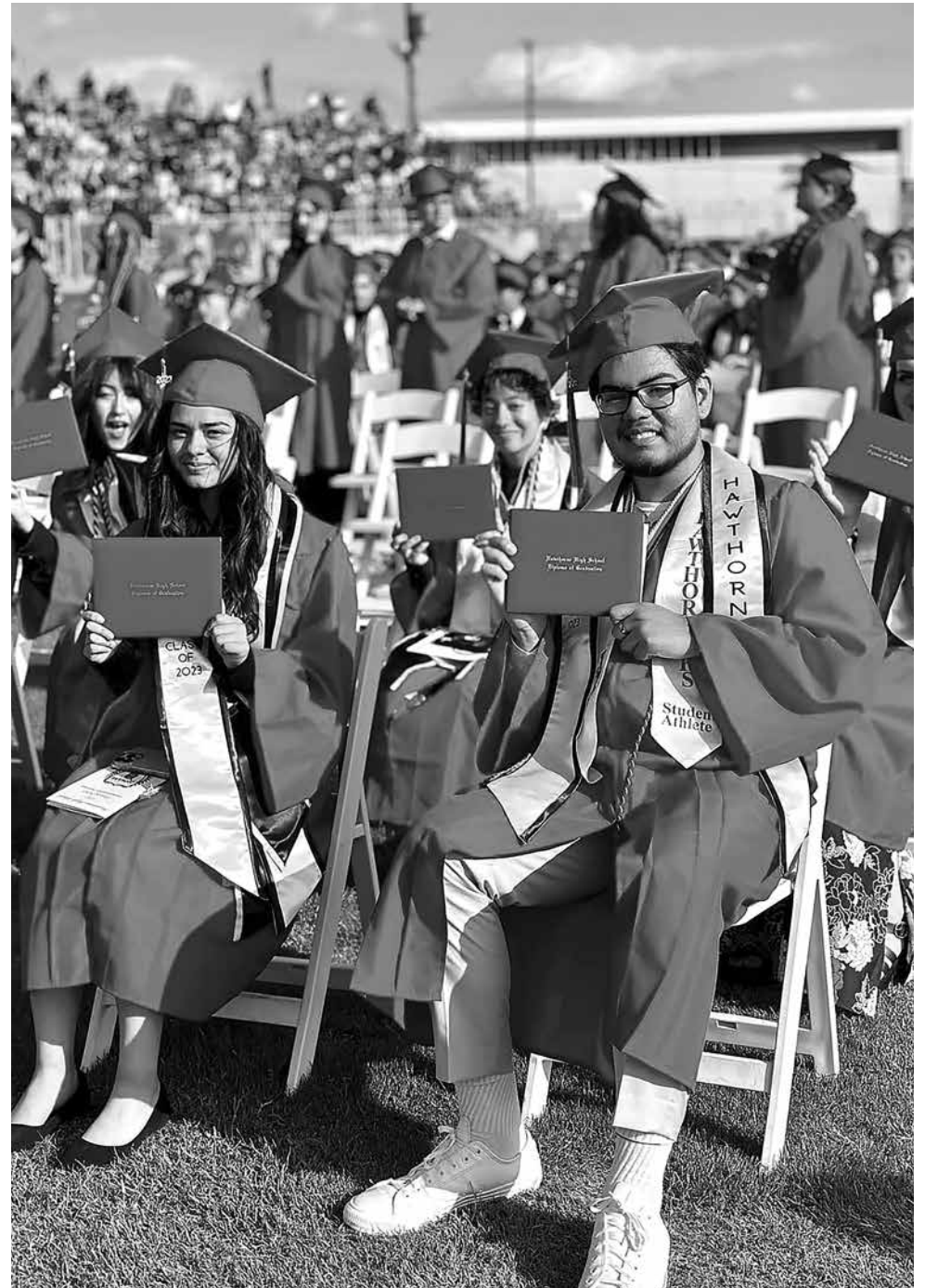

Early Detection and Treatment for Retinal Disease Can Help Preserve Vision

(BPT) - Advances in early detection and treatment of retinal diseases made possible by retina specialists can preserve sight and virtually eliminate vision loss from conditions such as age-related macular degeneration (AMD), diabetic retinopathy and retinal detachment.

