Local Student Earns Valedictorian **Honors in Nontraditional School Setting**

For Angelica Pronto, graduating valedictorian was a goal she had established for herself years before high school. Earning her 4.41 grade point average was the result of a commitment to earning the highest academic honor in high school and working to achieve it since seventh grade, when she first entered Capistrano Connections Academy.

"When I joined Connections Academy, I always knew that I wanted to attain that achievement," Pronto said. "I wanted to follow in the footsteps of my mom who was a valedictorian as well."

Unlike traditional schools where students and teachers meet in a classroom for several hours a day, at Capistrano Connections Academy teachers work directly with each student and their parents (learning coaches) to develop an individualized learning plan that provides instruction while evaluating assignments.

"All of our students are working from the comfort of their own home--they are working virtually with a fully qualified and credentialed teacher," teacher at Capistrano Connections Academy Leslie Dombeck said. "That means that the teachers are better able to individualize the curriculum. We are able to tailor our instruction to more one-on-one tutoring or smaller group instruction as well. All of our students receive the curriculum at home and then they are doing lessons live with their teachers in something we call live lessons. That is similar to the teacher being in front of a classroom except that they are doing it virtually."

Instruction and administration are both conducted via the Internet, by telephone and

e-mail. All teachers work from centralized offices and hubs, under the supervision of a principal or other administrator. Due to the virtual nature of the academy, students are constantly reminded that teachers are just a phone call away.

"Our teachers, our administrative staff and our advisory staff work very closely with

the student and also with the family and the parents to ensure that everyone is on the same page and that we not only talk about the process and how things work, but how we can make things better for everyone," Dombeck said. "Every student, parent and teacher goes through training before it all

Volunteers Looking for Help Building Bocce Courts

The Friends of Torrance Exceptional Athletes (FTEA) is looking to raise money to construct three handicap and elderly accessible bocce courts on an unused basketball court at Columbia Park to provide a safe and convenient place for Torrance's aging, physically challenged and general populations to a sport dating back to ancient times. The group hopes to raise between \$55,000 and \$60,000 to create three unique bocce courts at Columbia Park. Before setting off on this project, FTEA surveyed the existing bocce courts in the South Bay and found that all of them were inaccessible to wheelchairs and treacherous for crutches and other mobility-impacting afflictions--and few had illumination in case matches run a little past sundown. They then found a possible location and designed a more accommodating layout for their courts that would be free of steps and provide illumination. The only hurdle left for the group is funding. They are hoping to build these courts at no cost

By Dylan Little to the City and are instead relying on taxdeductable donations. Volunteer Bob Chiota hopes the community will be generous with the project and see the benefits not only for older residents and special athletes, but for all of Columbia Park's visitors as well as for anyone looking to save money on their taxes with a donation. "This is a win-win-win initiative," said Chiota. "Dig deep. I mean, please be generous."

Bocce is a staple of FTEA's athletics, especially for older athletes who are no longer able to participate in strenuous contact sports such as soccer or basketball. Bocce provides them with many of the benefits of the sports they can no longer play, such as staying active and healthy, being social and building self-esteem. Chiota says the game can be played by anyone, regardless of disability, including the wheelchairbound and the blind. Currently there are over 50 athletes participating in FTEA's bocce program.

Growing up in Pennsylvania Dutch country, when my grandmother was exasperated with something, she would say: "Give me strength and salvation"!

Asking ourselves questions such as "What is salvation?" is a good thing for we many times use terms and think we know exactly what they are but have really never questioned them as adults.

Whatever salvation meant to my grandmother, I will never know for I never knew a a child but I did know it had something to do with religion!

Many people would most likely define salvation as a saving from wrong doing/"sin" or a deliverance from wrong doing/"evil". Sin, evil, hell then creep into our definitions and light on their meaning must be given as well. Assault With Deadly Weapon On Police Officer

Carjacking Suspect in Custody

On Thursday June 28, at approximately 7 p.m., gang investigators with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's Operation Safe Streets Bureau arrested the outstanding suspect sought in connection with a carjacking incident occurring in the City of Torrance and a separate incident involving the suspect shooting at Torrance Police Detectives near the City of Compton. Los Angeles County Sheriff's Investigators identified and located the suspect during an ongoing investigation following the shooting incident near Compton. The suspect arrested was identified as Markeese Slocum, 25 years, who resides in the City of Compton. Slocum was arrested in an apartment complex in the 500 block of East Esther Street in the City of Long Beach and charged with assault with a deadly weapon on a police officer, attempted murder on a police officer, carjacking, and robbery.

