Praise, Hope, and Unfortunate Controversy

There was applause early on at the October 8th meeting of the Hawthorne City Council when Pastor Greg Guich was found in the audience. He does such a nice job with the Invocation. This particular evening, Pastor Greg expressed great hope that God will help those so adversely affected by the destructive hurricanes impacting our country.

There would be applause as well when City Councilman David Patterson brought forward the inimitable Ruby Cohens – Hawthorne resident, Commissioner, and flight attendant. A Proclamation was read aloud in

Ruby's honor for the wonderful, touching, and thoughtful work she has done to share the impact of 911, that infamous day, on flight crews and pilots and their contributions to the community. Ruby made clear she is just part of the group, part of the family. The information she has so eloquently brought forth about 911, the dedication of flight attendants and pilots, and the fact that quite a few were among the victims are both acknowledged and very much in our hearts and minds.

Councilwoman (and Mayor Pro Tem) Katrina Manning then introduced a speaker who shared details of the Abundant Birth Project. The goal of the Project is to provide guaranteed income for a period of time to help make birthing healthier and safer for those facing the greatest risks during pregnancy. Research has shown that reducing stress during pregnancy can positively impact the mother's health and prevent babies from being born too early or too soon. Statistics raise concern about who is at risk otherwise.

This was followed by another uplifting part of the City Council meeting: the recent

Cuban Festival here. The entire City Council attended. In fact, the festival was very well attended and a real success. Appreciation was expressed for the Council's support. Councilwoman Manning said she would like to buy raffle tickets now for next year's festival, as the prizes were awesome.

It was all good, and then, well... it is, after all, a political season. Two members of the public came forward, each of whom expressed dismay, anger, and disappointment about how some candidates were acting. This was echoed later in the meeting when Council member Monteiro had his say. He decried what he described as the lying and underhandedness of some who are running for office. You could hear a pin drop during his fervent remarks.

The unhappiness expressed during this part of the Council's meeting was disquieting, to put it mildly. I want to say, "Oh, it's all just part of the political process", but ugliness is ugly, and does not feel good at all. If you have a nice meal, it is hard to then say, "Man, that was really good, except for the part that made me quite sick to my stomach..."

Fortunately, we had a very constructive agenda item: Planning Director Greg McClain discussed the status of Hawthorne's Economic Four-Year Development Plan. He explained that five goals were adopted in 2023, ranging from economic development strategies to improving development processes and customer service to updating the zoning code. Director McClain emphasized that there

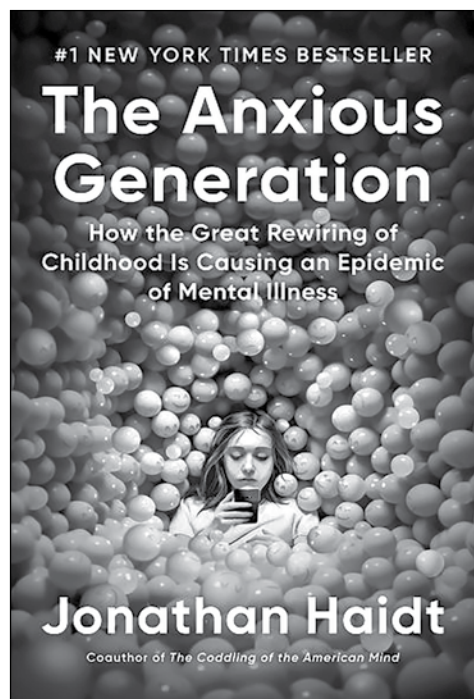

The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood Caused an Epidemic of Mental Illness by Jonathan Haidt