People who are at risk or experience symptoms of a retinal condition should visit a retina specialist's office which is equipped with cutting-edge imaging technologies, allowing for earlier diagnosis, closer monitoring and breakthrough treatment approaches that can help save sight.

According to the American Society of Retina Specialists (ASRS), advanced imaging techniques and technologies a patient may encounter during a visit with a retina specialist include:

- Indirect ophthalmoscopy: A diagnostic technique used to examine the back of the eye, including the retina, optic nerve and blood vessels. During the exam, the retina specialist shines a bright light into the eye from a special head-mounted device. The retina specialist then uses another lens, called a handheld lens, to magnify the image of the back of the eye and examine it in detail.

- Fundus photography: Fundus photography and ultra-widefield fundus photography use a specialized camera with a low-power microscope to capture a series of high-resolution images of the fundus, or back of the eye including the retina and macula, while a patient's eyes are dilated. During this painless test, the patient is seated in front of a specialized camera and looks straight ahead while a bright light is shone into their eye. The camera then takes multiple images of the back of the eye, which are reviewed by the retina specialist for any abnormalities or signs of disease.

- Optical Coherence Tomography (OCT): A non-invasive imaging technique that uses waves of light to capture individual images of cross-sections of the retina giving retina specialists a three-dimensional look at its structures and the ability to measure the retina's thickness. During the test, the patient is seated in front of a machine that looks like a camera and asked to rest their chin on a support to keep their head still. The patient's eyes are then scanned with a special light, which captures images of the back of the eye.

- Optical Coherence Tomography Angiography (OCTA)

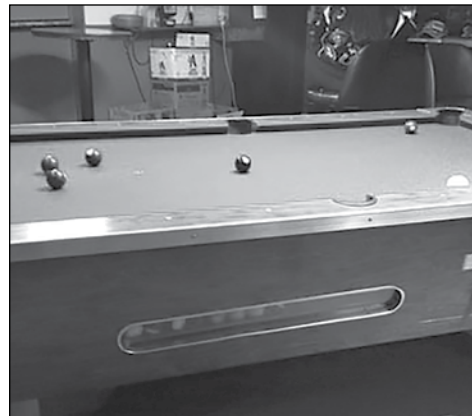
Hawthorne's own, the Beach Boys, sang about "Good, good, good, good vibrations"... Granted, they may not have been thinking