On Sunday June 24, at about 11 p.m., a victim in the 23800 block of Crenshaw Blvd. in the City of Torrance reported being confronted by a male suspect with a handgun and having his truck carjacked. The suspect fled the area in the victim's truck.

On Wednesday June 27, Torrance Police Detectives developed information on the possible whereabouts of the stolen truck taken during the carjacking. At about 9:00 a.m., while conducting follow up investigation in the area 139th Street and San Pedro Street

near Compton, the detectives attempted to contact two males who were possible suspects. Both suspects fled from the detectives, one ran away into the surrounding neighborhood and the other got into a truck and drove away. The detectives followed the truck and the suspect driving fired an undetermined number of rounds from a handgun at the detective's vehicle, hitting the detective's vehicle at least one time. No officers were injured. The suspect in the truck fled the area. A containment of the area was set up with the assistance of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and other surrounding agencies. The suspect who ran away was located and arrested inside the containment area. That suspect was identified as Antwan Bacon, 20 years, who resides in the City of Los Angeles. Bacon was charged with possession of a stolen vehicle. The second suspect was not located at the time of the search. The truck in which the second suspect fled in was later located unoccupied in a nearby area and determined to be the stolen truck taken during the carjacking incident in the City of Torrance on June 24, 2011.

This crime is being investigated under the command and direction of Acting Captain Michael Jezulin of the Special Operations Bureau. Anyone with information about these incidents is encouraged to contact the Torrance Police Department Detective Division at (310) 618-5570. •

A game is played between two players, or two teams of up to four players each. A match is started by having one side throw a smaller ball called the pallino from one end of the court into a zone near the far end of the court. The side that threw the jack is then able to start bowling. Once the first bowl has taken place, the other side has the opportunity to bowl. From then on, the side which does not have the ball closest to the jack has a chance to bowl, up until one side or the other has used their four balls. At that point, the other side bowls its remaining balls. The team with the closest ball to the jack is the only team that can score points. The scoring team receives one point for each of their balls closer to the jack than the closest ball of the other team. The length of a game varies, but is usually between seven and 13 points.

Lorna Clark, the mother of a bocce-playing special athlete, would like to see FTEA's bocce players get a court they can make use of every week instead of the current chaotic incarnation that has them playing at different parks throughout the city. "My daughter has always loved sports," said Clark. "Now that she has aged out of basketball and other contact sports, bocce has provided her a great deal of pleasure through exercise and social opportunities. Up until now, special needs athletes have been playing in various parks on courts marked with ropes and utilizing whatever space may be available.

Torrance officials are also excited by the idea of new bocce courts. At a recent City Council meeting, Mayor Frank Scotto asked Chiota for a game once the courts were completed. Community Services Director John Jones also backs the project and wrote FTEA a letter of support. He said that the new facilities would benefit all the residents of Torrance, including but not limited to seniors and special needs bocce players. "I am proud to endorse the fundraising campaign to develop and install three state-of-the-art bocce courts at Columbia Park," wrote Jones. "Bocce is a popular sport that allows for group participation of all ages and physical abilities. All residents within the city of Torrance will directly benefit from the creation of these courts, including the special needs and senior population."

Louie Zamperini, a well-known figure in Torrance and former Olympian, World War II prisoner of war and inspirational speaker, also penned a statement supporting the bocce courts. In it he said that facilities similar to the proposed bocce courts were part of how he dealt with the challenges he faced. "These unique courts will provide fun, sociable and healthy exercise alternative for all South Bay residents, especially the Wounded Warrior Veterans," wrote Zamperini. "These benefits are part of what allowed me to survive the challenges I faced." •

One Man's Opinion

This morning I'm working on my first cup of joe--the neighborhood cat wrapped around my feet looking for a handout and I'm browsing through the morning rag's report on national tragedies. A small inside page article called my attention to the fact that the Fourth of July is coming, and it got me to thinking about the Founding Fathers and what they would have thought about our stewardship of this ship of state they had handed to us. Thomas Paine, reflecting the challenges of his time, said, "These are the times that try men's souls," but I would suggest those sentiments apply to us as well. Pull up a chair, pour yourself a cup and let's chat a bit.