This week I will be reviewing New York Times Best Seller *The Anxious Generation* by Jonathan Haidt. Jonathan Haidt a social psychologist, discusses the epidemic of teen mental illness, across many countries at the same time, largely due in part to what he calls a “phone-based childhood.” Haidt begins by discussing the nature of childhood in the past and present and also emphasizes the importance of play and independence in childhood. Haidt explains that the “play-based childhood” began to decline in the 1980s and was eradicated by the arrival of the “phone-based childhood” in the early 2010s. He presents numerous findings and

states that this rewiring of childhood has impacted children’s social and neurological development. Haidt also explains why social media is more damaging to girls versus boys and why boys have been distracted from the real world into the virtual world through online gaming. Haidt discusses the implications for this and most importantly he issues a call to action. Haidt highlights the “collective action problems” that trap us and then offers four simple rules that could help set us free. Haidt provides solutions for parents, teachers, schools, tech companies and governments to end the epidemic of mental illness and restore a more gentle childhood. This books contains a lot of facts and findings but is written in a way that keeps you engaged. It would be an interesting read for parents, people who work with children or anyone that is interested in learning more about the impact technology has had on children in recent years. Film Review

The Outrun: A Best-Selling Memoir Turns Into a Shattering Slice-of-Life Drama

Director Nora Fingscheidt transforms Amy Liptrot’s best-selling memoir into a shattering slice-of-life drama in her film adaptation of *The Outrun*. The story features Saoirse Ronan, who makes a transformative turn as a recovering alcoholic attempting to find her footing in a new lifestyle. Ronan commands the screen with an overwhelming display of vulnerability and grit. Making its World Premiere at the 2024 Sundance Film Festival, *The Outrun* is a tender story about one young woman’s struggle to reach stability and find inner peace in a chaotic world. Now playing in theaters.

The film opens with a stunning underwater shot of seaweed flowing gracefully among the coral reef. There is a sense of tranquility below the surface, off the shores of Scotland’s Orkney Islands. The remote island is a place that 29-year-old Rona (Ronan) knows well, but the sense of peace is a feeling she struggles to accept. For the past ten years, Rona has lived in London, where she fell into an unsustainable and dysfunctional lifestyle of partying and drinking. Despite having a Masters degree in Biology, Rona has been unemployed and directionless. Her life takes a dramatic downward spiral after a night out when she becomes blackout drunk and accepts a ride from a stranger. The next day, she wakes with no recollection of the previous night’s events. She then discovers that she has been assaulted, and her boyfriend—fed up with her unpredictability and recklessness—has finally left.

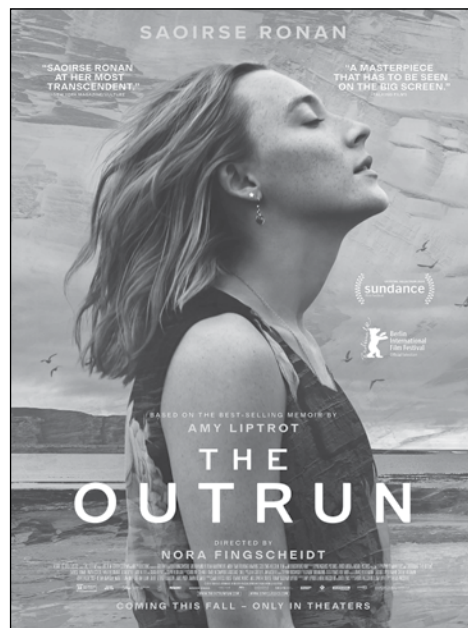
Attempting to get her life back on track, Rona returns home to her family farm on the Orkney Islands and checks into rehab. Rona knows she’s doing the right thing, but

she still misses parts of her former alcohol-fueled life back in London. She flashes back to these moments often, both the good (falling in love with her boyfriend) and the bad (hiding bottles of booze around the bathroom for sneaky drinking). As much as she tries to suppress these memories, especially the details of the horrifying event that led her here, the intrusive thoughts continue to leak into Rona’s present life.

A lot of these triggers also come from her father, who struggles with addiction himself. His toxic behavior encourages Rona to relive the worst of her childhood traumas. But through perseverance and the trust of her newfound and tight-knit sober community, Rona eventually feels confident enough to embark on her journey of recovery. Returning to Orkney is returning to true identity, and though sobriety never gets easy, it eventually gets less hard.