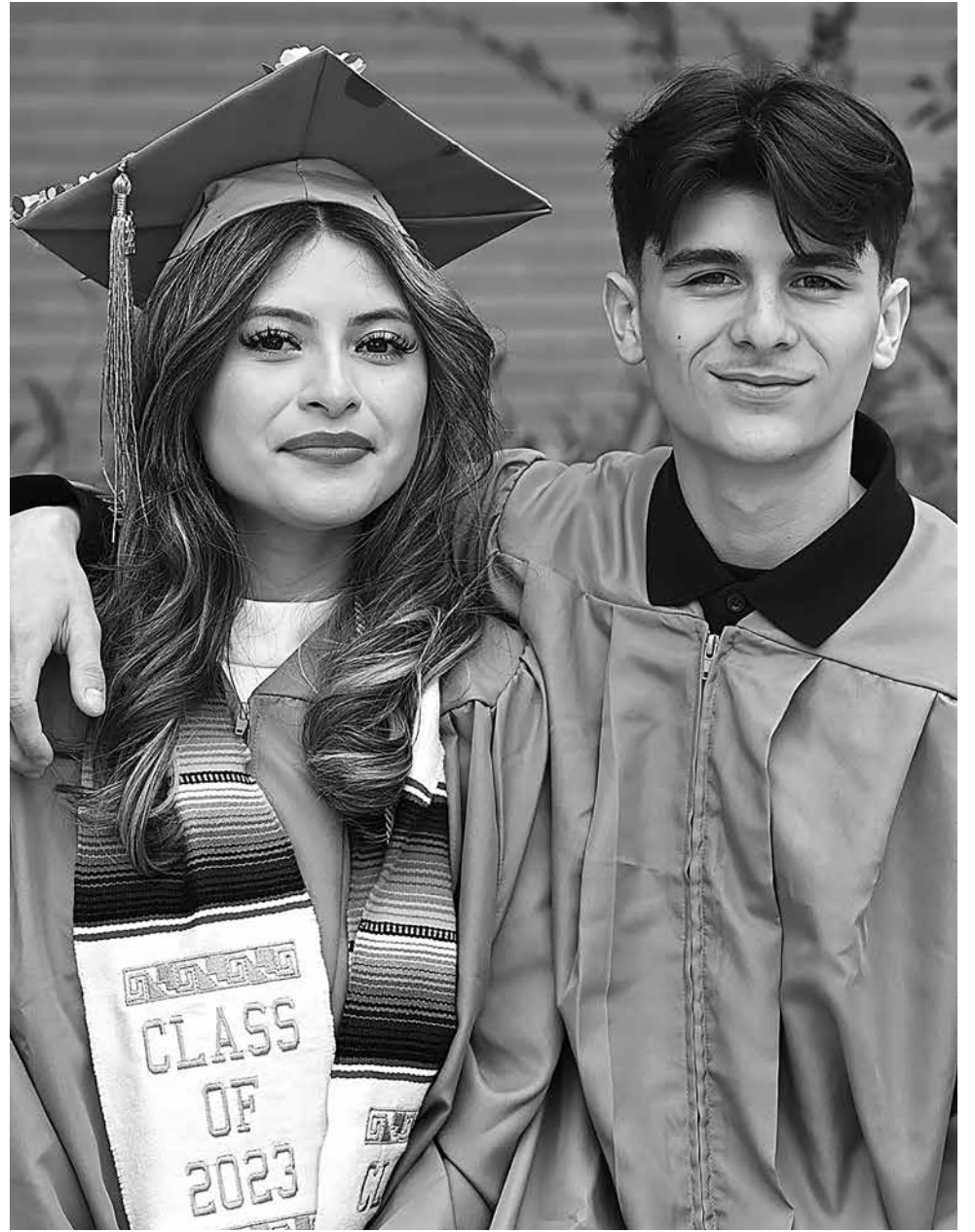

ography (OCT-A): A novel, non-invasive technique, OCT-A allows a close, three-dimensional look at the blood vessels and blood flow inside the retina and surrounding tissues. The patient's eyes are then scanned with a special light, which captures images of the back of the eye, including blood vessels and blood flow.
 • Fluorescein Angiography/Indocyanine Angiography (FA/ICG): A diagnostic technique that uses a dye injected into the bloodstream and a highly specialized camera to record blood flow within the retina and the rest of the eye. After a patient's eyes are dilated, a small amount of dye is injected in the arm or hand. The patient is positioned in front of a specialized camera and looks at a series of bright lights while a series of pictures are taken which shows the dye as it moves through the blood vessels in

the retina.
 • Ophthalmic ultrasound: Ophthalmic ultrasound or eye ultrasound uses high-frequency sound waves to create images of the structures inside the eye. During the non-invasive test, a probe is placed on the eye or eyelid and the patient may be asked to move their eye in different directions. Ophthalmic ultrasound is useful in diagnosing and monitoring various eye conditions, including retinal detachment, vitreous hemorrhage, tumors and other abnormalities.
 Retina specialists have access to highly specialized imaging equipment right in their office, allowing patients to have all tests and imaging done to track the progress of their retinal condition in one location, eliminating the need to travel to a different medical office or clinic.