Do you remember when the very foundation of the American dream was an education from a word-class American university? That the result of that education was

a satisfying career...not just a job...but a career of the graduate's choosing? That the graduate could marry, have children and save enough money to buy his own home in a safe neighborhood? That his children could attend a functioning public school and the family be allowed to worship in a religion of its choosing? Wasn't it the dream of every parent that his children would stand on the shoulders of generations past and accomplish that which had eluded his elders? Where did that dream go?

Today, every aspect of that dream (quality university education, post-education career, marriage between a man and a woman, home ownership, quality public schools, practicing religion of one's choice) are all under siege. Elaborating on each of their challenges would be depressing and lead me to add Kahlua to my coffee. Suffice it to say, the American Dream has turned into a cruel mirage.

The most insidious consequence of our failing may be the death of national optimism--the belief in upward mobility and confidence in a brighter tomorrow. Sadly we now focus negatively on just avoiding catastrophe for one more day, one more week, one more year. After nearly four years, 62 percent of the country believes we are still in recession. The best we can dream of is anemic economic expansion that is insufficient to keep up with population growth, and the worst is a flat out 2013 economic recession. In the words of the civil rights movement, "Been down so long, it looks like up to me."

And in this era of discouraging news on an individual level, wouldn't you at least expect a President to respect the rule of law and the will of the people?

The Federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) defined a marriage as between a man and a woman, and is the law of the land, but President Obama has chosen to reject the Constitutional requirement that he enforce the law--but instead supports gay marriage. The issue is not whether or not one supports gay marriage. It is whether or not the President of the United States is required to follow the law. He says "not." In another arena, only 38 percent of the population supports Obamacare, but the President has chosen to reject the public will, directing the Health and Human Services

Court, the President has flipped off the court of public opinion. On June 15, the President by fiat declared that he will not enforce the provisions of the Immigration Act by stopping deportation of young illegals and beginning approval of work permits. Left unsaid was whether or not the parents of the 800,000 young immigrants will also be exempt from deportation. The President violates federal law, making

Thomas Paine would undoubtedly agree that these are times that try men's souls. We

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Dodgers Fall From Grace

It wasn't long ago that the Los Angeles Dodgers had the best record in the National League West and even beyond that, the best record in all of Major League Baseball. Anyone who watches the game of baseball, however, knows that the same boys in blue that previously had climbed to the top of the league are now looking like bums in blue, sliding all the way to the bottom even faster than they ascended. Certainly, the baseball season is a long campaign. With 162 games to be played to complete the sports year, it is regular to see good teams at times fall into slumps along the way. The Dodgers, however, aren't only in a slump They are on a meteoric descent that when over with may be the worst in team history, begging the question are these in fact the same Dodgers of last year that finished in third place in their division just slightly above the .500 mark?

The Los Angeles Dodgers led the NL West by as many as 7 1/2 games on May 27. At the time that this is presently being written, the Dodgers are now a game back in the standings of the San Francisco Giants and have been shut out five times in six games and six times in 12 games--including all three at San Francisco and at least two out of the four games against the New York Mets. Presently, those same Dodgers have produced only two runs in their last 57 innings played, seeing them lose seven games in a row and 11 out of their last 12. The slide has dropped the Dodgers from five games ahead in the NL West and in first place to where they are now--one game behind the Giants and in second place. These Dodgers don't seem to be the same team they were last year. Now, they seem to be even worse.

To give the team credit, the Dodgers are depleted by injuries that may explain some of their insufficiencies lately. Obviously, Matt Kemp has been out of the lineup for the majority of the year with his hamstring injury. Andre Ethier has been sidelined a few games with an oblique injury. The team's number two hitter and one of the best defensive second basemen in the game, Mark Ellis, almost lost his leg due to complications resulting from the injury that he suffered on May 19 that has seen him sidelined for almost a month and a half now. When you take the number two, three and four hitters out of any lineup in the league all at the same time and for an extended amount of time, you can expect the team's run production to drop off drastically. Not only are the big hitters for the Dodgers sidelined, but the other hitters on the team are being asked to take their spots and step into roles that they are not used to filling, thus having to work harder and thereby producing less.