At its core, *The Outrun* is a spiritual awakening in film format. Through stunning cinematography, DP Yunus Roy Imer immerses audiences in Rona’s mystical world. The poetic visuals offer insight into her complex inner narrative. At the height of Rona’s addiction, her story is lensed through handheld camerawork. These moments are shot intentionally out of focus and with a blurriness around the edge of the screen, alluding to Rona’s drunken double vision. Once she reaches her family’s farm, the colors that leap from the screen are jaw-droppingly stunning. The arresting visuals, including lush hills and chilling Arctic waters, ring similar to the beauty of *The Banshees of Inisherin*.

The Outrun is a poetic and transfixing film about returning to oneself. Rona’s story shows that sometimes, surrendering to chaos is the necessary first step. What follows is acceptance, which gives way to autonomy, and can finally result in a positive change. •

Renovate your home without wrecking your budget

These remodeling tips from Bank of America could help you make the most of your home—and potentially even increase its resale value.

Have those home improvement shows got you thinking about renovating your kitchen or knocking down walls to expand your living room? You are not alone. In 2023, homeowners were projected to spend \$485 billion on home improvements and repairs, according to Harvard's Joint Center for Housing Studies¹, up just slightly from 2022 but a 19% increase over 2021.

In addition, after years of rising home prices, homeowners may be more willing—and able—to tap their residence's equity. The right kind of renovation can help make your home worth more. But keep in mind that even a moderately ambitious renovation project can be expensive and time-consuming. So before you start picking out paint colors, make sure your time and money will be well spent and that your project will add to your home's value—not just your stress level. Ask yourself these questions:

Renovate or not?

Check out comparable homes in your area.

Would your home suffer by comparison if you put it up for sale? How many bedrooms do they have on average? Do most have gourmet kitchens and finished basements? If you want to keep up with the Joneses, do research to see how likely it is that you will be able to recoup the cost of your renovation when you sell.

Keep in mind that you could make your home more difficult to sell by doing too much. Expensive renovations do not always make up for their cost. According to the Remodeling 2023 Cost vs. Value Report², for instance, you are likely to recapture only 42% of what you spend on a major kitchen remodel.

How will you pay for the renovation?

With any renovation, it is easy to get caught up in the fun decisions—selecting fixtures, colors and decor. Before you get carried away, put your finances in order. Start with a budget, not just a ballpark figure. It is important to establish exactly how much you are willing to spend. There is a phenomenon known as scope creep, in which you add a little of this and a little of that, and before you know it, your budget is blown. Setting limits will help you determine what

you can afford—and help prevent financial stress later.

If you are not paying for your renovation with savings, you will need to borrow. A home equity line of credit may be an attractive option, allowing you to pay expenses as they come up. You might also consider a cash-out refinance when new mortgage rates are lower than your current rate.

How is your money best spent?

Which is a better use of home improvement dollars—updating a tired kitchen or replacing drafty windows? When you eventually sell, potential buyers are likely to balk at glaring structural issues. Redoing your siding gives your house a visible face-lift and also makes for a warmer, more energy-efficient home. According to the Remodeling 2023 Cost vs. Value Report², new vinyl siding can recoup 95% of the cost (on average).

Look for smaller projects that add immediate value, like replacing your front door with a higher-quality version. First impressions matter, and the door is the first thing potential buyers notice.

Are you planning to stay in your home as you age? Then you might not want your proposed renovation to include additional stairs or a doorway that might not be easily navigable with a wheelchair or walker. Think instead about things like a shower with seating or kitchen cabinets with pull-up and pull-down shelves.

Do it yourself or hire a pro?

You can sometimes save money by tackling a project—or part of it, like painting or spackling—yourself. With thousands of how-to videos online, it is easier than ever to become a DIY expert. But know your limits. It might seem like a good idea to tackle costly tasks yourself. But some jobs, like rewiring an outlet or retiling a bathroom, are best left to the pros. Taking on a project for which you are not qualified could be dangerous as well as ultimately more expensive when you have

is ample progress toward accomplishing the goals; ahead of schedule, except in one instance which is being dealt with.

Council whisked through quite a few consent items, such as approving progress payments (some involving significant sums of money), awarding a city contract, and setting up and licensing code enforcement software. Much business gets done at the meetings in this truncated (consent calendar) way. It is indeed part of the meat and potatoes of

Council business.