Even so, help is on its way very soon. While Ethier was only sidelined for a few games, both Kemp and Ellis should be back directly after the All-Star game that takes place on July 10. Once those three get back into the lineup, the Dodgers will once again have their core back and the offense should finally do its part to end its worst slide in years and eventually start scoring runs again. Even through their horrific play of late, however, one thing separates this team from last year's. Stan Kasten and the ownership group that includes Magic Johnson, unlike Frank McCourt, are willing to do whatever it takes to win. Already looking overseas to enhance the team, Kasten and the Dodgers' front office recently signed 21-year-old Yasiel Puig to a seven-year deal in order to hopefully be the Dodgers left fielder of the future. Beyond that, the hot stove is burning white hot with trade rumors that have the Dodgers looking in various areas to improve their team and their brand. "I promise you we'll explore everything," Kasten said of his team's position on the trade market this year. "Look, as candid as we can be, we'te the Dodgers. We're supposed to be big. We intend to be big. Will we look at big things? You bet."

While there is nothing big about the way the Dodgers have been playing on the field recently, fans can rest assure that although it feels like it, it may not be the end of the world just yet. With names like Carlos Lee being rumored to join the Dodgers' clubhouse soon, it is clear that management is doing everything it can to better the team for a run at the playoffs this year. Once the lineup gets healthy and the trade deadline passes, the runs being put up on the scoreboard for the Dodgers should make this, the time of a completely anemic offense, almost completely forgettable.

Though many fans would love see that 7 1/2 game lead reappear in the standings, when put into perspective, the Dodgers aren't really putting themselves out of misery just yet. Only one game back of the National League West-leading Giants, the Dodgers still have the opportunity to retake the lead in the division standings even before the entire team gets healthy. Even so, if the Dodgers can make it to the All-Star break without slipping much more, then they certainly won't have to worry about the ghosts of last year with the visage of Frank McCourt revisiting their clubhouse anytime soon. •

If you haven't heard her talked about before, start getting used to it now. Tiffany Liu is one of the best swimmers in the city of Torrance. As a freshman, Liu isn't only new to West High, but is also new to Torrance. After being born in England, Liu grew up in Florida where she spent seven years of her life and later moved to Kansas where she spent three years before coming to California. Liu has moved around a lot due in large part to her father's profession, but through all of the change of scenery along the way, she has definitely made herself right at home here as a West High Warrior in Torrance.

Liu got her start in the city competing for Swim Torrance for the last two years before she finally entered high school and chose West as her destination. Though high school competition can be much different than competing on the club level, Liu was prepared in a way that most swimmers are not. For her, it is not how athletic she is that makes her such a fierce competitor. Rather, it is the mental capacity that she encompasses that makes her an almost unbeatable swimmer. "To get yourself in the right state of mind and be confident in what you are doing and push yourself in a positive way is a huge part of it," Liu said. Posting a time of 52.08 seconds, Liu set the league record before moving on to CIF. She also finished tied for fifth in the 200-meter freestyle with a time of 1:52.74.

Though she didn't beat all of the competition down at the CIF finals, Liu certainly made a statement. "Our bodies are capable of doing things we don't realize they can do and having confidence helps

starts that includes some basic training to give them the tools to know exactly what to do, how to access the teacher and how to submit their work. It's something we carry out throughout the entire year just to make sure that everyone is comfortable and the best way to do that is to ensure that everybody understands the process."

Being away from the traditional school setting did pose some challenges for Pronto. However, she believed that there was something missing in the traditional school setting that she was able to find through the curriculum offered at Capistrano Connections Academy. "I have always been an independent learner--even as a kid I never really asked my parents for that much help," Pronto said. "My mom quit her job because she wanted to take care of us, so she decided to try homeschooling with me and that's kind of how this would all develop. We knew that I would be able to thrive there because I am such an independent learner and rarely asked for help. This place would give me attention only if I would really need it."

Despite the convenience and flexibility that is attached to studying at Capistrano Connections Academy, there is a demanding curriculum with a great deal of focus on core courses such as English, History and Math. It's definitely easy to slack off."

Capistrano Connections Academy is an option for students who for various reasons can't attend a traditional school setting. Some of the student body's members are involved in the pursuit of acting careers, or dedicated to athletic development, which allows them to continue pursuing their passion while meeting the academic requirements set by the State.

"There is always a different reason for

being in different types of educational settings and we are of school choice, so if you are in search of something different from a traditional school, we can fill that need," Dombeck said. "As a teacher it is definitely something that because we are able to work with our whole class, we are also able to break it down to what those individual students need."

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Department of Transportation provides 'Blueprint for **Ending Distracted Driving'**

U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood released the Department of Transportation's "Blueprint for Ending Distracted Driving" during a press briefing Thursday. The plan, which builds on three years of research and initiatives to reduce distracted driving, details what needs to be done to further reduce traffic fatalities

"Distracted driving is an epidemic. While we've made progress in the past three years by raising awareness about this risky behavior, the simple fact is people are continuing to be killed and injured -- and we can put an end to it," LaHood

The plan focuses on four main recommendations to Congress, states and individuals and is available for download at www.

driving and provide good enforcement of those laws

As of June 8, 39 states have bans on texting while driving, and 10 states have outlawed the use of handheld devices while driving altogether. The Department of Transportation would like to see the remaining 11 states enact legislation banning texting.

Pilot projects publicizing and enforc-

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reduce the amount of texting and driving in these areas. Tickets and fines were issued. During the press briefing, LaHood said an expansion of these pilot projects is underway and will be focused on the areas of Sacramento, Calif., and the state of Delaware.

The Motor Vehicle and Highway Safety Act of 2012 currently includes \$39 million in grants to be awarded to states that have enacted distracted-driving legislation in order to help publicize and enforce the laws. Provided this element of the legislation is not removed before it is approved, these dollars could go a long way toward helping a larger percentage of the U.S. population see a greater reduction in distracted-driving incidents and fatalities.

Provide better education for young people about the dangers of distracted driving

Part of the blueprint discusses the importance of adding data about distracted driving to the standardized driver's training curriculum. In order to get teens involved in spreading the antitexting word, the Department of Transportation launched a design challenge. Teens have been charged with designing an icon that could be shared via social media and become known as a symbol of safe driving habits.

Address safety of developing technology This portion of the plan urges manufacturers to be cautious when designing in-car technology and to take distraction into account. This applies to developers of other handheld devices, too, as many drivers have become accustomed to bringing their technology with them into the car. A complete list of guidelines for manufacturers was rolled out as Phase I of transforming how vehicle manufacturers approach distracted driving. Phase II will further address other handheld devices but has not been released yet.

Get involved

During the press briefing, LaHood introduced a woman whose life had been instantly changed by a distracted driver. She described how she was stopped at a red light three years ago and was hit by someone who had been texting. The impact was severe and caused the innocent driver to suffer brain and spinal-cord injuries among others. She spent every day of the year following the accident in physical therapy trying to recover. Because she needed to work on her rehabilitation, she was forced to miss out on much of her high-schoolaged son's life. She felt horrible about this as she is her son's only parent. Her message was not only that people should not text and drive, but that everyone should let their loved ones know how much they are cared about and needed so that they think twice before texting too.

The blueprint encourages parents to talk to teens and suggests community members get involved in enacting legislation to stop distracted driving.

Involvement is important because, when all is said and done, the blueprint is nothing more than a recommendation and does not mandate safer behaviors.

Tip 1: Make planning a group activity

The most successful multigenerational vacations are when all family members are involved in choosing the destination. It will take some research to find the right locale for your vacation, and brainstorming with the entire group, young and old, to get ideas of where to go is a wise way to start your travel adventure. Do more people want a secluded trip with outdoor activity options, or does your family lean more toward travel to a big city with lots of shopping and museum visits? If everyone has a say in what type of vacation they enjoy up front, it's easier to narrow down destinations that will make everyone happy.

Tip 2: Find group accommodations

While getting separate hotel rooms can work for multigenerational travel, having a large suite or private residence where the entire group can reside provides a more unified travel experience. The key is to find a place that is comfortable for all and provides many of the conveniences of home, but still feels like a grand escape. An extra consideration: Look for accommodations with a full kitchen so your family can cook and eat meals together as desired. Starting the day with a full family breakfast or ending it with fresh baked cookies and milk can be a bonding experience in itself.