At the end of the Agenda, there were several matters listed for “closed session.” One of these matters involved negotiation on the acquisition of the Bank of America building, which is in connection with the City Hall Expansion and Civil Center Park. The other items were litigation-related. It bears mentioning that City Council meetings are subject to the well-established Brown Act. This is California’s open meeting law, which

requires transparent government meetings for local legislative bodies. There are exceptions, however, for genuinely sensitive legal matters (those go to the closed session).

It could well be rather interesting to be a “fly on the wall” when the Council goes into closed session, but ultimately, a report (typically rather terse) is issued outlining what the City decides to do—such as rejecting a claim or continuing forward with a contract. Litigation claims are typically rejected.

All told this was a substantive City Council meeting. Sadly, it also came with a reminder that not all is “warm and fuzzy” in our political climate. Controversy may well be inevitable, and discourse simply may not always be rosy and light. But much more civility in our politics would be welcomed. You get more bees with honey. I think otherwise, we all get stung.

Things Everyone Should Know About Falls and Concussions

(BPT) - Five million people go to the emergency department for a traumatic brain injury (TBI) in the U.S. each year, but more than half of people who suspect they have a concussion never get it checked. A main reason for this is that people aren't familiar with the common causes and symptoms of concussions, and unfortunately, there are a lot of myths out there. One especially dangerous myth is that concussions only happen to athletes. Most concussions occur when people fall while doing everyday activities - such as falling while taking a shower or tripping on a toy at home. These types of falls account for nearly half of all concussions in the U.S. And while concussions can happen to anyone, rates of concussions increase significantly in older adults.

Concussions can result from almost anything when the brain moves in ways it shouldn't. While falls are the most common cause, concussions can also be caused by a hit to the head or jolts (think: a car crash or whiplash).

Falls are the leading cause of injuries for older Americans and can have serious, life-threatening consequences, including concussions. The latest data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) show that people age 75+ have the highest numbers and rates of TBI-related hospitalizations and deaths compared to other age groups. Furthermore, older adults have a higher risk for severe outcomes following a concussion, including strokes.

NCOA leads the National Falls Prevention Resource Center, which supports awareness and educational efforts about falls, and

promotes evidence-based falls prevention programs and strategies across the nation. Visit NCOA's website for more tips on falls prevention and healthy aging.

Despite the widespread prevalence of concussions, most adults can't identify the common signs. A common myth about concussions is that all concussions result in a loss of consciousness, but that isn't the case.

It's important to recognize the following symptoms if you experience a head injury:

- Changes in emotions
- Changes to sleep patterns
- Clumsiness
- Dizziness or feeling off-balance
- Exhaustion
- Headaches
- Memory Loss
- Mental fog or concentration problems
- Nausea or vomiting
- Numbness or tingling
- Personality changes or irritability
- Sensitivity to noise or light
- Loss of consciousness
- Slowed reaction time
- Vision issues
- Vomiting

Concussions can be evaluated in several ways, most often including a physical evaluation and a series of questions. A physician will look for physical symptoms, such as balance and vision issues, and then ask questions that might help uncover other potential symptoms, such as memory loss and slowed reaction time.

Unfortunately, this process is subjective, as a physician must make a diagnosis decision

based on their evaluation of the situation. In patients where symptoms aren't obvious (think: a patient with memory loss being asked if they've forgotten anything), this approach to diagnosis isn't always effective. CT scans and MRIs are often conducted when a concussion is suspected, but these scans are used to detect brain bleeds and can't identify other concussion symptoms.

The good news is that major advancements are happening in evaluating mild traumatic brain injury (mTBI). Abbott's i-STAT TBI cartridge - a simple blood test - received

clearance from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) as a prescription use only test to help physicians assess patients with suspected mTBI at the patient's bedside. Abbott is working with hospitals around the globe and the Concussion Awareness Now braintrust of partners to make concussion testing widely available to ensure everyone can get the best possible care. Because concussions can happen to anyone, it is vital that everyone knows the risks, what symptoms to watch out for, and how to respond if you may have experienced a concussion. •



it lets you use our wide-reaching adoption infrastructure to find homes for the cats or kittens you have. There's no commitment to volunteer with us beyond the kitties you rescue personally or need to rehome.