Many resorts have accommodations appropriate for groups, such as the Inn on Woodlake or The American Club Resort in Kohler, Wis. The resort recently opened a nearby private cabin, Sandhill, nestled on 350 acres in the wilderness near the western shores of Lake Michigan and approximately an hour north of Milwaukee. The cabin is close enough so groups can enjoy the amenities of the resort, yet far enough away to feel like a private retreat. This charming, yet rustic, private cabin sleeps six comfortably and has a full kitchen and an attached sauna and poker shack with fireplace.

Tip 3: Research activities

You might even be able to schedule some activities in advance to reduce stress once you have arrived.

Society's Addiction to Busy and Ignorance of Rest

Society has bred a generation of workaholics. It has changed people's attitudes about work and rest. Today, people are working too hard and resting too little. For 200 years, society and personal lifestyles have changed man's definition of the word rest and skewered it from a refuge from daily life into an activity that is looked down upon. With society's rapid pace, changing attitudes and transition into an interconnected global system, can people still get the rest they need?

Unfortunately in a number of developed countries, the answer is most likely to be no. Society has an addiction to staying busy--busy doing work, busy worrying about work, or even busy when there isn't any work. With the introduction of the computer, Starbucks and the disposable coffee cup, people are further disregarding a proper night's rest and replacing it with more activities to keep them away from the bed and into the workplace.

The key cause of society's ignorance for rest is because people tend to not get enough sleep. Unfortunately, today's generation thinks sleeping causes them to miss out on opportunity. But developing a habit of sleep deprivation is a risk to one's health and the safety of those around them.

Not giving your body the rest it deserves can greatly put you at a higher risk of heart conditions. According to the studies conducted by the University of Warwick, an individual who sleeps less than six hours a night has a 15 percent higher risk of developing or dying from a stroke and a terrifying 48 percent greater chance of developing or dying from a heart attack. Sleep deprivation also affects one's appearance and behavior as a lack of sleep can translate into an increase in weight, a short temper and a decrease in attention span and life expectancy.

Sleep deprivation can also endanger the safety of those around you. A study conducted by the British Medical Journal during 2000 announced that individuals who stayed awake for more than 17 hours possessed the behaviors and blood type of a drunkard. Their research involved sleepdeprived drivers taking various tests and compared it to results from an individual with a blood alcohol level of 0.5 percent. After the experiment, they concluded that the sleep-deprived driver actually performed worse than the intoxicated driver. The test's result is an accurate reproduction of real life as the National Sleep Foundation reported in a 2012 survey that 14 percent of truck drivers said they encountered a near miss because of their lack of sleep. The number of truck drivers experiencing near misses is small compared to train operators, with 18 percent, and airline pilots, who are at most risk with a stunning 20 percent.

Along with people not getting enough sleep, another reason for society's lack of sleep is how people spend their time away from work. Ever since the introductions of the television, individuals have spent their time away from work staying up later and giving up sleep to watch television. As the main source of entertainment changes from television to computers, individuals are more likely to stay up late because of the unlimited source of information and entertainment the Internet provides. Although activities such as watching television or using the computer may be considered as a way to unwind, they do not provide the body with any way of recovering from the rigors of everyday life and only gives the user headaches after prolonged use. By failing to take advantage of the time given to rest and instead using it to interfere with one's sleep cycle, the individual is putting their life at risk for the health problems listed earlier.

While society's rapid rate continues to increase, more companies are exploiting tired workers and creating an entire industry dedicated to keeping people awake. Instead of listening to their bodies and giving it a rest, people look for high caffeine beverages to temporarily mask their bodies' yearns. This is where coffee chains like Starbucks and Coffee Bean succeed. Companies such as the world famous Starbucks have mastered the science of marketing and transformed the coffeehouse from a simple beverage store to the social watering hole.

As society continues to grow, humanity should be more responsible in listening to their bodies. Contrary to what others may say, rest should be as, if not more, important than what happens during the daily grind. In the issue about society's sacrifice of rest for opportunity, the dangers outweigh the benefits. Although people claim that giving up sleep is the key to success, it is also a path to a shorter life. When given the opportunity to get enough rest, people should take advantage of such an opening instead of wasting it doing senseless activities. The Dalai Lama famously said that man "lives as if he is never going to die, and then dies having never truly lived." In the world's rush toward an everlasting workday, people should take responsibility of their bodies and not ignore its needs in exchange for the mirage of opportunity. •


